- Up to 8 x 2.5-inch SAS/SATA/NVMe drives or 6 x 2.5-inch NVMe drives




Figure 2. Front view of the 6 x 2.5-inch drive system




Figure 6. Rear view of the system




Figure 7. Inside the system




Figure 8. Inside the system with liquid cooling module

Locating the Express Service Code and Service Tag

The unique Express Service Code and Service Tag are used to identify the system.

The information tag is located on the front of the system that includes system information such as the Service Tag, Express Service Code, Manufacture date, NIC, MAC address, QRL label, and so on. If you have opted for the secure default access to iDRAC, the Information tag also contains the iDRAC secure default password. If you have opted for iDRAC Quick Sync

2, the Information tag also contains the OpenManage Mobile (OMM) label, where administrators can configure, monitor, and troubleshoot the PowerEdge servers.




Figure 9. Locating the Express Service Code and Service tag



The Mini Enterprise Service Tag (MEST) label is located on the rear of the system that includes the Service Tag (ST), Express Service Code (Exp Svc Code), and Manufacture Date (Mfg. Date). The Exp Svc Code is used by Dell EMC to route support calls to the appropriate personnel.

Alternatively, the Service Tag information is located on a label on the left wall of the chassis.

The system information label is located on the back side of the system cover.








Figure 11. Memory information and system board connectors




Figure 12. Cabling overview




Figure 13. System tasks




Figure 14. Heat sink




Figure 15. BOSS S2




Figure 16. Electrical overview




Figure 17. Configuration and layout




Figure 18. Express service tag




Figure 20. LED behavior

iDRAC configuration

The Integrated Dell Remote Access Controller (iDRAC) is designed to make you more productive as a system administrator and improve the overall availability of Dell EMC servers. iDRAC alerts you to system issues, helps you to perform remote management, and reduces the need for physical access to the system.

Options to set up iDRAC IP address

To enable communication between your system and iDRAC, you must first configure the network settings based on your network infrastructure. The network settings option is set to **DHCP**, by default.

(i) NOTE: For static IP configuration, you must request for the settings at the time of purchase.

Minimum to POST and system management configuration validation

Minimum configuration to POST

The components listed below are the minimum configuration to POST:

- One processor (CPU) in socket processor 1
- One memory module (DIMM) in socket A1
- One power supply unit
- System board + LOM card + RIO card

Configuration validation

The new generation of PowerEdge systems have added interconnect flexibility and advanced iDRAC management features to collect precise system configuration information and report configuration errors.

When the system is powered on, information about installed cables, risers, backplanes, floating card (fPERC or BOSS), and processor is obtained from the CPLD and backplane memory maps is analyzed. This information forms a unique configuration, which is compared with one of the qualified configurations stored in a table maintained by iDRAC.

One or more sensors are assigned to each of the configuration elements. During POST, any configuration validation error is logged in the System Event Log (SEL)/LifeCycle (LC) log. The reported events are categorized in the configuration validation error table.




Figure 27. Removing the left air shroud




Figure 28. Removing the right air shroud




Figure 29. Installing the left air shroud




Figure 30. Installing the right air shroud




Figure 33. Removing the cooling fan cage assembly




Figure 34. Installing the cooling fan cage assembly




Figure 35. Removing a cooling fan




Figure 37. Removing the side wall bracket




Figure 38. Installing the side wall bracket




Figure 45. Removing a NVMe drive blank




Figure 49. 8 x 2.5-inch universal drive backplane




Figure 50. Removing the drive backplane






Figure 53. Installing a NVMe connector blank




Figure 54. Front GPU power cables




Figure 55. Front GPU riser module cables with BOSS S2 module




Figure 56. 8 x 2.5-inch SAS/SATA with fPERC




Figure 57. 6 x 2.5-inch NVMe direct




Figure 58. 8 x 2.5-inch NVMe RAID with fPERC




Figure 59. 8 x 2.5-inch SAS/SATA with 4 universal slots and fPERC

System memory guidelines

The PowerEdge R750xa system supports DDR4 registered DIMMs (RDIMMs), Load Reduced DIMM (LRDIMMs), and Intel Persistent Memory 200 series (BPS). System memory holds the instructions that are started by the processor.

