comprehensive water study has been completed on Lake Numurkah and now Council wants to hear from the public, not only from Moira Shire but also visitors and interested businesses, on the possible improvement opportunities to develop this beloved community asset.

Mayor Libro Mustica said Council was committed to the long-term future of Lake Numurkah and had allocated \$50,000 to undertake an analysis of water flows and develop landscape upgrade options.

"This analysis, performed by water engineering specialists *Spiire*, involved a review of all aspects of the lake including survey work and landscaping opportunities," he said.

"The results of this analysis include retaining a portion of the lake for ornamental/recreational purposes; use integrated water management for water treatment; incorporate wetlands into the design; and provide a stormwater management solution as Numurkah develops to the north.

"We now want to hear from you – what do you think of the various improvement opportunities outlined in the analysis?"

Cr Mustica acknowledged many members of the community just wanted the lake full of water year-round.

"But to achieve that, Council would need to regularly purchase additional water which could put us in active competition with our farmers for water," he said.

Laura, Volunteer Co-ordinator - MHA Care Phone 03 5742 1111 "It is important to note that since the lake was built the irrigation water sector has totally transformed.

"Water is now tradeable with both temporary and permanent markets operating.

"What this means is that in some seasons water has a higher value on the market to some water owners than its perceived value as water used for irrigation or recreational purposes."

Lake Numurkah provides a unique and special open space area for the local community and visitors.

"The lake was constructed in the 1970s by a private developer and was supported by the then Numurkah Shire," Cr Mustica said.

"With the recent low water levels the following issues have appeared reduced amenity; poor water quality including high e.coli concentrations; proliferation of aquatic vegetation limiting recreational activities; and reduced recreational value.

"This low water level also reduced fish habitat and in 2019 Council arranged and paid for the removal of more than 60 native fish from the lake into the neighbouring Broken Creek.

"It is important to note Council continues to work with the private company who owns the majority of the lake and they have been shown this landscape master plan."

NCN Health Nathalia Medical Clinic have processes in place for community members who are symptomatic and need to see a doctor.

Patients with COVID like symptoms will be encouraged to have a telehealth appointment with the doctor. This happens over the phone and is bulk billed. The doctor can then decide if they need to be seen in person at the clinic, the patient may be asked to have a COVID test, either a PCR test or Rapid Antigen Test. If the doctor does need to have an in-person appointment with the patient, it may take place outside in the patient's car with additional PPE in place. For appointments p 5866 9444

Where can I get tested for COVID-19 Testing is available Monday to Friday by appointment at NCN Health Nathalia. For most people a Rapid Antigen Test is recommended and will be provided to you to take home. PCR testing is still available, results can take 1 - 3 days. For appointments p 5866 9444

Do I have to wear a mask when attending the health service and residential aged care?

Yes. Any person aged 8 years and older who attends the health service or residential aged care must still wear a face covering, unless a valid exemption applies.



Museum Moments...

Brought to you by Jeanette Holland on behalf of the Nathalia & District Historical Society.

An upcoming exhibition to be held at the G.R.A.I.N. Store is to be titled 'Purple and Gold'. This got me thinking about when and why the sports teams of Nathalia use this colour scheme. ???

My research has taken me back to 1887 when a report in the Nathalia Herald dated 19/05/1887 states "*The first football match of seniors teams ever* played in Nathalia took place on Sunday last, in the paddock adjoining the Barwo Hotel." (This hotel was just north of the current location of Casual Step). "*The respective sides consisted of members of the recently formed Nathalia Football Club, the teams were selected on the field, captained by Messers A. Bird and Neill…The members played with great spirit and the form exhibited was extremely creditable for a young unpracticed club…… The first match against a foreign team will take place on Saturday week, 28 May, on the local ground, when it has been arranged to try conclusions with the Numurkah Club.*"

Some further history of Nathalia Club can be found in the book "Nathalia Football Club 1892 –1966" by W. Hawks. This very informative book provides a glimpse at football in Nathalia over the last century or more. In the early days, sides consisted of 20 men apiece, and the side which finished on top of the premiership ladder at the end of the season was declared the premiership winner.

Notes from 1901 state that the club colours were fixed at Red and Blue. Messers Eakin & Co donated 10 complete sets of football outfits to the Nathalia Football Club.

Pictured at left is the Nathalia Premiers, GVFA 1914. Even though the photo is black and white, the stripes on the guernsey could be seen as red and blue.

In 1921, it was decided at the Annual meeting of Nathalia Football Club to change the colours of the club uniform. The old red and blue was replaced by purple and gold, the new guernsey being an exact replica of the Wesley College outfit. This choice was possibly because local families had students at Wesley.

In 1930 it was decided to make a slight change to the club colours, as on dull days the side was difficult to distinguish from Numurkah—so a gold sash was added to the all-purple guernsey.

For five years, from 1969 to 1974, under the coach Barry Connolly, the Nathalia Football Club changed their colours to Black and White. It was thought that merchandise would be more readily available in these colours and it may stimulate interest in the club by aligning with the Magpies/Collingwood. The change was not popular and therefore short-lived as the Past Players Association pushed for a change back to the purple and gold, and were willing to provide executive members to promote the club.

