

Message from the Executive Director

I encourage you to note the title of this year's Annual Report. It's quite fitting since, after a few challenging pandemic years, I'm pleased to say that the Arts and Heritage Foundation (AHF) is now poising for growth.

2022 started with uncertainty over Covid-19 continuing, and the AHF operated within the Restrictions Exception Program until February 9. As the year progressed and our visitors started returning, we continued working hard to get more visitors and members back.

We turned to a reputable communications firm for a marketing audit and with their recommendations, implemented a new communications strategy (developed in the fall of 2021) and created a new digital marketing strategy in the fall of this year. We also worked with a developer on a new website (launched in January 2023) that is more visitor focused and allows community members to book and purchase community programs directly from our website.

2022 saw our full slate of exhibitions run as scheduled, and people also started to experience our popular school and community programs again. During 2020 and 2021, with the closures and restrictions, our overall visitation fell by 76% compared to our 3-year pre-covid average; however, our first non-covid year saw a recovery. Although we are not back to our strong number, we are on our way as we navigate the changes that have taken place. Overall in 2022, our visitation was at 63% of our 3-year pre-Covid average (visitation and events at 60%, with school and community programs at 67%). Another way to look at this is that we are below our pre-covid average by only 37%. Our financial results showed this, and we are posting a year-end surplus of \$63,727.

Thanks to the Board of Trustees for trusting our staff when we were navigating our challenges during the pandemic years. Thanks to the staff for working throughout the pandemic and developing new programs and operating methods to put us in a strong position in the future. Thank you to our members and volunteers for returning to our exhibitions, programs and working alongside our staff.

We greatly appreciate all who support us, enabling us to meet our community's arts and heritage needs. It's




ST. ALBERT'S HISTORIC RIVER LOTS + GRAIN ELEVATORS

This was the second summer operating after the restoration of the homes at St. Albert's Historic River Lots (Belcourt House, Cunningham House and La Maison Chevigny) and also the grain elevators. The site was bustling with activity all summer, including visits from the families connected to our heritage buildings. The sites hosted guests from across the globe, with visitors as far away as Australia, France, Germany and the Czech Republic.

HIGHLIGHTS:

- From June through September, River Lot 24 hosted *Lii Buflo: A Métis Way of Life*. This travelling exhibit developed in collaboration with **Parks Canada Agency (Elk Island National Park) AND The Arts and Heritage Foundation of St. Albert, working with an advisory committee, Métis Connections Advisory Committee.**
- A film crew took over Cunningham House for a week in July to shoot a short film. Suitable tells the story of the director's grandmother and her journey from Nunavut to Edmonton in the 1930s, where she struggled to fit into a new world.
 - The Grain Elevators and River Lots were also featured in a short film promoting St. Albert as a winter holiday film location.





Heritage Sites

ST. ALBERT'S HISTORIC RIVER LOTS + GRAIN ELEVATORS

- A new composter was built at the Community Garden, and root vegetables were grown and donated to the St. Albert Food Bank. Thirty-six garden plots were planted and cared for by approximately 50 gardeners. A variety of seeds were also donated to the St. Albert Public Library Seed Library.
- During Alberta Culture Days at the Dr. Anne Anderson Memorial Herb Garden, Indigenous Programmer Celina Loyer led sessions on medicinal Métis plants where guests toured the garden and tasted teas from medicinal plants our staff harvested.
- Walking tours returned this year once again on Thursday evenings over the summer to showcase St. Albert's Indigenous History, Mission Hill, and the histories of downtown St. Albert and the Sturgeon River.





Special Events

GALLERY, MUSEUM AND HERITAGE SITES

Our facilities in 2022 were once again popular places for people to either rent for special events or to take in celebrations hosted by our staff.

HIGHLIGHTS:

- The official launch of the travelling exhibit, Lii Buflo: A Métis Way of Life, was held at River Lot 24 on June 18. Representatives from the City of St. Albert, the Government of Canada, and the Métis Advisory Committee joined our board members and staff in this celebration, including Métis jigging, food and tours of the heritage homes.
- We hosted a food truck event at the grain elevator site on Father's Day. Many people were eager to enjoy local food while touring the elevators and historic homes.
- Six wedding ceremonies were held at the grain elevator site during the summer.

Special Events

GALLERY, MUSEUM AND HERITAGE SITES

- Our facilities are well-known as great places to rent for events. This year the gallery was the venue for various events, including a Latin Romantic Music Night with the St. Albert Latin Cultural Association and a book launch by local author Jennifer Lavallee. The gallery also hosted three local jewellery designers for a show and sale in the fall, including Concept Jewelry Design, Kerri Jarrett and Bejeweled.
- In the summer, the gallery launched our first Public Art Walking Tours series. With tours running in June, July and August, participants learned more about the public art in St. Albert's downtown area.
- The gallery and museum welcomed more than 1,000 visitors for Snowflake Festival in the winter, offering free drop-in activities for all ages.
- 2022 was our 24th year presenting programs at the gallery and museum for the St. Albert International Children's Festival in the spring, with more than 400 children taking part.

Rental + Sales **Gallery/Gift Shops**

GALLERY, MUSEUM AND HERITAGE SITES

The online shopping experience for our customers expanded this year for the gallery and museum's gift shops. The gallery's Rental + Sales Gallery also expanded in 2022.

HIGHLIGHTS:

- Online shopping sales for both gift shops started this year through our website via Shopify. This led to locally produced products being ordered and shipped to other communities throughout North America.
- The Rental + Sales Gallery diversified the artists represented by adding works from Oksana Zhelisko, Elsa Robinson, Lonigan Gilbert, Eunju Park and Rhonda Lund to the collection.
- Our retail areas were able to support local artists, with 38 fine art sales contributing nearly \$30,000 to local artists. The Gallery Shop also contributed over \$20,000 in artist commissions to local makers and artisans.



