





Japanese encephalitis - vaccine rollout

Council will be starting an immunisation program to help in the fight against Japanese encephalitis virus.

The state government has expanded the eligibility criteria to give specific priority groups the vaccine for free, including those who may be exposed to the virus at work.
Those eligible include people aged between 50 and 65 who work in a role that is largely outdoors, specifically those who spend more than four hours outdoors each day. Japanese encephalitis virus can cause a rare, potentially serious infection of the brain and is

spread to humans by mosquito bites.

We are urging people who fit the criteria to fill out a simple Expressions of Interest form on our website to indicate whether they wished to be vaccinated.

In addition to the vaccine, there are simple steps we can all take to protect ourselves from mosquito bites –

- Wear long loose-fitting clothing outdoors;
 Use mosquito repellents with active ingredients such as picaridin or DEET;

Calling for feedback on community transport

oira Shire Council has commenced a month-long consultation period as part of the Community Transport Review.

Acting CEO Brant Doyle said this review was intended to understand the current community transport offers.

"We want to understand how people without access to their own vehicle are managing their transport needs and what difficulties, if any, they are experiencing accessing activities that are part of community living," Mr Doyle said.

"The results of the consultation will go towards informing a council position for future advocacy for improved services across

the Moira area. "I encourage everyone to get involved in this important piece of consultation.

"Go to our website or look on our socials, scan the QR code and complete the survey, it is that simple."

The survey should take under ten minutes to complete; it closes on Friday 2 September 2022.



Vaccine roll out for JEV

oira Shire has been named a critical region in the fight against **1** Japanese encephalitis virus with people living and working in the area urged to get vaccinated to protect themselves against the infection spread by mosquitoes before the warmer months.

Acting CEO Brant Doyle said the eligibility criteria had been expanded to give specific priority groups the vaccine for free, including those who may be exposed to the virus at work.

"Those eligible include people aged between 50 and 65 who work in a role that is largely outdoors, specifically those who spend more than four hours outdoors each day," Mr Doyle said.

"Japanese encephalitis virus can cause a rare, potentially serious infection of the brain and is spread to humans by mosquito bites.

"Most people will have no symptoms, but one per cent of people may experience a fever and headache, which can develop into a serious disease.

"Victoria recorded its first-ever case of Japanese encephalitis virus earlier this year."

Mr Doyle said Council was urging people who fit the criteria to fill out a simple Expressions of Interest form to indicate whether they wished to be vaccinated.

"This information will be critical in helping us determine the amount of vaccine we need as well as the amount and location of immunisation

Community Strengthening Grants change - have your say

Acting Direct Sustainable Communities Rosanne Kava said Community Strengthening Grants enhance the capacity of community organisations to develop and deliver services, manage facilities, coordinate events and promote tourism, health, and environmental sustainability.

"Most importantly, there are a couple of changes to the grant categories," Ms Kava said.

"The Quick Response Grants, which are open all year round, will now have two funding opportunities available.

"In the past, only grants of up to \$1,000 were available; we are now adding another funding opportunity for grants up to \$5,000. "

So now whether your community organisation just needs a small amount to assist with an event or project or something more substantial, there will now be two funding streams to choose from."

Ms Kava said the Major Grants stream will be open for up to two rounds per financial year.

"The Major Grants stream is for grants up to \$10,000 and will aim to provide community organisations an opportunity to apply for funding for larger non-capital projects and events," she said.

"Applications for all Community Strengthening Grants will go through a pre-eligibility assessment and will either be returned to the applicant for further information if applicable, or will not progress if they do not meet eligibility requirements.

"Council's Community Strengthening Grant program supports projects that address social inequity, promote social inclusion, embrace diversity, and establish environments that are supportive of all people regardless of gender, identity, age, disability, culture, religion and sexual orientation." Museum Moments...

Brought to you by Jeanette Holland on behalf of the Nathalia & District Historical Society.



