The title of this year's Report to the Community is quite fitting, as I am pleased to share with you that the Arts and Heritage Foundation (AHF) is successfully rebounding! (in 2022 while coming out of the pandemic, our report was titled Poised for Growth).

We welcomed over 10,000 more visitors in comparison to 2022. The sector is still recovering from the pandemic, and while we are still below our pre-pandemic visitation, we are pleased to announce that we are now at 77% of our pre-COVID average (compared to 63% in 2022).

We are continuing to adapt and find new ways to bring arts and heritage experiences to the community.

In January, we launched our new visitor-focused website. It showcases the wide range of experiences that we offer from exhibitions, school and community art + history programs, gift shops, art rental and sales and our archives and collections. In conjunction with her exhibition ᑭᓂᓐᑎᓐ ᑭᓐᑭᓐᑭᓐ *mâmitonêyihcikan kotâwîw my mind digs in the soil like a turtle*, artist Heather Shillinglaw and local Elders led workshops sharing their stories and the story of Turtle Island. Inspired By Heather's artwork, more than 200 students and community members created their turtle island with mixed media and fibre art techniques for ᑭᓂᓐᑎᓐ ᑭᓐᑭᓐᑭᓐ *Ministik Mihkinâhk Turtle Island* in the vault exhibition space. A celebration opening event on November 4 featured a smudge and blessing by Elder Lynn Lush, poetry and music by Sissy Thiessen Kootenayoo of Wase Saba Experiences and catering by Pei Pei Chei Ow. Heritage Sites

ST. ALBERT'S HISTORIC RIVER LOTS + GRAIN ELEVATORS

St. Albert's Historic River Lots and Grain Elevators along Meadowview Drive tell the stories of Métis and French-Canadian settlement within the Sturgeon River Valley and the history of early Alberta grain transport. The Community Garden and the Dr. Anne Anderson Memorial Garden surround the restored La Maison Chevigny, Cunningham House, Belcourt House and Brousseau Granary. Nearby are the 1906 Brackman-Ker Grain Elevator, the 1929 Alberta Wheat Pool Grain Elevator and a replica train station, that acts as our visitor centre.

HIGHLIGHTS:

- More than 1,500 guests toured our historic buildings during the 2023 operating season, and nearly 2,500 students participated in year-round field trips.
- We piloted exciting new community programs that complement the heritage sites, including a series of fibre arts workshops facilitated by Kalea Turner-Beckett, a pickling class, and various onsite art programs with gallery staff.
- We hosted summer drop-in programs for children and adults inside the Train Station; our Wednesday evening Maker's Meet-Up and Thursday Crafternoons!
- Close to 40 gardeners enjoyed plots in our Community Garden. Gardeners donated 192 lbs of potatoes, carrots, beets and beans to the St. Albert Food Bank.



Heritage Sites

ST. ALBERT'S HISTORIC RIVER LOTS + GRAIN ELEVATORS

- In August, the St. Albert Weed Warriors hosted an onsite noxious weeds-pulling event, and in September, we piloted a gardening workshop with local gardening expert Charles Schroder.
- We also shared gardening space with local organizations such as the St. Albert Seed Library, OutLoud St. Albert and the St. Albert-Sturgeon County Métis Local.
- Museum and heritage staff participated in the REACH Program 2023, a program by Les Femmes Michif Otipemisiwak / Women of the Métis Nation to provide mentorship opportunities for young Métis women.

Special Highlight: CONNECTING WITH THE COMMUNITY:

St. Albert's Historic River Lots hosted an archeological field school by the University of Alberta's Institute of Prairie and Indigenous Archeology (IPIA) in May and June. Dr. Kisha Supernant, Director of the IPIA, asked to hold the field school onsite because she wanted her students to explore a Métis archaeological footprint. As a historic Métis settlement, St. Albert and Historic River Lots 23 and 24 provided the perfect opportunity!

The field school collaborated with local Knowledge Keepers Celina and Darrell Loyer, the St. Albert-Sturgeon County Métis Local, the City of St. Albert, Métis community members and our Foundation.



Heritage Sites

ST. ALBERT'S HISTORIC RIVER LOTS + GRAIN ELEVATORS

The field school provided unique learning opportunities for post-secondary students, local elementary students and the public. Five local schools participated in our exclusive Hidden Histories program, where students had the chance to learn about archaeology with Dr. Kisha Supernant and explore the excavation units alongside field school students.

