'Planner, pantser or ponderer' descriptions

Planner

If you are a planner you like to know exactly where you're going with a piece of writing before you begin. You especially want to know how your story will end. You breathe a sigh of relief when your teacher hands you a planning document. You like nothing better than filling it in, and then off you go. You also like to follow your plan to the letter. Sometimes new ideas bubble up as you're writing, but you don't let them float into your story. You follow your plan.

Pantser

A pantser finds planning tight and restrictive. A pantser dives right in and start writing. The word *pantser* comes from the saying 'to fly by the seat of your pants'. This saying dates to when pilots flew planes without navigational tools and complex computer systems. The pilot used their knowledge, experience and intuition to make judgements and decisions regarding the flight as it progressed. So, if you're a pantser, you rely on your intuition and write as you go, rather than being limited by a predetermined plan.

Ponderer

A ponderer likes to think things through before writing their plan. In fact, a ponderer likes to think things through before writing anything at all. By the time they get their ideas down on paper, their story is often clear and detailed. Ponderers make interesting and creative connections between ideas because they have considered many options before picking up a pen. A ponderer might suffer from having too many ideas – or the opposite affliction, too few ideas. The pressure to work fast makes a ponderer feel anxious and hot under the collar. A ponderer might also have a noisy and bossy inner critic; it's hard to stride out into the middle of your story when you have a voice in your ear questioning your every move. Perfectionists will often present as ponderers. They don't want to get ideas down unless they think they are right.
