New ways to pay your rates

M oira Shire Council is excited to announce there are new direct debit options available to pay your rates.

General Manager Corporate Simon Rennie said the new options were to give property owners the flexibility to pay their rates in a way which best suited their needs.

"There are multiple ways for paying your annual rates and charges and we have just added two more easy options," Mr Rennie said.

"As well as the lump sum, quarterly and 10 instalments options, you can now organise to have weekly or fortnightly payments direct debited from your bank account."

"Simply fill out the direct debit form on our website or you can send an email requesting this direct debit function."

"The weekly and fortnightly payments will run through until 26 May 2022."

Mr Rennie said the community generally wanted to know three things when their rate notice arrived.

"What am I getting for my rates, how much have they increased and how rates are calculated are by far the most common questions we receive," he said.

"Every single day people across our shire rely on Council to provide services to help them work, live, travel and play.

"From footpaths and roads to maternal and child health, from parks, gardens, and libraries to rubbish collection and landfills – our ratepayers fund more than 50 different corporate, infrastructure and community services."

Mr Rennie said the modest rate cap of 1.5%, as set by the Victorian Government, would not only help preserve Council's ongoing financial sustainability but support and sustain our community through the continuing COVID-19 emergency.

"We encourage anyone who would like to know more about our payment options or rebates they may be entitled to, to give us a call or drop into our Customer Service Centres in Cobram or Yarrawonga."

Mayor Mustica urges all businesses to take the opportunity.


"These officers will be able to help businesses prosper as best they can during these difficult times.

I would like to thank the community who have come forward to get a COVID-19 swab test following the Shepparton outbreak.

The community response has been overwhelmingly positive and proactive. NCN Health staff have swabbed approximately 1500 people since the public were made aware of COVID-19 exposure sites in Shepparton recently. Swabbing is continuing this week with much demand on these teams.

NCN Health has in place a number of infection control measures, screening practices and outbreak management plans to ensure the health and safety of our staff, patients, residents and the community remains our highest priority.

A reminder that as a community we must continue to work together and remain vigilant against COVID-19 infection.

I ask everyone to please follow the current health advice, wear a mask when leaving your home, practice social distancing, staying at least 1.5m apart from each other and follow good hand hygiene. If you do leave your house for essential purposes, always

remember to check in to all locations you attend. If you feel unwell with symptoms of COVID-19, even if they are very mild, please stay home and arrange to get tested. Symptoms of COVID-19 include any one of the following; cough, sore throat,

runny nose, fever or chills, loss of the sense of smell, loss of the sense of taste, fatigue or tiredness for no identified reason.

Any person who has visited a Tier 1 or Tier 2 exposure site, with or without symptoms and any person who is experiencing symptoms of COVID-19 is asked to get a swab test at Numurkah, instead of Nathalia.

You can access a swab test at the Numurkah Showgrounds from 9.30am

 – 1.30pm. This is a drive through service and no appointment is necessary, however, if possible please register your details online by going to https://tinyurl.com/7web3nux For information on COVID-19 swabbing in Numurkah, please call 5862 0328.

is now for asymptomatic reasons only. This means people who do not have any symptoms of COVID-19 and have not visited a Tier 1 or Tier 2 exposure site, can still get a swab test in Nathalia. The Cobram Vaccination Clinic is working hard to immunise our community against this virus. I strongly encourage any person who is eligible for a vaccination to make their appointment as soon as possible. Vaccination is our strongest defence yet and the value of high vaccination rates in our communities cannot be overstated.

The Cobram Vaccination Clinic offers both the Astra Zeneca and Pfizer vaccines in Cobram, they also run 'pop-up' clinics in Nathalia, Numurkah and Yarrawonga Fridays on a rotating basis.

'Everyone is dying to get in!!

 \bigvee e all know that old joke about cemeteries. But do people really know what because the second se know what happens to keep a Cemetery ticking over smoothly or how the Cemetery is run for the benefit of its residents? Or that a group of all volunteers do the work? They are known as "the Nathalia Cemetery Trust".

As a public cemetery, the Trust is under the governance of the Victorian Health Department. The Trust cannot discriminate on any grounds when a family applies for a plot (the Right of Interment).

The Trust maintains the grounds within the lawn sections and the rose

garden areas but the care and maintenance of the graves themselves in the monumental section is generally up to the families of the interred.

All the graves are capable of holding two interments but triple depth graves are no longer available as the risk to our contractor is no longer considered safe. Graves are dug and filled within a narrow timeframe to minimize the risk of anyone coming to harm accidentally over an open grave.

