Celebrating 128 Years of Worship in St Paul's Anglican Church Wakiti Creek

St Paul's Anglican Church, Wakiti Creek will hold it's final service on Saturday 29th July.

Until St Paul's Church was built at Wakiti Creek the families who settled in the area of Kotupna, Lower Moira and Wakiti Creek continued their prayers in the home. Neighbours also joined with each other to say the Order of Morning or Evening Prayer. Wakiti Creek was included in the Parish of Nathalia

In July 1892 the first donation was made towards a building fund for a church. A wide range of fundraising activities followed. A piece of land was donated and the timber was cut from local trees. Mr J Crothers won the tender to build the church and he also made ten pews that cost 17/6 each.

During an early morning service, a goanna came over the beautiful red gum door step halting the service for a few minutes as people put their feet up on the pew in front of them. After a quick look around our visitor ambled out the east door.

nother Rotary year has begun...

under the leadership of President Loula Oliver.

Our first meeting was held out of town, at the Picola Hotel, and most members were in attendance.

Speaking of members, unfortunately we are back to just eight again. We recently had three inductees but one of these "newbies" resigned within a very short period of time; we also had resignations from two members who had been with us for 14 and 8 years respectively. With luck, we will induct more new members this Rotary year and already there is a person interested.

Some of the ideas for this Rotary year are to have more social evenings and more guest speakers too.

We had a guest speaker at our July 26th meeting, but more on that next time.

On August 16th there will be a debate between teams from SMOTA and NSC and the topic has been given to the students. Of course there will be a report, with photos, in this column after the event.

This year, again, we will have tickets to sell in the Community Car Raffle that RC Mooroopna is running. There will be 4 prizes in total: 1st will be a Kia car and prizes 2, 3 and 4 are all \$1,000 voucher for either supermarket or hardware...to be chosen by the winners. Now for a little about INTERPLAST: In the early 1980's, Dr Gerald Duff, a general practitioner and Rotarian, initiated discussions with Rotary District 980 (now 9800), with the aim of bringing the Interplast concept to Australia. A joint project between District 980 and the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons eventuated, and in 1983 Interplast Australia was established to provide volunteer medical teams to carry out plastic and reconstructive surgery in developing countries. Interplast Australia's very first program was conducted in Samoa in 1983 and was fully funded by Rotarians. The second program to Fiji, also funded by Rotarians, garnered interest from the Australian Government, which recognised the importance of such foreign aid, and allocated additional partial funding for programs throughout the Pacific Islands. The ongoing partnership between Interplast and Rotary in Australia and New Zealand has contributed to Rotary achieving its humanitarian goals in our region, and aligns closely with Rotary's commitment to improving health and promoting peace and goodwill. In 2023, Interplast continues to undertake surgical and allied health programs in 16 countries in the Asia-Pacific region, from Samoa to Bhutan, and its partnership with Rotary is as strong as ever.

For some months we have held meetings out of town, having "no place to call home" and though it's been good to be able to buy meals and drinks at a hotel, the drive this time of year wasn't popular with everyone. So, an idea was hatched and put to Brereton's who agreed that we use the bakery as our meeting place for now. Our meeting this week was there and it was good to be so close to home and to have the venue to ourselves. More on this next time too.

A Serendipitous Swim

athalia's revered local doctor, Bill O'Hare, had recently told me this story about how he came to study Medicine at the University of Sydney.

During the 1930s, Bill O'Hare and his siblings attended a small rural school in Ellon, NSW. A young male teacher arrived and soon became besotted with one of the pretty school mothers. *She* was possibly besotted with his flashy car, a rarity in those times. The district grapevine was full of gossip about the pair.

Early in the new school year, the teacher gave instructions to the two eldest boys, Marty and Pat O'Hare, to take charge of the school students while he attended 'a school meeting.' Then he left. The new teacher wasn't aware that these two boys, Dr Bill's older brothers, were full of mischief. There were lots of cackles and sniggers from the students as to their teacher's whereabouts.

As it was the height of summer, Marty and Pat soon abandoned schoolwork and decided that a dip in the nearby dam was in order for them and their charges. They in turn told their little brother, Bill, to remain in the schoolroom and look after the younger students.

The boys' father was driving past when he spotted all the students' clothing and shoes on the dam bank. Being a prankster himself, he took in the situation and snatched up all the kids' clothing and headed off to the local sheep sale, smirking all the way. He didn't return until 5 pm.

