Museum Moments...

Brought to you by Jeanette Holland on behalf of the Nathalia & District Historical Society.

A request to our researcher Lyn Franklin, has led to a very happy visitor to this region. Adam Armstrong from Pakenham contacted Lyn to see what could be found out about St. Helena. This was the property where his maternal grandfather and great grandparents had farmed in the Wakiti—Yambuna area. When Adam mentioned his grandfather was Syd Smith, who had married Muriel Holland, then Lyn put him in contact with me.

(For those who want to know the connection-Muriel was the youngest sister of Theo Holland, Morice's father).

James Smith, his wife Margaret and two of their sons, Syd and Wallace, leased St. Helena in 1915-16 and went on to buy a nearby block in early 1920's.

Adam had grown up in the city but remembers regular visits to his grandparents, Syd & Muriel Smith, who lived in Shepparton. During these visits they sometimes would travel to Wakiti to visit the Taylor's who had been neighbours of Smiths when they lived at St. Helena. Adam had vague memories of the location of St. Helena and so wanted to renew his knowledge of his ancestors association there. He and his family visited us last weekend.

I was able to show him maps of the location of St. Helena. It is an isolated 100 acre property which is totally surrounded by State Forest. It has a couple of rolling sandhills with the remnants of an old orchard (apricot, quince and pears trees) still visible.

Research showed that Saint Helena had been selected by Nils Pehrsson (later known as Neil Peterson), a Swedish migrant who came to Australia in1875. The name was chosen because the beautiful sunsets reminded him of the sunsets on the island of St. Helena which Neil had visited in his seafaring years. This sandhill was also like an island during times of flood, just like the island of St. Helena where Napoleaon Bonepart was exiled.

Neil established an orchard and a very productive vineyard at St. Helena. Neil and his wife Christina, who was born in Scotland and grew up at Kotupna, went on to have ten children, five who died young. In 1900, Neil put the property on the market but it was not sold. It was described as

"100 acres in the Parish of Lower Moira near Simpson's Punt on the Goulburn River. A fine full bearing vineyard of 23 acres and 2 acres of orchard. A five-roomed weatherboard house, detached kitchen, outhouses, dairy, large wine cellar and wine making plant. The vineyard produces magnificent sherry."

Two of Neil's sons purchased more land off Yambuna Bridge road at Fiddlers Swamp. The Peterson family were very involved in the Wakiti Church with Neil supplying timber for its construction. In 1906, Neil Peterson offered his property for lease just prior to his death. Mrs Peterson advertised a clearing sale in 1914. She died in 1915 and in that year the Rate Books show St. Helena belonging to Alexander Couper. He then sold to James Alexander who leased the property to the Smith family. James Smith (1862-1928) with his two sons Syd and Wallace went on farming the vineyard and orchard until after WW2 and upon his return from service, Syd moved his family to Pine Lodge where he continued farming until he retired to live in Shepparton.

Saint Helena is currently owned by the estate of the late Leon Ash.

It was a great pleasure to reunite Adam with his childhood memories and show him the family property after all those years.

ANZAC Day Nathalia

Ackenzie Craig spoke about the history of the Vietnam war at this year's ANZAC Day services.

This year in 2023 marks the 50th anniversary of the end to Australia's involvement in the Vietnam War.

Most of our young people today would have no idea what this war that was so far away, was about. The conflict has a long and complicated history.

Vietnam became a French colony, along with Cambodia and Laos after the French defeated the Chinese in 1880. The French colonialism was brutal and exploited the country's resources (rubber and rice) as well as its' people who were practically slaves.

"The French 'civilising mission' was the transformation of subject peoples into loyal French men and women. Through education and examinations, it was theoretically possible for a Vietnamese to obtain French citizenship, with all its privileges. Yet in reality, the criteria for citizenship were manipulated to ensure that subject citizens never threatened French political power."

The French rule continued until WW11 when the territory was occupied by the Japanese, another brutal regime.

After the Japanese surrender, Ho Chi Min attempted to set up an independent government in Vietnam in September 1945. His government (Việt Minh was created by the Indochinese Communist Party as a national united front to achieve the independence of the Democratic Republic of Vietnam from the French Empire) ruled for only 20 days before the French returned brutally retook their colony. Ho fled to the forest with his supporters.

After World War II, the Việt Minh opposed the re-occupation of Vietnam by France, resulting in the Indochina War for the next 7 years, and later opposed South Vietnam and the United States in the Vietnam War.

