Calling for feedback on Yarrawonga Showgrounds draft Masterplan

fter extensive consultation with user groups and the community, Council has developed a draft Master Plan for the Yarrawonga Showground/Victoria Park precinct and we want to know what you think. Mayor Libro Mustica said the draft Master Plan would guide the precinct's development, planning, budgeting and funding for the next ten years with independent consultants engaged for this project.

"This plan looks at the whole site and has established what is valued about the present facilities and features and sets priorities for future upgrades," Cr Mustica said.

"In the development of this draft Master Plan we used a combination of information gained from survey responses, emails directly to the consultants, and a number of workshops with current user groups and stakeholders."

Cr Mustica said the responses to the initial community survey, as well as the thoughts and ideas garnered through the stakeholder and user group workshops were key to the development of the draft Master Plan.

"Now we want to know if we heard you and incorporated your ideas and thoughts accurately into the draft Master Plan," he said.

Community satisfaction survey commences

The annual Local Government Community Satisfaction Survey has now commenced with Moira Shire residents invited to share their views on Council's performance.

The survey is commissioned by the State Government on behalf of Victorian councils including Moira Shire.

Mayor Libro Mustica urged community members to participate in the telephone survey program that will capture the views of 500 Moira Shire residents and ratepayers.

"Over the next few weeks your household may receive a call from an independent market research agency, National Field Services, which has been commissioned to undertake the survey," Cr Mustica said.

"It is important to note these phone calls may come on the weekend or after hours in order to capture the views of our diverse community.

"Also, if you would like to participate but you were called at a time when you were unavailable, you can request to be phoned back at a time that suits you.

"The survey provides a snapshot of views on our performance across a range of measures. "It helps us identify ways to improve our service delivery and plan for the future.

"We appreciate your anticipated participation to assist us with your valuable feedback."

The survey is delivered by an independent research agency to ensure individual responses remain confidential and only the overall results are shared with Council.

"The survey results will be published on our website and reported through the Know Your Council website," Cr Mustica said.

Charity Drive

On the 26th - 29th January Laurie and Debbie Hicks (dairy farmers from Kaarimba) headed down to South Gippsland and joined in the Bi-annual Prostate Cancer Australia Day Charity Drive which was organised by the Eastern Vic. pleasure Harness Club and Southern Cross Harness club.

"The drive was conducted on the Southern Rail trail. Each day we travelled approximately 25 Kilometres on the trail through the beautiful South Gippsland countryside.'

"We have a 16hh Clydesdale Cross named Bonnie who pulled our historic four wheel buggy and we were a little apprehensive on how she would cope as she is quite young and inexperienced.

Leading up to the drive we trained her on the roads around Kaarimba to build up her fitness, introduced her to pushbikes and umbrellas and went on a local drive with other harness enthusiasts to prepare her for the new experiences she would encounter.

"We were very pleased with the way she handled all that we threw at her including a rather long tunnel, many long skinny bridges, push bikes coming up behind and directly towards us on the narrow rail trail and some driving down the very busy South Gippsland Highway.

"The organising clubs were fantastic organising our lunch stops and delivering our pre-ordered food and finding camping spots for us each night where we would arrive and be shuttled back to the previous camp by the local men's shed group to collect our vehicles and move to the new spot. We had a couple of nights at the local pubs and a pizza night with a raffle.

"We travelled along with two other single Clydesdales and two other pairs of Clydesdales, there were approximately 20 vehicles in total, it was quite a site. There were also two riders on horseback. The clubs had advertised locally we were coming through so there were many people along the trail taking photos and stopping to chat at our lunch breaks and along the way. Many of these people made donations to the cause.

"The highlight of our trip were the lots of new friends we made and we look forward to many more drives with our now more experienced harness horse."

In the latest Rotary Health Newsletter this rather interesting article caught my eye; part of it follows:

Results from a study funded by Australian Rotary Health suggests that patients with Parkinson's disease have a unique blood signature compared to those without the disease. Such a discovery could further be investigated to better understand and develop treatments for Parkinson's disease.

Parkinson's disease is an incurable, degenerative neurological condition that progressively affects a person's ability to control their body movements. Approximately 4 per 1,000 people in Australia have Parkinson's with its chances of diagnosis increasing to 1 in 100 over the age of 60.

The article continued on, but I chose to just include part of it here. More articles were in the newsletter, about different branches of medicine and research that ARH is involved in. Perhaps, another time, I may include more in my column.

There was talk about the upcoming Show and Shine at our last meeting too. All visitors and entrants will need to check in via QR code or manually and adults must be fully vaccinated, as per Covid safety requirements. Closer to the time, more can be written here about the rules...perhaps there may be changes made by the government. It will be good to finally be able to host this event, after the past couple of years of very disappointing "no go".