Of course, the teacher's unprofessional behaviour forced the Education Department's hand, and he was dismissed, effective immediately. An Education Department official from Sydney was sent to sort out the mess. He interviewed every student and their parents about their children's education. Primary school concluded after Grade 8, when students successfully completed their Merit certificate. This was the extent of most students' education in rural Australia at this time.

After examining Bill O'Hare's outstanding schoolwork, the senior teacher asked Bill what he'd like to do when he left school. Bill suggested that he would probably work on his father's farm. The senior teacher was shocked and assured Bill that he should consider other options.

All the students, including Bill, were allocated to other schools as there wasn't any teacher available to come and take over their small remote school at such short notice. Bill was a keen student whose love of studying and reading was encouraged by his mother. He said he would probably be called a *nerd* these days. Bill finished his secondary education and achieved so highly that he was offered tuition and residential scholarships to the University of Sydney, where he studied Medicine. After becoming fully qualified, Dr Bill practised at Nathalia for over 30 years.

That frisky young Primary schoolteacher would have no idea of the part he played in Nathalia's history.

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Museum Moments...

Continuing..... A PROBLEM WITH THE BELL

The Nathalia Herald, 15 November 1904, published the following article on the Fire Bell. The fire bell belonging to the local brigade has never given satisfaction, inasmuch as it failed to peal forth the deep penetrating sounds expected of it. An attempt was made to improve this last Wednesday night, but although there was a slight perceptible improvement in the tone, it is yet very dull. An expert should be invited to discover what the defect is.

Under the heading, *Bell Towers*, the Nathalia Herald, 23 May 1905, affirmed that: *The bell towers* continue to find favour amongst the fire brigades, several orders having been received by the firm from different parts of the State. The Nathalia tower, is the pioneer amongst the Victorian towers, and no doubt many more will be used in place of more antiquated ones in the State. On 20 July 1905, the Dookie and Katamatite Recorder, printed that: The Dookie Fire Brigade has just been supplied with a new angle-steel bell tower and look-out, at a cost of £35. It is a very graceful structure made and erected by Messrs. Snooks and Jones, of

Nathalia. The bell is to be suspended 34 feet from the ground, the tower rising to a height of 68 feet, and being surmounted by a flag pole.

Due to ill health, Mr. Snooks retired, but before leaving the district in October 1907, the fire brigade members were pleased to make a presentation of silverware to Mr. Snooks, showing their appreciation for his generosity and work with the fire brigade.

DEATH OF KING EDWARD VII

The Nathalia Herald, 27 May 1910, printed the following news. At Nathalia last Friday, a large congregation at the Church of England held a special

service to mark the burial of our late King Edward VII. In the afternoon, the tolling of the **fire bell** caused to assemble a large crowd at the **bell** tower where, under the direction of Mr. H. M. Muntz, a platform had been erected. The service was attended by Mounted Rifles under Captain W. F. Smith, the Cadets and State School children under Mr. Sleeman, the Nathalia Fire Brigade under Captain F. H. Muntz, and the Nathalia Brass Band under Bandmaster Biggs. The President of the Shire [Cr. T. Thornton] pointed out that they were taking part in a ceremony that was being held throughout the civilised world in honour of their late great and honoured King. The band then played, followed by impressive speeches by Reverends Oates, Clemens and Walker. The **bell** was tolled in halfminute peals and the Mounted Rifles fired the royal salute as a mark of reverence. [Abridged]

The Nathalia Herald, 15 June 1915, confirmed that: Permission was granted to the Nathalia Church of England, to place a sign on the bell tower. In the same paper it was confirmed that: News had reached Nathalia that ex-fireman John Gordon "Jack" Scouller, had been killed in action at the Dardanelles. "Jack" was

in action at the Dardanelles. "Jack" was affectionately known to all as, "the darling of Nathalia." His father, Jim Scouller as well as himself, had been highly respected members of the brigade and had done good work for the brigade while in it. Fireman Furze and Gray moved that a letter of condolence be sent to the parents of exfireman Scouller. It was also moved at the meeting that: An enlarged photo of young Jack, be secured and placed in the station.




meals to residents within our community who needed support. This product had an estimated face value in excess of \$3 million dollars.

On a fictional remote Scottish island, (filmed on the Western Isles. North and South Uist) a group of refugees are placed in a temporary residence as they await the results of their asylum claims.

At the heart of the story is Omar, a Syrian musician who is unable to work during his asylum process. He carries his oud, a Middle Eastern string instrument, with him at all times. As the film unfolds, it becomes apparent that Omar's hand is injured and doubts arise about his ability to play the oud. He frequently uses the only available pay phone to speak with his parents in Istanbul, who share concerns about his safety as well as the well -being of his brother Nabil.

