Community Update

Japanese encephalitis vaccine rollout

We are starting an immunisation program to help in the fight against Japanese encephalitis virus. Those eligible include people aged between 50 and 65 who work in a role that is largely outdoors, specifically those who spend more than four hours outdoors each day.

Japanese encephalitis virus can cause a rare, potentially serious infection of the brain and is spread to humans by mosquito bites.

We are urging people who fit the criteria to fill out a simple Expressions of Interest form on our website to indicate whether they wished to be



Wunghnu – new public toilet facilities

W unghnu's popular George Graham Park will be given a new lease of life with the ageing toilet block to be replaced with a brand new facility.

Director Infrastructure Services Josh Lewis said the old brick toilet block had served the community well but it had reached the end of its service life.

"It is being replaced with a long wearing, low maintenance steel and concrete structure featuring a fully accessible toilet, an ambulant toilet and two unisex toilets," Mr Lewis said.

"In addition, this prefabricated building can be installed in a very short space of time so once demolition works are completed on the old toilet block, this new building will be installed in a matter of days."

This \$150,000 project has been funded under Moira Shire Council's Capital Works Program.

2023 Australia Day Award nominations open – with a twist

Mominations for the 2023 Australia Day Awards are now open for individuals or organisations that have endeavoured to enhance and provide for their local community and instil a sense of community spirit and awareness.

Mayor Libro Mustica said nominees who are Australian Citizens and have made a significant voluntary contribution during 2022, or who have given outstanding service to their local community over a number of years are eligible.

"But it is not just individual people who can be nominated," Cr Mustica said.

"A project or event that a school, community group or organisation has held which went that extra mile to help their local area can also be nominated.

"These awards are an opportunity to recognise those in our community who have given tirelessly for the benefit of others.

"We are fortunate to have so many community minded people and the Australia Day Awards provides each town throughout our shire with a fantastic opportunity to recognise their commitment, contribution and effort."

There are six award categories – Citizen of the Year; Junior Citizen of the Year; Young Citizen of the Year; Community Event of the Year; Community Organisation of the Year; and Arts, Culture and/or Environment Project of the Year.

"These nominations will go towards the individual town ceremonies to be held on Australia Day 2023," Cr Mustica said.

"The nominations will also be considered for the Moira Shire Achievement Awards to be held in April next year.

"With the success of the 2022 Moira Shire Australia Day Award ceremony, held in late April due to COVID restrictions, Council has decided to adopt this timing to allow for each town's celebrations to be unhindered by the overall Council awards evening.

"By naming this new ceremony the Moira Shire Achievement Awards, all residents of Moira Shire can be considered, not just Australian citizens, and will allow for a more inclusive and representative ceremony."

Are you eligible for a fourth dose? An additional booster. or fourth dose, is recommended for people at increased risk of severe illness, to be given 3 months after their first booster dose. You should get a fourth dose if

you are: 50 years or older

- a resident of an aged care or disability care facility
- severely immunocompromised (this group may have already had the fourth dose and are now able to have a fifth dose)
- Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander and aged 50 years and older
- 16 years or older and with a medical condition that increases the risk of severe COVID-19 illness
- 16 years or older with disability with significant or complex health needs or multiple comorbidities which increase risk of poor outcome.

Group on Immunisation has advised people aged 30 to 49 years old can receive a fourth dose if they choose.

Museum Moments...

Brought to you by Jeanette Holland on behalf of the Nathalia & District Historical Society.

This article may not be 'local' but I found it very interesting so I thought I would share it with you.....

I have recently had the opportunity to spend some time around Alice Springs and spent several days exploring the Transport Museum there and I can recommend it is well worth the visit if you are in the area. They have many exhibits relating to the story of transport in Australia, from the Ghan Railway to a shed full of amazing Kenworth trucks (a truck-lover's delight).

A team of volunteers work to maintain the museum and keep the exhibits going. Some of the trucks are kept in working order and are driven around the outer area of the display. One of these is 'Bertha', a Diamond T truck which is over 100 years old and was the first road-train in Australia. This truck was owned by Kurt Johannsen and he built four self-tracking trailers for it in 1945. He was required to get a permit from the Dept. of Transport to operate his unit on a public road. Kurt went on to build more trailers and at times towed as many as seven trailers behind Bertha, usually loaded with empty forty-four gallon drums purchased from Army Disposals and transported them to Alice Springs to be sent by rail to oil companies down south.

After several decades of transporting things such as oil drums, cattle, stores and building materials on his road-train, Kurt Johannsen ceased operations and eventually donated his vehicle to the Road Transport Hall of Fame in Alice Springs. 

