Independent Administrator John Tanner AM Statement to Council 22/03/23

Welcome to this evening's Shire Council meeting and thank you for attending it as my first in my role as Independent Administrator of the Council.

My role

Since taking up my appointment last week, many people have been asking about my role. My role is that of the Independent Administrator.

As such, I not only carry out the role of Mayor, but also the Councillors. This means that I act as the Council.

I have the authority under the Local Government Act to undertake this role and to make the appropriate decisions on the information and proposals that are put before me by the Council Administration.

This also extends to the community. I am also open to meeting with community members and stakeholder groups on matters of importance to them and the Shire and its future.

Not the CEO

I must stress, I'm not the CEO of the Council that is not my role.

However, I want to assure you that I'm working closely with the current Acting CEO Joshua Lewis to ensure good governance practices are in place to enable council services to be delivered effectively for the community and that the health and wellbeing of the staff are a

In my tenure here over the three months period, I also want to lay the foundations for ensuring that the interests of local residents and business have a solid basis on which to

It will be from these foundations that the permanent Panel of Administrators can work towards to ensuring good governance practices are restored so that elections can be held at the Shire in 2028.

Commission of Inquiry has ended.

Another thing that many people have been

concerned about is the Independent Commission of Inquiry.

Firstly, I want the community to know that the Independent Commission into the Council's operations is finished – the Inquiry and the Commission have ended.

It was from this that the Commission's report was presented to the Minister for Local Government and this led to legislation being introduced to Parliament in the second week of March to dissolve the

Council and appoint me as Independent Administrator for this three month period.

Key areas of role

Now, let me turn to some key areas of my role. Naturally, I have a number of important tasks ahead of me.

Apart from my focus on the Council and its operations, I'm also addressing the key recommendations of the Commission.

Both of these bring me to the community perspective.

What I want to look into are the aspirations that drive the community to have pride in the shire and to be part of it.

An essential part of this is the Council's engagement and relationships with the community.

I acknowledge there have been difficulties in the past from both the community's and the staff's perspectives.

I want to assure you that I have every confidence that the Council's staff will play their part in this and I hope that community share this also.

Therefore, I'm looking for the community to be involved in the wide range of activities more



recommendations opportunity to reset and build. This also falls into line with one

of the key Recommendations of the Commission of Inquiry.



My experience as the Administrator of the Brimbank Council shows that this can be achieved.

You may see the Commission's inquiry and report as a loss of democratic representation, but this has happened for a number of reasons. Rest assured; you are also not alone in being under administration.

There are two others currently - Casey and Whittlesea. Both are under administration until October next year (2024). And there have been others in the past including South Gippsland and Brimbank

Tuseum Moments...

If you read last weeks story about the Back to Nathalia Invitation that was sent to the Historical Society you may have noticed some interesting activities planned for the event. One such activity which caught our eye was the River trip on the Steamer Avoca. It made us wonder why this was part of the celebrations for Nathalia.

Thanks to our researcher Lyn Franklin, we can shed some light on the association between this paddle steamer and Nathalia. The Griffith family information was taken from a book 'Son of a Carpenter', co-written by Joy Bell (Mirtschin).

PS Avoca was built in 1877 at Milang, SA. After a series of other owners, it was purchased in 1922 by J.G. Arnold (who formed River Murray Navigation Co.) for transporting supplies to the locks building on the Murray. He took her from Pt Adelaide with only minor repairs carried out and made the perilous return to the river.

The two masts which had been erected for open gulf work were removed at Murray Bridge to permit the steamer to reach Mannum where she underwent an extensive refit.

From 1928 to 1948, Daniel Ernest Treacy was the owner. He was born in Echuca in 1883 and died in NSW in 1975. Treacy married Adelaide Griffiths in 1909 and had the following children were born in Nathalia; Kathleen 1911, Mona 1913, and Maurice in 1915. In 1909 their son John was born in Echuca, and in 1920 Terrence was born in

So you can see that in 1938 the PS. Avoca was owned by Daniel Treacy and he had family connection to Nathalia. His wife was the twelfth child of Narioka pioneer John Griffith for whom Griffith Lane is named. Daniel and Adelaide Treacy lived at Barmah for quite a few years after their marriage. Some time after 1915 their lives became centered around the river boat trade. Dan became part owner of the "Murrumbidgee" and later owned steamers at Mildura, including the "Avoca".

