Fruit fly control essential despite the arrival of winter

The Goulburn Murray Valley Fruit Fly Area Wide Management Program is reminding property owners, gardeners and orchardists of the need for continued action against fruit fly, despite the arrival of winter.

The cold weather makes it harder for fruit fly to survive, however the pest is able to survive the winter months by taking refuge in warm spots on the landscape in areas such as the foliage of evergreen trees and areas around houses and buildings.

The Program's Acting Regional Coordinator Penny Aston said it is important anyone with a fruit tree or vegetable patch is fruit fly aware and takes action to stop the spread of the pest all year round.

"We know that the fruit flies that are able to survive winter by finding a warm environment will be the cause of a population influx in spring, so continued action through winter is essential," she said.

The region was hit by several extreme weather events throughout the growing season with a number of storms causing serious hail and wind damage for many growers earlier this year.

"It has been a bad year for fruit fly and we know growers have faced significant challenges arising from weather events throughout the season, so it is essential that anyone with a fruit tree or veggie patch remain vigilant and continue to take action to protect against fruit fly," Ms Aston said.

"Poor management of fallen fruit in orchards and untendered fruit trees at the back of properties has contributed to population explosions in a number of areas this season. We are calling on operational and non-operational orchards in the region to increase their vigilance in how they manage fruit fly on their property," she said.

Support is available through the program to help gardeners, property owners and growers build their knowledge of the various fruit fly control methods.

will work through the most effective control options for their particular situation." Ms Aston said.

"We have identified that area wide management is the best way to minimise the impact of fruit fly on our region and

its horticultural industry, and are continuing to work to increase both community and grower awareness about the critical need to be fruit fly aware and take action," Ms Aston said.

Anyone with a fruit tree or vegetable patch is reminded to pick, prune and protect against fruit fly by taking a few simple measures:

- Remove ripe fruit from the tree and collect fallen fruit to reduce opportunities for fruit fly to breed
- Pick fruit early as fruit ripens it becomes more attractive to fruit fly so it is import to pick and remove fruit early
- Use netting to create a physical barrier between your fruit or vegetables and fruit fly
- Use traps and bait sprays to control numbers
- Prune fruit tree regularly and keep them to a manageable height
- Consider replacing unwanted and unmanaged fruit trees with non-fruiting alternatives
- Dispose of effected fruit by placing spoilt fruit in a heavy duty plastic bag, sealing it and putting it in the hot sun for 14 days to cook the larvae or freeze infested fruit for a few days.

Fruit fly poses a serious threat to the Goulburn Murray Valley's multimillion horticultural industry, with action required by orchardists, property owners and home gardeners to help stop the spread.

"It is essential that growers and property owners in the Goulburn Murray Valley take a range of measures rather than relying on a single action to help control fruit fly," Ms Aston said.

The Goulburn Murray Valley Fruit Fly Area Wide Management Program is supported by the Victorian Government.

oira Shire Council administrator John Tanner AM on Thursday June 8th welcomed his appointment as chair of the Panel of Administrators for the Council.

The Victorian government announced on June 8th Mr. Tanner's appointment to the permanent Panel and as its Chair to lead Moira Shire 'back to good governance' after the Council was dismissed on 7 March.

Other members of the Panel are Suzanna Sheed, a lawyer and former Member for Shepparton and Dr. Graeme Emonson PSM, the former Deputy Secretary, Corporate Services Department of Energy, **Environment and Climate Action.**

The Council was dismissed following a Commission of Inquiry highlighting that the Council could not effectively carry out its responsibilities in accordance with the Local Government Act 2020 because of significant governance failures.

Mr Tanner said he was honoured to be joined by such distinguished and experienced leaders on the Panel.

"They will help provide the Shire with the confidence and trust people are seeking from the Council," he said.

"I am delighted to see the depth of their understanding and experience in the needs of rural and regional communities. Their strategic insights will be of great importance to the work of the Council and the community as a whole.

"Over the past 90 days I have endeavoured to 'reset' the community's perception of the Council and build a pathway to a progressive and innovative Shire that meets the residents' expectations.