Here is another picture of the MV coach that was featured several editions ago which travelled through Nathalia regularly.

I would like to thank those who contacted me to give some details of the accident which involved this coach and a train at Strathmerton in 1954.

The following articles appeared in the newspapers at the time.

Riverine Herald 18 June 1954 "TWO DIE IN MVC BUS SMASH Strathmerton Level Crossing Fatality.

A bus hostess and a young child were killed, and seven other people injured when a Murray Valley bus was almost cut in half yesterday by a diesel rail motor at a level crossing near Strathmerton. The coach had left Echuca yesterday morning on its way to Albury, and the fatality occurred at about midday.

Those killed in the smash were Miss Val Bourke, about 23 years of Wodonga, and Gwenneth Phillips, a toddler believed to be aged 3 years, of Corowa. The bus, a semi-trailer, left Echuca at 10:15am yesterday carrying approximately ten passengers. The rail motor on its way to Cobram struck the bus midships of the trailer and cut it in half. The train was derailed and it is believed that it sustained little damage. However the bus was wrecked. The driver of the train received cuts and scratches to the face, but the driver of the bus, J. Higginson, escaped injury.

It is reported that there were 13 persons on the bus at the time of the accident but the train was empty of passengers. The sound of the accident brought out scores of people who helped clear the wreckage.

The Argus 5 August 1954

THE driver of the Murray Valley coach involved in the Strathmerton level crossing smash, told police that he failed to stop at the crossing because he was over anxious to make up lost time, the Coroner's Court was told today.

An inquest was being held on the deaths of Valerie May Bourke, 25, of Wodonga, and Pamela Gwen Phillips, 4, of Coffs Harbor, N.S.W., who were killed in the smash. Detective Stanley Edgar Sturtz of Shepparton, said that the driver of the coach, Walter Geoffrey Higginson, of Albury, came to the police station and made a statement.

In the statement, Higginson said that he had lost 10 minutes travelling time on a rough stretch of road between Nathalia and Strathmerton, Detective Sturtz said.





The funeral was to be held the next day in the large Catholic Church in Shepparton.


As they prepared for bed, Maria was aghast at what she saw when Michael took off his boots.



Proposal to close three transfer stations

Moira Shire Council recently conducted a triple bottom line assessment which included the social, environmental and financial assessments at all of its transfer station sites.

The results of this assessment recommended the closure of Strathmerton, Tungamah and Yabba transfer stations.

Acting Director Sustainable Communities Rosanne Kava said there were a range of reasons for this recommendation.

"Primarily, the significant investment in development and upgrading of these three transfer stations to meet best practice standards as well as additional operational budget now required to maintain these services to meet the requirements of the new Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Act." Ms Kaya said.

"The Strathmerton, Tungamah and Yabba stations also have low waste volumes and households will remain within a 10-20 minute drive of another transfer station.

"The Strathmerton and Tungamah communities have township kerbside waste and recycling collection already in place.

"We will be working closely with the Yabba community to implement options for kerbside waste and recycling collection following the closure to that transfer station."

Council will be holding three drop in sessions for interested community members to come and speak with officers regarding this proposal.

- Strathmerton Mailbox Café Tuesday 30 August 10am-12pm
- Tungamah Community Service Centre Middleton Street Wednesday 31 August 9am-11am
- Yabba Yabba North Fire Station 1/3 Railway Parade Wednesday 31 August 12pm-2pm.

"If the proposal to close the three transfer stations is accepted, they will likely close permanently in early 2023 with work to begin directly after in rehabilitating these sites," Ms Kava said.

"I encourage anyone who is interested to come to one of the drop in sessions or go to our website for all the details and to have your say on this proposal."



orth-east Victorians are being reminded that VICTORIA with spring just around the corner, native



birds such as magpies and masked lapwings may begin swooping during their breeding season - but there are steps we can take to remain safe at

Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP) Senior Wildlife Projects Officer, Therese Davis, said some native birds swoop to defend their eggs and young for the six to eight weeks until they leave

territorial birds," Ms Davis said.

