Nathalia Cenotaph Restoration





fter three years of grant applications and only partially completed jobs because of a lack of money, the Nathalia Cenotaph restoration is finally underway.

Thanks mainly to the Nathalia Bendigo Community Bank, the final but significant parts of the project have started. Residents might have already seen Butlers Electrical digging around the memorial in order to re-instate the lighting of the flags at night but more importantly, to remove the outdated and ugly switchboard from rear of the memorial and to provide protected power to the Northern end of the plantation. This power is needed for the various carnivals and events that we hold throughout the year.

Another part of the project is replacing the missing letters damaged names that are on the two stone Additionally, there are at least two names missing from Nathalia residents that enlisted or were conscripted to serve in Vietnam. Their omission has been distressing for the RSL, who have struggled to get the finance needed, as well



as finding a practical solution to add the missing names.

This is a once in a generation opportunity for people to put forward the names of those they believe are missing or whose names are damaged or spelt incorrectly. President of the local RSL, Mackenzie Craig, is asking anybody with information to contact him on 0418 489 491 or email mackenzie@llanreath.com.au as works need to get underway shortly in order to be completed by ANZAC Day.

Nathalia Vets Good News Story



Ellie had recently visited Bacchus Marsh with her family. She returned home with very itchy skin and allergies. She had a bald chest and abdomen, the hair on her legs had thinned so dramatically, her ears were itchy constantly and she was forever licking her paws. She also had a hot spot (red and inflamed skin lesion also known as acute moist dermatitis) on her face. The poor little soul was having a rough time.

Thankfully Ellie's owner brought her to the vets where she was assessed. Certain skin conditions like flea allergy dermatitis, demodex and sarcoptes mange were ruled out. She was placed on antibiotics and a safe new injection called cytopoint, that settles the overstimulated immune system, was given. This results in a relief from environmental allergic itching/reactions.

Two days later, she was much improved. The hot spot was almost gone and she was scratching much less.

One month later and little Ellie had significantly improved. Her face and coat looked great and her demeanour had improved. She even had some very fine hair growth occurring on her chest, abdomen and down her hind legs. A very happy dog!

Wildlife awareness signage installed in Koonoomoo



ew wildlife awareness signage has been installed along a stretch of the Goulburn Valley Highway in Koonoomoo known for its large koala population. Koalas and other wildlife move through this area looking for food, water, and habitat. The wildlife awareness signage aims to remind motorists of their surroundings and to take care whilst driving through the area.

The wildlife awareness signage project, initiated by Dutch Thunder Wildlife Rescue and completed in partnership with Moira Shire Council and the Department of Transport and Planning, has come to fruition after a significant number of koalas were hit and killed on the Goulburn Valley Highway in Koonoomoo in early 2023.

Moira Shire Council's Administrator Suzanna Sheed AM said that she hopes the signage encourages motorists to drive carefully through areas known for large wildlife populations.

"Moira Shire Council is proud to have supported Dutch Thunder Wildlife

Rescue in the implementation of this project," said Administrator Sheed

"We are home to one of the largest koala populations in Victoria, and many other species call Moira Shire home. We have an opportunity to help protect the threatened and endangered animals habituating in our area - driving carefully, being aware of surroundings, and knowing key times when animals are likely to be on the move is an important start."

"I thank Dutch Thunder Wildlife Rescue for the crucial work that they do and for their continued efforts in educating and raising awareness within our community."

Motorists are asked to take care whilst driving through known wildlife hotspots, particularly at dusk, dawn and during extreme weather events when animals are likely to be on the move searching for shelter or water. Dutch Thunder Wildlife Rescue is a not-for-profit 24-hour emergency service aiding native wildlife throughout the Moira Shire and surrounds. Calls for assistance can be made to 0417 560 910.

Museum Moments...

Thanks to Karen Davis for her research to identify this interesting item which is part of the Nathalia Museum collection.


There are many strange and interesting objects at the Historical Society Museum. When we first found this item hidden amongst wool balers we had no idea what it was or where it had come from. After a lot of research, Karen found that this is a wool picker, sometimes known as a floor standing drum carder. It was a device use for separating the clumps of wool to make it easier to brush and spin.

This particular machine was made in Manchester, England, sometime between 1872 – 1910, by a man called Reuben Sutcliffe. It was very difficult to find out anything much about him due to the large number of men with the same name around this time.

