A Lens On Our Landscape

Lens On Our Landscape' is the intriguing title for the newest exhibition by our local artist, Linden Lancaster.

Inspiration for the 18 pieces which feature in her exhibition comes from observations of the natural world. Mostly the pieces feature local subjects, but included is a small collection of quilts inspired by a trip to the Red Centre.





2023 has been an exciting and productive year for Linden. Mixed media have increasingly been explored, alongside her signature textile artworks. Earlier this year several of Linden's pieces featuring local birds were included in a book, 'Stitched Journeys with Birds: Inspiration to let your creativity take flight,' by the American author, Martha Sielman. These artworks will feature in the current exhibition.

A 'feather' in Linden's cap came when her piece, 'Wattle Time,' was juried into the 'Quilt National: Best of Contemporary Quilts' in the US. "A bit like having your portrait hung amongst the Archibald Prize contenders," is Linden's take on this achievement. As this quilt will be touring distant galleries for the next few years.

In the meantime, 'A Lens On Our Landscape' may be viewed at the Kyabram Town Hall Gallery from 2nd October to 2nd December. Check Gallery opening times before heading over.



"But... I'm only eight," said Julian with unease.



Museum Moments...

For the October 1923 "Back to Nathalia" celebrations, thrice past president of the Numurkah Shire (which included Nathalia), William Atchison Campbell of the well known auctioneering firm, Campbell & Co, Numurkah had his early life reminiscences in Nathalia printed in the *Numurkah Leader* on 17th October, 1923 which included the following snippet:

The great trouble in those days was water. The Chinaman's Weir was the source of supply. We had to go with our pails and carry home what we required. One evening my friend, **Dick Sellick, and I met at the creek with our buckets. I dipped mine first, and disturbed the water a bit. Dick followed, and to his surprise something came to the surface. He said, "Hello Billy, a dead dog," but on investigation we found it was the corpse of poor old Dan McGarry, who had been missing for over two weeks, and we had been drinking the water. We thought nothing of pulling out a dead dog, cat, iguana, opossum, or any of those kinds of animals, but we all felt a bit sore after drinking the water then. All the same, it did us no harm. When I see the splendid water at such a nominal cost, and hear some of the residents complain, I wish they had lived there in my early days.

**Dick Sellick was Richard George Sellick former miller for Edward Richardson, Nathalia when the mill, now demolished, was situated behind Limos Hardware Store and later at Richardson's new mill (now demolished) on the Transtanks site. In his senior years he was to take over the mill in Numurkah.

Wanting more details about this incident Nathalia Cemetery and the Historical Society's records were searched but to no avail, the surname did not appear anywhere. Days later, Judy Ormond, when on the internet site "Million Graves", typed in "McGarry Barwo". Surprisingly, up came the name "McCarry Barwo". Armed with this new spelling once again the Nathalia Cemetery records were perused. The positive outcome was that we now had a name and date to search the *Nathalia Herald*...the result was the following article dated 15th September, 1896:

MAGISTERIAL INQUIRY: On Sunday last a magisterial inquiry was held before Mr. F.H. Furze, J.P., touching the death of DANIEL McCARRY, a labouring man who was well known about this town. The following evidence was taken:-

Michael Colgan sworn, said: I have seen the body lying at the Bridge Hotel, and recognize it as that of DANIEL McCARRY. Last saw him alive on 28th August, about 12 o'clock in the day. He was then sober. He had been drinking during the previous week. Deceased was employed by me at intervals for about four years cutting firewood. I settled up with him on the 6th August. I have no reason to think McCARRY would commit suicide. About three months ago he told me he would make a will as he had some property at Axedale, near Bendigo. He said it was house property and that he got rent for it. He never made a will to my knowledge. Have known deceased about 7 years and believe he drank all he earned. Last winter deceased was laid up for two months with influenza. He lived in a tent by himself.

George Alexander Eadie, M.B. sworn, said: I have examined the body of a man lying at the Bridge Hotel. Judging from appearances it had been in water 14 to 20 days. There is no external marks of violence, from the appearance death was caused by drowning. I think deceased is about 45 or 46 years of age. Deceased clothes were not disarranged in any way, and it appears to me that he had fallen into the creek.

