hree weeks ago Nathalia Fire Brigade took possession of a new Field Command Vehicle. The command vehicle which is a Ford Ranger is fitted with tools to assist with the management on an incident.

Nathalia Fire Brigade has 30 active members and they meet every Wednesday evening where they do training, equipment maintenance, tactical training, and once a year training in a specialised training centre.

Volunteers are able to join the CFA from the age of 16 and more volunteers are always needed. To operate more effectively it would be

ideal to have approximately 50 members. The CFA sometimes struggle with members being available during the week, and during working hours.

Recycling Station



WERE YOU ATTENDING NATHALIA HIGHER ELEMENTARY SCHOOL OR NATHALIA PRIMARY SCHOOL IN 1953? HAVE YOU STILL GOT YOUR CORONATION MEDAL?

The Numurkah Shire Council, which included Nathalia at that time, announced that the Council would give each child a commemorative medal, which it was hoped each child would keep as a memento of a great occasion. The medals were gilt bronzed, having on one side the Queen's head, with the Shire seal on the other, to which were attached red, white and blue ribbons. The Latin on the shire seal reads, "from/by a Gift of God"

Museum Moments...

The Nathalia Herald reported on 9th June 1953, "The Nathalia Town Hall was crowded on Monday afternoon of last week, when an impressive children's Coronation service was conducted by the H.E.School. On the platform with Mr. Osborne were Crs.R.Gordon (shire president) and J.V. Trewin. Mr. J.K. Dancocks (shire secretary) also attended to help in the distribution of medals to the children." "After the singing of the National Anthem, the children repeated the declaration of loyalty, and Mr. Osborne welcomed visitors and townfolk. The hymn "God Bless Our Native Land" was beautifully sung by the children"....."Mr. Osborne, in addressing the gathering, gave a very

thoughtful address in which he explained that the crowning of the



Coronation of Queen Elizabeth 11, 2nd June 1953 (size: slightly larger than a 20 cent piece)

Queen was a dedication of service to the British Commonwealth of Nations"......"A song by the primary scholars, "Ring the Bells of London", was nicely rendered, as also was that by the secondary scholars, "True Hearts Rejoicing".

Museums Victoria Collections has a sample in their collection which they have purchased. The sample here is held by Lyn Franklin who possibly picked it up at a clearing sale. Medals issued by other shires for sale on Ebay range between \$18—\$35.

Tell us what you know about fruit fly - online community survey open

H ome gardeners and property owners across the Goulburn Murray Valley have the opportunity to take part in the Queensland fruit fly online community survey and share what they know about fruit fly and options to control the pest.

The survey findings will help identify opportunities to support and educate the community about fruit fly control and management.

Goulburn Murray Valley Fruit Fly Area Wide Management Program Coordinator, Ross Abberfield said the short survey takes about 2 minutes to complete and is accessible through the program's website at <u>www.fruitflycontrol.com.au</u>.

"We're asking property owners and anyone with a vegie garden, fruit tree or interest in gardening to take a couple of minutes and complete the survey. "By participating in the survey, community members can play an active role in informing and identifying important education activities that are aimed at supporting the community manage fruit fly," Mr Abberfield said.

The Goulburn Murray Valley Fruit Fly Area Wide Management Program was established in 2017 and brings together government, industry and the community to apply control and education measures across the whole region.

"Fruit fly control needs to be carried out by the whole community to be effective and relies on the program's capacity to increase community awareness, education and engagement about fruit fly management," Mr Abberfield said.

The program includes the council areas of Moira, Greater Shepparton, Strathbogie, Campaspe and $^{\mbox{8}}$

Berrigan. Program partners include Cobram and District Fruit Growers Association, Fruit Growers Victoria, Summerfruit Australia and Lions International.

"Effective fruit fly control by the whole community is essential in protecting our region's multi million dollar horticultural industry, our regional economy and the lifestyle our region is so well known for," Mr Abberfield said.

"By asking the community to complete the short online survey it allows us to understand the community's knowledge of fruit fly and where we should be concentrating our education efforts to make sure we are doing everything possible to effectively manage the pest," Mr Abberfield said.

Fruit fly control must be carried out by the whole community to be effective and relies on the program's capacity to increase community awareness, education and engagement about fruit fly management.

The Goulburn Murray Valley Fruit Fly Area Wide Management Program is supported by the Victorian Government.

The survey is open to all residents in the Goulburn Murray Valley region and will close Friday 5 August 2022. Road Safety Inquiry Project 2022



• ollaborative partnerships for our children's road safety education with ELLA (Early Learning Association Australia), TAC and along with other early learning services to ensure that early childhood road safety education in Victoria is recognised as integral to the wellbeing of children now and into the future.

Nathalia Preschool's Inquiry Project - How do we build and promote the children's cycling and scooter skills in our local community, Nathalia? From this week. The children will be bringing their own bike or scooter to preschool to practice their skills and awareness of riding/ scooting in our local community. But, before we venture out into community we must first learn about road rules, who else is a road user, signs and their meaning and importantly the children's skill level on their bike/scooter.



We have been out and about in Nathalia looking at and taking photos of our local signs and then investigating their meaning back at preschool. The children have been engaging in music and movement sessions to practice go and stop, changing directions and listening to a direction. We have then incorporated the photos of our community signs into their play.



Lego road kits were purchased to allow the children to design and build roads. The perfect opportunity to practice crossing a pedestrian crossing and think about other vehicles that move through our community such as trucks, cars, motorbikes and bike riders. Role play provides opportunities to put their new knowledge into practice, for their peers to challenge their decisions and for the educators to put intentional teaching strategies in place. The children in the 4yr old program have been

fitted with a helmet which they will use when riding their bikes or scooters at preschool. Mandatory standards prescribes requirements


for design, constructions, performance and safety making of bicycle helmets. helmet bicycle is designed to offer protection to the cyclists head during impact. Importantly, the helmet should not move on the child's head.

Out to the vacant block, the children have begun to practice their new skills. Following signs, practicing starting and stopping and most importantly listening to directions from educators and their peers. Keep an eye out for us in the coming weeks as we being to move out and about in our local community.