"Swooping is basically a scare tactic to warn people and animals not to come near their nesting young. Birds may swoop people or animals, so

"However, not all birds swoop to protect their eggs and young during the breeding season, so don't be concerned simply because there are

"During this time of year less than 10 per cent of birds actually swoop and even fewer make contact.

"If you are worried about being swooped, you can do a few things to protect yourself."

Tips to avoid being swooped:

- Know your local swooping hotspots
- Avoid the area if possible
- Move quickly, but do not run
- Cover your head with a hat, helmet or umbrella, but don't wave it around
- Do not harass or feed birds

To plan your route around known swooping hotspots or to report a swooping incident on Victoria's interactive swooping bird map, please visit https://www.wildlife.vic.gov.au/managing-wildlife/swooping-birds All Victorian native wildlife is protected by law, and it is illegal to harass

hree local sisters showing great talent in touch football have been selected to represent Victoria at the School Sport Australia Touch Football championship.

St Mary of the Angels Secondary College Nathalia student Zahlia Kautai (13) has been selected in the School Sport Victoria Team Vic 15 Years & Under Touch Football Team competing in the School Sport Australia Championship to be held in Wagga Wagga, NSW from 30 October to 4 November. Cobram Anglican Grammar School students Tennille Kautai (12) and Aroha Kautai (10) have been selected in the School Sport Victoria Team Vic 12 Years & Under Touch Football Team also competing at the event. It has been a great performance by Zahlia, Tennille and Aroha Kautai who participated in a structured trial process to be selected to represent Team Vic.

Zahlia is no stranger to the Touch Football championships first debuted in the Team Vic 12Years & Under Team in 2018 as a 9 year old and again in 2019 at 10 years of age, scoring her first try at the national level. Unfortunately Zahlia's final year in 12Years & Under was impacted by Covid 19 pandemic and in 2020 and 2021 the Australian Touch Football Championships were cancelled. Cancellation of the Championship in 2020 and 2021 means that this year is the first opportunity to compete at a National Level for Tennille and Aroha who will debut together in Wagga Wagga.

The three sisters began their touch football career at Moama/Echuca Touch Football Association in 2018 playing mixed touch football against adults in a family team with parents Kaokao and Sarah Kautai. They have each played with Melbourne based touch football club Harlequins in Victorian Junior State Cup and Junior Victorian Touch Football League. This year Zahlia aged 13 years old, has also been selected in the Harlequins open women's touch football team and will be competing in Melbourne competition Victorian Touch (VT) League running from September through to November. VT League is the highest level competition in the state.

The three sisters father Kaokao Kautai has been selected as a volunteer coach of the Team Vic 12 Years & Under Boys team at the School Sport Australia Championship in Wagga Wagga this year. Growing up in New Zealand, Kaokao Kautai was a talented touch football and rugby player, playing at national and international levels in both sports. This is not Kaokao's first national coaching role having coached the Vic Stormers Men's 40years Touch Football team to fourth place at the National Touch League competition held in Coffs Harbour earlier this year.

Many past School Sport Victoria team members have gone on to compete at national and international competitions including World Olympic Games. Championships and Commonwealth Games.

So, here is hoping that Zahlia, Tennille and Aroha and their Victorian teammates can achieve their personal goals and that sister trio may be representing Australia in the vears to come.

Playing at a state and national level involves significant travel, time and financial commitments for the family. Zahlia, Tennille and Aroha Kautai are seeking sponsorship to support their journey to Wagga Wagga for the School Sports Australian Touch Football Championship. The sisters are required to travel weekly to Melbourne for training. It is anticipated that the cost of the three girls competing in the Championships will be approximately \$5000 including uniforms, fees and levies and accommodation for the championship.
