#### Museum Moments...

#### BELL TOWER CONSTRUCTED BY MESSRS. SNOOKS AND JONES

With the newly established Nathalia Fire Brigade in November 1900, it was soon realised that a loud bell was needed to alert not only the townspeople but also the fire brigade volunteers. The fire bell and cry of fire brought members of the brigade with a rush. It was through the generosity of Mr. Snooks, who provided the bell tower, charging less than half of its value. In October 1902, the Numurkah Leader stated that: Whilst on tour of inspection, Inspector Marshall, asked for estimates of cost from Messrs. Snooks and Jones [tinsmiths of Nathalia] with a view of having similar structures erected in other parts of the state. The Nathalia bell tower was one of the first of its kind in Victoria, which was recommended to quite a number of other brigades. On 9 January 1903, at a meeting of the Numurkah Shire Council, the Numurkah Leader printed the following information. The paper stated that: Members of the Nathalia

Fire Brigade asked if the fence in front of the reserve in Blake Street could be removed to the back of the band stand, in order to give free access to the fire bell. Their request was granted as on 16 January 1903, the Numurkah Leader, confirmed that: The fire brigade bell tower had been painted, and the Shire Council had decided to have the fence removed to the back of the rotunda, so as to make the tower more accessible for the ladder practice.

On 21 July 1904, the *Numurkah Leader* published that: *Messrs. Snooks and Jones, have built to order for the St.*

Arnaud Fire Brigade, a **bell tower**, similar to the one in use by the local brigade. The frame work is of iron, weight about 16 cwt., and cost about £20. The structure has been consigned to its destination, and the firm has three more orders to execute for brigades in different parts of the State.

#### A PROBLEM WITH THE BELL

On Tuesday last at 2 a.m. the fire bell rang out an alarm, and Captain H. M. Muntz and some of his men were soon at the fire brigade station, printed the Numurkah Leader, 14 October 1904. The Nathalia fire brigade can boast of one of the finest towers in a country district, but although the bell is of large size, weighing upwards of 3 cwt., the sound is not what would be expected from a bell of its proportion. The contention has been raised that it is not hung properly, and if that be so, the defect ought to be at once remedied, for on Tuesday last, very few townspeople heard the alarm. Four days later, the Nathalia Herald, 18 October 1904, also reported on the "FIRE ALARM". On Tuesday morning about two o'clock



an alarm of fire was raised in Nathalia and the fire bell rung out. The alarm was not very loud, as either the man at the bell-pull or the bell itself was out of tune, because few heard it, and the firemen, for the most part, slept peacefully through the whole affair. The cause of the disturbance was the destruction of an abandoned Chinese residence across the creek from the show ground. No one seems to have any idea how the place got on fire. ...to be continued...

#### Pre and Post Natal Care through NCN Health



In conjunction with your primary care doctor the NCN **Health Community** Midwife can facilitate all your pre and postnatal appointments close to home.

NCN Health Community Midwife Tania Bell said many new parents were not aware of the services available on their doorstep.

"Using our services means that you do not have to travel to Wangaratta or Shepparton for all your antenatal appointments, with some standard appointments such as pre-natal check -ups, available locally.

"While NCN Health does not have a birthing facility, this service means that you can maintain local care, close to home and have the same midwife for your entire pregnancy journey. Some appointments can even be conducted in the comfort and privacy of your own home - even better with a newborn!

### Loch Garry Reference Committee holds final meeting

The Loch Garry Reference Committee held its fifth and final meeting on Friday 23 June 2023 with the committee endorsing the recommendation of a revised set of operating rules for the Loch Garry Flood Protection District.

The committee was formed in January 2023, to review the service requirements of the Loch Garry Flood Protection District infrastructure and its operating rules.

In recent meetings, the committee has worked on creating and refining a set of revised operating rules to recommend to the Goulburn-Murray Water (GMW) Board.

Loch Garry Reference Committee member Colin Gilby said he was pleased with the outcome the committee had reached.

"Everyone on the committee worked together with the community's best interests in mind," he said.

"The revised operating rules that we have endorsed will ensure the regulator can be operated differently depending on the nature of the flood, enabling the rules to be effectively applied in different scenarios."

GMW Water Delivery Services general manager Warren Blyth thanked the committee for their dedication.

"We're grateful for the time and effort that all the members of the Loch Garry Reference Committee have invested into this review process," he said.

"The committee has had to absorb a lot of complex information and make some challenging decisions, but all the members approached the task with open minds and with a great deal of professionalism."

The revised operating rules the committee has recommended can be viewed on GMW's YourSay website:

#### https://yoursay.gmwater.com.au

Loch Garry Flood Protection customers have been notified the rules are available for viewing via text and mail.

The operating rules will be presented to the GMW Board for approval in August 2023.

The Terms of Reference for the Loch Garry Reference Committee state that the role of the committee is to:

- Confirm the service requirements of the Loch Garry Flood Protection District.
- 2. Define the levels of service to be provided based on the current infrastructure.
- Assess the effectiveness and appropriateness of the existing infrastructure at Loch Garry and the impact of any potential change to infrastructure.
- 4. Review and recommend improvements to the Operating Rules.
- Engage with local Landholdaers and other interested parties regarding the improvement opportunities and recommendations regarding the Loch Garry Operating Rules.
- Consider costs and pricing impacts of any recommendations relating to changes to the existing asset management practices and/or the type of infrastructure at Loch Garry.