To provide for the orderly development of the lawn section, gravesites are released sequentially with no pre-sales, unlike the rose garden areas or the niche wall or the monumental section where sites can be reserved. In the past, the custom was that the body had to face the east so to have the dead face the

rising sun to greet each new day or to greet the second coming of Christ. But now the family can choose the body position in the grave. Cremated remains/ashes are also allowed to be interred within a grave already containing bodily remains, normally a close family member or relative.

Families frequently come to visit their loved ones and like to leave either fresh or artificial flowers, sometimes precious mementos on the gravesite beams. The Trust has a duty of care to keep the area safe for everyone so only non-breakable items that don't extend beyond the 6

concrete beams or flags no higher than 300mm are permitted. On the graves within the baby/children's area,

the Trust allows small toys provided they are placed on the plaque/ monument but we advise against leaving valuable items. People should be aware that the cemetery is a public place so leaving cans of beer or empty spirits bottles or items that could cause a safety risk, is just leaving

Historically, the Cemetery was divided into various religious denominations areas. These exist today and many locals have family plots

> which they still use. The family employs a stone mason to build a Trust approved stone or granite monument for their gravesite. Many others choose to use the lawn section of the cemetery which was established in the 1980s. The 'perpetual' responsibility of the Trust is to maintain this area with constant watering and mowing and backfilling any sunken sites. Each grave is marked with a uniform sized but individualized bronze memorial plaque honouring the dead.

> The roses planted at the edge of the early lawn area in the 1980's are still thriving but a replanting program has begun as needed. The cremated ashes or simple memorials in the Rose Garden areas are also marked with a small bronze plaque which is

ordered through the Trust. In 2018, a niche wall for cremated ashes was built in the area designated to honour the late Lyndsay Bell. It is planned for the native Wilga trees to grow and provide much needed shade for that area.

MHA Care (formerly Moira Health Care Alliance) became their own entity in 2013 leading to the name change. It is a not-for-profit organisation which provides community care services for frail, aged and people with disabilities and their carers across the Moira Shire. The organisation is accredited under the Aged Care Act 1997and must deliver a safe, quality service that meets Program Standards.

There are Private Services where customers can purchase any of the services as a one, short term or on a regular ongoing service. Other services include:

The Government Subsidised Services are for those over 65 or indigenous people over 50 on a low income, homeless or at-risk people. It also provides

respite services to give carers a break.

The Victorian Government Program, provides services for those under 65 or Aboriginal people under 50.

Eligibility is by assessment and is based on priority of needs.

Services include Home/Domestic Care such as vacuuming, sweeping, mopping floors, meal preparation, shopping, washing etc. Personal Care such as showering, Respite care, Social Support such as assisted shopping, accompanied activities etc, Meals on Wheels, Planned Activity Group, Swimming Program Home Maintenance an Home Modifications such as handrails etc



MHA Care will assist customers with organising a Home Care Package to suit individual needs. In some instances other service providers may provide some of the requirements.

Nuseum Noments

Brought to you by Jeanette Holland on behalf of the Nathalia & District Historical Society.

On a trip to South Australia we enjoyed our travels through the southern part of the state. Of particular interest was the farmland around The Goyder Line and the story behind the establishment of this imaginary line. A visit to Robertstown tells the story.....

George Goyder was born in London in 1826. At the age of 22, George immigrated to Sydney then three years later he moved to SA where, in 1851, he joined the Civil Service as a draftsman. Due to his talents in this field he rose rapidly through the ranks of the Land & Survey Department.

George Goyder was a man of exceptional energy and he commonly spent 10 months of each year away on expeditions, much of it on horseback criss-crossing the country and making detailed reports of his findings.


At the age of 34, ten years after joining the Civil Service, Goyder was appointed to the position of Surveyor-General, a post he held for the next 33 years.

At this time the pastoral properties were flourishing. In Victoria the gold rush, together with the growing Australian population created a strong demand for mutton and wool. With their new wealth, the squatters were able to out-compete smaller landholders when Crown Lands became available for sale. This fueled resentment against the squatters, many of whom obtained large runs at very low rental. Thus the hottest political debates of the day revolved around the valuations of pastoral runs and the methods of land sales.

In the early 1860's Goyder travelled north to classify leases, rents and rights of renewal, but when his valuations were published, they were met by howls of protest from disgruntled pastoralists demanding immediate reassessment. Three commissioners were appointed and sent north to reassess the rents. Goyder, the man with the greatest knowledge of the land, was also directed to go north to determine 'a line of demarcation between that portion of the country where the rainfall has extended and where the drought prevails.'

A map was published the following year showing his line of travel. Thus Goyder's Line was initially a 'Line of Drought' used for the reassessment of leases and divided lands suitable for agriculture from those fit only for grazing. Goyder based a lot of his reports on the type of vegetation he found. Against unwavering advice from Goyder to not allow agricultural settlement beyond his demarcation, the push for new land sales compelled governments to open up more and more land well beyond the line. With the regular occurrence of drought through the marginal country many selectors walked off their land.

