Lyn Franklin - Medal of the Order of Australia

athalia's Lyn Franklin received a Medal of the Order of Australia in the general division in the Australia Day 2024 Honours.

Lyn received the award for her research and work in local history and her volunteer work in the community.

Lyn is an avid researcher and has been the chief researcher for the Nathalia and District Historical Society for over 20 years and also the chief researcher for the Nathalia Genealogy Group for over 20 years. Through her research she has gone on to become the author of a number of local historical books. Lyn's community volunteer roles included Newsletter editor for Nathalia Probus Club for 20 years, Secretary for Barwo Homestead for 25 years, former member of the Committee of Management for Nathalia District Hospital for 10 years, Councillor, Nathalia Shire (now part of the Moira Shire) 1992-1994. Lyn was the only woman on the council and the second female councillor in Nathalia's history.

of Lyn Franklin's former Community work also includes being a Lay Preacher with the Uniting Church of Australia, member of Numurkah Singers, volunteer for Meals on Wheels,

volunteer for Broken Creek Improvement Group, Landcare Victoria and member and researcher, Nathalia Cemetery Trust, 2016-2023.

From the Barwo Homestead Book

Lyn was nominated onto the Committee of Management at the first Annual General Meeting in 1991. She immediately took on the position of Secretary. There were some extremely turbulent times in this early period concerning the construction of the Hostel and the President, Jack Harding noted that Lyn's diligence and attention to detail was immediately noticeable.

In 1993, Lyn was at the Hostel every weekday for ten months, preparing reams of documentation required for the Commonwealth Government inspection. Lyn's typewriter ran hot documenting rules, regulations and red tape.

In 1996 Lyn's parents, George and Muriel Moate, joined the Barwo family and Lyn took a break from the secretary position and took on a portfolio as Finance Secretary. Lyn's knowledge of resident's fees, ingoings and refunds was invaluable and she continued in this role for eleven years.

At one time the Committee of Management felt that Lyn should be on the payroll of Barwo Homestead as she was working more and more. and all in a voluntary capacity, but of course Lyn refused the offer. So, the Committee then presented Lyn with a cheque for some thousands of dollars with their gratitude, but Lyn promptly donated the money back.

The following year, the Committee surprised Lyn with the presentation of a chair, hand crafted and upholstered to match her furniture. She was obviously delighted with this gift.

Lyn has given so much to Barwo Homestead as a voluntary Secretary, Finance Secretary, Public Officer, Typist, Taxi, Helper, Messenger, Chemist Runner and Bedmaker.

Lyn Franklin was made a Life Member of the Committee of Management of Barwo Homestead just prior to her retirement from the Committee in 2008. Thank you Lyn for your dedicated service.

ansy the Jack Russell was bought in for a check-up as the owners felt that she was having troubles urinating over the past few months.

Tansy was squatting to urinate, passing very little urine at a time and it seemed painful. She was quite cranky and unhappy.

A physical examination, urine tests, a blood tests and an ultrasound were performed to try and establish the cause of Tansy's issues.

A bladder stone was diagnosed and Tansy was immediately booked in for surgery. The stone was too large to dissolve with a special diet, so surgery was the best option.

Poor Tansy had a stone in her bladder bigger in

size than a golf ball. Hard like cement and with roughened edges it was taking up virtually the whole of her bladder.

Her bladder wall had become so inflamed it was around 10 times as thick as it should've been. How painful.

Luckily for Tansy, her parents acted on their concerns. She is recovering well from her surgery, is less painful and a lot happier.

A special diet will be required to stop reoccurrence of this problem.

Ms O'Keeffe said the funding is open to all cricket clubs, cricket associations, schools, local government and cricket facility managers.

"The 2023-2024 Australian Cricket Infrastructure Fund is providing funding in minor and major categories, catering for the size of your most urgent requirements," Ms O'Keeffe said.

"The projects that can be funded through Cricket Australia's recent fund include change facility/pavilion upgrades, sports lighting, practice facility refurbishment and supporting infrastructure.

"The minor category is funding projects between \$1,000 and \$15,000, whereas the major category is providing funding for projects between \$15,000 and \$40,000, with both categories providing maximum grant amounts of up to 50 per cent of the total project cost."

"I encourage all cricket clubs across the Shepparton District to take advantage of Cricket Australia's current funding round and make a submission for their respective club."

Broken Creek - Broken Tapes

Proken Creek are releasing their second single 'Broken Tapes' on Tuesday 6th February.

The wistful single sees Picola-based duo Erin and Lachlan Heycox explore a landscape of nostalgia with a stripped back acoustic sound of guitar and fiddle reminiscent of artists like The Waifs and Gillian Welch.

Broken Creek create Australian folk music that finds resonances in the past for the present moment. In 'Broken Tapes', they reach into their own past to sort through postcards of memories: picnics at the Yarraville Gardens with highschool friends, family holiday road trips along the Hume Highway soundtracked by Midnight Oil tapes and beachcombing at dusk along Mollymook Beach.