The Committee first met on 13 February 2023, to discuss the terms of reference and identify the key topics for discussion and exploration. As



at 12 June 2023, the Committee had four meetings. The following recommendations have been prepared by the Chair of the Committee, Cath Botta. An initial draft of recommendations was discussed by the Committee at Meeting 4 on 23 May 2023, and then revised based on Committee discussion and feedback. The final version of the recommendations were discussed and endorsed by the committee at Meeting 5 held on 23 June 2023.

For Role 1 and 2: Confirm the service requirements of the Loch Garry Flood Protection District; Define the levels of service to be provided based on the current infrastructure.

- Key Service requirements and levels of service expected from the regulator are: quick, safe, reliable and flexible operation for flood protection.
- The Committee confirmed the current service levels provided by the Loch suit the needs of customers of the Loch Gary Flood Protection most of the time.
- The Committee supported the formation of a "Future Services Strategy Group" to consider future services and infrastructure requirements in more detail. Members from this Committee are encouraged to nominate for appointment to this new group.
- The Committee commented that the "Future Services Strategy Group" will need to be well resourced and supported by GMW.
- GMW will also consider minimum standards of maintenance of the levee banks which will include consideration of the removal of trees/ shrubs growing in the levee banks.

For Role 3: Assess the effectiveness and appropriateness of the existing infrastructure at Loch Garry and the impact of any potential change to infrastructure.

- The Committee was advised that the expected lifespan of the Loch is 100 years and there is approx. 15-20 years life left of Loch Garry. A range of future options need to be fully explored as part of the development of the Future Services Strategy.
- The hydraulic capacity of the regulator; changes to the flow regime; and the capacity of levee banks need to be more fully understood and considered in combination to assess the effectiveness and appropriateness of the existing infrastructure.
- The impacts of increased flood protection upstream of the Loch, and climate change, needs to be more fully understood and considered to assess the effectiveness and appropriateness of the existing infrastructure.
- As part of the Future Services Strategy, consideration should also be given to the

effectiveness of the current bar operating system for quick, safe and reliable operation of the Loch.

For Role 4: Review and recommend improvements to the Operating Rules.

- In summary, the Committee recommend the following additions to the operating rules:
  - When the Bureau of Meteorology (BoM) predicts a flood event above 11m at the Shepparton gauge, GMW will send out SMS notification to the customers of the Loch Garry Flood Protection district that all bars will be removed once the flood level reaches 10.36m at the Shepparton gauge on the Goulburn River.
  - When the BoM (Bureau of Meteorology) predicts the Shepparton Gauge will exceed 10.36m but not 11.0m, GMW will send out SMS notification to the customers of the Loch Garry Flood Protection District that bars will start to be removed 24 hours after the Shepparton Gauge reaches 10.36m on the Goulburn River.
- The Committee noted that customers need to opt-in to the SMS service to receive these notifications from GMW. Each customer needs to ensure the most appropriate and updated contact information for each property is entered into the GMW database.

For Role 5: Engage with local Landholders and other interested parties regarding the improvement opportunities and recommendations regarding the Loch Garry Operating Rules.

- GMW will develop a media release and a fact sheet to highlight the recommendations from the Committee. Members are encouraged to discuss the recommendations with their communities.
- GMW will request a meeting with the Loch Garry Flood Protection District customers to discuss the changes to the operating rules and proposed engagement with customers.
- The Committee suggests that any engagement with customers' needs to include a reminder that customers need to opt-in to the SMS notification service to receive notifications from GMW.

For Role 6: Consider costs and pricing impacts of any recommendations relating to changes to the existing asset management practices and/ or the type of infrastructure at Loch Garry.

- Members support the draft funding model presented to the Committee. Namely, DEECA have committed \$750K, consisting of \$500K for repairs and \$250K for development of the Future Services Strategy. The estimated cost of repair works of \$950K would be funded by DEECA (\$500K) and an increase in rate payer's fees spread over an 80-year period. This equates to an annual increase of 10% on the rates to cover the costs of repairs.
- Members requested repairs to Levee Banks be carried out in the most efficient and costeffective method available.
- GMW need to consider the broader benefit of the Loch to other communities and how the costs and benefits can be recognised and shared with the broader beneficiaries. This needs to be reflected in the "Future Services Strategy".

Our region was hit by unprecedented flooding in October and while communities are still recovering, work has already started on identifying what could be done to mitigate future floods.

\$3.5 million dollars has been secured in the first round of the Disaster Ready Fund and will help pave the way for bigger projects to build flood resilience across the region. This first round aimed to fund projects which help Councils and communities better understand what occurred and build a foundation of knowledge for developing projects to protect communities and critical infrastructure in the future. I continue to have regular discussions with government



ministers about what will be required to better protect our communities in future. and this billion-dollar fund over the next 5 years will aim to do that. The money includes \$112,500 for the Numurkah Flood Mitigation Project -Stage 2 Southern Levee Design as well as a broader project that involves documenting current flooding inadequacies in road infrastructure across local councils including Moira Shire.
