Young writers, keep your eyes peeled for the new Marian Keyes Young Writer Award, and also Young Writer Delegate opportunities at Cuirt and ILFDublin. Are you signed up to our newsletter?

The Irish Writers Centre is the national resource organisation for writers on the island of Ireland. For over a quarter of a century, the IWC has provided professional supports to meet the needs of writers of all forms and genres, at all stages of their development. We offer creative writing courses, professional training, information, networking opportunities, cross-border programmes and events in venues all over the island, abroad, and from our beautiful Georgian building on Parnell Square in the heart of Dublin's newest Cultural Quarter.

We continue to find ways for writers to connect, in particular by expanding the Centre's evolving community of writers across the island. Our work continues with the third incarnation of **XBorders**, our cross-border programme which brings up to 20 emerging writers together over five months to create new work. The theme this time around is **Transition** in its widest context and in its potential for activism and art.

Our five-year strategy (2017-2021) commits to meeting the needs of all writers, with a

special focus on the next generation. First initiated at **Cúirt International Festival of Literature** this year, the **IWC Young Writer Delegates Programme** is intended to give young writers an opportunity to immerse themselves in a literature festival, soak up the atmosphere and to contribute to the festival as active participants. We connected in a similar vein with Dublin Book Festival this November where the selected four young writers were given festival passes, four days of full literary immersion in its events and activities, and support from a bespoke mentor, Elizabeth Reapy, and the IWC team.

The Irish Writers Centre is governed by a voluntary board of directors, chaired by Liz McManus. They are Martina Devlin, James Harpur, Hilary Fennell, Paul Moore, Luán Ó Braonáin, Mary O'Donnell, Rossa Ó Snodaigh, Jenni Barrett, Deirdre Lillis and Susanne Dirks.

We continue to open our doors to our members, writers, readers, literature industry professionals and the general public and look forward to seeing you at the Centre soon.

#### Writers' and Artists' Social Welfare Initiative

In June 2017, the Irish Writers Centre welcomed the launch of a new pilot initiative which acknowledges the professional status of writers and artists applying for Jobseeker's Allowance. The pilot is being developed in partnership between the Department of Social Protection and the Department of Culture, as part of a key commitment to artists under the Creative Ireland programme. The Irish Writers Centre can issue Professional Members a certificate which will confirm you as a Professional Member of the IWC and which will be accepted as evidence of your professional status when applying for Jobseeker's Allowance.

### Professional Development



As a resource organisation, a primary aim of the Irish Writers Centre is to provide various services for writers. Our mission is to support, promote and inform writers, and we provide comprehensive services for professional writers ranging from day-long workshops and residencies, to bursaries and mentoring.

We also provide accomplished writers with a range of employment opportunities, including facilitating courses, presenting at festivals, participating on selection panels, and acting as curators and mentors.



Continuous professional development is as important to writers as to any other professional. In recognition of this, our **Mindshift** and **Propel** series seek to inform, advise and upskill writers in their career as artist, as facilitator, as networker, as self-promoter and as tax payer.



We have two types of **Writers-in-Residence** (WIR) – one for writers to have time and space to write, and the second is a community engaged residency model, where writers act as facilitators working with marginalised or special interest groups.

### MID-WEEK COURSES • CÚRSAÍ LÁR-SEACHTAINE

Second Thursday Writing Club for Children with OISÍN McGANN THUR 31 JAN, 14 & 28 FEB, 14 & 28 MARCH, 11 APRIL • 4.00PM − 5.30PM • 6 WEEKS • €90 Suitable for all children ages 9 to 12 who love writing, even those who have yet to decide what they want to do with it. There will be short exercises with a view to writing a full story towards the end of the six weeks.



### Starter Kit in Creative Non-Fiction with KEVIN BREATHNACH MON 4 FEB • 6.30PM − 8.30PM • 6 WEEKS • €165/€150 MEMBERS

This starter course will explore elements of non-fiction such as memoir, social commentary, cultural criticism, and the construction of narrative space and time. Participants will produce material by responding to prompts such as photographs, film stills, and biographical texts.



### 6-Week Starter Kit with NIAMH BOYCE TUES 5 FEB: 6.30PM - 8.30PM - 6 WEEKS: \$165/\$150 MEMBERS

This course is suitable for those new to writing, or interested in getting back to writing. Fun but focused, the core of this course will be weekly writing exercises. Through these, participants will create and shape new fictions.



### Beginner's Fiction with TANYA FARRELLY TUES 5 FEB • 2.00PM − 4.00PM • 6 WEEKS • €165/€150 MEMBERS

Attendees will look at the key aspects of fiction writing, exploring how to create intriguing characters, generate plot, and use dialogue effectively. You will also look at the importance of point of view, conflict and setting in stories.



### Beginner's Creative Writing with PAT BORAN WED 6 FEB • 6.30PM − 8.30PM • 10 WEEKS • €280/€260 MEMBERS

Using a variety of guided exercises and games, participants of this course will produce and edit a range of new work, from poetry to short fiction, with the aim of applying their new-found skills to work beyond the workshop environment.



