LK—I don't know of any IRON MAN or WAR MACHINE video games in the works, although with the cartoon coming out later this year, I wouldn't be surprised to see an IM game happen.


② Do you keep tabs on the goingson of other armored heroes produced by the competition? And do you ever check comic book distributor sales stats to see how the books you write stack up to all the competition out there?

LK—Yeah, I try to keep an eye on the various other armored heroes from other companies, if only so that I don't end up doing something they've already done. I like HARDWARE a lot.



❸ I was happy—yes, happy—to see the WAR Machine armor's weapons systems sustain considerable damage in WAR Machine #3. So does this mean that the armor will be receiving a major re-fit in the new future, and, if so, what will it consist of?

LK—No armor re-fit for War Machine in the immediate future, I'm afraid; I tried to talk Nel Yomtov into doing one around #12, following the resolution of Rhodes' "how do I get this thing fixed" subplot, but he's of the opinion that I've gone too nuts with Iron Man redesigns over the past couple years, and doesn't want to do the



same thing with WM. Sorry.

• What other Iron Man related projects do you and Scott Benson have cooked up? Please tell us a little about Scott as a cohort and cowriter.

LK—Let's see, Scott and I will continue to co-write WAR MACHINE for the foreseeable future. Scott doesn't have any direct connection to IRON MAN, other than providing me with

good advice on occasion, and the occasional piece like his Stark Enterprises guide in [IM] #300. Scott's a swell guy, he and I've been friends for almost ten years now; we were roommates back when I first moved to NYC, eventually drifted apart when we both got married, and then met up again after we both had gotten divorced, and now we're roommates again, doing the Felix and Oscar thing. Writing-wise, we both

know what the other has in mind for the book so well that frequently neither of us remembers who came up with any particular plot point or line of dialogue. We're a well-oiled machine!

What's this about an Iron Man graphic novel you mentioned in your column in Advanced Iron #4? Was the Werewolf by Night limited series you were working on ever published?

LK-That IRON MAN graphic novel has been shelved indefinitely, now that Marvel is no longer producing graphic novels. It's written. though, and maybe someday it'll see the light of day, possibly in a different format. That WEREWÖLF BY NIGHT mini-series I was supposed to do is long dead. I'm afraid, thanks to the falling out I had with the Midnight Sons office (which is now the "custodian" of the character) after my absence was requested from MORBIUS.

6 How much time do you spend researching a book or series before you begin writing it? For example, before you began writing Iron Man, how long did you research the book's background and what did you use for resource materials? And to take the question one step further, how did you create the new Ghost Rider 2099 character and book concept with an established 2099 Universe?

LK—There's no simple answer to this one: where IRON MAN is concerned, I'd read the book since, ohhhh. #51 or so, and I'd always liked the character. When I first had an opportunity to pitch for taking over the book, I went back and re-read my collection, looking for story possibilities (like bringing back Ultimo), and trying to get a grasp of potentials that hadn't really been explored (like the fact that almost nobody had done anything showing us Stark's

childhood). As for GR 99, the concept for that largely grew out of my initial desire to not have any connection whatsoever to either the present-day Ghost Rider or any supernatural elements at all. I wanted to develop the idea of future technology filling, in a sense, the void left behind by the absence of mysticism and magic, and the rest kind of just wrote itself.

How about a Kaminski roster of books you've worked on? Here, I'll lead it



off: Iron Man, WAR Machine, Morbius, Hellstorm, Dr. Strange. Slapstick (a character you and Jim Fry III co-created), DC's Showcase '94 #6 (an Atom story), She-Hulk, Ghost Rider 2099, Werewolf by Night (see #5 above), What If? #'s 55-56 (The Avengers lose Operation: Galactic Storm), recent issues of Marvel Comics Presents (a WAR Machine series). Namor #41 (with WAR Machine), and, finally, the 25page story "Molecular

Psychology" that appeared in the recently released *FF Annual* #27.

LK—Yug. I've done a lot of piece work on various Marvel titles over the years, a lot of which I'd just as soon nobody remembered, like my issue of TRANSFORMERS. Of the stuff I can still look at without cringing, there were some FANTASTIC FOUR ANNUAL back-ups I did for Ralph Macchio, an FF fill in that came in around #351 or so, various WEREWOLF stories in MARVEL

PRESENTS, a couple of back-ups in X-MEN annuals a few years back, and three issues of AVENGERS, with the Avengers vs. the Grim Reaper.

Why, in your opinion, doesn't Marvel list the names of a comic's creative team on the book's cover, a la DC?

LK—Marvel doesn't list the creators on the cover of the books for the simple reason that it's official Marvel policy that "the characters are what sell the books, not the creators".

Will H.O.M.E.R. ever get an issue of *Iron Man* devoted just to him?

LK—I'd love to devote an issue to H.O.M.E.R., we'll have to see if the opportunity presents itself.

