





Physical Classroom Space

Possible Ideas

- 1. Have an eye—catching bulletin board display encouraging students to ask questions and absorb information.
- 2. The classroom library needs to be visible and well—organized. Think like a bookstore.
- 3. Does your favourite bookstore keep the books in a dark corner and not easily accessible? Or do they make displays at eye level and organize the books in a meaningful way?
