Pride of The Murray Passes Through Nathalia

The Pride of the Murray, a 98 year old paddle steamer, passed through Nathalia on Tuesday the 7th of June, on it's 2300 kilometre trip from Echuca/Moama to Longreach, Queensland. The 60-tonne load on a trailer with 106 tyres to spread the load negotiated many different obstacles on its journey including Nathalia's round-a-bout and bridge over the Broken Creek.

Originally built at Echuca in 1924 as a red gum logging barge for the PS *Adelaide*, the then named *C24* transported logs from the Barmah Forest to Murray River Saw Mills at Echuca. After World War II, the paddle steamers and barges were no longer used, and she was abandoned on the banks of the Murray in the 1950s.

In 1972, Max Carrington dug it out from the riverbed sediment and transported it to the Moama slip where he began restoring and converting the old barge into a paddle boat, complete with a diesel engine. It was named the *Pride of the Murray* in honour of a paddle steamer that sank at Echuca in 1866.

Finally, we held an assembly, addressing the importance of this week, focusing on how we can move forward together. National Reconciliation Week is a crucial part of building relationships and communities that value Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander people, histories, cultures and futures.

Moira Shire Messages

Community Strengthening Grants awarded

M oira Shire Council has awarded grants to four projects across the shire, totalling \$26,149, as part of the Community Strengthening Grants Program.

Mayor Libro Mustica said Council grants were a great way to kick start a community initiative, with the grants designed to support community organisations that provide diverse and effective local services, facilities and activities.

"These grants help facilitate projects which enrich the whole community and can assist in the development of services, management of facilities, co-ordination of events and promotion of tourism, environmental sustainability and health in the community," Cr Mustica said.

"This latest round of grants will help community groups from St James, Yarrawonga, Numurkah and Cobram.

"The Cobram Football Club will receive \$10,000 to assist in creating a new spectator shelter.


"The Rotary Club of Numurkah will receive \$10,000 to help in the purchase of an 11 seater all-abilities community bus for use by residents of the Pioneer Lodge and Karinya Nursing Home.

"The St James Golf Club will receive \$1,804 to replace old curtains which will improve the clubhouse; the carpet will also be replaced but has been included in Council's renewal program for 2022/23.

"The Yarrawonga and Border Agricultural and Pastoral Association will receive \$4,345 for the installation of an evaporative cooler in the Hammon Pavilion.

"Congratulations to those community groups.

"I would also like to thank the Goulburn Valley Regional Library Group who provided support to the applicants with the online application process including computer and internet use."

An evening in Malaysia!

Every year the Country Women's Association of Vic chooses a different 'country of interest' so that we can learn more about other parts of the world, this year it's Malaysia... and what unites people more than sitting down and enjoying a tasty meal together?

Nathalia Night Watch CWA met on the evening of Wednesday 8th at the Guide hall, but the intriguing scents of various exotic foods soon transported us to the food hawkers' markets in the bustling streets of



From markets in the bustling streets of Kuala Lumpur or Penang where we learnt about the many different cultures which have left their footprint on the country throughout its history.

Each member brought along one or two dishes they had cooked, some of the more exotic ingredients were a bit hard to source and we realised they eat a lot of rice!

We learnt some new words, like 'nasi' for rice and 'goreng' meaning fried.

Some members' kids came along too and Kayla impressed us with her report of basic facts about the country; Malay is the official language but there are also 112 different indigenous languages spoken.

The highlight of the evening was when Adrea turned up in full Malay dress with a traditional platter on banana leaves! Here's a recipe you can try, to add a bit of Malaysian exoticism to your life... over there it's eaten as a daytime snack, there's no concept of dessert in Malaysia. For us, it's a great

Winter comfort food.

Bubur Pulut Hitam - Black Rice Pudding 1 cup of black glutinous rice

1 сир от ріаск

5 cups water 4 pandan leaves (for flavour, but not absolutely necessary) Coconut sugar, but dark brown sugar works fine 1 can coconut milk (TCC brand, from IGA is great)

A little salt

Rinse the rice, then add to a medium pot with the water and pandan leaves, cook covered on low heat, stirring occasionally, until the rice grains are broken up into a gloopy mush; this might take a couple of hours. Remove pandan leaves and add enough sugar till it's slightly sweet, stir till dissolved.