- *Métis Trash Talking: An Archaeological Footprint in St. Albert* in June, where participants toured the excavation units and saw the belongings (artifacts) unearthed during the field school.
- Follow-up Métis Trash Talking session at the Arden Theatre in November, to showcase what was discovered, and the overall significance of the field school.

GALLERY, MUSEUM AND HERITAGE SITES

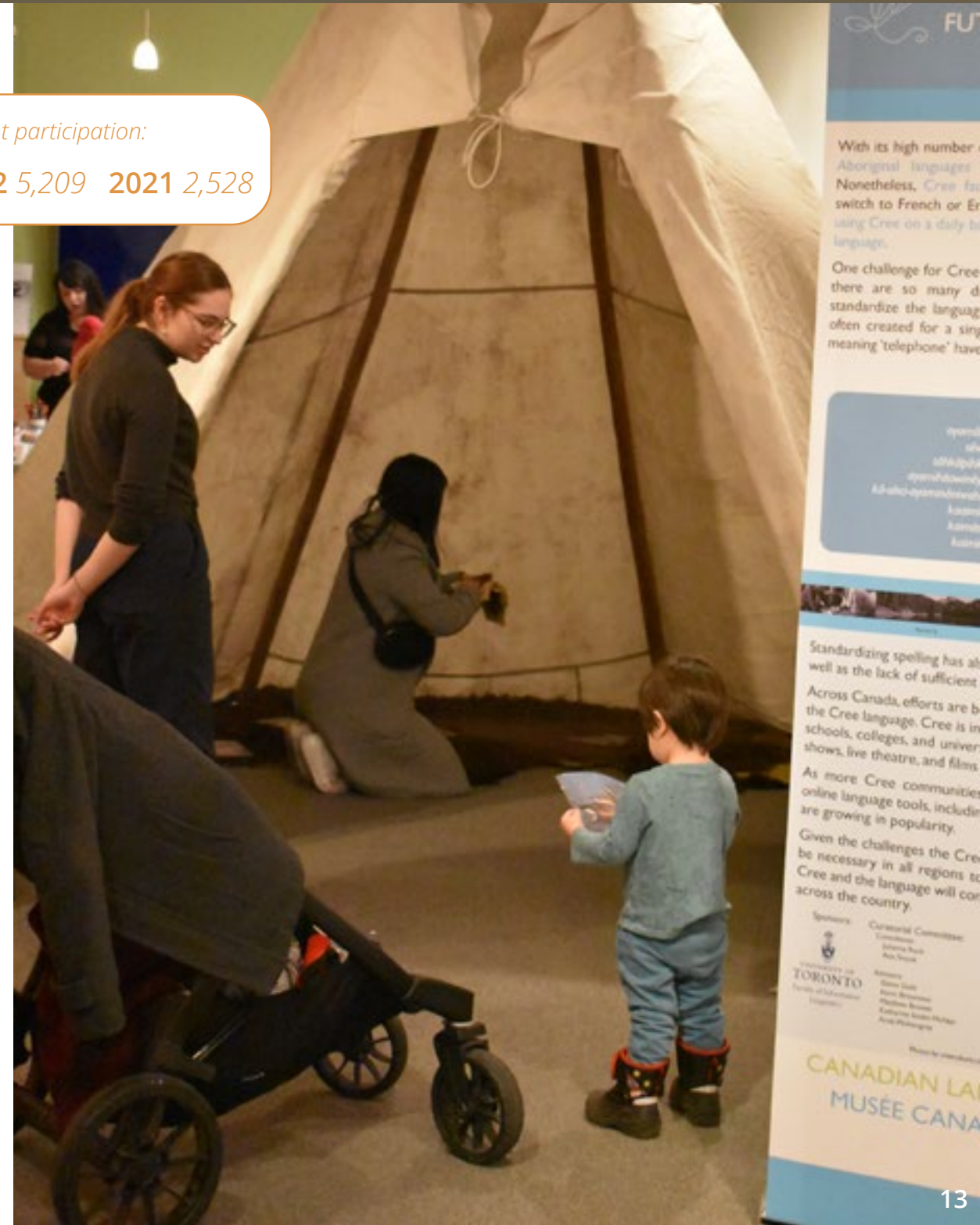
Special event participation:

In 2023, our facilities were once again popular places for people to rent for special events or to attend celebrations hosted by our staff.

