The importance of this place can be seen in the number of names it has had during its history; Operetu, Takapuna Point, Stark's Point, Fort Takapuna, Narrow Neck Camp, Fort Cautley, HMNZS Tamaki and now The Fort Takapuna Historic Reserve. All the occupants have left their mark.

Nature also plays its part. Below the clifftops are the writhing layers of stone of the wonderfully named 'Narrow Neck Structural Discordance'. These soft papa cliffs erode, sometimes slowly, sometimes with large amounts falling into the sea at once.

This headland, Operetu is named for the ancestor Peretu whose people had settlements all along this coast. Tainui and Kawerau people lived here and today Ngāti Paoa, Te Kawerau ā Maki and Ngāti Whātua all have ancestral connections.

To an early colonist, Robert Adam Mozley Stark it was firstly the site for a grand mansion and later in 1886 a lucrative investment when in dubious circumstances he sold it at an exorbitant price to the government to build a fort.

The fort, Fort Takapuna, with its two 'disappearing guns and magazine tunnels was part of a chain of defences built in the 1800s to defend Auckland from attack from the sea, the anticipated enemy being the Russian navy.

While the Russians never arrived during the World War I, the fort was in use and the extensive grounds became the training camp for the Māori and Pacific Island soldiers who went on to serve in the Middle East and France. It also became a prison for the Māori from the Waikato who refused to enlist and famous Tainui leader Te Puea Hērangi sat at the gate to offer encouragement to the men.

After World War I, the fort was declared obsolete and the camp became home to the Royal New Zealand Artillery and the old fort became a storage space for tons of naval ammunition.

In the build up to World War II, guns from the World War I Battle Cruiser, HMS New Zealand, were emplaced along the coast and new barracks, messes and administrative buildings were constructed. From here, hundreds of men and women marched off to war.

After the war the army continued to occupy the site and some of the barracks were used for civilian accommodation and the camp hospital became part of the public system and was used as a maternity facility. After the closing of the fort at North Head in the late 1950s the 'Fort Cautley' name was transferred to Narrow Neck. In 1963 the Naval training establishment HMNZS Tamaki was moved here from Motuihe and the army and navy shared the space.

By the 21st century most of this land was no longer needed for defence purposes and the public reserves were created where the spectacular historic headland and its even more spectacular views can play host to events such as NZ Sculpture OnShore.

What inspires your art practice?

I work with organic forms that show elemental forces like wind, fire and water. Depicting movement particularly interests me while I make my glass works. The constant movement of these elements is captured in my sculptures and enhanced by the play of light inside the glass. My art constantly reflects my state of mind, my Greek heritage and my surrounding nature.

What materials do you work in?

I mainly work with glass. I incorporate metal, wood and harakeke in my sculptures. Other mediums are woodcarving, collage, mixed media, photography and painting.

Describe your artwork for NZ Sculpture OnShore 2023

The connection between our actions and life experiences is often linked to ideas like karma, the law of attraction, and the ripple effect. These notions propose that our intentions and deeds create ripples in our lives and among those close to us, moulding our experiences.

The sculpture analogy, featuring repeated and mirrored shapes, symbolises the recurring cycle of cause and effect. It illustrates how our actions can rebound unexpectedly. This artistic portrayal becomes a visual representation of the intricate and intertwined nature of human relationships. In essence, the concepts underscore how our thoughts, actions, and outlook profoundly shape our personal journey and the world. They provide a perspective to fathom the dynamics of human existence.

What inspires your art practice?

Growing up in post-war NZ, I lived with objects that were hand-made, and the craft involved in this was valued. I enjoy combining a variety of materials in my art, exploring the differences in their material languages. I believe that through installation and assemblage, the juxtaposition of created and found objects can portray a sense of human interaction and emotional response more effectively than through the spoken word.

What materials do you work in?