Out and About in the Community

The preschool children in the 4 year old program have been out in our community practicing their bicycle and scooter skills under the supervision of the educators and volunteers. Practice is important, it allows for extended time to master the skills of balancing, steering and braking. Being exposed to different surfaces for their skill development such as open flat areas, bumpy surfaces such as dirt areas and roads along with practicing on the levy banks and crossing the walking bridges.

The children have been engaging in activities that support their understanding of the road rules and what the different signs mean. When out in our community they need to be aware of where they are riding in relation to riders in front and behind them along with listening to the educators and moving safely around bins, tables and chairs, signs and importantly pedestrians. If a child is under 12, an adult supervising them can legally ride on the footpath.



Gerard Hicks Inducted in to the Transport Hall Of Fame

The Australian Festival of Transport was held in Alice Springs at the Transport Hall of Fame on the weekend 28th-29th August.

Gerard Hicks (Hicks Contracting) went to the festival thinking he was there to surprise a friend's induction, he was given the ultimate surprise with being inducted into the Shell Rimula Wall of Fame himself.

This is the write up that can be found on his poster on the Wall of Fame.

Gerard Hicks was born in December 1953 and grew up on a dairy farm with his 10 siblings in Nathalia, country Victoria.

His trucking career began in 1979 behind the wheel of his 1418 Mercedes Benz and a contract with Pirelli hauling cable over the country (a relationship that lasted 17 years). Alongside his wife Linda, their company G.W & L.A Hicks Contracting grew with every year of operation.

Gerard always dreamt big and as the business grew, he changed his truck to something that would turn heads, stand out in a crowd and one that he'd be proud to drive. He purchased his iconic Kenworth W model from Graham Thomson Motors in Shepparton. After 7 years running Australia wide in the W model, Gerard sold it (which he would later regret).

In 1997, as the business grew, the company moved from Shepparton to Melbourne where it was involved in the Australia wide rollout of Telstra smartcard payphones including delivery to Homebush for the 2000 Sydney Olympics. From here the company grew to become a fleet of 15 trucks and 22 trailers along with several loyal subcontractors and a second depot in Sydney.

Gerard has always had a hunger to succeed which has led to his 40 plus years in the transport industry. He is known for his attention to detail,

pride in his trucks, commitment to his family and business and his iconic restorations of his Kenworth W model and 1718 Mercedes Benz.

Gerard has appeared in numerous publications over In 2016 Gerard the years. received an award of excellence for his dedication to not only Kenworth but the preservation of the history of the brand at the Kenworth Klassic. In 2019 at the same show. Gerard was the recipient of the Dane Ballinger memorial award for an

Sadly in 2014, Gerard's wife Linda lost her battle with cancer. Their daughter Katie continued to help Gerard in the operation of the family business. In 2018, Gerard sold off a large portion of the business, although he has not yet retired. You will still find him putting his iconic trucks to work, loading them up along with his partner Hayley (who also shares his passion for trucks) and taking in the countryside along the way.

Snakes out and about as the weather warms up

As the days become warmer, snakes are starting to emerge from their winter *brumation* to bask in the sun and search for food and a mate.

Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP) Senior Wildlife Officer, Therese Davis, said: "Sunny weather also means it's more likely people will encounter a snake."



"It's not uncommon to find snakes warming themselves on a rock or in a clearing during early spring, particularly on a sunnier day, so it's important we're mindful that they can be out and about earlier than normally expected.

"Snakes are generally shy and prefer to keep away from people and often when a snake is found in a backyard it's because it's moving through the area to another habitat.

"Snake species found in north-east Victoria include the Red-bellied Black Snake, Eastern Brown, Tiger Snake and Copperheads

"These four species are venomous, but it is rare for them to bite people. Most snake bites occur when people try to capture or kill a snake.

"Being aware that snakes may be around and being informed about how to react to them is important at this time of year," Ms Davis said. If you live in an area with snakes, please remember:





If you see a snake, keep calm and move yourself and anyone with you (including pets) away from the area. Don't attempt to capture or harm snakes. Instead call

DELWP on 136 186 for further advice.

Maintain lawns and clean up around your house, as snakes are attracted to shelter such as piles of rocks and timber, chook sheds, sheets of metal, and building materials.

Undertake first aid training and ensure your first aid kit contains several compression bandages, and if someone is bitten, call 000 immediately.

Snakes are protected under the *Wildlife Act 1975* and it is illegal to capture, harm, or kill them. If you have information about people wilfully destroying protected wildlife, please contact Crime Stoppers Victoria on 1800 333 000.

Brumation is the term used to describe the hibernation of cold-blooded animals, namely reptiles and amphibians who rely on the surrounding environment to regulate their body temperature.