This wool picker is in surprisingly good working condition. It is missing the feed conveyer, converter rollers, one of the front arms the conveyer was attached to and suffers from a bit of rust. Unlike others found in Karen's research, this one still has all of its wood and picking spikes.

The picker works when wool is placed on the conveyer (missing) that feeds it into the rollers where the spikes would catch and pull at the wool like a hair brush. The process of wool carding is done to make sure the wool fibres are untangled and aligned in one direction to make it easier to spin. In theory the combed wool would then drop into a container underneath.

There is still a lot we don't know about this wool carder so if you know its history or would like to have a better look at it please feel free to come to the museum during open hours or call us on the number below.

Wunghnu becomes RV Friendly



oira Shire is a Recreational Vehicle (RV) friendly shire and is actively seeking to encourage greater visitation and economic impact from the self-contained RV market. The self-contained RV market represents a growing segment of tourists travelling to and through the Moira Shire, not detracting from the regular caravan and camping visitors. February's Council Meeting saw the endorsement of the Wunghnu Recreation Reserve as a designated, 48-hour camping area for selfcontained RVs.

Moira Shire Council's Chair Administrator John Tanner AM said that the addition of the Wunghnu Recreation Reserve to Council's list of RV friendly sites will be beneficial to locals and tourists alike.

"With statistics showing that the average self-contained RV tourist travels approximately 163 days of the year, it is important to consider this market in Moira Shire's tourism offering," said Chair Administrator Tanner AM.

"We welcome visitors to our shire - there are an abundance of local businesses to support and beautiful, natural landscapes to enjoy. The addition of the Wunghnu Recreation Reserve as a designated camping area for self-contained RVs will encourage more visitors to experience what the Moira Shire has to offer. It also presents an easily accessible stop over for self-contained RVers travelling north or south on the Goulburn Valley Highway."

"This is a great achievement for the Wunghnu community, with RV Friendly status for their town listed as a priority in the Wunghnu & District Community Plan. I commend the Wunghnu community for continuing to advocate for this."



Early Snippets - Nathalia Cemetery - 1880-1915

uthor and historian Lyn Franklin has compiled a new book on the Nathalia Cemetery. It is titled Early Snippets Nathalia Cemetery 1880-1915. The book is available at Nathalia Printers for \$15. Below is a copy of the introduction from the book.

Introduction


It has been said that a town which has no record of Its history is like a man who has lost his memory.

The earliest extant records of the Minutes

of the Nathalia Cemetery Trust begin in 1916, the previous Minutes having been lost over time. However it is possible to get a glimpse of the early activities of the Trust from reports in the Riverine Herald, the Numurkah Leader and the Nathalia Herald. Other sources of information derive from the death certificates of the early internments in the Cemetery also some surviving Cemetery Caretakers' Account Books held by the Nathalia Historical Society and Government Gazettes. Records are scarce for the years 1914 and 1915.

Very early burials took place on the squatting runs such as the Yielima pre -emptive right and later at the Yalca and Barmah cemeteries, the forerunners of the Nathalia Cemetery. The settlers, as opposed to squatters, began arriving in the Nathalia district from December, 1873. From that time up to the time that land was temporarily reserved for a Cemetery in January 1881, burials from Nathalia mostly took place at either Shepparton or Echuca with some infants being buried on the farms. It was an alarming outbreak of Diphtheria in May and June 1880 attended by Dr.Fitzgerald, the public Health Officer based in Shepparton who ordered all precautionary measures be taken including the closure of Barwo West, Narioka and Nathalia Schools, which would have been the catalist for a local cemetery.

John Bouverie Hussey Tanner, the local chemist, was appointed Deputy Registrar for births and deaths in Nathalia District in June 1879 and it is his submissions to the Registrar which show that burials did take place in the Barwo Cemetery (Nathalia Cemetery) as early as December 1880 although the plot of 10 acres bounded by Cemetery Road, Garonne,



Grinter and Tuckett Streets was only gazetted as being reserved as a temporary site on January 12th, 1881.

Early Trust Members were faced with the daunting task of establishing the Cemetery without all the conveniences of modern living - there was no easy access to the cemetery, no made roads, no water on the block, no toilets, rabbits were rampant, weeds prolific and all digging would have been done by hand to name just a few obstacles.

Over time the Cemetery, at first unfenced and subject to invasion from stock, was later fenced with a post and rail fence; post and rabbit proof wire fence; and later a white picket front fence with black finials which was demolished in 1961 and replaced with the fence you see today.