"The Shire has so much potential for its residents and business. We must build on the opportunities we have in education, health, arts, tourism, sport, horticulture, business and community leadership to make everyone proud of being part of the municipality."

Government Melissa Horne said Ms Sheed had extensive experience as a lawyer and brought a deep understanding of key issues in regional Victoria. The Minister said Dr. Emonson brought expertise in leadership and organisational culture and was most recently a Deputy Secretary in the Victorian Public Service.

"Councils must faithfully represent the communities they serve - Moira Shire residents deserve quality services and a council that puts their interests first," the Minister said.

"The appointment of the Administrators is a crucial step along this path." The work of Mr Tanner, Ms Sheed and Dr Emonson will help move Moira Shire forward "

Mr Tanner was appointed as the initial Administrator of the Council in March. He will now Chair the Panel until 8 December 2023 after which further appointments may be made to the Panel, including the appointment of a new Chair.

Ms Sheed and Dr Emonson's appointments are until the beginning of the first meeting of the Council following the general election for the Council in October 2028.

Background information:

Ms Suzanna Sheed, a lawyer, was an independent member of the Victorian Legislative Assembly from 2014 until 2022. She represented the electorate of Shepparton. She served as chair of the Victorian Parliament's Pandemic Declaration Accountability and Oversight Committee and was a member of the Family and Community Development Committee.

Ms Sheed brings a deep understanding of key issues in regional Victoria. She has held board positions with the RACV, Goulburn Murray Water and the Law Institute of Victoria.

Dr Graeme Emonson PSA was formerly Deputy Secretary, Corporate Services Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action in Victoria. He brings leadership and organisational culture to the Panel, along with his extensive background as a Fellow and Board Member of the Institute of Public Administration Australia (IPAA), a former Executive Director of Local Government Victoria, CEO of the City of Wangaratta for five years to 2002 and CEO of Knox City Council from 2002 to 2016.

Establishing a bush tucker garden at Nathalia Preschool

busy area of play at preschool $m{\lambda}$ is the mud kitchen. Here the children create potions, bake mud cakes, cook soup, and utilise the vegetation that grows in the garden. preschool After conversations about the plants that grow in the children's garden, we decided to plant bush tucker plants. We currently have a small bush tucker garden growing in the vegetable patch, although the children do not have access to it when they are playing in the mud kitchen.

3yr preschoolers worked together to weed the area, remove the rocks, and then plant the native oregano, chocolate lily, lemon myrtle and salt bush seedlings that had self-seeded in the vegetable garden. We know that some of these plants can grow quite large, although the children will maintain their growth as they pick the leaves and flowers to incorporate in their mud kitchen play. The added benefit is the scent of the plants and the hands on experience they will have as they learn about bush tucker from their everyday play.

The 4yr preschoolers arrived at cups, bikes were soon entering into preschool after the large amount of rain last week to discover the vacant block was now a lake. Never ones to miss an opportunity, they soon donned the wet weather gear and gumboots and headed out onto the block to explore their changed natural environment. How do you tell the depth of the water? By how far the water comes up or over and into your gumboots! Trucks, kettle,

their exploration of the water.

This also provided the opportunity to have a fire on the block and cook our sausages for lunch. Together we gathered around the conversations, discoveries of how smoke follows you, safety around a fire as well as reflections about the land on which we were gathering and acknowledged the traditional custodians of the land on which we

Museum Moments...

FIRES IN NATHALIA CONTINUE..

The Numurkah Leader, 6 January 1899, published details on the destruction of Muir and Co's premises.