Frank M. Becroft sworn, said: I am a mounted constable stationed at Nathalia. About four o'clock p.m., on the 13 inst., it was reported to me that the body of a man WAS FLOATING IN THE CREEK OPPOSITE THE STATE SCHOOL. After seeing the body I informed Senior Constable Allwood and with him and Constable Jeffers brought the body onto the bank; and had it conveyed to the Bridge Hotel. I recognized the body as that of DANIEL McCARRY, and have known him about seven years. I last saw him alive about Wednesday 26th August. On the following Monday I searched for him for the purpose of getting some information in a case of larceny, but could not find him. From my knowledge of deceased I think he must have fallen into the creek whilst drunk.

David Armstrong sworn, said: I have seen the body lying at the Bridge Hotel. I recognise it as that of DANIEL McCARRY. I have known him about 7 or 8 years. There would be about 3 or 4 feet of water at that place.

The magistrate returned an open verdict.

NOTE: There is no mention at the Inquiry of Bill Campbell, Dick Selleck nor Chinaman's Weir. Daniel McCarry is buried in an unknown grave in Nathalia Cemetery.

LAMB, LENTIL AND ROSEMARY SOUP

From our Delicious Lamb Dishes book.

Ingredients

2.5Litres water 1 leek washed and chopped

500ml beef or chicken stock 4 cloves crushed garlic 2 lamb necks or 2-3 lamb shanks 1 pkt brown lentils

2 carrots peeled and chopped 2-3 sprigs rosemary

3 sticks celery chopped 1 tsp sugar

2 chopped brown onions salt and pepper to taste

Handful of finely chopped parsley

Method

Trim meat of all accessible fat and discard. In a large pot, add water, stock, chopped onions, carrots celery, leek, crushed garlic, whole packet of brown lentils, finely chopped rosemary sprigs (stalks removed), salt, pepper and sugar. Bring to the boil and skim and reduce to simmer, cooking until meat is tender (approx 2 hours) topping up with water if needed. Remove meat and pull apart, (discarding any fatty pieces) and returning pulled lamb meat to the soup. Add $\frac{1}{2}$ to $\frac{3}{4}$ cup of chopped parsley and serve with crusty rolls.

Troubling data shows Victorians won't leave early in the event of a bushfire

n alarming number of Victorians living in high-risk bushfire areas say they would stay at their properties until they felt threatened by a bushfire, or would wait for an official warning, a CFA survey revealed. CFA's annual Bushfire Community Survey, undertaken since 2009-10, showed 30.9% would wait for emergency authorities to tell them what to do, 28.6% would stay until they felt threatened and 13.8% would stay and defend their property.

Victoria has experienced many damaging fire seasons in recent memory such as the February 2009 bushfires and the 2019-20 fires, and with the prediction of a warmer spring and earlier start to this year's season, CFA is concerned that not enough people are preparing themselves for fire season and heeding CFA's advice.

CFA Chief Officer Jason Heffernan said it's concerning knowing around half of all Victorians in high-risk bushfire areas are risking their lives if a bushfire was to occur.

"Victoria has had quieter fire seasons the last few years but now is not the time for the community to become complacent," CO Heffernan said.

"And while our firefighters are always well prepared and your safety during fire season is a shared responsibility, so it's vital that you understand your local risks and take actions to prepare your family and property.

"We've seen in the recent release of the spring seasonal outlook that weather patterns are changing and we're expecting

warmer and drier conditions across the state leading up to summer.

"Fires spread quickly and they threaten lives and properties. The community needs to be prepared and they need to know their triggers to act. Please don't rely on one source of information , utilise the multiple channels available to you. Use common sense and protect yourself and your loved ones."

The AFAC Seasonal Bushfire Outlook for Spring released on 23 August, outlined that fire risk in the coming months is expected to be normal across most parts of Victoria.