As a mixed media artist, I work predominantly with objects found and created. Objects are loaded with histories, they contain traces of residual emotions and symbolism. I enjoy combining a variety of materials in my art, exploring the differences in their material languages.

Describe your artwork for NZ Sculpture OnShore 2023

We all start here, individual, distinctive and full of potential. It's circumstances that influence and change our journeys and those of the people around us. A series of ceramic heads of various sizes crocheted into cocoon-like ovum. Installed in the dark space of the bunker to gestate, suspended from the ceiling at different heights, spaces between them and underneath so the viewer can engage with the *Ovum*.

What inspires your art practice?

I am inspired by the beauty of the female form. My work celebrates the strengths of the female form and the female within the form. The forms are often portrayed as elongated figures. My love for Africa shines through in the forms I create as the inspiration is taken from the elongated African sculptures.

What materials do you work in?

The sculptures are created in a polymer clay which is then moulded and cast into bronze. The bronze casting process is long, complicated and labour intensive.

Describe your artwork for NZ Sculpture OnShore 2023

We never know how strong we are until we are put to the test. Creating thin, elegant

sculptures in a strong metal-like bronze is a reminder that looking fragile has very little to do with the strength we have and how long we will prevail.

Where are the public most likely to see your artworks outside of NZ Sculpture OnShore?

Most of my representation is in the South Island with annual exhibitions in Tai Tapu Sculpture Garden of her life-size works. Christchurch being my base, has the strongest representation.

Outside of Christchurch my work can be found in Matakana, Wellington, Nelson, Hanmer Springs, Timaru, Clyde and Oamaru. Internationally: Art Catto in Loule, Portugal and Monarca in Dubai, UAE

I have an interest in the ancient monolith sculptures contrasting that with the modern, along with the sublime and symbolic nature that sculpture can bring and its timeless qualities.

What materials do you work in?

Corten steel, also known as weathering

Describe your artwork for NZ Sculpture OnShore 2023

Here and Now represents the polarisation of people's perspective which is depicted in the two different sides of the piece. Bringing into focus the view, as a camera does with depth of field, depending on which side you look gives multiple options / viewpoints.

Sensory Intent attempts to provide an archway from the seen to the unseen.
Utilising light's sensory properties and aligning it with the movement of the sun, this piece can be used to read time. Shadows can be recorded. It also enables safe communication.

earthing, conservation, sustainability and connection to the elements and environment. With references to aspects of the outdoor activity and how it promotes good mental health, as well as nutritional health.



What inspires your art practice?

As a proud member of the queer community, I use my work to examine, question and criticise the relationships between gender, sexuality and society's misconceptions about those themes.

Much of my work references the figure and gently probes at confronting and challenging issues surrounding sexuality, gender and identity. I use ambiguity and stereotypes to make playful artwork that deconstructs the notions of sexuality and queer identity while celebrating the human form, in all its many unique differences.

What materials do you work in?

My work changes, develops and covers a wide range of topics and materials. It is diverse and takes many forms and can be made of anything material. I exhibit paintings, crafted objects, sculptures and installations. All bear a certain physicality and push the boundaries between conceptualism and post-pop art.

Describe your artwork for NZ Sculpture OnShore 2023

My work is a celebration of the human form. These minimal sculptures with their clean outlines and block colour are deceptively simple. They offer a compounded complexity focusing on the body, how it's viewed, employed and interpreted.

Celebration of the male form certainly has a rich artistic precedence – from classical Greek sculptures of disrobed heroes as exemplars of 'masculinity', to the subtle undertones of homoerotic desire, perhaps expressed by Michelangelo's David.

While a number of works from antiquity and beyond may have eroticised the male nude in carefully guarded ways, the opportunity to openly celebrate the male form from a queer perspective is something altogether more recent.

What inspires your art practice?

I have always wanted to be a potter, since I was little. I started doing after-school pottery classes when I was quite young, probably around 10 years old. I had this absolutely stunning teacher who showed me clay is a little different from other materials and I still remember everything she showed me.