HIGHLIGHTS:

- The Gallery hosted a talk with Dr. Adriana Davies on *Bootlegging, Murder and the End of Prohibition in Alberta* as part of the Doors Open Historic Edmonton Festival.
- The Foundation hosted several events in partnership with the City of St. Albert as part of the Tamarack Institute's Conference on asset-based community development. Attendees took part in walking tours highlighting local arts and history and a closing event hosted at the Gallery.
- ArtWalk brought 500 visitors to the Gallery and Museum over three nights. They visited the exhibitions and participated in special activities, including a sidewalk chalk display on our front steps.
- During the International Children's Festival, more than 300 children enjoyed the *Found Object Fun* activity at the Gallery, creating found object sculptures inspired by the exhibition *Line and Form*. In total, 1,362 children took part in programs at the Museum. Many children also witnessed a butterfly release at the Museum as part of the *On the Trail of the Monarch Butterfly* exhibition.



Special Events

GALLERY, MUSEUM AND HERITAGE SITES

- During St Albert's Snowflake Festival, the Gallery and Museum welcomed more than 1,000 visitors.
- We celebrated the Foundation's 25th Anniversary with a Community Picnic in August at the Historic River Lots and Grain Elevators site.
- Four wedding ceremonies were held in front of our historic grain elevators.
- The Museum held a special Family Fun Day in December, during which people could come in from the cold and enjoy fun family-based activities while touring the exhibitions.

Total attendance within all of attractions run by AHF in 2023 = 61,344, whether it be a general visit, special event, community program or school program (50,809 in 2022)



Rental + Sales Gallery/Gift Shops

GALLERY, MUSEUM AND HERITAGE SITES

The Rental and Sales Gallery, the Gallery Shop and the Museum Shop showcase the incredible breadth of talent in the St. Albert and Edmonton regions.

HIGHLIGHTS:

- New promotions, including the Fall Book Sale and the Holiday Gift Guide in the Gallery and Museum gift shops, increased sales and awareness.
- Overall, the Gallery and Museum's gift shops represent over 80 artists and artisans who create various handmade, designed and crafted products. They feature jewelry, pottery, textiles, stained glass, coffee, tea, books, toys, chocolate and more.
- The Rental and Sales Gallery added three new artists – Karen Blanchet, Roger Garcia and Rayma Peterson.

Programming

EDUCATION PROGRAMS

The Gallery, Museum, Little White School, Historic River Lots + Grain Elevators and the Father Lacombe Provincial Historic Site provided exceptional curriculum-based education programs in French and English for eager students in 2023. We reached almost 6,000 more students than in 2022 (see Education Program Participation chart on next page).

HIGHLIGHTS:

- Indigenous Visual Arts Programmer Melissa Jo Belcourt Moses implemented new Indigenous visual art programs, including Parfleche Bags and Faux Caribou Hair Tufting.
- Educational programming attendance returned to 2019 pre-COVID studio and in-school booking levels while fewer virtual programs were held.

Programming

COMMUNITY PROGRAMS

During this rebound year, interest in our community art experiences, and craft and history programs at the Museum and heritage sites soared. We saw an increase of more than 1,000 registrations in 2023!

HIGHLIGHTS:

- The Museum programmers held several beading workshops this year. These included community favourites like the Orange Shirt Day pin and beaded poppy pin. Also, new workshops include making a beaded flower pin, the flower keychain and the snowflake pin.
- Our heritage sites' programmers partnered with local gardening expert Charles Schroder to provide the public with seminars at the Historic River Lots that focus on building healthy garden soil and successfully starting plants from seeds.
- The We Are All Treaty People: Stitch Your Own Treaty 6 Needlework Sampler community program expanded this year. A new component of the program was developed for teachers to also gain a better understanding of treaties and land based learning.

Programming

COMMUNITY PROGRAMS

Community program participation:

2023 9,961

- New Gallery programs included Clay Club, Kids Art Lab, Introduction to Needle-Felting, Clay Garden Gnomes, Clay Ornaments and Express Yourself—Pride at the Art Gallery of St. Albert, which was offered in collaboration with OutLoud St. Albert.
- Gallery staff facilitated 34 private art classes in 2023, including 10 of our popular Art Birthday Party events. Several of our private art classes were for local Embers and Guides groups who loved learning new art-making techniques such as yarn painting and linoleum printmaking. Other private art classes offered groups of co-workers, families or friends time to enjoy their creative sides and spend time together while learning from a local artist!