With a slump in the river trade Dan turned the Avoca into a showboat and with the help of his family ran this for eighteen years at Mildura. A five-piece band played on the night trips with their son Jack as compere and Jack's wife as pianist.

Dan & Adelaide spent their later years at Corowa, and after the death of her husband, Adelaide moved back to Nathalia. They are both buried in Nathalia Cemetery.

I provide intensive support to vulnerable older people across the

Moira Shire, who are not able to navigate the Aged Care System or arrange services for themselves to continue to live at home safely and independently. These older people may not have family members, friends or support people available to assist them to find services, programs or support, they require.

Who can access Care Finder?

Care Finders specifically assist older people who may have difficulties working through the complex aged care system. These older people may have



communication difficulties due to hearing, vision or language barriers and may not be confident in engaging with aged care or government services. Older people may also need someone to advocate on their behalf and liaise with organisations to receive services.

Check your smoke alarms

hen was the last time you checked your smoke alarms? While technology has changed over the years, the key message in relation to smoke alarms remains the same - only working smoke alarms save lives.

North East Region CFA Manager of Community Safety Darren Viney said "Properly maintaining your smoke alarms can save your life, it's no good having a smoke alarm installed if it isn't working. When people change their clocks for daylight savings we are asking them to also check their smoke alarms".

Regardless of the type of smoke alarms you have:

- Test monthly use a broom stick to press the button on your smoke alarms, hold until the alarm beeps three times
- Dust regularly
- All smoke alarms (hard-wired and standalone) need to be replaced every 10 years
- Smoke alarms must meet Australian Standard AS3786


If you have smoke alarms with replaceable batteries, you need to change the batteries annually. The end of daylight savings is a good prompt to do

Recent research indicates the importance of installing smoke alarms in all living and sleeping areas throughout the home. "Current research shows the number and location of working smoke alarms in the home increase your family's chances of escaping from a fire. Over the last 10 years most fatal fires started at night, either in lounge rooms or bedrooms. People lose their sense of smell when they are asleep, so the smell of smoke won't wake them up. Therefore, CFA recommend smoke alarms be placed in every living area and bedroom. Having working smoke alarms is your first line of defence in the event of a fire", Mr Viney said.

CFA recommends installing smoke alarms powered by a 10 year long-life lithium battery on the ceiling at least 30 centimetres from the wall. Recommendations include having interconnected smoke alarms – so that when one sounds, the others will do the same.

There are also a number of simple measures people can take around the

home in order to prevent fires from happening in the first place, these include:





- Never overcharging devices
- Never leaving devices on bedding to charge
- Ensuring home heating, including flues and chimneys, are regularly cleaned and serviced by a certified technician.
- Never leaving cooking unattended

CFA also asks that people regularly update and practice their home fire escape plan with all family members.

Maloney descendants reunite at Barmah

ome of the many descendants of James and Elizabeth \mathcal{I} Maloney met at Barmah on Sunday, 19 March for their fiveyearly reunion. The oldest descendant was 94-year-old Dick Maloney. Unfortunately, the only remaining Maloney still living in Barmah, Nancy, wife of Darcy Maloney, was not at the reunion. James and Elizabeth came to Barmah in 1870 and promptly made an impact, with James building the first Barmah Hotel and general store plus taking over the ownership of the punt.

The pub stayed in family hands until 1946 when James' grandson, Cliff Maloney snr sold the premises to Eric Keogh.

The current hotel is the third, built by Carsten Carstensen in 1965. The second hotel was built in 1882 by James' son, William Thomas, after the original was destroyed by fire in 1878.

The punt stayed in the family's hands until 1929 when it was sold to New South Wales government, which had a new punt built. It is the one currently on site at Barmah.

The next Maloney reunion will be in 2028.