Programming

EDUCATION PROGRAMS


The gallery, museum, Little White School, Historic River Lots + Grain Elevators, and the Father Lacombe Provincial Historic Site provided exceptional curriculum-based education programs in French and English for eager students in 2022.

HIGHLIGHTS:

- This marked the first year providing educational programs at St. Albert's Historic River Lots. The new Learning from the Land program gave students from kindergarten to grade 12 opportunities to learn about sharing the land, animals, place names and sustainable gardening/harvesting.
- The gallery hired five new instructors, including two from the St. Albert Potters' Guild, to provide students with exceptional pottery knowledge and help grow and strengthen our community partnerships.
- A new Private Homeschool Art Series began in September. Our programmers plan to continue on a quarterly basis with up to 20 students.

Programming EDUCATION PROGRAMS

• 2022 saw the return of field trips at St. Albert's Grain Elevators. Nearly 1000 students passed through to learn about St. Albert's Métis, Francophone and agricultural histories through programs such as "Landmarks", "Communities that Grow," and "Washed Up: Traders, Trappers and Coureurs Des Bois."

Programming

COMMUNITY PROGRAMS

Community Programs in 2022 saw an increase in participants after a few challenging years of providing programs during changing provincial health measures.

HIGHLIGHTS:

- We piloted a handful of new community programs, including:
 - We are all Treaty People: Stitch your own Treaty 6 Needlework Sampler, where participants explored their own treaty relationship through craft and intimate conversations.
 - Prairies + Pencils: An Adult Intro to Sketching where participants used the heritage buildings as their classroom and inspiration.
 - Two fall beading classes are held at the museum to mark Orange Shirt Day and Remembrance Day.
- Museum programmers lead professional development programs for school staff, industry professionals and government groups, such as; blanket exercises, historical walking tours, Métis finger weaving and presentations on The Michel Band.

Programming

COMMUNITY PROGRAMS

- We sold out our Spring Break Art Camp four-day morning program and successfully ran our first four-day Arts and Heritage Camp at both the gallery and heritage sites.
- Gallery staff provided community programs that were captivating and popular, including Winter Wood Burned Ornaments with guest instructor Crystal Driedger. This class allowed participants to burn and paint their own holiday ornament.

Archives + Collections

MUSÉE HÉRITAGE MUSEUM

In 2022 the museum received a wide variety of items from generous donors in the region. Our Bruin Inn exhibition inspired some gifts of memorabilia from the storied hotel. We were also given several children's items from the mid-20th century. Two of our donations went straight into the "A Woman's Place" exhibition, a hand-made crib and a framed confirmation certificate.

HIGHLIGHTS:

- Tour photographs were requested to be used in various sources (for both personal and professional use), such as for presentations given by the National Centre for Truth and Reconciliation, in various television news broadcasts regarding residential schools and for an in-depth article, "Wheeled Steel," about the 1st Canadian Machine Gun Brigade in the October 2022 edition of Britain at War magazine published in England: https://archives.museeheritage.ca/raymond-brutinel-fonds
- The archives processed nearly 300 photographs from Dorothy (née Bellerose) Chartrand, a member of one of the prominent Métis families of St. Albert and the area.

Archives + Collections

MUSÉE HÉRITAGE MUSEUM

• Thirty-two archival and 22 artifact donations were accessioned (69 total objects). Some significant donations came from our patrons who visited our Bruin Inn exhibition, who then gave us items they had related to the Bruin Inn. Other items like mugs, chairs, dolls, knitted pennants, framed portraits and paintings will be added to our Chevigny family collection.

• The archives worked on a special project where we processed photographs taken at the memorials that went up at the St. Albert Healing Garden when the graves at the Kamloops Residential School came to light in 2021.

• Our archives department was proud to present an archival research workshop for members of the Métis Settlements of Alberta about how to approach archival research across Canada.

Marketing + Communications

The Marketing + Communications department focused 2022 on planning for the Foundation's future, which will be poised for growth. A respected local communications firm was hired to audit the Foundation's general marketing and communications initiatives and develop a comprehensive communications plan to help staff better fulfill the Board's *Strategic Plan Pillar 2 Engage our Community*. In late 2022, the firm also completed a separate audit specifically focusing on digital marketing initiatives.

HIGHLIGHTS:

- Based on recommendations from the overall communications/marketing audit completed at the end of 2021, staff planned and executed an extremely successful marketing plan to promote the opening of the heritage sites in the summer of 2022.
 An increase in regular social media posts led to a significant jump in activity on the Foundation's platforms in June, July, August and September.
- Staff spent the last few months of this year developing a new website to make it easier for people to plan their experiences at our facilities and have an easier online shopping and program booking experience. The new website is scheduled to launch in January of 2023.
- Plans to greatly enhance the Foundation's overall social media activity are also planned for early in 2023.

Volunteers

Our wonderful volunteers contributed 2,510 hours of support within all areas in 2022, and we are very grateful for their continued support.

HIGHLIGHTS:

- More than 300 volunteer hours were donated to assist gallery staff with events such as ArtWalk and Snowflake Festival. They also helped with material prep for programs, planting a new sensory garden behind the gallery building, painting and facility maintenance.
- At the grain elevator site, volunteers helped with vehicle maintenance (working on the tractors and a Model T vehicle). They provided general help with painting, regularly cleaning up, moving items and weeding the shrub beds.
- The St. Albert Weed Warriors hosted an August weed-pulling event at the Community Gardens. Volunteers worked hard to remove invasive plants from our flower beds while engaging with St. Albert's history.






