Advertising destructive water buybacks

ederal Member for Nicholls, Sam Birrell MP has slammed an advertisement authorised by the Australian Government attempting to justify the destructive water buybacks legislated by the Albanese Government.

Mr Birrell said the video advertisement, which is currently running in Nicholls, uses emotive language and doomsday scenarios to attempt to justify the Labor Government's plan to harm regional communities through water buybacks as part of the new Murray



"This advertisement is simplistic,

deluded, misleading, partisan and intends to justify the destruction of agriculture in Australia," Mr Birrell said. "This advertising campaign smacks of a partisan political advertisement not the work of a body that should be focused on science.

"It's sad that an organisation that once did have some credibility is now conducting itself in this way," he said. Mr Birrell said the advertisement is offensive to regional communities who will be impacted by water buybacks. "Labor's new plan for water will

increase costs for producers and manufacturers, impact jobs and the economic prosperity of Murray Darling Basin communities," Mr Birrell said. "Murray Darling Basin communities

grow fresh clean food for Australia and the world which drives economic growth for our Nation.

"Instead of celebrating the regions, this Labor Government continues to make it harder for regional and rural Australians to do what they do best," he said.

Margaret Liddell, was the Speaker Behind the Badge. Margaret was born in Holland, now known as the Netherlands, in 1950. Her parents' first child, Frank, was born in 1938 and later another son, Gary. During the war the Germans rounded up all the workers and Jewish people, creating great hardship and food shortage - people were eating tulip bulbs and cabbage leaves. Margaret's father returned home in 1946 and worked in a glass company. Two more boys and Margaret were born after the war.

The eldest son migrated to Australia and in 1960 all the family came to Australia.

Upon arrival they were taken to Bonegilla Migrant Hostel but only stayed one day as Frank had obtained a house for them in Mooroopna. Having arrived in Australia with few possessions it was a very basic life. The family was naturalised in 1968. Margaret moved to Melbourne to work at Myers and later obtained a position in a bank. Margaret's

brother John introduced her to her future husband Jim whom he knew through their service as National Servicemen. Jim and Margaret married in 1973 and lived in the Coolabah shearer's quarters. Due to Jim's



position as a bank employee, they moved with their children to Horsham, Mildura, Geelong, Numurkah and finally Nathalia.

In 1988 they bought IGA from Pat and Mary Barry, later selling it to their daughter and son-in-law in 1993. Jim helped to get the Bendigo Bank established in Nathalia and was an active member of Rotary and Lions Clubs.

Sadly Jim passed away and Margaret recently built a new home in Nathalia.

A very interesting life.

Museum Moments...

Thank you to our readers who made contact with me to inform us on the use of the 'D' hook pictured in last edition. (see right).

This hook is an Army issue kitbag D-lock. The straight side is threaded through the eyelets on the kitbag and is then secured with a pin or padlock. The idea being that this prevented casual pilfering by one's comrades or others, when the kit bags were left in piles awaiting transport. It can also be used as a handle to carry the bag once it is fitted in place.

Below the picture shows a D-Lock in use.

Usually made of heavy brass, these locks were used

by all forces during World War 2.

Numurkah Rotary Art Show This Weekend

In its 44th year, the Rotary Club of Numurkah will stage their Annual Art & Craft Exhibition in the Numurkah Town Hall from Friday 8th March to Monday 11th March.

The exhibition has built a reputation of excellence and is regarded as one of the biggest art show on the Goulburn Valley's art calendar.

With prize money of \$10,000 offered, chairman of the organising committee Chris Sutton said the organisers were encouraged by the entries received from local artists as well as throughout Victoria, New South Wales, and Queensland.

Entries include traditional landscape, still life and modern styles in all mediums and will present an excellent exhibition for the public to view and appreciate, with all art exhibits for sale.

The major sponsors are Numurkah Home Hardware and Numurkah Solar Farm with local businesses supporting the exhibition with generous sponsorship.

