

Red Gum Courier, Friday May 17th, 2024 Tallygaroopna Hall Centenary Celebrations 8th & 9th June 2024

In June this year the Tallygaroopna community will come together to celebrate the centenary of their town's magnificent "Soldiers' Memorial Hall". The hall is recognised as an Australian War Memorial "Place of Pride" and the hall has been at the heart of the community for over 100 years.

A Centenary Ball on Saturday 8th June, 7pm, will include music by local and visiting artists to accompany dancing and chatting. Entertainment includes a re-enactment of a 1922 hall building fundraising competition called "The Queens of Tallygaroopna". Ball guests are asked to bring a plate of supper to share, like the olden days, to keep ticket prices low.

On Sunday 9th June, 11.30am, the community are invited to a special Memorial Service, where the Returned & Services League will pay Tribute to Tallygaroopna First World War veterans. The Shepparton RSL Memorabilia Team will present some interesting stories about the soldiers and nurse who are listed on the WWI honour roll at the front of the hall. The RSL will display memorabilia in the hall, to reflect the history of the hall as the Tallygaroopna RSL sub-branch headquarters from 1930. Tallygaroopna war veterans met for generations in a secluded 'Dugout' located under the supper room at the hall. Their memorabilia dating from the Boer War, WWI



& WWII is now at Shepparton RSL.

The halls' foundation stone was laid on 1st January 1924 by the well-known Goulburn Valley soldier and politician Colonel (Sir) Murray Bourchier. The hall was officially opened on the King's Birthday weekend in June 1924, by the Australian Federal Treasurer (later the Prime Minister), Sir Earle Page. Recognition of these events will take place on Sunday at the RSL Memorial Service, led by local politicians. This is a free event open to the public.

A celebration of 100 years of community social life at the hall will then take place at a Sunday Luncheon in the hall with music and cutting of the "Centenary Cake" for afternoon tea. Recognition of hall committee long service along with time for more chatter provides a great opportunity for family and community groups reunions.

The Ball cost is \$15 adult, \$10 secondary student. The Luncheon cost is \$20 adult, \$15 secondary student. Children free. Tickets available at the door or book with Trish, mobile 0427298288.

A hall centenary history book will be launched and for sale (\$40) on both days. The book contains over 100 pages in full colour, packed with photos, newspaper articles, community groups' and families' stories of events at the Hall. It includes the RSL tribute to Tallygaroopna war service, photos of the hall's memorabilia and reflections by the hall committee of management.

Museum Moments...

HISTORY OF MONEY...People worry about it, think of ways to get more of it, and dream about how to spend it. But how much do we really know about money? There has been a considerable amount of discussion in the media about the fading use of cash and the proposal of being a cashless society. Here we take a look at the history of money....... (taken from the Britannica website).

Some of the earliest currencies were objects from nature, used to trade for goods. A notable example is cowrie shells, first used as money about 1200 BC. Shells in the form of wampum (tubular shell beads) were used as money by Native Americans. Another currency from nature was whale teeth, which were used by Fijians.

While the use of metal for money can be traced back to Babylon before 2000 BC, standardized and certified coinage may not have existed until the 7th century BC. During this time, the kingdom of Lydia (in present-day Turkey) issued the first regulated coins. They were made of electrum, a natural mixture of gold and silver. Crudely shaped like beans, these coins featured the royal symbol, a lion.

About the 6th century BC leather and animal hide began to be fashioned into currency. Early ancient Rome reportedly used this type of money. It was also found in such areas as what is now France, and Russia is believed to have used leather money into Peter the Great's reign (1682–1725). The Chinese emperor Wudi (reigned 141–87 BC) created currency out of skins from his personal collection of white stags. It was fringed and decorated with elaborate designs. Although no longer used, leather money may have left a lasting legacy: some believe it gave rise to the use of buck as slang for dollar.

Given that paper is widely believed to have originated in China, it is fitting that that country introduced paper currency. This innovation is widely thought to have occurred during the reign (997–1022 CE) of Emperor Zhenzong. It was made from the bark of mulberry trees (so, in a sense, money really did grow on trees). By the late 18th to early 19th centuries,

paper money had spread to other parts of the world. But the bulk of this currency was not money in the traditional sense. Instead, it served as promissory notes—promises to pay specified amounts of gold or silver— which were key in the development of banks.

Forgery proved such a huge problem around the world that harsh penalties were enacted. Chinese currency from about the 14th century carried the warning that counterfeiters would be decapitated, and England was known for punishing perpetrators by burning them at the stake. In the American colonies too, death greeted early counterfeiters.

Currency comes with a number of problems, one of which concerns 'fiat' money. This is currency that is issued on the "fiat" (decree) of a sovereign government and, unlike gold and silver coins, has no intrinsic value. Countries can thus issue such money at will, and some did (and do), potentially making the currency worthless. This became such a problem that in 1821 the United Kingdom—then the leader in international finance—introduced the gold standard. In this monetary system, the standard unit of currency is typically kept at the value of a fixed quantity of gold, which increases confidence in international trade by preventing governments from excessively issuing currency. Eventually, other countries, including Germany, France, and the United States, adopted the gold standard.

After the Great Depression (1929–c. 1939), countries began to rethink the gold standard, and by the 1970s gold was no longer being tied to currency. While credit has existed for ages, the first universal credit card was not introduced until 1950. That year Americans Ralph Schneider and Frank McNamara founded the Diners Club. Other cards were soon created, and in 1959 American Express debuted a plastic card.

The magnetic stripe on credit cards was introduced in the 1960s to contain account information. In the 1990s, cards began to have chips embedded in them to encrypt their information, providing even greater security.