So ever since then Purple and Gold has been recognized as Nathalia colours across all sporting disciplines.

Protecting workers and animals from Japanese encephalitis

 $^{f N}$ here have been further detections of This includes wearing Japanese encephalitis virus across the state, with cases now confirmed at six piggeries in Victoria.

The six cases have been located in the shires of Loddon, Campaspe, Wangaratta, Gannawarra, Greater Shepparton and Greater Bendigo.

The detections in Gannawarra, Greater Shepparton and Greater Bendigo were confirmed by the Australian Centre for Disease Preparedness on the weekend.

Agriculture Victoria staff are continuing surveillance activities and providing information and advice to farmers.

Japanese encephalitis occurs most commonly in pigs and horses and can cause reproductive losses for susceptible animal species.

Humans can be impacted by the disease if they are bitten by an infected mosquito.

Chief Veterinary Officer Dr Graeme Cooke is urging anyone who owns pigs or horses to take steps to reduce exposure to mosquitoes.

"We encourage pig farmers and horse owners to eliminate mosquito breeding grounds near their animals, such as stagnant water, to reduce the chances of them being bitten".

Mosquito control is very important at this time and the Chief Health Officer has issued advice for people to protect themselves from mosquito bites.

AGRICULTURE VICTORIA long, loose fitting clothes outdoors and using

effective mosquito repellents containing picaridin or DEET on all exposed skin and trying to limit outdoor activity if lots of mosquitoes are around.

People cannot be infected by eating pig meat. Pork meat or pork products are safe to consume.

Nationally agreed movement restrictions have been applied to infected pig properties to reduce the spread of the disease in pigs.

Japanese encephalitis is a notifiable disease under the Livestock Disease Control Act.

Report any cases of unexplained pig deaths, especially piglets, or unexplained horse illnesses, to the 24-hour Emergency Animal Disease Watch Hotline on 1800 675 888. to your local vet or to Agriculture Victoria animal health staff. For more information visit: agriculture.vic.gov.au/je

Agriculture Victoria is working closely with the Department of Health to understand the implications, and to communicate to farmers how they can reduce the risk to farm workers. 



Off-Leash Dog Area Policy - have your say

• ouncil is exploring ways to make Moira Shire more dog friendly → and a draft Dog Off-Leash Area Policy is now out for public feedback.

Mayor Libro Mustica said dogs could currently be exercised off-leash in daylight hours at showgrounds, football grounds and recreation reserves across the shire.

"Dogs must be in the presence of the owner and the off-leash provisions do not apply when an organised sporting event or similar activity is in progress," Cr Mustica said.

"During these events dogs must on a leash at all times."

Cr Mustica said in addition to these open areas Council had received a number of requests to provide confined off-leash areas for dogs.

"These would been in the form of a fenced off-leash dog park," he said. "We conducted an initial survey in late 2021 to test the broad community attitude to these assets and to assist in the development of a draft Policy.

"This survey had a terrific response with 329 people taking the time to answer the questions.


"Their responses helped guide and develop the draft Off-Leash Dog Area Policy."

Mayor Libro Mustica said this draft Policy would help guide the development of off-leash areas throughout Moira Shire.

"All submissions received by the deadline will be considered by Council prior to deciding whether to proceed with the draft Policy, with or without amendment," he said.

Lake Numurkah improvement opportunities – have your say

A comprehensive water study has been completed on Lake Numurkah and now we want to hear from interested people on the possible improvement opportunities to develop this community asset.

Council is committed to the long-term future of Lake Numurkah and allocated \$50,000 to undertake an analysis of water flows and develop landscape upgrade options.

This analysis, performed by Spiire's Water Engineering and Landscape Architecture teams, involved a review of all aspects of the lake including survey work and landscaping opportunities.

The results of this analysis include retaining a portion of the lake for ornamental/recreational purposes; using integrated water management for water treatment; incorporating wetlands into the design; and providing a stormwater management solution as Numurkah develops to the north.

We now want to hear from you – what do you think of the various improvement opportunities outlined in the analysis?

Improvement opportunities

- Improved environmental values and opportunities for recreation and enjoyment.
- The Open Water area provides access to water, with activities including canoeing and kayaking.
- Jetties or pontoons at various locations in the Open Water area, such as Madigan Street Foreshore and the Broken Creek Trail Foreshore.
- Path connection along the north western portion of the site (behind Reynolds Drive) for access between Wattle Drive and Madigan Street.
- The remaining existing lake footprint will become an ephemeral zone, meaning it will be generally dry but will become wet after rainfall, and will be planted with appropriate native vegetation.
- ✓ Boardwalks across the flood zone could provide loop connections

between the island and Broken Creek trail and pedestrian bridge.

- / Boardwalk connection between the Lakeside Country Club to the island and Open Water area.
- Improved car parking, pedestrian access and safety along the Madigan Street foreshore.
- More seating, viewing areas, barbecue facilities and a playground.
- Areas of open water, tracks and trails, and mature trees provide places for the community to enjoy and a habitat for wildlife.
- Existing four drainage inlets combined into one to maximise all drainage flow being treated via the wetland.
- A deeper permanent lake area to minimise vegetation and algae blooms and improve open water ecology for fish and bird life.