January 27 was a red-letter day for Pakistan...announced polio free for 12 months. The welcome good news continues in the wake of ongoing successful vaccination campaigns in both Pakistan and neighbouring Afghanistan. This article is from February's Rotary Down Under magazine and continues: the Global Polio Eradication Initiative has reached 2.4 million children. These children have been in previously inaccessible areas of Afghanistan for the past two years. Every so often there will be more snippets in the Rotary News about the fight to eradicate polio.

There was no booking till about the middle of the year, at the respite house. A phone call and follow up e-mail, with booking sheet, was received on the evening of the 3rd so a couple of us went to the house the next morning to ready it for the guests who were able to stay just 2 nights. The gentleman (the patient) phoned us on the Sunday afternoon to thank us and to say how much better he felt after the short visit. This phone call was an unexpected surprise...most people leave favourable comments in the visitors' book. These comments make us even more proud to practise Rotary's Service Above Self and we are honoured to run the Heart to Heart respite house and provide this wonderful service for pre and post heart and/or lung transplant patients and their carers, so that they may have a place to rest, recuperate and recover.

Museum Moments...

Brought to you by Jeanette Holland on behalf of the Nathalia & District Historical Society.

Do you like to 'Surf the Internet'? If so, you may find some interesting stories from days gone by in the old newspapers. The website **trove.nla.gov.au** will give you access to read old newspapers from this area or anywhere around Australia. But a word of warning—you need to allow lots of time and beware of the squirrels!! These are those distracting things you find when you are looking for something else. You can enter a subject into the search box and it will find lots of interesting pages relating to your search, but then your eye is distracted to read the next column and off you go, chasing that squirrel.

Here are a few 'squirrels' I found interesting while doing some recent research.....

From The Adelaide Advertiser, 13 March 1908......

"FIGHTING PARSONS - The latest thing in athletic entertainments is the fighting parson (says 'Javelin' in this week's Melbourne Leader). The belt at present seems to be the Rev. George Gladstone, who last Sunday "did" the Rev. J. W. Oates badly in one short round. A quiet little spot known as Narioka was chosen for the "mill", where police interference, it appears, was not likely to take place. The performance, it appears, was to have been repeated at Nathalia, but the police got wind of the proposed breach of the peace and prevented the unseemly desecration of the Sabbath taking place. These things take place in a country whose legislators make it a criminal offence to buy or sell a pound of tomatoes on the Sabbath! Meanwhile people look on and exclaim - "See how these Christians love one another," and the parsons ingenuously ask why people no longer go to church to hear them preach "peace on earth and goodwill to all mankind!"

From The Numurkah Leader, 7 August 1914

"NATHALIA - Two boys, each riding a bike, collided at the corner of the Bridge Hotel. The one carrying a basket of meat was very wroth. His wares were virtually thrown to the dogs. He arose and we are afraid he did not use language adaptable to the Sunday school, and his bicycle had to be laid up for repairs. The other lad was like Brer Rabbit - he lay low and said nothing, and got away as soon as he could." From Numurkah Leader. 22 June 1906

"Some of the streets in Nathalia are in a very bad state, especially the one leading from the Court House Hotel to the sale yards and also to Weir Street. The former resembles the mud in a dam dried by the heat of summer, and it is so hard that a heavy cart can just crush through it, while Weir street, which drains into the creek, has hollows and cavities running through it in some of which a fair sized poddy could be buried. Other streets are in a more of less better state of repair, and it is no wonder that the footpaths are being used so much by traffic passing over them." From Numurkah Leader 31 march 1905

"Our firemen have returned from the Demonstration at Warrnambool, beaten but not disgraced. Warrnambool showed them one point they are not likely to forget. See they were looking forward to 3d (3 penny) beers but the people of the coast are wise according to their generation and rose the price to 6d the day before. I have read of a farmer who had a gap in his fence through which the kangaroos used to jump at night, causing considerable damage to his crop. Leading his old horse up to the gap he shot him down, saying: "They won't come in here anymore,, not at least till the air sweetens." Our boys say it will be some time before the odour passes away from Warrnambool."

 ${\sf I}$ also listen to their conversations, give them "thumbs up" and tell them ${\sf I}$ "like" them.

And it works like Facebook. I already have 4 people following me: 2 police officers, a private investigator and a psychiatrist.

Planting Trees For The Queen

Young people and veterans who live in the Goulburn Valley are being encouraged to apply for scholarships worth up to \$13,000 to cover the costs of an eligible vocational education and training qualification and internship.

Round four of the Federal Government's Commonwealth Scholarships Program for Young Australians is now open, with up to \$5000 on offer per

year for up to two years, along with an additional \$3000 for eligible applicants who also complete a 20-day paid internship.

Federal Member for Nicholls, Damian Drum, said the Goulburn Valley was one of 10 regions nationally selected for the program.

"This support will provide a helping hand to get your career on track and help young people across our communities get valuable qualifications that will help set them up for the future," Mr Drum said.

