Running Time (including music): Approximately 25 minutes.

Number of songs: 3

SCENE 1: IT'S SPRING-TIME!

Narrator 1: Welcome to our spring-time show!

There's lots to learn, and lots to know!

Narrator 2: Like, why the Easter bunny comes,

And why we all eat hot cross buns.

Narrator 3: Or, why we get a tasty treat,

Of yummy chocolate eggs to eat.

Narrator 4: So join us now, to learn the reason

Spring is such a happy season.

Narrator 1: Spring is a time of renewal, regrowth, rebirth, regeneration,

and rejuvenation.

Narrator 2: And anything else beginning with "R"!

Narrator 3: But why do we call it "spring"?

Narrator 4: In Great Britain, spring takes place in March, April and May...

Narrator 3: (Interrupting) Yes, but why do we call it "spring"?

Narrator 1: Because the northern hemisphere tilts closer to the sun, so

the days get longer and warmer...

Narrator 3: (Interrupting) Yes, but why do we call it "spring"?

Narrator 2: Give us chance - we're trying to tell you!

Narrator 4: It's because the warmer weather means that animals all wake

up from hibernation, and new plants grow, or "SPRING

forth".

Narrator 3: (Sighing) I give in - I STILL don't know why it's called

"spring".

SCENE 3: HOT CROSS BUNS

Bun Seller: (Singing) "Hot cross buns! Hot cross buns! One a penny, two a

penny, hot cross buns!" Who fancies a nice, tasty hot cross

bun?

Customer 1: Oooo, I'd like a hot cross bun, please!

Customer 2: Me too!

Bun Seller: (Holding out two buns) That'll be fifty pence, please!

Customer 1: (Shocked) Fifty pence?! You said they were a penny!

Bun Seller: That's just an old rhyme they used to sing 300 years ago!

Customer 2: (Dismissively) Hot cross buns haven't been around for 300

years!

Bun Seller: (Teasingly) Is that what you think...?! Listen-up, and we'll tell

you everything you need to know about hot cross buns...

Customer 1: OK, for starters, what ingredients do you need to make hot

cross buns?

Baker 1 holds up the ingredients:

Baker 1: Flour! Sugar! Eggs! Milk! Dried fruit! Spices!

Customer 1: And why do we eat hot cross buns at Easter?

Baker 1: No-one knows for sure. Some people think they were first

eaten in the 14th Century. But hot cross buns may go back as

far as the Romans, or the Saxons, or even earlier!

Customer 1: (Impressed) Wow!

Baker 2: In the 16th Century, at the time of the Elizabethans, it was

against the law to sell hot cross buns except at Easter.

Customer 2: (Surprised) No way!

Baker 2: And in the 19th Century, people thought that bread baked on

 $\operatorname{\mathsf{Good}}\nolimits$ Friday would never go mouldy. They'd even hang it up in

the house as a good luck charm for a whole year! And if anyone was ill during the year they'd break off some of the

bread and eat it as medicine!

Customer 1: (Pulling face) Bleeaauurrgghh!

Baker 1: It's also said that sharing a hot cross bun with someone

brings friendship throughout the year.

Customer 2: (Smiling) Ahhhhhh! That's nice!

Customer 1: Phew! I never knew there was so much to learn about hot

cross buns!

SCENE 5: EASTER EGGS

Several Easter Egg Hunters are looking for eggs.

Egg Hunter 1: We're on an Easter Egg Hunt!

Egg Hunter 2: (Holding up an Easter egg) I've found one!

Egg Hunter 3: (Holding up an Easter egg) Me too!

Eggs have been given as spring gifts for thousands of years.

Egg Hunter 1: (Surprised) Really?!

Egg Hunter 2: Oh, yes!

Egg Hunter 1: I didn't know they had supermarkets thousands of years ago!

Egg Hunter 3: They didn't buy them from supermarkets! And they weren't

made from chocolate, either. They were REAL eggs, hard

boiled, and painted or dyed pretty colours.

Egg Hunter 1: (Impressed) Oooo!

Egg Hunter 4: Explorers even found a decorated ostrich egg in Africa that

was SIXTY THOUSAND YEARS OLD!

Egg Hunter 1: (Pulling a face) Urrggghh, I bet that smelled <u>AWFUL!</u>

Egg Hunter 2: So, when did Easter Egg Hunts start?

Egg Hunter 3: In Germany, 500 years ago. But people still play them today.

The largest hunt EVER was in Florida in 2007 - there were

FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND EGGS to find!

Egg Hunter 1: (Shocked) Gosh! We'd better get hunting, or we'll be here till

NEXT Easter!