Add salt to the room temperature coconut milk, stir, check the taste, it should be slightly salty.

Serve the rice warm in bowls with coconut milk poured over the top. The contrast between the warm sweetness and the cold saltiness is what makes this dish intriguing.

Out and about with the preschool children

O n a cold, wet windy winters day, the children in 4 year old preschool boarded a coach and headed off to explore Shepparton.

Their first stop was to visit SAM (Shepparton Art Museum) where the Education Coordinator Anni had invited us to participate in a magic-clay workshop. The workshop is based on the Liquidarium exhibition designed by artist Vera Möller and inspired by the wetlands. A wet land is the area around the lakes and rivers. Many plants and animals live and grow in the wetland's areas. Vera has created a wet land in the exhibition to show what life is like in the wetlands from the point of view of a frog. It was an opportunity to use our senses to observe, listen and move around the exhibition.

Anni then invited us into the workshop where we engaged in hands on learning with sculpting an aquatic plant with magic-clay. Magic-clay is a self-drying medium that can be sculptured in many ways and forms and is the perfect follow on from the children using playdough and clay at preschool.

We are the first preschool group to be invited to participate in an art workshop at SAM!

Due to the wet weather, we ventured in a lift to the fourth floor for lunch. Excited children's voices were heard "we are the same as the treetops", "look over there, I can see a town" as they took in their view.

After lunch, we boarded the coach to visit Elora's Mum Holly who works at PETstock to purchase tropical fish for our tank. For many months our giant Oscar greeted the children every morning. After a discussion about why we could only have one fish in the tank, the children decided that they would like to see many different fish swimming. Therefore, the hard decision was made to rehome our Oscar fish. We found a fish collector who specialises in large Oscars and off went our fish to his new home. At PETstock, the children investigated what a pet shop sells. Looking at all the birds for sale and watching the kittens play in their enclosure. Holly then showed us the fish and advised us on the ones perfect to create a community in our fish tank.

With our choices caught, we boarded the coach to bring our fish to their new home. If you would like to see the fish in their new home at preschool, you can look up our Facebook page Nathalia & District Preschool.

Excursions provide the children with an opportunity to think about the world in which they live, to engage in new experiences within a group and to practice making appropriate choices. These are all skills required to be successful learners throughout

This photograph was kindly loaned to me by Mr Vic Dohnt. It shows the Murray Valley Coach in Echuca in 1949.



This coach would travel from Mildura through to Corryong each week, pulling into Nathalia at about midday, at the café located where the Printer's shop is now.

The prime mover was a 'White' model truck.

It would feel very different to what we know today to have the driver in a separate part of the vehicle to the passengers.

Regarding the latest about polio in the world: "Two new cases of the wild polio virus have been reported in recent weeks - taking the total number for the year to date to five." The article goes on, "It was reported in the official Polio Weekly global update on May 13 that the number of WPV cases for the year so far was three - two in Pakistan and one in Afghanistan." Later in the week, in an official weekly report on Thursday May 19 it was " confirmed there have been two new cases of WPV - one in Pakistan from the same area as the previous two cases in Pakistan this year; and the second in Mozambique - derived from the Malawi outbreak."

A few words now, from another article, about the good that Rotary is doing through its Foundation:

"This year, Rotary made another contribution in our commitment to peace, in the form of more than 1,000 global, district, and disaster response grants approved to fulfil the needs of thousands around the world. For until hungry people are fed, families have access to clean water, and children everywhere are educated, we won't truly have peace in the world."

We received a booking for the Heart House on June 9th. The house was ready, after our recent working bee, but we still had to go to the house before the guests arrived. The carpets had been steam cleaned, soon after we worked at the house , and the furniture needed to be put back in place.

The yearly insurance at the respite house has risen by about 50% and it is

a huge expense. The fact that the property is not constantly occupied, that it's close to the Murray (flood risk) and to Barmah forest (fire risk) dictates the cost of insurance. We mentioned this cost in front of our incoming Assistant Governor (when she attended our June 1st meeting) and she said she'd see what she could do. The next day she gave a phone number for a member from one of the Melbourne Rotary clubs, also in District 9790. Heart to Heart president, John Attwood, spoke with this man and a couple of days later John received a call to say that \$1,500 would be donated towards this insurance of \$2,500. We are very grateful, to say the least, and have expressed our gratitude to the Melbourne Rotarian, and his members, and AG elect too.