It became apparent from 1887 onwards that low lying areas of the Cemetery were subject to flooding particularly the Presbyterian Section, so much so that many Presbyterian internments took place in the higher Anglican section. Levee banks were built after 1974 floods, raised after the 1993 floods and were over topped in places in 2012.

Credit is due to the many Trustees and Caretakers over the years who served the community culminating in the pleasant grounds we wander through today.





Firewood collection areas open in state forests

ictorians are able to collect free firewood for personal use from state forest collection areas until 30 June.

Domestic firewood supply in state forests is provided from fallen trees and forest management works.

Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action Director of Forest and Fire Operations, Aaron Kennedy, said people can collect up to two cubic metres per person per day during a firewood collection season with a maximum of 16 cubic metres per household per financial year.

He said firewood collection is only allowed in designated firewood collection areas in state forests during approved times and for personal use only. Collected firewood cannot be sold. Maps are available at www.ffm.vic.gov.au/firewood.

Firewood collectors are being urged to play it safe and check local weather conditions as well as their planned route before heading into the forest, especially after recent flooding, storms and bushfires.

"When collecting, please drive only on formed roads, be aware of the environment around you and safety of yourself and others as trees may fall or drop limbs without warning," Mr Kennedy said.

"I would encourage people who rely on firewood for heating and cooking to plan their needs early."

"Firewood collected during the collection seasons needs at least 8-12 months to cure and be dry before use."

The Victorian Government provides targeted energy support and

concessions for people on low incomes who buy firewood or need assistance with their energy costs.

This includes tailored support via the Energy Assistance Program, a \$250 rebate for eligible households from the Energy Bill Relief Fund, payments of between \$55 and \$619 per year for eligible households that rely on non -mains energy including firewood for heating and cooking, and up to \$650 via the Non-Mains Utility Relief Grant for Victorians on low incomes who rely on firewood as their only source of fixed heating.

More information about financial assistance is available for people on low incomes who buy firewood: www.ffm.vic.gov.au/firewood/energyconcession-and-support.

It's an offence to collect wood outside designated areas or to leave formed roads to collect or load.

"Most people do the right thing and stick to the collection limits, but people should know Authorised Officers from the Conservation Regulator, FFMVic and Parks Victoria conduct routine, random and targeted patrols of forest areas," Mr Kennedy said.

Officers can issue fines of \$769 to those caught breaking the rules, and serious offences have a maximum penalty of \$9,615 and/or one year in prison.

Community members can help by reporting any suspected illegal firewood collection on 136 186.





Family Car and Ute Tax

Recently in Question Time, I asked the Minister about the proposed family car tax that could cost Australian tradies, families and farmers thousands of dollars for a diesel car or ute. I asked about the price and range of EV utes. "My question is to the Minister For Climate Change and Energy. Last year the Minister showed off the first EV ute. A ute that would cost struggling tradies an extra \$46,000. Is it true that the maximum range of this ute is 300 kilometres the distance from Melbourne to Hamilton; but only if it's empty? Is it also true that if the back of the ute is fully loaded, the maximum range drops to 150 kilometres; the distance from Melbourne to Bendigo but not back to Melbourne?"

The Minister answered and referred to an article in an automotive magazine that stated this EV ute was in fact cheaper than it's diesel twin but only in New Zealand (therefore admitting that the diesel ute price had risen). He also wasn't up to speed with the latest news... despite huge subsidies by the New Zealand Government the ute has been withdrawn from the market due to lack of sales. I'm not opposed to EV's and they may be good for people in the cities, however, a lot of people in our region require diesel vehicles for travelling long distances and carrying heavy loads. I don't want to see them adversely impacted as a result of this policy.

Temporary Road Repairs = Not Good Enough

Every day I speak to frustrated locals about the state of roads across our electorate. The road network is a mess and drivers deserve better, safer roads. Late last month in Parliament I once again demanded the State and Federal Governments stump up the funding needed to



make meaningful repairs to our roads. At the moment, they've got this game of patching up potholes, reducing speed limits, erecting rough surface warning signs, and it could be many months of dodging damaged roads before even temporary repairs happen. These temporary repairs then seem to wash out. Adequate funding is urgently needed, and the Albanese Government must invest in regional Australia and its infrastructure.

The 2024 season has begun, and I'm back kicking my goal to train with every football and netball club in our electorate. With a number of clubs under my belt from the 2023 season, I've kicked off this season training with Undera, Stanhope, Yarrawonga Masters and Rochester.