"The scholarships are designed to target occupations identified as growth industries and in-demand occupations and I'm happy the Goulburn Valley has been selected as the only Victorian region."

Young people aged 15-24 years old or those who have transitioned from the Australian Defence Force in the past two years are eligible, however, they must not be in full-time work or study and intend on taking an eligible VET qualification, from Certificate III through to an Advanced Diploma.

Minister for Employment, Workforce, Skills, Small and Family Business, Stuart Robert, said supporting young people and those transitioning from military service will strengthen Australia's workforce.

"This program will help Aussies get into jobs and is part of the Federal Government's record \$7.1 billion investment in skills and training across the nation," Mr Robert said.

"We're already seeing hundreds of thousands of Australians upskilling or reskilling thanks to programs like this, as well as the JobTrainer Fund and our investment in free TAFE and apprenticeships, which are all helping drive our economic recovery through getting locals into jobs."

MORE SCHOLARSHIPS FOR REGIONAL STUDENTS

More than 1000 eligible students from regional and remote Australia will have access to a scholarship worth up to \$18,000 to support their tertiary education in 2022.

Federal Member for Nicholls, Damian Drum, said applications for round six of the Rural and Regional Enterprise Scholarships program were now open.

"These scholarships are a fantastic opportunity for students from regional and remote communities, including those across Nicholls, to access financial support to support further study such as a university qualification," Mr Drum said.

"I encourage all students in Nicholls to check their eligibility and if eligible, to apply for an RRES scholarship."

Mr Drum said the RRES program was in addition to the Federal Government's Commonwealth Scholarships Program for Young Australians, mentioned above, which provides scholarships worth up to \$13,000 to cover the costs of an eligible vocational education and training qualification, and internship.

The Goulburn Valley is one of 10 regions selected nationally for that program.

Minister for Regionalisation, Regional Communications and Regional Education, Bridget McKenzie, said the RRES scholarships support students to undertake courses from Certificate IV to PhD level.

"Since 2018, these scholarships have helped support more than 4000 regional and remote students pursue a tertiary education," Senator McKenzie said.

"I have heard from scholarship recipients that the application process is easy and the money has helped them undertake a tertiary education they might otherwise have not been able to afford.

"The Federal Government is committed to reducing the disparity between rural and regional students and their city counterparts, and these scholarships help deliver on that promise."

The Federal Government has invested \$62.6 million in the RRES program since 2017.

After moving to the Luckes Weir area, we were startled by a wild old billy goat who charged past us, then proceeded to head north along Murrays Road.

The gorgeous morning was enjoyed by us all.









Mistletoes in our Midst

The summer season is the time to look for mistletoes on our local flora; in our area, they are mainly found on eucalypts, Buloke trees and sometimes on acacias (wattles).

Mistletoe is classified as hemi-parasitic. It can produce its own energy through photosynthesis, but must obtain mineral nutrients and water from its host.

Judy alerted us to two mistletoes out by the Barmah Lakes: the Box Mistletoe and one she thought was the Creeping Mistletoe, but it turned out, she thought, to probably be the Fleshy Mistletoe *Amyema micraculosa* subsp. *boormanii*. The Nathalia Wildflower group were able to photograph the two mistletoes easily, because they were growing on the one tree – a River Red-gum.

Linden Lancaster alerted us recently to the flowering of the Buloke Mistletoe *Amyema linophylla* subsp. *orientalis* in a stand of Bulokes on the 3 Chain Road in Picola North. One Buloke even had the Fleshy Mistletoe *Amyema miraculosa subsp. boormanii* growing from it. The flowers are stunningly beautiful. Buloke Mistletoe is classified as vulnerable.

Renowned amateur botanist, Howie Marshall, had always told us that we had four mistletoe species in our area.

However, Judy states that she has photographed, in Shepparton, a mistletoe with grey leaves, distinctly different from our four species. The VicFlora website informs us that there is a Grey Mistletoe *Amyema quandang* and its flora distribution includes the Victorian Riverina. We shall now be on the lookout for it, possibly on a Silver Wattle, *Acacia dealbata*, which has been listed as one of its possible host plants. This mistletoe flowers mainly from May – October; interestingly, it grows predominantly on acacias. Early Australian explorer, Thomas Mitchell, in the early 1800's, described a quandong tree (itself a hemi-parasitic plant) with this mistletoe on it.

The Mistletoebird The Mistletoebird *Dicaeum hirundinaceum* is the only representative in the flower pecker family in Australia. The male has a bright red chest with blue-black upper body feathers. It's a small, fruit-eating bird, native to Australia. It's dependent on mistletoe seeds for its survival.

How is it connected with the dispersal of mistletoes? It eats, then defecates (after only 4-12 minutes) the sticky seeds onto a branch; the sticky seeds dry, become cemented into place and then the mistletoe plant grows from this foundational base: this is a slow process.

The conservation status of these birds in Victoria is secure.