Your system memory is organized into eight channels per processor (two memory sockets per channel),16 memory sockets per processor and 32 memory sockets per system.




Figure 60. Memory channels

General memory module installation guidelines

To ensure optimal performance of your system, observe the following general guidelines when configuring your system memory. If your system's memory configurations fail to observe these guidelines, your system might not boot, stop responding during memory configuration, or operate with reduced memory.

The memory bus may operate at speeds of 3200 MT/s, 2933 MT/s depending on the following factors:

- System profile selected (for example, Performance Optimized, or Custom [can be run at high speed or lower])
- Maximum supported DIMM speed of the processors
- Maximum supported speed of the DIMMs

(i) NOTE: MT/s indicates DIMM speed in MegaTransfers per second.

(i) NOTE: Fault Resilient Memory-Non Uniform Memory Access is supported.

The system supports Flexible Memory Configuration, enabling the system to be configured and run in any valid chipset architectural configuration. The following are the recommended guidelines for installing memory modules:

- All DIMMs must be DDR4.
- x4 and x8 DRAM based memory modules can be mixed.
- If memory modules with different speeds are installed, they operate at the speed of the slowest installed memory module(s).
- Populate memory module sockets only if a processor is installed.
- For single-processor systems, sockets A1 to A16 are available.
- For dual-processor systems, sockets A1 to A16 and sockets B1 to B16 are available.
- In **Optimizer Mode**, the DRAM controllers operate independently in the 64-bit mode and provide optimized memory performance.

- Mixing of DDR4 DIMM types (RDIMM, LRDIMM, and 3DS LRDIMM), within channels, for Integrated Memory Controller (iMC), or across sockets are not supported.
- Mixing of Intel Persistent Memory 200 series (BPS) operating modes (App Direct Mode, Memory Mode) is not supported.
- If only one DIMM is populated on a channel, then the DIMM should always be populated in the first slot in that channel (white slot).
- If a Intel Persistent Memory 200 series (BPS) and a DDR4 DIMM are populated on the same channel, always plug Intel Persistent Memory 200 series (BPS) on second slot (black slot).

- In App Direct Mode (AP), sockets can be populated symmetrically or asymmetrically.
- In Memory Mode (MM), sockets can be populated symmetrically.
- Memory mode is not supported for the 6+1, 8+1 and 12+2 configurations irrespective of DDR to Intel Persistent Memory 200 series (BPS) capacity ratio.
- In VMware ESXI environment, if BPS goal is changed between App Direct Mode and Memory Mode, it is recommended to sanitize the Intel Persistent Memory 200 series (BPS) before creating a new goal.




Figure 61. Removing a memory module

CAUTION: Do not apply pressure at the center of the memory module; apply pressure at both ends of the memory module evenly.

4. Press the memory module with your thumbs until the ejectors firmly click into place. When the memory module is properly seated in the socket, the levers on the memory module socket align with the levers on the other sockets that have memory modules installed.




Figure 62. Installing a memory module

- 1. Ensure all four anti-tilt wires are in the locked position (outward position), and then using a Torx T30 tool, loosen the captive nuts on the processor heat sink module (PHM) in the order that is mentioned below:
 - **a.** Loosen the first nut three turns.
 - b. Loosen the nut diagonally opposite to the nut you loosened first.
 - c. Repeat the procedure for the remaining two nuts.
 - d. Return to the first nut and loosen it completely.

(i) NOTE: Ensure that the anti-tilt wires on the PHM are in locked position when loosening the captive screws.