What materials do you work in?

Pottery is the process and product of forming vessels and other objects with clay and other raw materials, which are fired at high temperatures to give them a hard and durable form. I am using stoneware for my ceramic flowers.

Describe your artwork for NZ Sculpture OnShore 2023

I see how flowers are absolutely beautiful, magical and the essence of femininity. This exhibition is supporting women and every woman deserves flowers.

Flowers give us a sense of joy, love and happiness. All flowers are beautiful without exception and they can decorate our life perfectly and effortlessly, creating a special atmosphere for a delicate woman's soul.

What inspires your art practice?

Living in Northland and being surrounded with the kawakaka plant at my home, it was natural for me to explore kawakawa as a sculptural form.

Having worked with a conservation trust, I support the health of native plants and animals, while working to eliminate pests and predators.

What materials do you work in?

Recycled copper, hot water cylinders are the medium of choice these days. A random buy on TradeMe set me off on my enamelling experiments.

Describe your artwork for NZ Sculpture OnShore 2023

The native flora of Aotearoa is unique as it evolved in isolation for millions of years. We need to protect and celebrate our diversity and our cultural heritage.

In this work I am celebrating kawakawa. Kawakawa is used extensively in Rongoā Māori. When harvesting kawakawa, please respect tikanga and Te Ao Māori.

Where are the public most likely to see your artworks outside of NZ Sculpture OnShore?

Camera Obscura in Whangarei opened in November 2020 and recently won Small Project Award at the Auckland Architecture Awards, June 2023.

Materials: Copper

What inspires your art practice?

Curves in nature are an inspiration to me. Transferring this feeling of wellbeing and fulfillment through the medium of art for others to enjoy is a main motivating factor. The physical aspect of my sculptures is a key indicator of my commitment to this aim.

What materials do you work in?

Porcelain, stoneware and raku clays, oak, rimu, jarrah and totara wood, steel, stainless steel and copper.

Describe your artwork for NZ Sculpture OnShore 2023

The maple leaf tree fountain represents what is beautiful and serene. The ivy has its own beauty and in this fixed copper image is a wonderful compliment. However, in the natural world such a competitor would grow to dominate and destroy its host/partner.

Cooperative symbiotic relationships do exist; they may be hard to find, keep looking, never give up.

What inspires your art practice?

Here, in my version, she has found her head and, in turn, found her voice to shout for freedom for women in our times. She is both ancient and an angel, seeking freedom like a bird, with no boundary. Proclaiming her rights for all to hear.

What inspires your art practice?

I am interested in feelings evoked by shape, form and pattern, how we react to scale and light and the influence this has on art, architecture and design. The pompoms cover one of the gun emplacements (purpose-built coastal defence network and utilised for military purposes from 1886–1889 to WWII), located at Operetu Fort Takapuna, the dwelling place of Peretu and part of the ancestral lands of the Kawerau people. It was a coveted land, frequently fought over with hostilities.

What inspires your art practice?

I express my own story through creating art objects. I am drawn to the movement, shape and warm rich colours naturally inherent in wood and stone and to the powerful strength of steel and aluminium.

Subtle hints of the human figure seen in man-made objects and within nature, are recurring themes in my work.



Everyday items take on a touch of humanity and become pieces of art; a clothes peg transitions into a 2m tall ballerina on pointe; or a pair of scissors reflects a man and woman ploughing the ground together. Simple yet elegant forms, telling a story through subtle movement, jump from the pages of my personal journal onto my work bench.

What materials do you work in?

Wood, steel, aluminium and composite stone.

Describe your artwork for NZ Sculpture OnShore 2023

Belonging takes on the form of a curtain or a dress elegantly moving in the breeze. A hint of humanity is captured within this form, delicately held by a golden rod, as if engaged in a divine dance. What's striking is that the curtain / dress isn't pushed by the wind, but rather drawn by it, evoking a sense of graceful movement. The symbolism of being untethered yet gently held from the centre of its being is a representation of the delicate balance between freedom and connection.

