

Gift Tin Transferring Instructions

Read these instructions *completely* before you begin.

Supplies Needed

- King Coat[™] dye sublimation Gift Tins
- Sublimation ink transfers
- Press support to fit each size lid (1/2" thick rubber cushion)
- Heat resistant tape
- Oven mitt or heat-resistant gloves (for removing product from heat press)
- Thermal Rubber Mat, 1/16" thick (a thicker mat may require a longer pressing time)

Note: If you did not purchase a transfer support from us, you can make one yourself by cutting a piece of wood or mouse pad to fit snugly inside the lid of each tin (that means it has to be slightly *smaller* than the lid itself).

Step 1: Adjust the Heat Press

For best results, always pre-heat your press.

Note: These instructions, including transfer times and temperatures, are based on the inks, paper, equipment and supplies we use. Your inks, papers, etc. may require adjustments in your time/temp settings.

Step 2: Design & Print Your Transfer

- 1. Scan and open your image.
- 2. The gift tins come in different sizes. For best results, **the transfers should be slightly** *larger* **than the surface of the lid**. You may size the image to bleed off the lid.
- 3. Remember to print a mirror image so the final product will be correctly oriented once it is transferred.
- 4. Apply color correction as needed.
- 5. Print the transfer using standard dye sublimation transfer paper. We do not recommend highrelease transfer paper with hard goods.

Step 3: Transfer the Image

- 1. Place the press support on a table.
- 2. Place the gift tin lid face-up over the press support.
- 3. Place your transfer, face-up on the press bed.
- 4. Place the lid with the press support face-down (support facing you), against the transfer, and register the lid correctly in the center of the transfer on all sides.
- 5. Wrap the edges of the transfer paper up and secure them to the back of the lid/press support using heat tape.

- 6. Turn the lid/press support over so the press support is sitting on the press bed with the gift tin lid/transfer on top.
- 7. Place the lid/press support in the *center* of your heat press.
- 8. Place the thermal rubber mat over the tin lid.
- 9. Close the heat press. Using **medium-firm** pressure, press at **385 400° F for 1.5 2 minutes** with a 1/16" thermal rubber mat. A thicker mat may require a longer pressing time.
- 10. Open the press. Carefully remove the tin lid. **Caution:** The tin lid will be **HOT**. We recommend using heat resistant gloves.
- 11. *Carefully* remove the press support and transfer. Avoid scratching the lid. It is more susceptible to scratching when it's hot.

Transfer Tips, Techniques & Troubleshooting

- If you are printing an image without a bleed, print an outline slightly larger than the size of the tin to help you register the position of the design on the lid.
- After the first pressing you may notice an indentation on your press bed left by the lid/support. Try to line up subsequent lids in that same spot to avoid the possibility of uneven pressure. The indentation will disappear after you've finished pressing lids.
- Prints light in places:
 - a. Check the accuracy of your press thermostat with a Rayvek gun or temperature strip.
 - b. Check your time and temperature. You should be pressing at 385 400° F for 1.75 2 minutes with a 1/16" thermal rubber mat. Lightness may be caused by *too much* time or heat (burnout) as well as *too little* time or heat. Try adjusting the temp or pressing time.
 - c. Check your pressure. Your press may have a "cold" or worn spot. Try increasing pressure and/or moving the tin to the left or right.
 - d. Make sure your rubber mat is not worn out from previous pressings.
- The outside edges print light:
 - e. Check to make sure you are using medium-firm pressure.
 - f. Make sure you have placed the gift tin lid in the center of the press.
 - g. Make sure your press support is smooth and even on both sides and equal thickness all the way around.

Sales & Marketing Tips

- Sell the tins empty, or fill them with gifts designed for the recipients.
- Package printed tins with personalized basket-type gifts to make a big impression.
- Small, 2.5" round tins are perfect for a small piece of jewelry, a lock of hair, baby's first tooth, or rice or bird seed for a wedding, with appropriate dates printed on the top, or labeled on the bottom.
- Medium size tins are suitable for puzzles, sewing notions, personal notions, or pet treats.
- Large tins are idea for candy, cookies, nuts, or even apparel, such as t-shirts, hats, or lingerie.
- Create your own label with our **MultiCal** decal for the bottom of each tin. Advertise your company, or let your customer use the space for their company logo or a personal sentiment.
