WATERLOO

Spring 2024





On a cold January morning in 1649, upon a high scaffold beside the Banqueting House in Whitehall, King Charles I met his death under the headsman's axe. No English monarch before or since has died in such circumstances. The English Civil War Society organise an impressive annual parade to Whitehall to mark the anniversary and continuing our commemoration of past historical events our first event for 2024 was to witness the annual re-enactment of the final walk by King Charles I from St. James' Palace to Horse Guards Parade. Assembled costumed participants solemnly marched slowly up the Mall to the beat of muffled drums, then a brief Drumhead service followed at Horseguards before a small party took a commemorative wreath under Horseguards Arch to hang close to the bust of Charles I at Whitehall, before the army marched off with colours flying.

At the conclusion of the re-enactment, our members took a short walk to the Army and Navy Club in Pall Mall where they enjoyed a convivial lunch.




HIDDEN LONDON

TOUR OF ALDWYCH STATION 29th FEBRUARY

Aldwych station is one of London's secret places, holding myths and memories of times gone by. Opened to the public in 1907, it was never as heavily used as originally intended and closed nearly 100 years later in 1994. The station has had a varied history; from providing shelter to Londoners during the Blitz, to being used for film and TV shoots including The ABC Murders (2018), Darkest Hour (2017), Sherlock (2014), and Atonement (2007).

We joined the tour to see one of the former termini of the Piccadilly line – the ticket hall, the original lifts, abandoned platforms and tunnels, and interconnecting walkways - including some that are very rarely seen by the public. This event was fully booked as we took the last 19 tickets for that day. We had two very informative guides. Although the lifts are still insitu they do not work so the steps underground were testing! The tour began in the Ticket Hall and then down to the platforms, it was an experience going back in time. We learnt that the name of the station was changed, why it was subsequently closed, and how crowded the platforms had been when used as an air raid shelter during both world wars. The station is often used for filming, Darkest Hour being the most famous. Committee member Dave and his wife Linda had a photograph taken in front of the last tube train – but previously and not on this occasion! Afterwards we climbed the numerous stairs and once we had got our breath back repaired to Cote Covent Garden for a meal and drinks. There are several other tours of stations by Hidden London which is part of TFL and it was agreed that we would organise another venue as the visit was so interesting.


Saturday 9th November. Festival of Remembrance. The Royal Albert Hall.
