The Irish Writers Centre is the national resource organisation for writers on the island of Ireland. For over a quarter of a century, the IWC has provided professional supports to meet the needs of writers of all forms and genres, at all stages of their development in Irish and English. We offer creative writing courses, professional training, information, networking opportunities, cross-border programmes and events in venues all over the island, and from our beautiful Georgian building on Parnell Square in the heart of Dublin's Cultural Quarter.

In 2017, with the support of the Arts Council of Northern Ireland, we have been able to provide a range of services and networking opportunities for Northern and Southern writers to connect, including the award-winning **WomenXBorders** for International Women's Day and our bespoke intervention project XBorders, aimed at emerging writers, which worked so well that we're doing it again, this time exploring a conciliatory theme entitled Accord.

We are rolling out our five-year strategy (2017-2021) to meet the needs of the current writer as well as a new generation of writers, in particular reaching out to attract younger writers into the IWC. A second goal is to bring our fantastic Irish writers to an international audience by delivering world-class creative writing courses online. Finally, we seek to connect more with Irish language writers and also to be an integral partner in the development of Dublin's new Cultural Quarter.

The Irish Writers Centre is governed by a voluntary board of directors, chaired by Liz McManus. They are: Martina Devlin, Hilary Fennell, James Harpur, Anne Larchet, Paul Moore, Luán Ó Braonáin, Mary O'Donnell and Rossa Ó Snodaigh. Writers' and Artists' Social Welfare Initiative

In June 2017, the Irish Writers Centre welcomed the launch of a new pilot initiative which acknowledges the professional status of writers and artists applying for Jobseeker's Allowance. The pilot is being developed in partnership between the Department of Social Protection and the Department of Culture, as part of a key commitment to artists under the Creative Ireland programme. The Irish Writers Centre can issue Professional Members with a certificate which will confirm you as a Professional Member of the IWC and which will be accepted as evidence of your professional status when applying for Jobseeker's Allowance.

Professional Development



As a resource organisation, a primary aim of the Irish Writers Centre is to provide various supports for writers. Our mission is to support, promote and inform writers and we provide a comprehensive service for professional writers ranging from day-long workshops and residencies, bursaries and mentoring. Also, we provide accomplished writers with a range of employment opportunities including facilitating courses, presenting at festivals, participating in selection panels, and acting as curators and mentors.



Continuous professional development is as important to writers as to any other professional, and in recognition of this, our **Mindshift** and **Propel** series seek to inform, advise and upskill writers in their careers as artist, as facilitator, as networker, as self-promoter and as tax payer.





Residencies and bursaries provide Writers-in-Residence (WIRs) with time and space to write or to connect with local communities. Annual residencies include:

- an inaugural residency in partnership with the Tyrone Guthrie Centre named after IWC founder, the Jack Harte Bursary
- an international residency in St. Mark's Church, Florence
- seven residencies for IWC professional members in Cill Rialaig, Kerry
- one Irish language bursary in association with Anam Cara in the Beara Peninsula, Cork
- an Online WIR
- last autumn we instigated a new Writers' Exchange between Bergen, Norway and Anam Cara supported by the Norwegian Embassy

Acound the Country & Beyond



As a national resource centre for Irish literature, we're always aiming to connect with writers and audiences outside of the capital. This year we have already travelled all around the island and we will continue to bring more of our offerings from home base to various parts of the country.

The Irish Writers Centre Cavan Literary Programme, launched in May, continued on throughout the autumn with Brian Langan's Edit Your Novel and Brian Leyden leading participants through their paces in Writing for Radio.

In Northern Ireland, we had a full programme of courses across all genres including Gerard Brennan with CSNI: Crime Scene Northern Ireland in Belfast, and Patsy Horton from Blackstaff Press sharing her publishing know-how. We also partnered with Queens University Belfast to bring our well-known Publishing Day to the Crescent Arts Centre. With Brian Langan, Faith O'Grady, and publicist Jim Meredith giving advice on publishing and promoting, and Nuala O'Connor revealing her own

experiences as a writer, it was a valuable and interesting day for writers. Northern Irish writers, be sure to check our website and newsletter for information on how to avail of free professional membership and mentoring opportunities.

We'll also have professional development offerings from the Mindshift series for playwrights (From Page to Stage) and, an intensive day on publicising your work. The new year will also see us back in Cavan with courses in Poetry, Memoir, Creative Non-Fiction and more.

As always we've had a busy autumn as we kicked off the season with Culture Night 2017 in a bilingual celebration of contemporary Irish writing. In a first for the Centre, we hosted a Teen Writers Showcase while the writers on our Soapbox, including Jennifer Johnston and June Caldwell, took to the stage with newly commissioned work on the pros and cons of writing in the wake of Irish literary giants. October brought Tóg an Mic, the special 'as Gaeilge' edition of our monthly open mic and in November we crossed the Liffey with Takin the Mic and Poetry Northern Ireland as part of Dublin Book Festival. The festival also continued our Women in Literature series with Stand in Awe of All Mná, an innovative half-day event to shine focus on gender in the literary industry. November showcased Cavan writers in Looking for the Right Word putting Cavan writers centre stage with readings from Michael Harding and Pat McCabe, and special guests, local band, The Strypes. 2017 will culminate in a celebration of the IWC community with our annual Members' Christmas Party, featuring readings from our new Dublin City Writers-in-Residence, E.M. Reapy and Declan Burke.

As well as these exciting milestones, as always we continued to grow and develop our regular events at the centre. The Irish Times Book Club has welcomed an exciting line-up of authors including Jennifer Johnston and Sally Rooney, and Takin The Mic has continued on the last Friday of each month bringing an ever-growing number of great performers to a captive audience.

2018 will begin with Nollaig na mBan, in partnership with Banshee Journal. Sinéad Gleeson will host our Soapbox showcase featuring Nuala O'Connor, Anna Carey, Alison Spittle and Éilís Ní Dhuibhne. January will also mark the beginning of the second iteration of our cross border project, XBorders: Accord where, again, we will bring writers from across the island together to explore the themes of borders and diplomacy. In March to mark International Women's Day we will host the second annual Women XBorders event. On Saturday 14 April, we are hosting a great UNESCO One City One Book day of free short story workshops and an Art of the Anthology panel discussion to celebrate The Long Gaze Back, this year's featured book.