The words that gracefully dance in the breeze add a layer of depth to the sculpture. Words like 'yes,' 'welcome,' 'compassion,' 'acceptance,' 'kindness,' and 'grace' find their place within the sculpture, signifying the values that form the foundation of human connection and a sense of belonging.

What inspires your art practice?

I am passionate about the environment, in particular New Zealand's post-colonial landscape and the tensions between introduced and native species of flora and fauna.

My background in documentary production means that I have a love for history and deep diving into primary resources so my ideas often come from reading. My aim is always to come up with a simple and beautiful way of representing a more complex story.

What materials do you work in?

I work predominantly in bronze as I love its longevity as a material and the fact that as an artwork it can be touched by the viewer. The original artwork is usually sculpted in wax and can often utilise existing shapes and objects within the work.

Describe your artwork for NZ Sculpture OnShore 2023

Off Balance 2023 is part of an ongoing body of work drawn from the historical introduction of non-native plants and animals to the New Zealand landscape. This work is intended





as both homage to our native $t\bar{u}\bar{u}$ and to the trees, plants and people who have come to New Zealand from all over the world. But it also comments upon the more serious issue of non native species in our environment.

Parson Bird is part of a new series of works taking a wry look at the nicknames given to New Zealand birds by the early European settlers. The tuft of white feathers at the tūī's throat reminded settlers of the white collar of a minister or parson. Its raucous, sometimes pompous demeanour evokes an enthusiastic sermon. Here the tūī delivers his sermon from a giant bible on a precarious lectern.

Scattered is an homage to a majestic copper beech tree that stands in the garden of a beautiful homestead in the Lakes District of Otago. This tree is an example of the introduced species that has a lasting historical significance in the New Zealand landscape. Discussed at length and introduced purposefully by the Acclimatisation Societies of the early 1860's, giant trees such as oaks, beech and maples can be seen as vestiges of colonialism, but they are also the silent witnesses to all that has come after them.

What inspires your art practice?

Through our creative practices, individually and collectively, we explore what is perceived as 'useful' and ask questions about 'use': The way things are used, the material potential that remains after they've been used and the potential uses beyond those intended. Our collaborative art practice draws inspiration from the plastic pandemic, redefining waste through artmaking. Constructing blooms from hand-cut, single-use water bottles, our work seeks to evoke wonder for our planet's precious ecosystems and our place within them. Our practice comments on waste's impact on the planet, encouraging viewers to reconsider consumption habits and fostering connections to our living earth.

What materials do you work in?

We choose to work with found and collected cast-off materials to highlight problematic aspects of current modes of production and consumption. *Droplets* utilises hundreds of hand-cut single-use water bottles, redefining plastic waste as art and serving as a reminder of our environmental impact.

Describe your artwork for NZ Sculpture OnShore 2023

Highlighting the plastic pandemic through the redefinition of plastic waste, *Droplets* is a showcase of the potential of plastic as an art-making material.

Made from hundreds of hand cut singleuse water bottles constructed into forms evocative of our planet's threatened biodiversity, the droplets become vessels for new ways of thinking.

Droplets serves as a stark reminder of the impact our waste has on the planet and its inhabitants, and hopes to inspire viewers to rethink their own consumption.

All three pieces are crowned with an extinct huia bird. This bird was a victim of predation by introduced mammals and, to a lesser extent, human hunting. The last accepted sighting was in 1907 and the presence of the huia reminds us to care for the other birds sitting on the pou to prevent them meeting the same fate.

They remind me that all materials can be repurposed to create something fresh and new and, conversely, that the animals, clothes and people we think we know can reveal something very different if we care to look more closely.

What inspires your art practice?

It symbolises hope and defiance and invites all to challenge the veils of compliance from encroaching governance and peer pressures. Within these sacred

grounds of Operetu, we honour our Wahine whose strength and resilience resonate within these sculptures and kaupapa. We must remember! All we have is our one life so we must always stand up for our rights.