The exact validity of the Line as an agricultural demarcation has been a subject of controversy for over a century, but as an indicator of zones safe and unsafe for agriculture it has proven a remarkably good indicator.



In the same year that Goyder (pictured above) moved to SA he married an Englishwoman Frances Mary Smith and they had nine children. Goyder's lengthy absences ensured a lonely life for Frances and following the death of her newborn twins she sank into depression from which she did not recover, eventually taking her own life. Subsequently, Goyder married Ellen, his wife's sister and they had several children.

The exceptional workload and the bitter political controversies took their toll, not only on Goyder's marriage but on his health also.

In 1889 Goyder was appointed CMG (Campaign of the Order of St. Michael & St. George). He retired in 1894 and died four years later.




SMOTA for their quick response to the tragedy unfolding in Afghanistan and to Liz Arcus on the front of Shepparton News with the small felted

The early bird avoids being swooped

W ictorians are being reminded that with spring in the air, so too are swooping birds – so get your plan together early to avoid becoming a target during breeding season.

Native birds, such as magpies and masked lapwings, swoop as a method to defend their young for the 6-8 weeks between when they hatch and when they leave the nest.

Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP) Senior Wildlife Management Officer, Therese Davis, said whilst less than 10 per cent of swooping birds actually swoop, you should have a plan of action if you're worried.

"A small number of birds will swoop at this time of year. They do this to protect their eggs and young." Ms Davis said.

"Swooping by a territorial bird is actually normal bird behaviour, although it's definitely not fun for their targets. Birds may swoop people or animals, so be mindful of your pets too."

When birds swoop, they rarely make actual contact; and whilst it's hard to understand this in the moment, as you hear swooshing sounds, screeching and beak clapping of the birds near you, it's worth knowing that your reactions can help reduce any real harm.

"Swooping is essentially a scare tactic to warn people and animals not to come near the nesting young," Ms Davis said.

"If you have a plan of action and try to keep your distance, you're already halfway to living harmoniously with wildlife and keeping yourself safe at the same time.

"To reduce the impact of swooping, try to remain as calm as you can if you find yourself being swooped.

"Do try to protect your head and eyes and move quickly – but don't run, as this actually upsets the birds.

"It's very important not to do anything to threaten the swooping birds – or interfere with their nests – or to feed them, and to remember that they're simply protecting their young."

The best way to avoid being swooped is to know your local hotspots and avoid the area altogether, although this is not always possible or practical.

To plan your route around known swooping hotspots or to report a swooping incident by any species of bird, and mark its location on Victoria's interactive swooping bird map, please visit <u>https://</u>



Beautify Barmah

Beautify Barmah came into being after a public meeting of the Barmah Community in 2014.

Those present decided that Barmah's biggest assets are The Forest, the Indigenous Community, and the capacity for tourism expansion.

That a bush walk in and around Barmah incorporating a War Memorial, the "Scar Tree", "Canoe Tree" through the bush to the river up through Lassies finishing by the Water Tower incorporating statues, Emu Walk, Punt plaque, local artists, story boards and remembrances along the way could be a good way to incorporate all the ideas put forward as well as make an interesting feature for locals and tourist alike. Tourists arriving on the Emmy Lou could complete the walk in a short time. The walk could be implemented relatively quickly but future projects could be added in stages over a period of time.

Since then, a small group of volunteers with Kerry Bruce as President and Maureen Blair as Secretary have successfully applied for the following grants:

• Grant from Victorian State Government to create a War Memorial for Barmah to celebrate the centenary of the Gallipoli Landing on 25 April 2015.

• Grant from Moira Shire to create a walking map and signage around the town of Barmah noting, the timber cutters, the punt, and the Heritage Horses.

- Grant from Moira Shire to erect Indigenous Art signs by local Yorta Yorta children.
- Grant from Victoria State Government to install solar powered lighting at Barmah's War Memorial January 2019.

• Implemented a Community Market at the Yorta Yorta Nation's Yembena Centre at Barmah.

The group seeks to improve the facilities and activities for residents.

Each year (until Covid 19) the group has organized an Anzac Day Street Parade and Service followed by a morning tea. This has become an extremely popular and important event to our small community. A lot of assistance and support from other organizations and individuals is required to successfully carryout this event and the whole community is incredibly supportive and involved.

Our group has been limited in its activities de to Covid 19 but are looking forward to carrying out further projects to improve the health and well-being of our community such as:

Expand the walking & bicycle track to the Barmah National Park

• Erect more signage along the route highlighting the history and points of interest of the area.


• Erect a statue to commemorate the Barmah Heritage Horses and the contribution they made to the early progress and development of our nation.