The judge, Thel Cardwell will select the Best in Show Award valued at \$1500 plus the runner-up \$500 award and 4 Highly Commended Awards in Watercolour, Oil, Pastel and Acrylic and Regional Artist, each valued at \$200, these awards are non-acquisitive, and are also eligible for purchase.

In the photography section awards will be offered to \$200 Framed Photographic Award, \$100 Runner-up Award, \$100 Digital Art Award and \$100 Theme Photo "A Touch of Red" Award.

The Craft Awards are \$500 Best Craft Entry, \$100 Other Textiles, \$100 Woodwork, Metalwork and Pottery and the \$100 Quilt Award.

Since its inception in 1981 the exhibition has raised over \$329,000 for local charities. The proceeds from this year's exhibition will go towards local Rotary charity projects.

The official opening will take place on Friday evening by the Phillipa Schapper, chair GRAINStore Nathalia, with a wine and cheese tasting courtesy Monichino Winery, and musical entertainment provided prior to the official opening by Picola based duo Erin & Lachlan Heycox "Broken Creek". Following the official opening the judges, Thel

Cardwell (art) and Claire Reid (craft), will announce the winners in the various sections, and supper will be provided.

Thel Cardwell is this year's art judge.

Thel has lived most of her life in Whittlesea and loved painting and drawing from an early age. She started painting in oils and studied tonal painting under the late Alan Martin. She later began painting in pastel and loves working in both mediums. Thel has served 3 times as president of the Australian Guild of Realist Artists and is a life member, a member of the Victorian Pastel Society and immediate past president of Plenty Valley Arts. She regularly conducts painting classes and holds workshops in Victoria and NSW, as well as being frequently invited as an Art Judge and undertaken numerous commissions.

Claire Reid is this year's craft judge

Claire is a textile teacher at Numurkah Secondary College. Claire has played (as Claire believes it is not work, as work is not as enjoyable as play) in a wide variety of textile mediums from pattern and dressmaking to lace making.

Whilst enjoying working with traditional techniques, she also loves



experimenting and the mixing of textiles with other materials such as wood and metal.

Claire believes the best thing about teaching is being a part of a student's learning process, watching and aiding them grow in their confidence in working with a medium which is often more foreign to people than it should be, seeing as we all come in contact with textiles, in one shape or another, every day of our life.

Photography judge is Leigh Teitz,

Leigh took up photography as a hobby in 2005 and shortly after joined the Shepparton Camera Club where he has served as Secretary since 2010. Leigh has also been an accredited member of the Australian Photographic Judges Association (APJA) since 2016. He enjoys all genres of photography though his main interests these days are Landscape, Astro & Macro. Leigh loves his Nikon gear and currently shoots with the Z7ii which is his first mirrorless body. For image processing he uses Lightroom and Topaz Sharpen AI when required and Zerene Stacker for his macro

Once again patrons are being asked to try themselves as judges and to cast their vote for the People's Choice Award, for best exhibit in the Exhibition.

This Award has proved popular since its introduction, with \$100 prize awarded to the winning artist.



Lynette Franklin - Given for her research and work in local history and her volunteer work in the community. Lyn is an avid researcher and has been the chief researcher for the Nathalia and District Historical Society and the Nathalia Genealogy Group for over 20 years. Lyn has authored a number of local historical books.

Lyn's community volunteer roles included newsletter editor for Nathalia Probus Club (20 years), Secretary for Barwo Homestead (25 years), former member of the Committee of Management for Nathalia District Hospital (10 years), and Councillor for Nathalia Shire (now part of the Moira Shire) between 1992-1994. Lyn was the only woman on the Council and the second female Councillor in Nathalia's history. Some of Lyn's former community work also includes being a Lay Preacher with the Uniting Church of Australia, a member of Numurkah Singers, a volunteer for Meals on Wheels and the Broken Creek Improvement Group, Landcare Victoria, and a member and researcher for the Nathalia Cemetery Trust from 2016-2023.