The predicted development of an El Niño weather pattern will contribute to higher fire risk in some parts of Victoria this season compared to the last three years.

"Now is the time to sit down with your family or household and make sure you have a bushfire survival plan. Practice this plan and be ready," CO Heffernan said.

"On hot, dry and windy days, don't drive into or through high-risk areas. Plan an alternate route or postpone your travel if possible. Continue to monitor conditions every day."

The survey also showed 44.4% believe CFA is responsible for protecting

them during a bushfire, and 43.8% say CFA is responsible for protecting their home.

"We simply can't get a truck to every house during a major bushfire. Fire safety is a joint effort and the community need to also take on this responsibility when living in a bushfire prone area," CO Heffernan said.

"Our promise is to continue with our mission to protect lives and property and we are lucky to have some of the best firefighters in the world to do this."

Victorians should know where to find the best information to stay safe and never rely on just one source of information.

Victoria's integrated warning system includes the Vic Emergency website,

app and social media channels, VicEmergency Hotline 1800 226 226, emergency broadcasters including ABC radio, Sky News TV, commercial radio and select community radio stations.

Warnings are issued when an incident is occurring, and you need to act. Make sure you understand the three levels of warnings and additional messages such as 'Evacuate Now':

- Advice An incident is occurring or has occurred. Access information and monitor conditions.
- Warning (Watch & Act) An emergency is developing nearby. Conditions are changing and you need to act now to protect yourself and your family.
- Emergency Warning You are in

imminent danger and need to act now.
 Evacuation – An evacuation is recommended or procedures are in

place to evacuate.

We're asking people to take the following actions :

- Move your winter woodpile away from the house or sheds.
- Prune tree branches so they are not overhanging the roof or touching walls.
- Clear your gutters.
- Keep grass shorter than 10cm.
- Remove leaves and twigs from around your property.
- Test anything that is part of your fire plan such as sprinklers, pumps and generators.
- Check that your home and contents insurance is current and includes a level of cover in line with current building standards and regulations.
- If you are burning off to remove green waste, register your burn-off online at Fire Permits Victoria at www.firepermits.vic.gov.au, or call ESTA on 1800 688 511.
- Make sure your household has a Bushfire Survival Plan. Find out how at www.cfa.vic.gov.au/bushfireplan.



GMW benefits from innovative drone usage



oulburn-Murray Water (GMW) is exploring new ways of using drone technology to help create efficiencies and operate more safely. The water corporation has previously used aerial drones for mapping channels and detecting weeds but has recently started to expand its use of them.

An underwater drone was recently used to inspect the trash rack and bulkhead at Lake William Hovell.

Trash racks are grates that prevent

debris from entering outlets where it can cause damage or blockages. Bulkheads cover the outlet to stop the water altogether, usually to enable maintenance works to be undertaken.

Water Storage Services acting general manager Shayne Lowe said there were several benefits to using the drone for inspections such as the one at Lake William Hovell.

"We have a lot of critical infrastructure at our storages that is underwater but still needs to be routinely inspected," he said.

"Underwater inspections have previously required us to hire specially trained divers. In many of these instances, we will now be able to have staff who have been trained to use the drone undertake the inspections instead

"This is a great outcome for GMW, as using the drone will not only reduce the cost of these inspections but will enable us to be more flexible with the timing of our inspections, and also improve safety.

"The underwater drone can also be used in certain spaces where we would not be able to send divers, such as inside outlet towers."

GMW has also been conducting trials using aerial drones to spray aquatic weeds.


This method has been tested at Lake Eppalock, Tullaroop Reservoir, Goulburn Weir, and several waterways.

GMW Survey Services manager Avni Bekirofski said these trials had shown promise.

"Our tests have shown there is a lot of potential to this method of treating weeds, particularly in areas that are otherwise difficult to access," he said.

"Over the course of several trials, we have learned a lot and managed to refine our approach; with some of the latest tests, we have taken days to treat an area that would usually take weeks.

"Innovations such as this can create significant efficiencies, and it is ultimately the customers who benefit from this, so it is fantastic to see the business embracing these advancements."