National Ride2School Day is Australia's biggest celebration of active travel and one of the best days on the school calendar.


It is a day full of fun and colour where students, teachers and parents


discover the joy of riding and kick-start healthy habits for the future. We also celebrated Epilepsy Awareness (Purple Day) last Friday,

What do you value most about lower Broken and Nine Mile creeks?

athalia, Numurkah and Wunghnu residents are invited to have their say on management of the lower Broken and Nine Mile creeks at a community workshop being held by Goulburn Broken CMA.

GB CMA River Health and Environmental Water Project Coordinator Pam Beattie said the workshop would focus on what is valued most about the creek by the community, desired improvements and identifying top priorities for works. The feedback will contribute to GB CMA's Environmental Water Management Plan.

"Goulburn Broken CMA will be updating the Environmental Water Management Plan for lower Broken Creek and Nine Mile Creek over the coming year," Ms Beattie said.

"This plan is a 10 -year document and provides an opportunity to think about what we can do better in terms of flow management and other waterway improvement activities.

"While the plan has a primary focus on improving environmental values, it is also important to make sure the objectives within the plan reflect what the local community thinks is most valuable about the creek and what needs further attention.

"We look forward to hearing what the community has to say and building it into our upcoming work on the lower Broken and Nine Mile creeks."

Lower Broken Creek, including Nine Mile Creek, forms part of the larger Broken Creek system that originates at Casey's Weir on the Broken River north of Benalla. Lower Broken and Nine Mile Creek is the section covering some 200km from Katamatite to Barmah, and taking in the townships of Numurkah, Wunghnu and Nathalia.

Originally an intermittent creek cared for by Yorta Yorta people, the creek has been altered and operated as a regulated, almost permanent waterway for the past 100 years, enabling the growth of local towns and irrigation developments.

This period of transformation involved sections of the creek being straightened, dredged and controlled through multiple weir structures. All of these changes have impacted the health of the creek by altering flow patterns, the physical shape of the creek and the type of habitat available.

Ms Beattie said despite these changes, lower Broken Creek remained a highly valuable asset within the Murray-Darling Basin supporting cultural values, rural communities and threatened native species such as Murray cod and golden perch.

"The creek forms part of the fabric of the Numurkah and Nathalia townships, providing a source of water and food, a place for recreation, and at times, an escape from the drought-stricken landscape," she said. "In recognition of this value, there has been considerable investment to improve the health of lower Broken Creek over recent decades. The installation of fishways on weir structures, reinstating deep pools and woody snags, native fish stocking, re-introducing threatened catfish, protecting the riparian zone through creating reserves and delivering

water for the environment, have all worked towards improving aspects of the creek.

"These efforts have seen some improvements in water quality, the availability of instream habitat and consequently the native fish community, with researchers finding in recent years the creek is supporting natural breeding by Murray cod. Delivering small volumes of freshwater at the end of last years' flood peaks helped provide critical water quality refuge areas for native fish and is an example of the benefit management efforts can provide even under extreme conditions."

Ms Beattie said GB CMA, with help from Traditional Owners, research scientists, partner organisations and the local community was aiming to build on past efforts to further improve the health of the creek.

The community workshop will be held on Tuesday 9 May, 5.30pm-6.30pm, at the Dancocks Room, Nathalia Sports and Community Centre, 42 Robertson Street. Supper will be provided. In a previous article I wrote a little about our current District Governor's "partner project" which is "Wheelchairs for Kids". I mentioned that the chairs are manufactured in The Wheelchairs for Kids factory in Wangara, Perth. Up to 800 wheelchairs a month are manufactured by passionate and hardworking volunteers who give their time and skills free of charge and therefore minimise manufacturing and administrative costs.

Volunteers work across three groups: 1/ Manufacturing – with 250 working in the factory (50 per day);

2/ Work from home – with 550 volunteers cutting and sewing covers for the wheelchair seat, back and restraint cushions, making individual knee rugs and knitting and sewing the soft toys; and 3/ Back office – assisting with financial administration, procurement, warehousing, website maintenance and promotions.

