Museum Moments...

THE WAR TANK ARRIVES.



The Nathalia Herald, 1 October 1918, published the following: The much discussed "War Tank" made its appearance in Nathalia on Saturday morning at 11.30 a.m. The shrill notes of a bugle were heard towards Elizabeth Street, and soon the townspeople flocked to the bell tower, where the tank manoeuvred into position. Major Hearder, made an impassioned appeal to the public to buy £10 war bonds. The total amount subscribed by Nathalia and district on Saturday was £12,500 plus £1100 cash. [Abridged]

On 7 November 1918, the Shepparton Advertiser, published that: Nathalia put on a public demonstration of joy and thankfulness at the good news received of Turkey's unconditional surrender, and the release of all British prisoners, was held at the bell tower, Nathalia on Saturday. At 3 p.m., the fire bell was rung vigorously for about five minutes, after which the school and church bells in the town took up the joyous peal and continued for some time. END OF THE WORLD'S WAR -**REJOICING AT NATHALIA**

On 19 November 1918, the Nathalia Herald, described the events in Nathalia and how people responded to the news that the war had ended. The residents of Nathalia and district in common with the citizens of the Empire, celebrated the great victory of the Allies with unbounded peals by the ringing of the fire bell. The church and school bells, and the mill whistle took up the joyous chorus and immediately the streets were thronged with an excited crowd making its way towards the bell tower. Amidst the tooting of motor horns, ringing of hand bells, banging of


kerosene tins and other musical instruments, the pent-up feelings of the populace were given full rein. Following each speaker, songs of a patriotic character were given with great vim and lung power. It was a happy, joyous and thankful crowd that returned to their beds after midnight, the keynote of joy being tempered with sorrow for those bereft of loved ones.

On 17 December 1918, the Nathalia Herald, announced that: The first ANZAC to arrive in Nathalia was Corporal Ken Peterson, formerly of Yambuna and Nathalia. Mr. Peterson was met at the station, then motored to the **bell tower**. Townspeople, school children accompanied by their head teacher, Mr. Crosskell, Reverend Abbott [Chairman of the Soldiers' Welfare Committee], extended a hearty welcome back to his native land again. [Abridged]

By 20 December 1938, another location was being sought for a new bell tower. The Nathalia Herald, printed the following article, which stated: From correspondence received from the Country Fire Brigades' Board, stating that the Board is prepared to sell a part of the site of the Nathalia fire station (for the purpose of erecting a tower there-on), for £5, providing the Trust erects the necessary fencing and pays the cost of the transfer. (The portion referred to has a 33 ft. frontage, by a depth varying from 10 ft. to 42 ft. 6 inches). The engineer said that before purchasing the land the suitability of the ground should be determined by the consulting engineer. Commissioner McDonell said there was a feeling in the town that the brigade site was not as suitable as a more central one contention being that a lower pressure would be available at the fire station site. The motion was carried, and it was agreed that the offer of Mrs. Gray to provide a piece of ground to "square off" the area, be accepted.



he debate on August 16th...

L took place at Brereton's Bakery an hour earlier than our usual meeting time.

This was to allow those, who were interested, to be home in plenty of time to watch the World Cup semi-final between the Matildas and the Lionesses.

Most of our club's members attended, as did a few guests, and of course the debating teams from SMOTA and NSC, their coaches and three adjudicators.

Chairperson, Anthony, told us that the debate would take place first. Then dinner, and lastly the winning team would be announced. He also told us the topic: *Is It Now Time For Australia To Be a Republic* and that SMOTA had the affirmative, thus would start the debate.

The debating teams from both the Secondary Colleges put forth their arguments very well, after which they could relax over their meals.

After some deliberations SMOTA was declared the winner; both teams were congratulated on their excellent presentations and each team member was given a souvenir Rotary drinking glass. The adjudicators were thanked again and presented with flowers.

A few words regarding polio, taken from a May 2023 publication:

Global leaders and stakeholders have been unanimously declaring their solidarity to achieving a lasting world free of all forms of polioviruses.