The French pushed Viet Minh out of the South until their defeat in 1954 and at the Geneva Conference, relinquished all claims to Indo-China. Laos and Cambodia declared independence and Vietnam was divided into two provinces – North and South Vietnam as a temporary measure until elections could be held in 1956. Civil administration of the North was given to Viet Minh on 11 October 1954.

The Emperor of Vietnam had abdicated in 1945 at the surrender of the Japanese and moved to

Republic of Vietnam with himself as its first President.

It was believed that if South Vietnam fell to communism, the "domino effect" would cause its' spread right across the region to India. It was for this reason that America supported the South Vietnam regime and began its' involvement in the Vietnam War.

In the early 1960s, Australia's participation in the Vietnam War (1962 to 1973 was not widely opposed. Public opposition grew as more national servicemen were deployed to Vietnam, and they began to make up a large percentage of those being killed in action.

The arrival of the Australian Army Training Team Vietnam (AATTV) in South Vietnam during July and August 1962 was the beginning of Australia's involvement in the Vietnam War. Australia's participation in the war was formally declared at an end when the Governor-General issued a proclamation on 11 January 1973.

From the time of the arrival of the first members of the Team in 1962 over 60,000 Australians, including ground troops and air force and navy personnel, served in Vietnam; 523 died as a result of the war and almost 2,400 were wounded. The war was the cause of the greatest social and political dissent in Australia since the conscription referendums of the First World War. Many draft resisters, conscientious objectors, and protesters were fined or jailed, while soldiers met a hostile reception on their return home.

By early 1965, when it had become clear that South Vietnam could not stave off the communist insurgents and their North Vietnamese comrades for more than a few months, the US commenced a major escalation of the war.

The year 1968 began with a major offensive by the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese Army, launched during the Vietnamese lunar new year holiday period, known as "Tet". Not only the timing but the scale of the offensive came as a complete surprise, taking in cities, towns, and military installations throughout South Vietnam. While the "Tet Offensive" ultimately ended in military defeat for the communists, it was a propaganda victory. US military planners began to question if a decisive victory could ever be achieved and US public opposition to the war intensified. For Australian troops, the effects of the offensive were felt around their base at Nui Dat, where Viet Cong attacks on targets around the provincial capital, was repulsed.

By late 1970 Australia had also begun to wind down its military effort in Vietnam. The 8th Battalion departed in November (and was not replaced). The withdrawal of troops and all air units continued throughout 1971 – the last battalion left Nui Dat on 7 November, while a handful of advisers belonging to the Team remained in Vietnam the following year. In December 1972 they became the last Australian troops to come home, with their unit having seen continuous service in South Vietnam for ten and a half years. The only combat troops remaining in Vietnam were a platoon guarding the Australian embassy in Saigon and they were withdrawn in June 1973.

After the withdrawal of all troops North and South Vietnam became one re-unified country as the Socialist Republic of Vietnam under Communist rule.

This poem is written about a local man who served in Vietnam with 6th Royal Australian Regiment Delta company

Life will not be the same

I grew up in Victoria up in the north in a small sleepy town on a river; Like most country kids we rode horses we fished and swam in the river in summer.

I had a few good mates we didn't have much but you couldn't say that we were poor; So we shared what we had we had one common bond most our fathers had fought in the war.

Now Nathalia you see is surrounded by farms worked by ex soldiers that they call blockies ; At the end of the war the government thought we'll turn our ex servicemen into cockies.

Our dad's worked really hard to get away from the past from sunrise and into the night; But often they'd go and meet up at the pub where they would drink way too much and then fight.

Dad wasn't much fun for his temper he'd loose and often I'd get the blame; But in his defence my mum often said " since the army his life's not the same.

So I grew up hard and I grew up well I learnt how to work drink and fight; Me and Parker cut sleepers lived out in the bush and tore up the town of a night.

We played merry hell with the local Trap me and Parker near drove him insane; " Join the army " he said "it will straighten you out and your life will not be the same".

So I signed myself up, thought they all would be proud told mum and dad as I walked through the door; But to my surprise dad yelled " you stupid young fool you have no idea what you are in for".

They cut off my hair, dressed me all in khaki near marched me into the ground; Then the Sergeant said " your now part of the sixth and Vietnam is where you are bound. We arrived by jet plane were marched off to our digs got our issue of weapon and pack; "So it's into the weeds " Major Smith said to us " to find the ones in pyjamas of black ".

This war has no trenches or battle fields with the enemy easily found; They were in front and behind to the left and the right and even hid under the ground.