The volunteers also organise fundraisers so that 100 per cent of the funding goes towards making wheelchairs. The wheelchairs are packed and dispatched to a network of 65 agencies around the world, who then deliver and assemble the chairs. Just watching the delight on the faces of these disadvantaged disabled kids, getting into their chairs is so uplifting.

It was rather disappointing to learn that the guests who had booked for 2 nights at the Heart to Heart house did not show up! The booking clerk from the Alfred hospital rang them to ask how they were enjoying the country and they said they were at home! When asked after their health, they said they were well, just changed their minds! Most disappointing, especially as a couple of volunteers made a special trip to ready the house! Currently there no immediate bookings.

Easter is upon us and on Saturday we are due to be in the plantation with prizes, our spinning wheel, and volunteers selling tickets for this fund raiser. Please come along and support us; prizes are great and winners get to choose what they'd like from a great variety of items displayed. There will be a bit of a write up about this, photos too, next time.






Why Do I See and Smell Smoke?







With fire restrictions easing in some parts of the State, and calm autumn conditions, hundreds of private resident burn-offs, agricultural burns and planned burns are expected to take place over the coming weeks.

While current conditions are ideal for burning, weather patterns may cause smoke to linger over parts of the state overnight and through to early morning.

FFMVic Chief Fire Officer Chris Hardman said our climate is changing and that means finding the right days for safe and effective planned burning is also changing. Planned burns are a critical part of a statewide bushfire risk management program.

"FFMVic's number one priority is to protect life, property and the environment from the risk of bushfires, and that is what we will continue to do," he said.

"Reducing fine fuels such as grass, leaves, bark, shrubs and fallen branches means fires are less intense and slower to spread, making it more likely that firefighters can keep bushfires small and contained before they pose a risk to communities. "We must go ahead with the planned burning

program while conditions are suitable, and it is safe to do so to avoid an increased fire risk in the future.

"Smoke could be a result of private resident burn -offs, planned burns and agricultural burns. We work closely with the Environment Protection Authority (EPA) and Bureau of Meteorology to keep the smoke impact from planned burns as low as practically possible and inform the community while delivering the program.

"Victorians can also sign up for planned burn notifications to prepare for any impact on their health or activities."

CFA Chief Officer Jason Heffernan urged Victorians to conduct private burn -offs safely.

"While the Fire Danger Period has ended in some areas, it is still important that residents check the local conditions are safe and appropriate for burning off – both on the day and the days following," he said.

"When conducting private resident burn -offs, remain alert and always have resources on hand to extinguish the fire.

"We ask the community to register their burn -off as this ensures if

someone reports smoke, the incident can be monitored and acknowledged early.

"If possible, landowners should also notify their neighbours and others nearby who may be sensitive to smoke so they can take necessary precautions."

Victoria's Chief Environmental Scientist Professor Mark Patrick Taylor said EPA understands that smoke from planned burns and private burnoffs can cause health concerns and is monitoring air quality across the state.

"You can check air quality for your area through our air monitoring system, EPA AirWatch," said Professor Taylor.

"Your nose is also an excellent smoke detector. If you can smell smoke, take the necessary precautions to protect your health."

For the latest information about when and where planned burns are happening near you, visit https://plannedburns.ffm.vic.gov.au

Detailed information about current air quality throughout Victoria can be found on EPA's website.

If you see or smell smoke outside, you should reduce your exposure to smoke by staying indoors and closing your windows and doors – but only if it's safe to do so. Tips for looking after your health when there is smoke can be found on EPA's 'Smoke and your health' webpage - www.epa.vic.gov.au/for-community/environmental-information/air-quality/smoke/smoke-your-health.

Keep your burn off safe and legal:

- Check fire restrictions in your area and always register your burn at www.firepermits.vic.gov.au or by calling 1800 668 511
- Check and monitor weather conditions particularly wind
- To avoid unnecessary calls to emergency services, notify your neighbours beforehand
- Leave a three-metre fire break, free from flammable materials around the burn
- Have sufficient equipment and water to stop the fire spreading
- Never leave a burn-off unattended stay for its entire duration
- If your burn-off gets out of control, call '000' immediately.