### Start Writing for Children and Teenagers with OISÍN McGANN THUR 14 FEB • 6.30PM − 8.30PM • 6 WEEKS • €165/€150 MEMBERS

These six-weeks will cover the basics of storytelling and the specific aspects of writing for children and young adults. There will be short exercises, as well as advice on how to get published and develop your own career.

This course, for teens aged 14-17, will focus on creating pieces of work to edit and develop over three days. The participants will work on building stories, characters and worlds, while exploring what works and doesn't work in the fiction they consume.



### Writer's Surgery: Poetry Workshops with JESSICA TRAYNOR & ADAM WYETH

These workshops will explore the how-what-where of various research sources and look at how too much research can create as big a problem as too little. Each session will include a mix of tips, useful advice and practical exercises.

This course will cover form and technique, project development, and necessary industry knowledge. Participants will workshop their own ideas, getting written materials in shape for the next phase of development, and formulating a plan for future action.

This course will furnish participants with the tools to move from an idea to a finished script, exploring effective character development and structure - from the individual scene to the completed screenplay - and everything in between.

#### Mindshift: Edit your Novel\* with BRIAN LANGAN SAT 12, 19 & 26 JAN • 10.00AM − 4.30PM • 3 DAYS • €270/€250 MEMBERS

This intensive course will involve workshopping and editing your work through a collaborative process. \*Writers will be asked to submit 10,000 words and a synopsis of a work-in-progress by Wed 19 Dec 2018. Ideal for Novel Fair 2019 finalists.

### Around the Island





As the national resource Centre for literature in Ireland, we are always aiming to connect with writers and audiences outside of the capital. In 2018, we travelled around the island to engage with artists from various parts of the country, and we will continue to do so in the year ahead.

In October, we visited **Cavan** for the **Bailieborough Poetry Festival** where we launched our *Poetry Masterclass* with **Moyra Donaldson**, **Colm Keegan**, and **Noel Monahan**. Cavan writers also had the opportunity to attend *Finish Your Novel* with **Conor Kostick** and *Memoir* with non-fiction writer **Selina Guinness**.

Autmn 2018 also saw the return of our XBorders project. Now in its third incarnation, the first XBorders: Transition event took place at the Centre in November with Rory O'Neill (a.k.a. Panti Bliss) as our inaugural speaker. We were also delighted that Minister of Culture, Heritage and the Gaeltacht, Josepha Madigan, was able to launch this event. The XBorders project aims to connect up to 20 emerging writers from both sides of the border with intensive workshops facilitated by Maria McManus that take place in the IWC,

the Robinson Library in Armagh and in the Crescent Arts Centre in Belfast.

This spring sees the welcome return of our Roaming Writer-in-Residence, an exciting project for one lucky writer who will travel around the island by train and engage with fellow travelers on their way to deliver creative writing workshops to students from different universities. We will also be seeking an Online Writer-in-Residence so watch this space.

We will continue to extend our partnerships with arts venues around the country in spring 2019 as part of our support to writers outside of the capital. The Linenhall Arts Centre in Castlebar will host Alan McMonagle for A Guide to the Short Story in April while Droichead Arts Centre in Drogheda will look at the rise of fiction from female writers over six weeks with Mia Gallagher.

We will have more partnerships to announce in 2019, so keep your eyes peeled for where we may provide literary supports in the coming months. We aim to come to your location if we can, so let us know how we can help.



### IWC Events Programme



Our events programme continues to keep us engaged with IWC members and audiences up and down the country. September kicked off our autumn season with our booked-out **Open Day**, giving people the opportunity to visit and explore the Centre and to get a taste of the workshops and courses we offer throughout the year.

We opened our doors again to audiences new and old for **Culture Night 2018**. Four events took place over the evening with **Frank Buckley** showcasing the Centre's stunning art collection, a **Teen Writers Showcase**, a **Writers Soapbox** and a **Publishers Showcase**.

Autumn 2018 was a busy time in respect of our offerings in the Irish language. As well as a special edition of our **Tóg an Mic** (*Takin' the Mic*), hosted by **Ciara Ní É**, we also launched the first of our new Writer-Led bursaries, awarded to **REIC** for a new project of *fisdánta* (video poems), now available for viewing on our YouTube channel. Guaranteed compulsive viewing, even for those who don't speak as Gaeilge!





Takin' the Mic as Béarla also returned in October in partnership with the Red Line Book Festival. A bilingual affair, host and musician, Marcus Mac Conghail, encouraged readers to perform in Irish and in English, while guest performances from Sarah Clancy, David Butler and Henrietta McKervey played a blinder. The final Takin' the Mic of the year was curated in collaboration with Dublin Book Festival at Smock Alley and was hosted by writer Sarah Maria Griffin, featuring poet Clara Rose Thornton as guest performer.