Te Matau A Kiwa: In Māori legend, Maui caught the great fish using woven Harakeke and a hook made from the jawbone of his grandmother, Muri Ranga Whenua. This fish is now known as Te Ika A Maui, the North Island of Aotearoa. Te Matau A Kiwa is a symbol of strength, prosperity, fertility, abundance and affiliation to our oceans as we are guardians of the seas and everything in it.



This site-responsive stage-set suggests a surreal narrative reflecting on the evolving symptoms of fear and dispossession as humanity struggles within our volatile world.

This interactive work aims to engage the viewer through their imagination to recreate this subterraneous project within their mind's eye using the clues offered on site. This disconcerting setting offers a platform for reflection, evoking a sense of unease, raising thoughts and questions.

The current work refers to immigration, life and survival. The vessel is fragile and delicate, referencing the hazards of the current crisis of refugee migration and the support column is filigreed with paddle and an oar

What inspires your art practice?

The symmetry of the images is a major factor for me. Even after all the years working in this field, the moment of the first view through a new kaleidoscope is a precious moment. Kaleidoscope images are strongly therapeutic, calming and de-stressing. It's a very rewarding medium. The combination of the six differently configured kaleidoscopes in an outdoor setting using plants as the 'objects' is unique.

What materials do you work in?

I'm open to many different materials, and use wood, aluminium, brass, stainless steel, acrylic, and glass.

We make our own mirrors in the workshop to give the best possible images. We also make our own dichroic glass for the object chambers.

Describe your artwork for NZ Sculpture OnShore 2023

The concept came from using as 'objects' in a kaleidoscope things like bubbles, pieces on a speaker dancing to music, and single kaleidoscopes set up to look at water features, including goldfish.

The idea of people being involved in all aspects of enjoying a kaleidoscope, so choosing which plants to use, perhaps picking flowers and herbs while enjoying the six different images was an idea I had nurtured for some time.

Adding other natural things such as pumice, driftwood and river stones all invite involvement by people who would then enjoy the images, and as the fancy took them, change the display. I really like the idea of not dictating an unalterable display.

As debris is chipped and falls to the depths of the sea below, they are tumbled into more genteel contours.

The thought of these softer forms have inspired me to create *Washed Up*.

The use of corten steel anchors its hold to the continued demands of Mother Nature, never knowing what to expect next as it sits here temporarily.



What inspires your art practice?

The main source of inspiration for my sculpture is the prehistoric megaliths of my Cornish homeland and the indigenous belief systems of my ancestors – the monument builders.

The indigenous pre-Celtic peoples of Briton, much like most indigenous cultures across the world, orientated their lives around the connection to land and the natural cycles of the seasons, the tides, the rising and setting of the sun and the moon.

By portraying these ideas in 3-dimensional form, I hope to highlight the knowledge and wisdom to be found within indigenous cultures, serving as a reminder that the care of our land and seas are paramount to our existence.

What materials do you work in?

Corten steel is a dense metal with a tensile nature lending itself well to curvilinear form. The natural rusting patina symbolises the passing of time, but also holds strong connections to my childhood home of the small fishing village of Newlyn in Cornwall. 23ct gold represents the sacrality of love, light and our emanating light within.

This work is a statement about gender equality.

The Voyage has seen Javier collaborating with James Molnar, who has been inspired by his Māori cultural roots to portray the origin of mankind through the carving component of the piece.


Describe your artwork for NZ Sculpture OnShore 2023


What inspires your art practice?

Green Zeitgeist captures spaces in time and spirit. Wild and special places intrigue and beg discovery, while engaging the visual reinterpretation for each work. I discovered cast glass, an exciting medium which works with my vision of wild places. Glass – that magical, sexy, transparent, light-filled material that touches and informs my wilderness experiences. It has the ability to reflect ambient light and its ephemeral character is an essential aspect of each work.

