SCHOOL PROGRAMS (VIRTUAL AND IN PERSON FIELD TRIPS)

The gallery and museum staff developed a complimentary virtual program for

 teachers that included teaching resources for Indigenous visual arts, history and culture activities to use in the spring.

Gallery and museum staff presented **147** virtual school programs for **3,193** students to communities as far away as Clyde, AB.

AHF staff also recovered homeschool programming in 2021, by facilitating 36

 programs for 236 students, as well as 1 special request in-person clay program at the Little White School.

Indigenous programs for school-wide learning increased this year. Entire

 schools participate in a Métis finger weaving activity lead by Aboriginal Programmer, Celina Loyer. Often, 600+ students took part.

VIRTUAL AND IN-PERSON ART CLASSES & COMMUNITY PROGRAMS

Aside from many art classes being offered virtually again this year, Gallery staff held a special Mixed Media Art and African Culture program as part of Culture Days, with exhibiting artist Diana

 Ohiozebau. This was in partnership with the African and African Descendants Friendship Club of St. Albert, who presented on African fashion and fabrics and demonstrated how to tie a Nigerian head wrap, called a gele.

Sparks, Scouts, Brownies, and Guides groups enjoyed safely participating in activities at the gallery, museum and heritage sites (when the facilities were open) to complete badge requirements.

 Topics include Aboriginal People of Canada, Building Skills and Canadian Symbols. This year a new Gardening badge was offered, made possible with the community garden which opened at Historic River Lots 23 & 24.



The AHF was thrilled to welcome Métis artist, Melissa Jo Belcourt Moses to the team in late 2021 as our Indigenous Visual Arts Programmer, to develop and facilitate new Indigenous programming for 2022.

53 different videos were produced this year by museum staff to regularly connect with the community, especially when the museum's exhibition spaces were closed for the first six months of the year. 

Staff also produced a video highlighting the The Banque d'Hochelaga building's history and created a booklet and timeline for the public to enjoy.

RENTAL & SALES GALLERY & GALLERY SHOP

The Gallery Shop reopened January 19th after closure due to the pandemic. Staff continued to offer curbside pick-up and delivery for

- customers who preferred to shop from the website. 2021 Gallery
 Shop sales exceeded expectations, posting one of its best years for overall sales, supporting more than 50 consignment artists.
- Virtual art consultations and free in-home art installations and delivery were offered for rental and sales clients.

A special art rentals promotion started in July, generously funded by Glenn Walsmley and Lois Love. The campaign included a series

- of social media posts promoting the art rentals program. The most successful post reached 8,153 people, led to 13,402 impressions and 218 clicks to the Gallery's website.
- 7 new artists were added to the Rental & Sales roster this year. The program supports **more than 40** local artists.

Developed by museum staff to showcase the history of music

 in St. Albert. This unique exhibition featured instruments, memorabilia, radio recording equipment, performance clothing and photos which told many stories of local performers and different types of music the community has enjoyed over the years. 1,155 people took in the Rock'N August Exhibition at the museum between July 24 and August 28!

ARCHIVES MANAGEMENT

Archives photographs were requested to be used in various sources such as in the documentary "Discovering Mount deVeber"

 for Nelson Education's social studies student textbook "Exploring Nationalism" and by the City of Edmonton to create new Indigenous Ward names.

The archives staff worked in collaboration with the organizers of the Rock N' August Festival's 25th Anniversary. This led to

 our staff managing the photographic history of the event for the museum's accompanying exhibition and creating an anniversary book.

The archives staff completed the largest digitization of the AHF's audiovisual materials in our history. Thanks to federal

grant funding, we were able to digitize most of our AV materials, including videocassettes, beta tapes, records, audio cassettes and more. We are looking forward to publicly sharing these materials in 2022.

About **1,400** new photos were made available to the public with the completion of processing the **St. Albert Historical Society pictures** donated in 2020. The photos include people, buildings and events

donated in 2020. The photos include people, buildings and events dating back to the late 1800s.

The St. Albert Aerial Photographs project was completed this year, funded in part by the Archives Society of Alberta. These photos depict aerials of St. Albert and surrounding areas, including Sturgeon County and north Edmonton going back to 1954.

We were proud to present at the Archives Society of Alberta's 2021 conference on how our archives staff coped with reopening

 our archives during the pandemic. We shared about the different projects we completed during the pandemic and how we were still able to remain successful while adapting.

52.25% of all archival requests came from outside of St. Albert. It's the second consecutive year this percentage had been over 50%. Before the pandemic, this number had never been higher than 35%.

The first half of 2021 saw the completion of upgrades to the

- museum's textile storage. This included re-organization, new garment covers and supports and updated documentation.
- Several Chevigny family furnishings were moved out of storage to their permanent home in Maison Chevigny.

33 artifacts were accessioned, including items from the Oblates of Mary Immaculate in

Montreal that were originally used on Mission Hill, and Cunningham family pieces that will be used in the Cunningham House in the future.

GRAIN ELEVATORS, HERITAGE SITES & COMMUNITY GARDENS

The spring/summer of 2021 was the first season for the public to enjoy the newly restored homes at the historic River Lots 23 & 24 near the St. Albert Grain Elevator Park.

In 2021 the Dr. Anne Anderson Garden was planted in 2021, created to showcase traditional Indigenous medicinal herbs. This is next to our popular community garden at the river lots where community


members rented out and planted more than **30** plots. **60** gardeners were hard at work preparing the soil and planting their gardens. Garden plots provided a harvest for the St. Albert Food Bank. Giving back to the community is an important part of the work we do at the Heritage Sites.

We were pleased to use grant funding from TD Friends of the Environment Foundation Grant, Whole Kids Foundation

 (garden grant) and the Alberta Museums Association to produce programming at the river lots, to establish the gardening program station and purchase gardening items for programming.

Results from a francophone research project from 2020 were used

 to build programs, events and interpretive programs for the summer of 2021.




