SYNOPSIS

ACTIVITIES

BEFORE READING

Questions to ask:

- 1. What do you think this story might be about?
- Can you point out the following features of the book?
 (Spine, title, illustration, front page, back page, blurb, end papers).



DURING READING

Recognising rhyming words - Ask students to buzz like a fly when they notice the rhyming words on a selected page. (ACELA1439) (ACELT1585)

Recognising alliteration - Ask students to buzz like a mozzie when they notice any alliteration used in the story. (ACELA1439) (ACELT1585)

Clap the rhythm - On a selected page, students clap their hands along to the beat of the words. (ACELT1585)

Questions to ask:

- 1. What do you think will happen next?
- 2. How do you think Fuzz and Cozzie will solve their problem?
- 3. Have you ever been to a BBQ?
- 4. What do you know about Flies and Mozzies?
- Can you make any connections to the story so far? (ACELT1575) (ACELY1646) (ACELT1582) (ACPPS020) (ACPPS004)

AFTER READING

Questions to ask:

- 1. What did you enjoy most about the story?
- 2. Would you ever be like Fuzz or Cozzie? Why or why not?
- 3. What is another solution that you could think of that would solve their problem?
- 4. Can you think of an alternative ending? (ACELY1646) (ACELT1581)

SUGGESTED ACTIVITIES:

1. Cloze passages: Choose a section of text and omit words. Students to fill in the blanks.

2. Character Profile: Students draw the characters in the story and write their name underneath each picture.

3. Word Search: Create a word search using words from the text.

4. Retell Activities:

a. Create a table with the following headings: <u>Setting (Where?)</u> - <u>Characters (Who?)</u> - <u>Problem (What?)</u> - <u>1. In the beginning</u> - <u>2. Next</u> - <u>3. Then</u> - <u>4. Finally</u> - <u>5. Solution</u> - <u>6. Lastly</u>. Ask students to write or draw the order of events in the story.

b. Write short sentences which retell the story and jumble them up. Ask students to put them in the correct order.

5. Acrostic Poem: Students choose a character from the story and write an acrostic poem. Curriculum Links: (ACELY1651) (ACAMAM056)

6. Write a Blurb: Explore the existing blurb on the back cover. Explain the purpose of the blurb to the students and ask them to create their own blurb. Curriculum Links: (ACELY1651) (ACELA1586)

7. DIY Cork Hat: Create your own hat to keep the Flies and Mozzies away! Curriculum Links: (ACELT1783) (ACAMAM054) (ACAMAM056) (ACAVAM108) (ACTDEP007) (ACELA1586)

8. Conflict & Resolution: Students can investigate ways to recognise conflicts and how to resolve them. Curriculum Links: (ACELT1578) (ACPPS006) (ACPPS004)

9. Mozzies Vs Flies: Students can form two teams named Mozzies and Flies and investigate some of the features of each of these annoying insects. Why do we have Flies and Mozzies? Students could look at both the good points and bad points of these pesky creatures. Each team could create a PMI (Plus, Minus, Interesting) poster and then have a debate about which they think is best - Mozzies or Flies. 10. BBQ Activities: Students create their own BBQ area in the classroom for imaginative play time and story telling. The class could even have a real BBQ, remembering to wear their cork hats! 

DIY Cork Hat

Create your own hat to keep the Flies and Mozzies away!

An old broad brimmed hat (fabric or straw) Fishing line or string 6-8 Corks Scissors Scalpel Sharp needle Optional - drill and small drill bit

Materials



Steps

Measure and cut a 15cm length of string for each of the corks you have collected. Ask an adult to help make a small incision at the end of each cork with the scalpel.

Ask an adult to help pierce holes in the fabric or straw hat at intervals around the edge of the hat, with scissors or a sharp needle.

Thread the string through the hole in the hat and tie a knot. Then wrap the string around the cork and feed through the small slit made in the end. This will help to secure the string. Tie another knot to secure the cork and Bob's your uncle! Optional: You can drill a hole through each cork if you have the resources.