2. Set all the anti-tilt wires to unlocked position (inward position).




Figure 63. Removing the processor heat sink module




Figure 64. Removing a heat sink




Figure 67. Installing the retaining clip




Figure 68. Press the retaining clip on the four sides




Figure 72. Installing the processor heat sink




Figure 73. Set the anti-tilt wires to the locked position and tightening the screws




Figure 74. Removing the liquid cooling module




Figure 75. Installing the liquid cooling module






Figure 77. Riser 2A




Figure 78. Riser 3B




Figure 79. GPU riser module right




Figure 82. Removing the expansion card riser (Riser 3)




Figure 83. Removing the Riser 1 blank




Figure 84. Removing the expansion card riser (Riser 2)




Figure 85. Installing the Riser 2 blank




Figure 86. Installing the Riser 3 blank




Figure 87. Removing the Riser 3 blank




Figure 88. Removing the Riser 2 blank




Figure 89. Installing the expansion card riser (Riser 2)




Figure 90. Installing the Riser 1 blank




Figure 91. Installing the expansion card riser (Riser 3)




Figure 94. Removing the filler bracket




Figure 97. Removing the R4 paddle card




Figure 98. Installing the R1 paddle card




Figure 99. Installing the R4 paddle card




Figure 100. Removing the R3 paddle card




Figure 101. Installing the R3 paddle card




Figure 103. Removing the standard bracket with three screws




Figure 105. Installing the custom bracket with three screws




Figure 110. Removing the GPU




Figure 111. Installing the GPU blank




Figure 112. Removing the GPU blank




Figure 113. Installing GPU on GPU riser module




Figure 114. Removing the NVLink sponges




Figure 115. Installing the NVLink sponge




Figure 120. Removing the HH card holder




Figure 121. Removing the FH card holder




Figure 122. Installing the HH card holder




Figure 123. Installing the FH card holder




Figure 124. Disconnecting the serial COM port




Figure 125. Removing the Serial COM port




Figure 127. Connecting the serial COM port




Figure 128. Disconnecting the VGA port cable




Figure 132. Removing the IDSDM module




Figure 133. Installing the IDSDM module




Figure 134. Removing the MicroSD card




Figure 137. Installing the M.2 SSD module




Figure 144. Disconnecting the BOSS S2 power cable




Figure 145. Removing the BOSS S2 module




Figure 146. Removing the BOSS S2 power and signal cable from the BOSS S2 module




Figure 147. Connecting the BOSS S2 power and signal cables to the BOSS S2 module




Figure 148. Installing the BOSS S2 module




Figure 151. Removing the system battery




Figure 152. Installing the system battery




Figure 153. Removing the internal USB card




Figure 154. Installing the internal USB card




Figure 158. Installation of filler bracket




Figure 159. Removal of filler bracket

Hot spare feature

Your system supports the hot spare feature that significantly reduces the power overhead associated with the power supply unit (PSU) redundancy.

When the hot spare feature is enabled, one of the redundant PSUs is switched to the sleep state. The active PSU supports 100 percent of the system load, thus operating at higher efficiency. The PSU in the sleep state monitors output voltage of the active PSU. If the output voltage of the active PSU drops, the PSU in the sleep state returns to an active output state.

If having both PSUs active is more efficient than having one PSU in the sleep state, the active PSU can also activate the sleeping PSU.

The default PSU settings are as follows:

- If the load on the active PSU is more than 50 percent of PSU rated power wattage, then the redundant PSU is switched to the active state.
- If the load on the active PSU falls below 20 percent of PSU rated power wattage, then the redundant PSU is switched to the sleep state.




Figure 164. Installing a power supply unit adapter




Figure 170. Removing the LOM card and rear I/O board




Figure 171. Removing liquid cooling rear I/O board




Figure 172. Installing the LOM card and rear I/O board




Figure 173. Installing the liquid cooling rear I/O board




Figure 174. Removing the right control panel




Figure 175. Installing the right control panel




Figure 176. Removing the left control panel




Figure 177. Installing the left control panel




Figure 180. IDSDM port information




Figure 181. Internal USB card port information






Figure 186. NIC indicator codes