"We were remembering the long family road trips to see family on the East Coast and how you would often see broken cassette tapes that had become tangled in the car and tossed out the window" explains guitarist Lachlan Heycox.



"Things have changed so much in the last few years, but that feeling of missing old friends, past homes - even old

technology is something we can all relate to" adds frontwoman Erin Heycox.

The single was recorded in Erin and Lachlan's home studio on the Lancaster farm in Picola. At the end of 2023 they successfully crowdfunded the money needed to complete the recordings and have the album mixed by Mischa Hernan and mastered by Myles Mumford.

It is accompanied by a music video that mashes up Lachlan and Erin's own grainy videos from the early

Museum Moments...

If we take a look at the book written by Gillian Hibbins "A History of the Nathalia Shire—The Good Helmsmen" we realise what a valuable record of Nathalia's history this book is. With the passage of time we are losing our valuable senior citizens who had a wealth of knowledge of our heritage and now must rely on the written word from newspaper articles and books like this one.

A glance at the birth of Nathalia as recorded in Gillian's book takes us back about 150 years. The Barwo Steam Saw Mill stood by the edge of the creek with its piles of hardwood sawn timber and a flour mill behind. This site (currently the location of the Hardware Store) was chosen for its proximity to a timber and water supply.

In November 1876, Henry Kostadt built his 'Barwo Hotel' on his selection just across the creek, and by 1877 five acres was gazette for a State School following an application by William Witt on behalf of the parents of twenty-five children living in the area. Selectors Manifold, Pearce and Boaden had come to the district and helped to build the Wesleyan Church (now Uniting Church) on the banks of the creek.

By 1879, Richard Blake had established a General Store and a Post Office was opened. Seventy-eight allotments were surveyed and a blacksmith was established, followed by another Hotel with stables. Town residents were now petitioning to get the Railways to come through Nathalia. Deaths from diphtheria caused by poor water quality led to the need for a Cemetery. A saddler and shoemaker opened for business.


Nathalia was gazette as a village in January 1880 and a bridge was built to connect the northern selections and businesses with those in the south. In 1881 the Bank of Australasia was set up in a small wooden dwelling and a small wooden Roman Catholic Church was built. A Court of Petty Sessions was established, presumably in the back of what became known as the Court House Hotel. Further Banks, Hotels and businesses came to town and in 1884 the first edition of the Nathalia Herald was printed. Chinese gardeners were established on the banks of the Broken Creek, and with the boom in population there was a need for recreational activities.

In 1884, the People's Leisure Hour Club was opened every night to provide a place away from the hotels where the men (over fourteen) could meet, play chess, draughts and cards or smoke in a room especially set aside. This club flourished for a few months then passed into oblivion. The men then turned to joining the Masonic Lodge or Friendly Society before the addition of a tennis club and gun club, followed by a race club. Billiards, roller skating and bicycle riding were also established, before a football club commenced in April 1887

Now my reason for reading through this most interesting information from Nathalia's past is to find what I can about the early days of the Nathalia Tennis Club. I am collecting information to tell the history of the Tennis Club and would like to hear from anyone who can contribute photos, stories and information about the club as far back as we can go. If you have memories of playing tennis at sites other than the current lawn courts I would really like to hear from you. Please give me a call on the number below.

Authorities sick and CLA tyred of cleaning up

Invironmental authorities are urging Victorian households and businesses to spare the environment and dispose of their used tyres legally and responsibly after more than 2700 car and truck tyres were found dumped on public land last year.

The Conservation Regulator and Parks Victoria recorded at least 60 separate illegal dumping incidents involving personal or commercial quantities of tyres across Victorian public land in 2023, with the State's Environmental Protection Authority (EPA) estimating that thousands more have been dumped, burned, or stockpiled. Dumped car tyres can have serious impacts on human and environmental health. Old tyres also contain harmful chemicals that leach into the environment and groundwater as they break down, potentially poisoning plants and animals.

Discarded tyres also present a serious fire risk, as tyre fires are harder to control or extinguish than regular fires. As rubber burns hotter and more easily, tyres dumped in forests can fuel bushfires with devastating effects.

Legal disposal of old tyres reduces these environmental and safety risks, and recycled tyres can often be turned into other products, including roads and artificial playground turf.

Individual or small quantities of tyres can be responsibly disposed of at recycling centres, such as local council transfer stations, for a small fee so that they can be repurposed. Most tyre outlets will also accept old tyres as part of government recycling schemes, either for free if people have purchased new tyres from their shop, or for a small fee if brought from elsewhere.

When disposing tyres through one of the above options, people should check with their local council, recycling facility, or individual tyre seller to see if they accept them.

Victorian businesses also have legal obligations for safely storing and transporting large amounts of waste tyres. EPA Victoria produces guidance on managing these responsibilities, which can be found at: waste-tyres



In Victoria, it is an offence to dump litter or waste under the *Environment Protection Act 2017*, with maximum penalties ranging between \$3,846 and \$230,772.