Archives

HIGHLIGHTS:

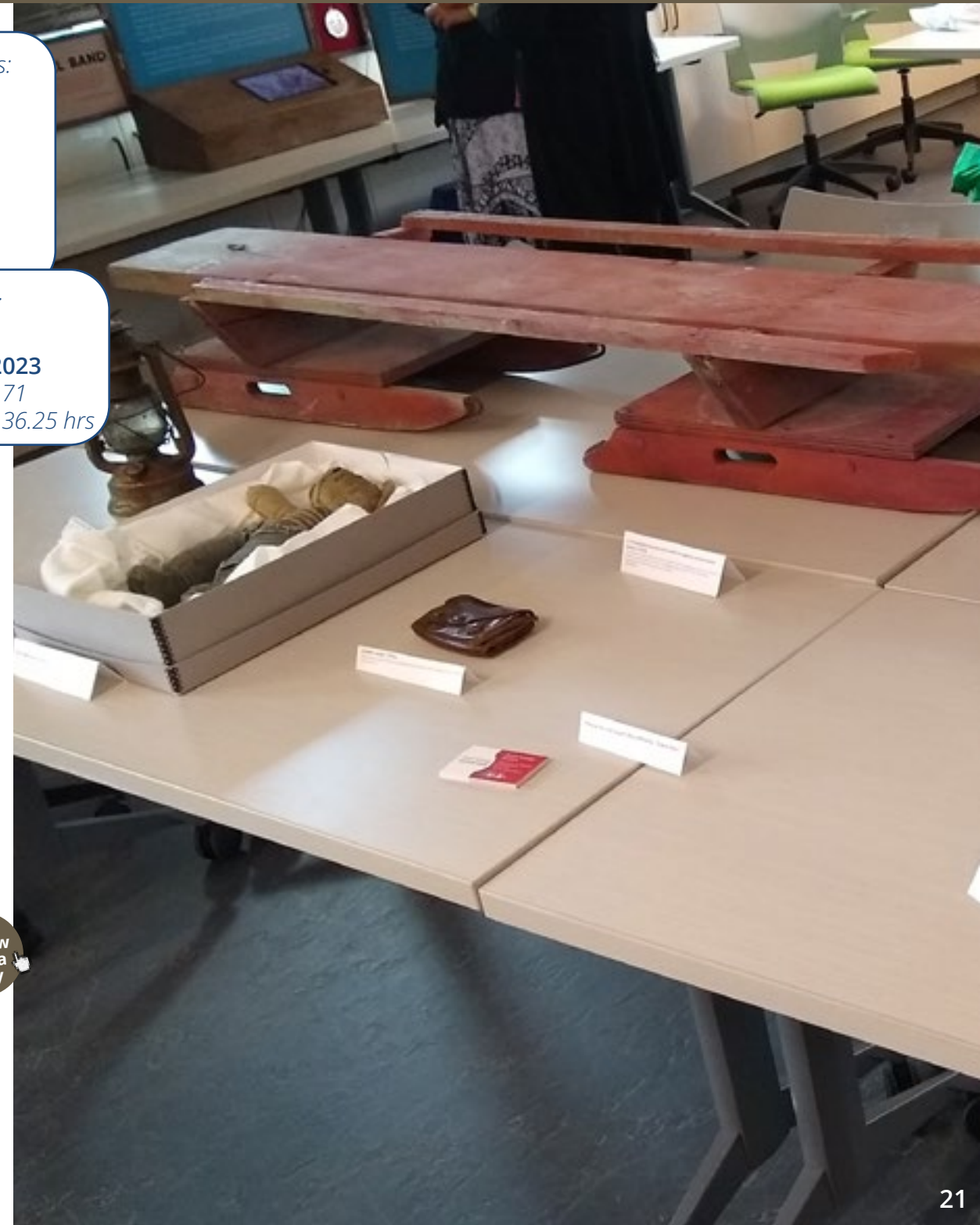
- The archives were re-accredited this year by the Archives Society of Alberta (ASA). We will now be an ASA institutional member through 2028–29.
- Our archives staff presented at the ASA 2023 Biennial Conference in Edmonton about user research experience regarding residential schools at our archives.
- Our collections staff presented at the Callihoo and Cunningham family reunions to share some historic family objects and archival materials. They also attended the Michel Callihoo Nation Society meetings to present the Michel Band tabletop exhibit and the Treaty 6 Medal.
- Some of our photographs this year were requested to be used in various sources, such as reports for the Missing Children and Unmarked Graves project, Reconciliation Garden at the Alberta Legislature grounds, Telus World of Science Edmonton programming and an educational video for Beaver Hills Biosphere looking at the life of Ketchamoot.
- The archives processed the John Beedle fonds this year, which are more than 700 photographs from the renowned horticulturalist and long-time City of St. Albert parks planner. Volunteers completed this project over five years.