• How's Tom Morgan to work with and can you get us an advanced look at the Iron Man "terminator" prior to its scheduled debut in *Iron Man* #308?

LK-So far, Tom Morgan's

been great to work with, and I hope to see him stay on the book for a nice long time. Sorry, I don't have any shots of the "terminator" IM on hand.

And now these additional tidbits from Len....

Len DOES NOT have red hair; instead, it's "dirty blond."

Peter Gross will be illustrating *Ghost Rider 2099* #4. Mark Buckingham will pencil and ink #5. Beginning with issue #6, Kyle Hotz will become the regular artist on the title.

As much as I like seeing the return of the Mandarin, Stark's greatest nemesis, I still can't get rid of this intense craving I have for a battle royal between Iron Man and Dr. Doom! Whenever they met in the past, it was usually part of some time continuum screw-up, and they were forced to work together after having only a very minor quarrel. We've waited 30 years to see a no-holds-barred, knock-down, drag-out, gut-wrenching fight between these two armored giants. Why has it not happened? Maybe... possibly... could it be that Iron Man just might lose such a fight... and lose it bad?! I hope not, but you just can't tell when it involves a serious battle with Dr. Doom! I hear that Len Kaminski has plans for a Dr. Doom storyline, and just needs to get approval from the Fantastic Four editor first. I sure hope it goes through soon... what do you think?

Iron Man In The Near Future: "Iron Man Cartoon"

If you don't own a copy of Marvel Age #140 (the FINAL issue of that title), and you care about the upcoming Iron Man cartoon in the slightest bit, you must go out and get it now! Inside, it shows artwork, from the cartoon of course, of Tony Stark, the Mandarin's control room on his space ship, Fin Fang Foom, the main Iron Man armor, and Stark's vast, indescribable, totally futuristic armory that must be seen to be believed! ----- This issue gives all of the inside scoop on both halves of the Marvel Action Hour, pictures from both, along with cast information! Robert Hayes (of the movie, Airplane) will do the honors of Stark's voice! James Avery (who plays Uncle Phil on The Fresh Prince of Bel-Air) performs the deep voice of Rhodey/War Machine! [Voices for the Fantastic Four cartoon include Brian Austin Green as Johnny Storm, and Stan Lee's wife as Miss Forbes] The Iron Man cartoon is also going to have a lot of classical music scores to give it "added muscle." The cartoon will basically stick to the continuity we all know and love. However, the cartoon's directors did change quite a bit in terms of how Stark suits up. His armory is shown as an infinitely deep and infinitely high tube lined with levels upon levels of various armored suits (some, the likes of which we have never seen before). The art for this backdrop is curved, almost as if you're looking at a picture taken with a "fish-eye lens." The viewer is standing in the middle and, because of the "fish-eye" effect, you can see both up and down the armory in the same view! Does this sound confusing? Pick up Marvel Age #140 and it won't be.

Tony will tell his computer (which looks like a huge beam of light in the center of the armory) what he needs on his armor for the mission, and he will be asked to step in the light. A platform will raise him up, level by level, and computer morphing techniques in the cartoon will show various pieces from all of the suits of armor around him attaching themselves to his suit. Finally, "he'll blast off straight into the light and out of a dome at the top of the armory." Sound cool? Well, one thing's for sure, it definitely is... different. I don't know... I might get to like the whole deal. We can rest assured, however, that our precious comic book version won't change a bit. If you're upset by this new way of doing things, just remember the fact that it might get stale having an Iron Man comic, cartoon, and cartoon adaptation that are all exactly the same. At least this way, we Iron Fans won't have to fall into the classic "Spider-Man Fan Syndrome" of having over eight different titles available that all have the potential to be exactly the same, or very close to it. ---- By the way, I said that this is the last issue of Marvel Age. It will be replaced with specific, monthly collectors' specials. The first of which is due sometime in August (spotlighting the X-books), and the second is due in September, and spotlights Iron Man and Force Works!!!! Wow! Iron Man is actually getting second place recognition to the X-books?! Someone capture the moment, I want to live in it forever!!! ----- Marvel Age #140 also briefly mentions the Iron Man toy line following the cartoon: "The attachment-heavy Shell-head figure is already being touted as a 'Transformer for the new millennium.'" ----- Speaking of the Iron Man cartoon, it looks like the original rumors of the armor having a mouth slit were false! The picture shown (in addition to the Operation: Galactic Storm Space Armor) looks exactly like the current suit, except the shoulder armor pieces are way too cool looking! They have serrated edges, sort of like Daredevil's new armor. That's one detail that I believe the comic should steal from the cartoon!

Well, I've said enough. I do hope you enjoy this new column and I hope it has revealed some information you didn't already know. I also hope that I haven't gotten you so hyped up over the cartoon, toy line, and Marvel Age #140 that you've forgotten about my request earlier in this column.... You know, the one about writing in... I believe I mentioned some contest too, if I'm not mistaken.
