

Japanese encephalitis virus (JEV) is spread to humans through mosquito bites.

It may cause a rare and potentially lifethreatening infection of the brain.

Moira Shire Council is offering Japanese Encephalitis vaccination to eligible residents at centres across the shire. Vaccine is available to residents aged 2 months and above who:

- are living in temporary or flood damaged accommodation that may increase exposure to mosquitoes or;
- are engaged in the prolonged outdoor recovery efforts (clean up) of stagnant waters following floods or;
- spend significant time outdoors (four hours per day) for unavoidable work, recreational educational, or other essential activities.

Most mosquitoes are just a nuisance, but some spread disease, however, there are simple ways you can beat the bite and protect yourself and your family:

- Wear loose-fitting clothing when outdoors.
- Use mosquito repellent that contains picaridin or DEET
- Ensure your house is mozzie proof
- Remove stagnant water from around your home, so mozzies can't breed. For example, turn over wheelbarrows, throw out old flower pots, keep gutters clean and swimming pools well maintained.

St Francis – New buildings opened

Nathalia back in 1961, they could never have dreamt of the wonderful facilities that would develop on each site.

Last week, St Francis Primary School officially opened their new Learning Centre, the 1.366-million-dollar redevelopment includes four general learning areas, meeting rooms, undercover learning, and a generous gathering space.

The impressive redevelopment was designed by the team from No. 42 architects, who have created a contemporary learning space which has transformed original classrooms into functional and dynamic learning hubs. Smaller breakout rooms with large round windows provide a focal point for the room, with tiered seating in one area proving very popular with students.

A spacious gathering area, which is large enough to accommodate the entire school, links the four classrooms together with a large kitchen facility at the end. The kitchen area will be used for catering, functions and for the Stephanie Alexander Kitchen Garden Program.

Principal, Matt Knight quoted St Francis at the official opening. "He who works with his hands is a labourer. He who works with his hands and his head is a craftsman. He who works with his hands and his head, and his heart is an artist."



There is no doubt that St Francis would praise the many artists who contributed to the redevelopment, landscaping and construction of the Learning Centre which was officially blessed by Bishop Shane Mackinlay and opened by Fr Michael Grace and Fr Jophin Joy, the former and current Parish Priests of St Mary's, Nathalia.

Ms Sam Dowling, Chief People Officer at Catholic Education Sandhurst acknowledged the funding that the Government and the community of St Francis provided for the new facility.

"I sincerely hope you all you make the most of this opportunity and the wonderful learning opportunity it brings. You are all supported by these committed teachers and your parents, families who really want you





thrive and flourish in such a wonderful school environment," she said.

Principal of St Francis Nathalia, Matt Knight thanked the Missionaries of the Divine Motherhood Sisters, who were involved with the school for 33 years before addressing the students of St Francis.

"The gift of the FMDM Sisters to this area was their strong charism and faithfulness to the community. These sisters built and nurtured a



stimulating learning environment, and this new learning centre continues to promote these original Franciscan ideals. It honours our past and provides our current and future students opportunities to reach their full potential."

"For our students, the main reason for the refurbishment is to allow you to learn in a warm, welcoming and engaging environment. We refurbished outdated classrooms and created contemporary learning environments that are flexible and adaptable. This project showcases the care and compassion our staff, your parents and school community have by providing you with opportunities to live, lead and learn in a wonderful setting," he said.

ensory self-regulation is the brain's ability to calm down or become more alert depending on the environment, task at hand, and social situation. ${\cal D}$ The children at Nathalia Preschool have been developing their self-regulation skills with the support of our visiting Occupational Therapist and Speech Therapist throughout the year. The Zones of Regulation is an approach used to support the development of self-regulation in children. All the diverse ways children feel and the states of alertness they experience are categorized into four coloured zones. Green - ready to learn, Blue - feeling

slow, unwell, Yellow - silly, frustrated, and Red - angry. On arrival the children place their photo in a colour zone and share why they have put their photo in that zone. Aunty Kella Robinson is a Wemba Wemba woman who completed her Master's thesis in 2014, when she attended Deakin University. The thesis was about the life of her kinship mother, Alice Kelly. Aunty Kella wrote, "Mum's story shows how Aboriginal families were able to triumph, despite the oppression of colonial rule."

Over the past two years, Aunty Kella has worked in collaboration with writer and co-editor, Lyn Loger, to turn that work into a book that includes her wider family. The book revolves about her family's journeying on and beyond her grandfather's Wongaibon country - the Ngiyampaa Dry Country people from Central West New South Wales. It documents the harsh impact of colonialism, while "...celebrating the capacity of Aboriginal people to survive."

