Poetry is a specific literature format that is used to express feelings, emotions and thoughts.

Poetry

- Can be an outlet for feelings, thoughts or anything someone wants to express.
- Can be interpreted in different ways, just like art, dance, or music.

Poetry Elements

Unlike a story, novel or other text, poetry has certain elements such as:

- · Line breaks
- Stanzas
- Rhythm
- Sound Devices

Tone and Mood: Tone is the author's attitude toward the subject Mood is the feeling created within the reader by the poem. The author's attitude, or tone, toward the subject they are writing about can affect how the reader feels, or the second

What is Poetry?

Lesson Overview:

Students will learn about what poetry and poems are.

- 3. Ask students what they learned about poetry from the video. Have them refer to the notes they took in the K-W-L chart.
- 4. Begin the lesson by handing out option 1 or option 2 of the poetry note—taking sheet.
- 5. Open up the Google Slides What is Poetry? slideshow.
- 6. Read each slide out loud to the class. Give students time to take notes.
- 7. After taking notes, have students work with their seat partners to complete the final K-W-L column.
- 8. Then take up the Poetry Notes sheet and the K-W-L chart as a class.


