




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About the Author

I am so excited for you to begin this journal. My goal for creating this journal was to help my family, and yours, dive into the story of Jesus' death and resurrection this Easter. My hope is that your children will learn something new and grow a deeper knowledge and understanding about the sacrifice Jesus made on the cross.

This journal is designed to be a Bible study for kids to grow in their Bible literacy and knowledge of the Word. This journal will walk kids through the events leading up to Jesus' death, His crucifixion, and His resurrection. Each lesson only takes about 10–15 minutes to complete. This study journal is divided into six weeks, with five days of reading each week. You can also do one lesson a day over 30 days to finish in one month.

There are activities and song suggestions included for each week. These are added for extra opportunities to learn about Christ and reinforce the lessons being learned that week. The most important thing is reading the Bible and learning about our Savior's sacrifice. I hope you and your family enjoy this study!

BIBLE READING

- Day 1: Why did Jesus have to die?

Option 1: Fasting

Do a fast as a family. Every one gives up something to focus more on God and prayer. You can try a week-long fast, 2 weeks long, 1 month, or 40 days. Pick whatever works for your family.

Why Did Jesus Have To Die?

Start by Reading John 3:16 and 2 Corinthians 5:21

We start this journal by understanding why Jesus had to die for our sins. When God created the world, He made everything perfect. However, the first man and woman ever created sinned and disobeyed God. Because of their sin, all people born from them would be sinners. God's punishment for sin is death and eternal separation from Him. However, God had a plan to save us all. He chose to send His Son, Jesus, to the earth to be born fully human and fully God. Jesus' purpose was to obey His Father perfectly and take the judgment of sin upon Himself. Because God is holy and just, sin must be punished. Jesus willingly endured God's wrath and judgment for all sins even though He never sinned. Jesus died on the cross, but God resurrected Him from the dead because He was innocent. We can now be saved and have eternal life with God in Heaven when we believe in Jesus.

 Option 1: Jesus died so we could be saved and have eternal life with Him. Option 2: Copy verse John 3:16

Jesus Foretells His Death & Resurrection

Start by Reading Matthew 16:21-23, 17:22-23, and 20:17-19

In this part of Jesus' life, He is now preparing His twelve disciples for His death. Jesus dying on the cross was part of God's sovereign plan from the beginning, and Jesus is now sharing that plan with His disciples. In Matthew, Jesus tells His disciples about His upcoming death and resurrection three different times. The first time, in chapter 16, Peter denied it and told Jesus he didn't ever want that to happen. Jesus gave a harsh rebuke to Peter because anyone that tried to discourage Jesus from dying on the cross was fulfilling Satan's plan and not God's. The third time Jesus shared about His death, in chapter 20, He prophesied exactly what would happen. He told His disciples He would be betrayed, mocked, scourged, and crucified. Jesus prophesied of His death and said He would be raised on the third day.



Jesus' Triumphal Entry Into Jerusalem

Start by Reading Luke 19:28-40 and Zechariah 9:9

The triumphal entry into Jerusalem is also referred to as Palm Sunday, which is the Sunday before Jesus' crucifixion. This entry was prophesied in Zechariah 9:9. Jesus fulfilled the prophecy by riding on a colt into Jerusalem. A colt is a young donkey. This colt had never been ridden, which showed Jesus' command over nature by having the donkey remain calm. Since the donkey had not been ridden, it was also suited for holy purposes. Riding a donkey signified peace. Kings would normally ride on horses, which symbolized power and war. The disciples laid their coats on the colt, and multitudes of people laid their coats and palm branches in the street. Laying their coats in the streets symbolized the welcoming of a new king, and the palm branches represented joy and salvation.
