Jeffie Brewer is a nationally exhibiting artist whose artwork has been displayed in public and private art collections, galleries and museums. Known for his oversized abstract figurative sculptures in bright colors, Jeffie's work is instantly recognizable and highly acclaimed.

Born in Palestine, Texas, Jeffie holds an MFA

in sculpture and metals and an MA in sculpture and painting from Stephen F. Austin State University in Nacogdoches, Texas. He also holds a BFA in drawing, printmaking and jewelry making from Sam Houston State University in Huntsville, Texas. He has been featured on *Texas Country Reporter*, and notable exhibitions have included Color Field at Crystal Bridges Museum of American Art, Bentonville, Ark.; Pop of Color, Tyler Museum of Art, Tyler; Joy Machine, at the Museum of East Texas in Lufkin, and numerous collaborations with the Lubbock Fine Arts Alliance, as well as public art collection acquisitions and gallery representation nationwide. His work has been acquired by museums in Abilene, Corpus Christi and Midland, Texas. He lives and works in Nacogdoches.

# **Q&A:Jeffie Brewer**

#### What is the driving force behind your art process?

The driving force behind my art process over the past 15 years has been a passion for creating a fun, joyful experience that allows people to be distracted for a second, a little "sunshine on your face" moment. Over these years, the focus on public art has allowed me to explore more whimsical and playful aspects of art, making large pieces that invite viewers to engage with on multiple levels, be it a moment or a longer reflection- to start a story or to finish the story.

The core of my art process has remained consistent: commitment to creating works that spark joy, adding a little mystery, clean craftsmanship, and just being funny to look at.

## Your process often start abstract then evolves until a shape is formed. Can you talk a little more about that?

I like to start making marks on paper and see where it goes. Sometimes it appears quickly and sometimes it takes layers and layers to get to the final image.

#### What excites you about making art?

I honestly don't know how to do anything else! I see everything in the light of creativity, beauty, and play. I'm not very excitable. Joyful, yes. I am happiest when I'm figuring things out, searching for the answer.

#### What inspiration do you draw on as you are completing the tasks for your art?

The world around me, I'm easily influenced by music, books, and people. I draw quite a bit and I'll just make marks, kind of from the subconscious, and then play with those shapes until I get a recognizable shape then build from that.

I had a great art teacher who pushed me toward creativity and not just rendering the world around me.

In college, I was fortunate enough to take a class called expressive drawing. The professor — John Daniel — invented this class. Loosely based on the ideas of the surrealists and the abstract expressionist ideas of working from the subconscious John had built a curriculum to help facilitate this way of working. It was an awakening.

Spending time raising my nephew gave me interaction I would have never thought I needed. His vulnerability, fearlessness, and unquenched curiosity were infectious, and made me remember what art was for.

To show the world how to see.

#### Excerpt:


To understand Freemasonry is to devote years of study, deep research and immersion into its communities. Without those experiences, we designed this book to instead be a visual survey of buildings that represent a vital, yet not well-known part of most communities.

Over the past three years, we documented lodge buildings on the road across east and west Texas, from the southern-to-northern Texas coast and everywhere we could stop along the way. We saw the Grand Lodge of Texas and equally grand structures in Dallas, Galveston and Brownsville; a very western design in Clarendon Lodge #700, the historically significant Milam Lodge #2 in Nacogdoches — Texas' second lodge, and lodges along Route 66 in Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma.

Historically significant lodges included are: Dallas Scottish Rite, Milam Lodge #2 (Nacogdoches, Texas); Dawn of Light #79/North Lufkin Lodge (Lufkin, Texas) and Chapman Lodge #2 (Las Vegas, NM).