What materials do you work in?

I have been working with cast lead crystal glass for 15 years and use stainless steel to add scale to the glass for my public outdoor sculptures. My recent work uses transparent fluorescent acrylic plastic sheets to provide a texture and transparent overlapping pattern of brilliant colours. Stainless steel threaded rods join the sheets though the central core of the sculpture.







Describe your artwork for NZ Sculpture OnShore 2023

Green Zeitgeist is a juxtaposition of 12 curved, undulating, fluorescent cast acrylic sheets aligned to express movement and light. The sheets have the ability to gather ambient light and transfer it to the edges of the sheets, intensifying each edge's colour. This work responds to issues of climate change in our current decade. There is significant Impact to vulnerable coastlines, mountains, pastoral, forestry and in high density urban communities.

Voices need to be heard. This bold, loud, fluorescent green, acrylic sculpture is intended as a visible statement of our own vulnerable *Green Zeitgeist*. We must not lose sight of what is happening to our own paradise or to planet Earth. Critical thought and action is urgently required from politicians, community and world leaders.







I am inspired by my Ngāti Porou 19th century grandfather, Rīwai Pakerau, who is one of six recognised Tohunga whakairo carvers and kōwhaiwhai creators of the East Coast. His works transitioned those of Māori and that of European heraldic motifs within wharenui. As such, my own work utilises simplistic forms of birds and marine life adorned with kowhaiwhai patterns to relay a message.



What materials do you work in?

Apart from working with precious metals and gemstones, Paora works in pounamu, obsidian, glass, jasper, basalt, andesite, limestone, wood, bronze and aluminium.

Korimako/Bellbird

The harakeke/flax bush is a complete representation of the whānau.
The following proverb alludes to the absence of the heart, of love, would leave the Bellbird bereft of song:
Hutia te rito o te harakeke
Kei whea to Komako e kō?
Ki mai ki ahau
He aha te mea nui o te Ao?

He aha te mea nui o te Ao? Maku e ki atu

He tāngata, he tāngata, he tāngata!

If the heart of the flax was removed Where would the bellbird sing? If I was asked what was the most important thing in the world I would be compelled to reply, it is people, it is people!

Whaitere Cloak

Whaitere is the polynesian name of a ray who in mythology is the Kaitiaki / guardian of life in the moana. The Kōwhaiwhai patterns upon her back pertain to her whakapapa and stewardship role to life within the oceans. Hers is a legend known throughout the Pacific Islands.

Describe your artwork for NZ Sculpture OnShore 2023

The vision I had was to create a contemporary styled Fale. A shelter for humanity. A lens that connects us to Te Moana Nui a Kiwa, the Pacific Ocean, and its healing powers. A space to navigate through clouded thoughts and emotions. A space to calm the mind.

'Te Moana Nui a Kiwa' is a poetic name for the Pacific Ocean in the Māori language. It literally means 'The Great Ocean of Kiwa.' Kiwa is the Māori name for the Polynesian goddess of the sea. The phrase is often used to refer to the Pacific region as a whole, rather than just the ocean itself.

Describe your artwork for NZ Sculpture OnShore 2023

Vessels of Wellness speaks about healing and replenishment. It references the beauty of strength, appreciation and resilience which is often gained through challenging and painful experiences.

It provides a reminder about being mindful of one's wellbeing. Rongoa is a term for traditional Māori medicine, involving the utilisation of native plants to promote healing and replenishment. In this series of work, I carve from ancient heart rimu – seven vessel-like structures, elongated and uplifting, which hold cast bronze plant forms commonly used in Rongoa to assist in healing and wellness.

Being rescued and revived from the Christchurch earthquakes, the rimu itself encompasses strength and resilience, while the creatively interpreted bronze forms pay homage to the nurture of nature.

What inspires your art practice?

The butterfly represents the transformative journey and is a salute to all women who have endured and survived forms of mistreatment.



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
