Let The Earth Breathe: Here are a few pictures of what's currently blooming in our gardens.

Shooting Star (Dodecatheon Meadia), Gray-headed coneflower (Ratibida pinnata), Wild Ginger, (Asarum canadense), Beebalm, (Monarda didyma.)

Shooting Star is an early bird and very welcome in the spring. It's already come and gone! I really like the way Gray-headed coneflower matures from the bottom up and in a circular pattern; it has a citrus scent when it goes to seed. Beebalm is like catnip for bees, and wild ginger lays its blossom on the ground so the ants that pollinate the plant have access. Wild Ginger is another early bird. The blossoms are gone, but the plant remains.