About 3a.m. on 5th January 1899, a fire broke out in the premises of Messrs. Muir and Co., storekeepers, Blake Street, Nathalia. The outbreak was first observed at the rear of the drapery department, where it raged fiercely until the fire reached where the powder and cartridges were stored, when an explosion occurred, which was the first notice the general public obtained of the disaster. Inspector Gardiner was first on the scene of the fire and too control of the workers who hastened with their willing services to aid in extinguishing the flames. There was dire confusion at first, as the Misses Phelps and Mr. M. Howe who lived in adjacent premises, having to be pulled from their beds. Howe's tobacconists' stock was much damaged as that of Mr. Peter's saddler. The stock of the Misses Phelps also suffered from severe handling on being removed into the street, and though there was no hope of saving Muir and Co.'s premises, the fears entertained of the safety of the adjoining premises. Muir and Co/'s premises were completely destroyed with all the stock. Amongst those who gave their help were: Mr. W. G. Parry, Constables Hartshorn and Bonnell, Messrs. Bennett, Lane, McDonald, Alf Doran, Hutcheson and Grogan, besides many others. A notable feature of the fire in Nathalia is the presence of Mr. C. Hutcheson's water cart, which is always kept full and ready for such an emergency.

The Nathalia business destroyed by fire were: Humberstone's Chaff and Produce Store, R. G. Eakin's Drapery House, Mr. Mill's bootmaker, Mr. F. C. Cameron's fruit shop "burnt like matchwood" and the Nathalia "Herald" Office and Mr. Jim Scouller's Butcher shop were both lost. Mr. J. Miller's Chemist was severely damaged.

Within 30 minutes, twelve shops were consumed by fire. Mr. J.P. Horne, manager of the Bank of Australasia, whose furniture was badly knocked about by handling. The roadway was strewn with goods from Stenton's, right past the destroyed buildings. Colgan's Hotel, Muntz Bros., and Mr. A.



Draper got their goods out, for the fire threatened to sweep right down the east side of Blake Street, and probably would have done so but for the wind changing round to the west. Mr. Stenton's tailoring establishment was charred on the roof and at the side of the verandah, but damage was effectively coped with here. His stock was damaged and his building partially burnt.

Many shops on the east side of Blake Street, Nathalia were destroyed by fire.

that was held in Melbourne during the last week in May, our members didn't "scatter" to other clubs. No one from our club was able to attend this convention but some Rotarians from clubs in the GV area did, thus we couldn't visit them (we had planned to go to two, maybe three). Then this week there was no meeting, for our club, and we

could have

"scattered" but a few of our members were ill so visits to other clubs will be done in the new Rotary year instead.

There was an article titled "How Rotary Helped Beat the Russians" in a magazine and I'll share it here: When Baltic nation Lithuania was fighting for its freedom in the early 1990s it had big problems rejoining international organisations such as Rotary.

But it got help from Australian Rotarians who intervened in an international dispute with Moscow, which was trying to stop countries like Lithuania from going their own way.

More than 30 years after Lithuania won independence, the small nation's Rotary leaders are here in Melbourne to give thanks to local members who helped out.

At the weekend they met up at the Rotary International Convention and also were hosted at the Lithuanian community centre in North Melbourne by local Rotarian Balys Stankunavicius.

In1990, Mr Stankunavicius was asked by then Lithuanian Prime Minister Kazimiera Prunskiene to lobby for her country to rejoin Rotary after the Russian occupiers had banned it for 50 years.

Mr Stankunavicius said that global Rotary leaders, under pressure from the then USSR, were initially reluctant to give the green light to Lithuania.

"It was outrageous," he said. "I spoke to my Rotary mates in Melbourne about what was going on and they were furious. Australian District Governor Greg Ross and Toorak Rotary president Les Goldman led a vigorous campaign."

It paid off – in 1992 Rotary returned to Lithuania for the first time since World War II.

Rotary Lithuania district governor Jurgita Turuliene said Mr Ross and Mr Stankunavicius had played a key role. "So it's amazing to be here in Melbourne to thank them," she said.

This time of year there is not much going on except for organising the changeover...which I touched on in my last column. There has been a change in that Nationals Member for Shepparton, Kim O'Keeffe, is unable to attend after all. Liberal MP Wendy Lovell has accepted our president's invitation for the evening of June 28th.

Time will tell. A fellow Rotarian will be "deputised" and will pass on the information to me so that I can write about the changeover, for this column, when the time comes.