Our meeting, on the 15th of June, was held in the Senior Citizens' rooms. It was our last "official" meeting for this Rotary year. Some business was conducted, there was plenty of Fellowship, and the Changeover was also discussed.

This will be on June 29th at the bowling Club in Weir Street. This was last year's venue also and it suited the occasion very well. Roving Roast will feed us, and a bowls club member will tend the bar. Apparently there are now more heaters, in the venue, than there were last year, so that will be very nice. Of course there will be words written about this evening, and photos will accompany the words also.

Yours truly has been asked to continue submitting articles for the RGC through the next Rotary year and will...you've been warned, Jeanette! Goulburn Murray Valley fruit fly project receives top accolade - national award

he Goulburn Murray Valley Fruit Fly Area Wide Management Program has lacksquare taken out a top accolade for its achievements in reducing the impact of fruit fly on the Australian horticultural industry.

The program featured at the Hort Connections national awards for excellence in Brisbane on the 8 June 2022, receiving the Visy Industry Impact Award from a field of 16 industry candidates from across Australia.

Program Governance Group Chairman, Tony Siciliano said the award was an outstanding achievement and recognised the important work that has been achieved in protecting Australia's \$12 billion horticultural industry from the devasting impacts of fruit fly.

"The program's coordinated and highly effective area wide management approach has resulted in positive outcomes for the region and has become a model of best practise which is being replicated in other areas," Mr Siciliano said.

Program Coordinator, Ross Abberfield said the award independently assessed and recognised the program for implementing a system of technology and business practice outside of the industry norm, as part of the program's area wide management of fruit fly.

"The judges determined the program achieved a significant contribution to best practice and cost savings through the value chain. They believe that we have delivered technology and practice that is not in common usage by industry, providing a commercial and competitive advantage, which is something we are extremely proud of," Mr Abberfield said.

Greens Lake Native Fish Salvage

W ith the decommissioning of Greens lake by GM-Water, and an attempt made by Roland and his team at the Goulburn Valley Association of Angling Clubs (GVAAC), and the Victorian Recreational Fishing Peak Body (VRFish) to save Greens Lake for its Regional Community, Recreational and Environmental values, it became apparent after many discussions that no water will be allocated to the lake even with spillage and excess water flowing out to sea this year. Next step was to warn the authorities of an imminent major fish kill which created much of a stir

and led to fish surveys last year and a recovery attempt before Easter this year. With only a handful of native fish recovered, letters were once again sent out, and a forty week

recovery operation was initiated which will be completed by the end of this week (17th June). To date 398 large Golden Perch and 42 Murray Cod with 10 over 1M have been relocated to Waranga basin, Goulburn River and the Arcadia Fish Hatchery to be used as brood stock.

Waranga Basin Habitat Installation




The GVAAC steering committee chaired by Roland will soon receive its draft report on the engineering and costing of the habitat installation from the Wedge Group, Echuca. Permits will then be applied for and the installation of woody structures and brush piles made ready for installation into the Zone around the island and up to the Yacht club on the western side of the lake, fishers and volunteers will be able to assist with the implementation which will be staged over a period of 2 weekends.

Recently VFA Inland fisheries Manager Dr Taylor Hunt and Roland spent an afternoon fishing and taking depth readings and photos around the proposed new habitat site, Taylor was surprised by the size and depth of the lake including the number of redfin caught. The VFA are eager to stock 750,000 golden perch fingerlings into the lake over the next 3 years. According to Roland stocking ceased a few years ago, under pressure from redfin fishers, but will recommence when sufficient habitat is provided for the fingerlings

Recently over 30 members of local angling clubs, from Kyabram, Undera, Euroa, Tatong, Rochester and Nathalia together with senior VFA and VRFish members participated in an outing to Greens Lake, Waranga Basin and the Arcadia Native Fish Hatchery organised by the Victorian Fisheries Authority (VFA) fisheries manager Michelle Wenner.

