PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Welcome to the 2021 AGM of the Highett Neighbourhood Community House and the Hampton Community Centre. The AGM provides us with an opportunity to look back and reflect on the activities of the Houses and evaluate whether those activities have focussed on the achievement of our vision, "To be known for providing innovative activities and events that connect & foster inclusive relationships across all ages, cultures & abilities and for connecting and fostering transformative leadership across all members of the local community".

2020 was a very strange year as I'm sure you all know! The Board decided to use contingency funds to ensure all our staff would have work during COVID. Thankfully, Jobkeeper kicked in and our accounts weren't decimated. Our normal annual activities were either cancelled or conducted online – the Highett Higher Ground Music Festival: cancelled; the Photography Competition: held online. Many of our programmes were delivered virtually and our outreach work grew out of necessity.

Through a year of lockdowns, changing rules, social distancing and community confusion, congratulations to Melanie and the team for the wonderful way they banded together to provide focussed support to those most in need in the community. Cooking with funding assistance from local Rotary Clubs and delivering up to 100 meals a week to the elderly and needy in lockdown.

Collaborating with Highett Bendigo Community Bank to provide Hello Neighbour Show bags to our local community. Ensuring the welfare of international students and public housing tenants by delivering fresh food and veggies. Telehealth counselling offerings and keeping all informed through very comforting and positive FB and Insta posts. We are so proud of you all and so thankful for your commitment to your roles.

Even though a lot of our plans went on the backburner, we continued to plan for how we can be pivotal to providing leadership in the community as well as upskilling the community's leadership capabilities. 2021 will be a key year in putting in place key projects to support our strategic plan of developing internal leadership skills and broader community leadership capability. There are many local developments across our Bayside Local Government Area that will need grassroots input and oversight. There will also be much needed for volunteers skilled in governance and advocacy to join committees of local sporting and community activities to ensure a post COVID world of social connectivity.

Our management team across the two centres, Melanie supported by Kate, has continued to provide excellent leadership in the House and to maintain very strong relationships with many local stakeholders through this time of COVID as cited above. The strong commitment to the Social Prescription philosophy has led to engagement with a wide range of medical stakeholders as well as the provision of counselling through Monash counselling students.

We look forward to a year where we can interact again with all the tutors and volunteers whose contributions to the work of both Centres are core to their success. We also look forward to seeing more of our valued co-tenants at Highett, the Highett Senior Citizens, and the Greek Senior Citizens.

This will be my last year as president and I look forward to supporting a new executive in 2021. Thank you for all the support and generosity you have shown me over the last five years – it is this positive energy that keeps the Centres moving forward.

TREASURER'S REPORT HNCH



This year, like so many other businesses, we were the beneficiary of a number of different Government stimulus packages e.g. Jobkeeper, Small Business Grants. We would gratefully like to acknowledge this financial support which kept all staff employed and continuing to keep our community connected during the pandemic. Whilst we received this extra funding, we also continued to receive our recurrent Major Grants from DHHS and Bayside Council. The overall position of the Income/Expenditure Statement should be seen within this greater context.

Without the stimulus packages both Centres would have recorded significant losses due to no rental income and decreased program income. Any surplus the organisation has made in 2020 will be reinvested in community development activities and events over the coming year.

I am pleased to report our financial results as follows, On an accrual basis, HNCH recorded: a surplus of \$105,891members' equity at 31 Dec 2020 of \$232,238 cash and cash-equivalents at 31 Dec 2020 of \$292,917

And on an accrual basis, HCC recorded: a surplus of \$53,562 members' equity at 31 Dec 2020 of \$157,126 cash and cash-equivalents at 31 Dec 2020 of \$176,311

The audited financial statements affirm very healthy financial positions of HNCH and HCC which ensures that our community development activities and events will not be hindered by the lack of financial resources for the foreseeable future.

In the year ahead, 2021 will prove to be an exciting yet challenging year as we continue to deal with the uncertainty of Covid-19. Our two major service offerings namely rental and program are still under constraint due to the physical distancing requirements in place.

As Treasurer I am confident that our organisation will continue to progress and fully utilise its resources to serve our community.

MANAGER'S REPORT

I would like to begin my report by thanking EVERYONE for your support in 2020. I won't bang on about what a tough year it was. We all lived through it, and although we have many shared experiences, the impact was certainly different for everyone.

Our Centres started the year strong with members happy, classes full, and hirers returning. Our Higher Ground event was looking to be our best ever. The introduction of Covid restrictions meant cancelling the event the night before and rethinking the delivery of our services. With the full support of the Board, our team pivoted, evaluated the needs of our community, and jumped into action in order to support our community.

Staff undertook training in Food Safety Supervision, Mental Health Awareness, Elder Abuse Awareness Training, Lifeline Counselling. These skills were invaluable in assisting our day to day work with our community during the pandemic. In 2020 we partnered with quite a number of organisations, a few new collaborations and some old favourites. I'd like to name check a few within my summary below and offer up my thanks and gratitude to them.

Over 9 months we made over 2,000 meals which were distributed to vulnerable members in our community including DHHS public housing tenants, Highett RSL members and Holmesglen Institute international students. This was financially supported by our local Rotary organisations Moorabbin, Beaumaris, Hampton and special thanks to Rotary Cheltenham for leading the charge. We also coordinated the receipt and delivery of 4,000 meals donated by Victoria Golf Club and RACV. Vegetable delivery to local seniors was made possible by the produce grown by Food for Change and delivery by the Community Transport team at Connect Health. Tatiana Scott was instrumental in sourcing fresh bread each week. On a fortnightly basis, our team assisted Housing First to pack vegetables for vulnerable social housing tenants.

Direct social support was given to our community via regular phone calls, welfare checks, and newsletters. We hosted 4 Masters of Counselling Students from Monash University who gave over 200 hours of free counselling services. We secured grant funding for a Social Prescription pilot program which enabled our Community Connector to support 20 participants to connect with activities/events in their community – no greater challenge in a pandemic! Our special thanks to Southern Melbourne Primary Care Partnership, City of Kingston Innovation Grant, Australian Neighbourhood Houses/Centres Assoc. (ANHCA) and Sidney Myer, and Bayside Council for these funds. I was a guest speaker discussing Social Prescription on several panels this year including prior to lockdown where I was able to present at the Neighbourhood House Victoria sector conference.

During the 5k lockdown, we hand-delivered 1,000 gift boxes as part of our Hello Neighbour campaign which was supported by Highett Community Bendigo Bank and local traders. Our community was encouraged to pick up a show bag with fairy floss and local service and activity information. We also received funding from Be Connected to assist seniors with technology and during Seniors week we had over 120 community members participating in free online classes.

A very special thanks to our team who 'leaned in' and supported everything we threw at them – new skills, new ways of working. Even during a pandemic, we stayed true to our Strategy House (pg 14). I'd especially like to acknowledge 2 of our staff members who moved on this year. Jo James has been the bedrock at HNCH for many years, and so too Angie Hosmer at HCC. We wish them the best in their new endeavours. Also a big thank you to Marlene Johnson for her support and for always championing our community. She has successfully steered this ship and we are definitely pointing in the right direction!