Convening this week at the World Health Assembly in Geneva, Switzerland, Ministers of Health from around the globe evaluated the unique epidemiological opportunity which currently exists, in particular in eradicating all remaining chains of endemic wild poliovirus in a handful of districts of just two countries – Pakistan and Afghanistan. As a record number of Member States and civil society partners took to the floor, key to success, all experts agreed, must be on adapting operations and reaching remaining un- or under-immunized children in just seven subnational most consequential geographies, with collectively account for 90% of all new polio cases, including in a gender-equitable and integrated manner. To ensure lasting success, delegates urged country-specific solutions for polio transition. 

ith the new irrigation season under way, Goulburn-Murray Water has brought its 2023 Winter Works program to a close. The program occurs over the three-month irrigation off-season, allowing GMW to dewater channels and undertake various maintenance and capital works projects. GMW Infrastructure Delivery Services general manager Warren Jose said the 2023 Winter Works program had been highly productive. "It's been a fantastic effort from everyone involved," he said. "During the program, we have had about 60 GMW staff and 40 contractors out in the field on any given day. "Despite the often challenging weather, they have understood the importance of the works and completed a significant amount in just three short months." These works included:

- replacing 39 regulators
- treating 260km of channel for aquatic weeds
- desilting 26km of channels
- major refurbishment of 31km of channel
- replacing or repairing 11 structures (ie. bridges and culverts)
- remodelling 10 channels. The works were completed



ahead of the start of the 2023/24 irrigation season on Tuesday 15 August allowing time for the Water Planning team to refill channels before customers begin placing orders.

"We know there are a lot of customers who have to plan around the irrigation off-season to ensure they still have access to water when channels are drained," Mr Jose said.

"We are grateful for their flexibility and understanding during this time, as it has helped us improve the delivery system in ways that will benefit customers for years to come."

EASY LAMB MOUSSAKA

From the CWA's Delicious Lamb Dishes cookbook.

We all need quick and easy weeknight go-to dinners. This one is very economical and super quick and easy to whizz up. Although not a Moussaka in the traditional sense, it is still a very tasty and simplified version.

Ingredients

2 tbsp olive oil	2 tbsp ground cinnamon
1 onion finely chopped	200gm jar grilled eggplant
2 cloves garlic finely chopped	200gm feta cheese crumbled
500gm minced lamb	3 tbsp chopped fresh mint
400gm can chopped tomatoes	2 tbsp tomato paste

Method

Heat oil in a large shallow pan and fry onions until soft. Add the mince and garlic and fry until browned. Add the tomatoes, paste, and cinnamon. Season with pepper and simmer 20 minutes, adding eggplant after 10 minutes. Sprinkle feta and mint over the top.

Hint

Don't brown garlic with the onion as the longer cooking may burn it.

Don't add salt with the cooking as there is salt in the tinned tomatoes and feta.

Taste at the end before adding any salt.

New podcast episode on managing high storage levels

WW ith many of the region's lakes, dams, and reservoirs close to full capacity, Goulburn-Murray Water (GMW) has released a new podcast episode to help keep the community informed about how storages are managed.



Northern Victoria resource manager Dr Mark Bailey features in the latest *Talking Water with GMW* podcast and said the way storages were managed varied greatly.

"How GMW manages its storages depends on many things," he said. "The key factors are the size of the storage, where the storage is located in the broader river catchment, and the actual infrastructure at the dam itself."

Most GMW's storages have fixed crest spillways, meaning once they reach full supply level, they simply begin to spill.

Lake Eildon, Cairn Curran and Lake Buffalo all have gated spillways, meaning there is a greater ability to control outflows from these storages.

However, Dr Bailey noted that fixed crest spillways, such as the one at Lake Eppalock, have a role to play during times of flood.

"Even at storages with fixed crest spillways, being full does not stop a storage from providing flood mitigation," he said.

"The spillways cause the water to back up and rise, and slow the rate that water moves downstream."

Recent years have seen considerable rainfall fill storages across the state. June 2023 was also a wetter than usual month, with inflows to Lake Eildon being recorded at three times the monthly average.

However, the Bureau of Meteorology's long-range forecast predicts a drier than average August to October, including a likely El Niño development.

"We know that drought and flood are both an inevitable part of our climate. Our storages cannot prevent either event, but they do lessen the impact of both," Dr Bailey said.

"We therefore need to manage against both situations, which is a significant balancing act."