13 large Golden Perch were taken from Greens Lake and released into Waranga Basin at the new boat launching facility at Harriman's Point as part of the Greens lake salvage operation, BBQ lunch and a very

informative visit of the new fish hatchery in Arcadia was undertaken providing an excellent insight into this modern facility.

Anthony Forster gave a tour of the hatchery starting with the Brood Ponds where female cod lay their eggs into fine mesh structures, taken, checked and the fish larvae transferred into Zooplankton ponds, where it will take only one week for the larvae to grow into fingerlings 4-5cm. The zooplankton ponds with a bed of grass are filled with water towards the end of September, sprayed with fertiliser and within a short time turn green with algae, the microscopic animals (zooplankton) drift around eating the algae turning the water into a brown soup,

fish larvae is then placed into the ponds and swim around eating the zooplankton, once ready the fingerlings are then transferred via underground pipes into blue tubs in an area below ground level, and distributed into our waterways

Fish Ecologist, Ryan gave a demonstration of how to determine the sex of a Cod, insert a Tag (microchip) and take a DNA sample.

The entire process from collecting the eggs to getting the fingerlings ready for release does not require any nets or handling procedures that could harm the fish.



Bee Friendly Farming grants dig deep to plant 100,000 trees for bees

 $B_{\rm farmers}$ across the country being supported to join the pledge to plant 100,000 trees for bees.

Grants of up to \$10,000 are available to farmers and land managers to plant pollinator-friendly trees that are indigenous to their farms, with Bee Friendly Farming providing farmers and land managers with \$1 for every tree planted, thanks to grant partners One Tree Planted and Flow Hive.

The program is administered by Wheen Bee Foundation, and CEO Fiona Chambers said the tree grants support pollinators while also benefiting farmers.

"Habitat loss is one of the greatest threats to bees and other pollinators," Ms Chambers said. "Planting pollinator-friendly trees increases food for bees, provides essential habitat for them to breed and creates habitat corridors, reducing the distance they need to travel to forage.

"This, in turn, helps farmers with healthier, more prolific pollinators and enhanced crop pollination outcomes."

The Bee Friendly Farming program works with farmers to help protect, preserve and promote the health of all pollinators. This month, Bee Friendly Farming celebrated its first anniversary in Australia. In just 12 months, more than 30,000 hectares of farmland across Australia has been certified Bee Friendly Farming.

To receive a tree grant, farms must be certified with Bee Friendly Farming. The tree grants, which start at \$1,000, more than cover certification costs, making it both good for the environment and a sound business investment.

This is the second year the tree grants have been offered. Last year, 17 agriculture businesses in four states received grants totalling \$48,600 to plant pollinator-friendly trees.

"This grant program was extremely successful last year funding the establishment of 80ha of pollinator habitat across four states," Ms Chambers said. "We are pleased to continue our work with One Tree

Planted and we are confident we can reach our new target of 100,000 trees, creating 100 additional hectares of pollinator-friendly habitat."

One Tree Planted supports reforestation projects across the globe. Last year, the nonprofit planted 10 million trees. This year, the organisation is on track to support the planting of more than 20 million trees. Each project is managed in partnership with local



communities for a range of objectives from forest fire recovery to wildlife habitat expansion.

One Tree Planted Asia Pacific Regional Director Beth Dalgleish said the organisation was keen to continue this world-first partnership with farmers specifically to plant trees to benefit native pollinators.

One Tree Planted is thrilled to be supporting farmers to plant trees specifically to benefit pollinators," Ms Dalgleish said. "We are excited to follow the first plantings this year as a result of the first round of grants, and we are looking forward to seeing more farmers take part as the program expands."

Successful applicants will receive a contribution of \$1 per tree planted, with grants between \$1,000 and \$10,000 available. Larger grant requests will be considered. Applications must be received on or before 5pm AEST on Sunday, 31 July 2022.

To be eligible to apply for these tree grants, farms must either be a BFF CERTIFIED Farm or have a BFF CERTIFIED application submitted and pending approval by the tree grant closing date.

We invite all members of our communities to embrace the day and continue to work towards a strong future together.