The daily lives of the men are relatively uneventful. They attend awkward cultural awareness classes led by Helga and Boris. They share their dreams

with each other—Wasef aspires to play football for Chelsea F.C. —and ponder whether their remote location is a deliberate attempt to "break" them. They are aware that as single men, they are



considered low priority. Their leisure time is spent watching episodes of the television show *Friends*, which sparks intense debates between Abedi and Wasef regarding relationship dynamics.

Described as a funny and poignant cross-cultural satire...this slow and thoughtful film brings attention to a rooster, Freddy Mercury, and surprising references to universal western culture.

Why run from Nathalia to Melbourne?

eading Senior Constable Kyle Gemmill is planning to run seven ultra -marathons (441 kilometres) in seven days to honour the life of his SOG mate and mentor Brendan Warbutton (known as KB), who died from Ewing Sarcoma cancer in November last year and to raise funds to combat the disease.

"I am not a natural runner and have had 12 operations on my legs. I think that because it is such a challenge for me, it makes it the right way to honour KB."

He will start from his home town of Nathalia on November 3 and arrive at police headquarters on the anniversary of Warburton's death. "We aim to raise \$100,000 for research," he says.

Kyle has not cut his hair or beard since the day before KB's funeral and

will not cut either until he has completed the feat in November, earning him the nickname Forrest Gump among Victoria Police Members.

Kyle grew up in Nathalia before joining the Army and then the Police Force. He was a talented sportsman playing junior football and cricket for Nathalia winning many awards including the U17s Nathalia Football Club and Murray Football League Best and Fairest. Kyle also played senior football for Nathalia winning a number of premierships.

Kyle says his training is on track - he ran 45kms last weekend and says he has a few months to step it up.

Gail celebrates retirement and 40 years at Numurkah Hospital

ail Grinter (nee Baker) who lives in Kaarimba began her nursing training at the Warragul Hospital in 1975 at 18 years old, straight after finishing school. All the training nurses were required to live at the hospital under a matron for the duration of their training. The matron was very strict in those days. If the girls went out, they had to be back in by 10.30pm or they would be locked out & have to go to the head matron to be let back in. Girls would sneak out the windows and cover for each other. Men were forbidden in the nurse's quarters and cottages. Gail's brother Max was smuggled in one day for a shower on his way to a concert. Another day Gail's father, Max senior, was smuggled in so he could carry a television into the cottage Gail was living in.

Gail spent 3 years training in Warragul. Graduation was a big celebration. Wearing the veil was very prestigious.

She then worked in theatre at the Mooroopna Hospital (was Goulburn Valley Base back then). She was considered a very capable nurse by the surgeons, especially Dr Ferguson who wanted her to assist him when he went to Africa. She lived at Rushworth house behind the hospital where she met a friend Louis. The first time they met, they decided to travel the world together, which they did including a stint working in the Leukemia ward of the Hammersmith hospital in England.

Gail returned to nursing in Shepparton then completed 12 months of midwifery training at the Queen Vic Hospital in Melbourne. Again Gail lived on site with the other nurses and a strict matron.

Gail returned to the GV, working in Kyabram then finally starting at Numurkah hospital in 1983 after she got married. Gail worked in theatre, general ward and as a midwife while they still had babies born at the hospital. There were about 60-80 babies born each year, and Gail was there to help deliver many of them. During one big theatre operation, the surgeon needed Gail to use the suction and it would not work. Everyone was rushing about trying to figure out what was wrong, when Gail eventually realised she was standing on the suction hose! Most recently she worked as the solo community midwife handling the pre and postnatal care of local mothers & babies. Gail ran antenatal classes for many

years in the evenings and was renowned for her humorous take on the material.

It would give Gail great joy to see the mothers and babies down the street whom she assisted. There were a few who she assisted with their birth and then when the babies were having their own babies. Gail infamously announced at a family Christmas to everyone that she had seen a niece's new boyfriend naked...when he was born of course!

Gail was very devoted to the community midwife job. Late nights finishing paperwork after several home visits to new mums was a norm. Those close saw the extent of Gail's concern for her patients and maintaining the services offered from the Numurkah Hospital. She has cared for her patients young and old with care and compassion and made a wonderful career as a nurse. Like most nurses, she has quite the sense of humour (I guess they have to) and has made many special friends of her colleagues. Gail officially retired this month after 48 years nursing, 40 of those at Numurkah. We thank Gail for her incredible contribution.


