

At the time in Scottish history when "Loch Lomond" was a new nation (which united Scotland, England, and Wales) had already been formed. But the Highlanders had their own king who wanted to rule. It is this same battle that indirectly gives rise to this folksong. After the battle, many Scottish soldiers were imprisoned within England's Carlisle Castle, near the town of Carlisle. According to Celtic legend if someone dies in prison, his spirit will travel to his homeland by "the low road" - the route for the souls of the dead. In the song, the soldier will take the "high road" over the mountains.

"Loch Lomond" tells the story of two soldiers who were to be executed, while the other was to be set free. And, his spirit will travel to his homeland by "the low road" - the route for the souls of the dead. In the song, the soldier will take the "high road" over the mountains.

The song is from the point of view of a condemned man who will be executed: When he sings, "ye'll tak' the high road and I'll tak' the low road" in effect he is telling his friend that you will return alive, and I will return in spirit. He remembers his happy past, "By yon bonnie bough" and his true love were ever wont to gae [accustomed to go]" and sadly accepts his death "the last it ken nae [knows no] second Spring again."

The original folksong uses the Dorian mode; the seventh scale degree is absent from the melody. The lyrics intertwine the sadness of the soldier's plight with images of Loch Lomond's stunning natural beauty.

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