Howie Marshall O.A.M. Commemorative Exhibition 100 Years 1922 -2022

eel welcome to drop in at the G.R.A.I.N. Store Art Gallery, the Community Art Gallery section at the back, so see an exhibition about Howie Marshall's life. The exhibition starts today, Thursday December 1st and finishes on December, 11th.

Howie excelled as a dedicated amateur botanist; he left us a priceless legacy of knowledge about our local flora. Nathalia Wildflower Group now carries that legacy forward and honours his work with this exhibition.

Howie was a great environmentalist. His unique life is recorded in his autobiography, *The Way It Was*; the book details how he built his own home on his property at Waaia and also made nearly everything he needed. You can view it at the exhibition and buy a copy at the Barmah Forest Heritage and Education Centre in the main street. The book, always popular, has been reprinted many times.

Howie, full name, Arthur Howell Marshall, died in 2016, at 94 years of age, having lived much of his life in almost complete self subsistence; he had no power connected to his

house for heating and cooling. The old combustion stove provided heating and on the hottest of days, even into his nineties, he sat by his potting shed outside in the shade, quietly dozing, reading his newspapers and listening to his battery operated radio. It was a crystal set when he was younger and, yes, he made that too.

The G.R.A.I.N. Store is open from Thursday to Saturdays from 11 - 4pm. However, on Sunday the 11^{th} December, Nathalia Wildflower Group is providing an afternoon tea at 2pm. You are invited to come along and join us for a cuppa, listen to/share some stories about Howie and catch up with old friends or meet new ones. We look forward to seeing you.

Howie was a great craftsman, on form and function he built his strong foundation – however, it's the creative arts that now blossom in the Nathalia Wildflower Group members; their love of the environment is featured in this exhibition through art, photography and poetry.

Red Gum Courier, Friday December 2nd, 2022 Now and Then

It is with great sadness that I hear of the continuing flood problems and the devastation it is causing. Although we have had landslides and flooding in Tasmania they do not last so long.

For many years my husband George and I were residents of Nathalia, where we both very involved in community, living firstly on the farm at Lower Moira where children Kristin and Roger were born, before moving into Nathalia where we were involved in the building industry before establishing Woodbine Gardens Nursery. We retired to Maldon in 2003 where George passed away in 2006.

In 2015 I married Richard Mack and moved to Castlemaine. While in Castlemaine I continued in my love of plants by designing gardens for several clients.

After some overseas travel and visiting Tasmania we decided (after two years of hesitation) to make the move to Deloraine in Tasmania with views of the magnificent Great Western Tiers. With wonderful deep red soil, and good rainfall it is a gardener's paradise! There we created a beautiful garden on a double block but as years advanced it became more than we wanted to maintain.

So as a suitable property was not available in Deloraine at the time, we now live in Longford which is fifteen minutes out of the city of Launceston where we have a really lovely established, but smaller garden and house. Our garden has a fascinating succession of plants, with hellebores in winter followed by daffodils, tulips, aquilegias, irises, liliums, roses, lavenders and various perennials. Also in the garden is a large old weeping cherry, a magnolia, silver birches, camellias and various shrubs.

We are involved in two local garden clubs and have both run classes in U3A, Richard in a wide range of History subjects and mine in Garden Design.

Launceston has the benefits of all the services we need with a wonderful range of restaurants and shops plus a large hospital and specialist care. Launceston is considerably warmer than Hobart and an added benefit is that it usually takes no longer than ten minutes to drive from one side to the other Historic buildings in both Launceston and Hobart have in most cases been faithfully preserved.

Tasmania is a truly amazing place to live with a huge range of climatic conditions but always with beautiful mountains to see. Nearly a third of the state is wilderness forest where the only way in is to walk. There is always the ongoing battle to preserve this very special environment as so little is left elsewhere in the world. The west coast receives more rain and has the cleanest air in the world with the nearest landmass being South America. The central plains area is known for it's fine wool production. In the areas to the north mainly between Deloraine and Devonport a huge range of vegetables, fruit and crops are grown. These include potatoes, carrots, onions and crops of pyrethrum, opium poppies, hemp, chickory and

achinacea, apples, cherries and soft fruits, along with ever increasing amounts of berries (strawberries, blueberries, raspberries etc) There are large dairy farms plus beef, sheep and wheat.

Tasmania is known for it's high quality cool climate wines and has a large number of gin and whisky distilleries and boutique beer companies. Tourism is in high focus and there are many really beautiful places to stay. There are sandy beaches, wilderness, rocky mountains, limestone caves and the more sedate restaurant and shopping city visits, but everywhere, beautiful landscapes.

Richard and I have a lot in common and are very happy here, the only downside being that water in between us and family and friends! I will always remember with great fondness, my life in Nathalia and really enjoy reading the Red Gum Courier online seeing so many familiar faces.