We were all given roles, we were sent on patrol we relied on our training no doubt; "Mick your on the MG, Bluey you'll bring up the rear " and me well I got Forward Scout.

I learnt my job well in the jungle each day I moved through without making a sound; And I kept my mates safe if the enemy found "COTACT FRONT " and they'd all go to ground.

So I'd send them some lead throw some pineapples too just to hold them there on the spot ; Then the boys would come up and the spotter as well to range the one O fives onto the dot

Off on a stunt out in to the weeds a chopper we took for the ride; We were landed into a short rice crop that gave us nowhere to hide.

As the choppers took off I could feel the thump of the rotor blades over my back; Then all of a sudden a different thump as enemy bullets drove into my pack.

I lay face down and tried real hard to make myself as small as I could; And waited for darkness then we crawled on our guts to the jungle that covered us good.

We drove it right into them our aim was true our bullets were finding there mark ; I could hear the sound of them dragging their dead and their wounded off into the dark.

We ran more patrols some search and destroy and even rested in camp ; We were shot at and bombed drank weak yankee grog and even rested in camp .

At the end of my stint I made it through in one when we all say piece but there were those who were lost to the LEST WE FORGET '

game; Mates that were killed wounded bodies wounded minds and our lives will not be the same.

We lived by our wits our minds never still keeping alert kept you out of the strife; Back home in Australia how the hell will we fit into normal life.

When we arrived home the reception we got none of us could ever expect; We were sworn at and cursed called terrible names by the people we'd sworn to protect.

Even some of the diggers turned their back on us when we looked to them for some support; Surely they knew we were no different to them for our country we all had fought.

I spent thirty years in the old khaki a Warrant Officer at the end of my spell; I have plenty of memories I'd like to forget and there are plenty I cherish as well.

A lot of time has now passed and ignorance passed too and I think most people now understand; We now have our own day on August eighteen the anniversary of the battle Long Tan.

A friend said to me you know we Australians are very proud of our Vets ; We are grateful for the

service and the sacrifice you made when we all say " LEST WE FORGET "

Council is seeking your feedback on the draft 2023/24 Budget



The Moira Shire Council Annual Budget is developed to align with the objectives of the Council Plan, while considering the priorities of the community and Council's financial situation.

The draft 2023/24 budget concentrates on recovery, sustainability and careful prioritisation of key activities to secure and strengthen the future of the Moira Shire.

The budget which complies with the 3.5% rate cap details Council's financial position, capital works program and includes the fees and charges schedule.

Chief Financial Officer Matt Jarvis says the draft budget reflects the current economic conditions.

"With the impacts of inflation far exceeding the rate cap, labour and contractor shortages, and the 2022 flood event, we need to carefully balance community expectations with financial responsibilities."

"This budget is to secure and strengthen our future so we can efficiently and effectively meet the needs of our community, not just for 2023/24, but for many years to come," said Mr Jarvis.

The draft capital works program of \$42.2 million will focus on investing in Council's existing assets with 60% per cent to be spent on upgrade and renewal projects. \$10m of this budget has been allocated to flood recovery works across the Shire.

"We will likely require not just one year, but perhaps two to four financial years to get through the existing backlog and deliver capital works, so for the next few years we need to focus on renewing existing assets not creating new," said Mr Jarvis.

The draft operating budget proposes to spend \$15.3m on the services that make Moira Shire a Welcoming and Inclusive Place, \$5.4 million on services to generate a Diverse and Dynamic Economy, \$15.8 million on services to achieve a Clean Green Environment and \$7.4 million on services that are Customer Focused and Responsive.

The community can provide feedback online by visiting the Moira Shire website or face to face at a Feedback Session. The Feedback Sessions at our four major towns are open to all community members to ask questions and provide feedback on the draft Budget.







Stronger Communities Needs Another Round

The Stronger Communities grants programme commits \$150,000 for each federal electorate for small community projects.

Grants are up to a maximum of \$20,000 with a maximum of 20 projects receiving funding in my electorate. Round 8, which is currently in progress, was significantly oversubscribed. My office received expressions of interest for \$625,000 in grants, supporting projects worth \$1 million. This points to the urgent need for further rounds of this program. The pandemic not only wreaked havoc on community events, but it also limited normal operations and fundraising for so many organisations and clubs. In terms of overall spending, this is an inexpensive programme which efficiently delivers much needed funding quickly. We need more of it, and sooner rather than later.
