Scope and Sequence of the Course

God Reveals: An Introduction to the Bible is a companion for learning about the Bible and how it was inspired and formed as the Word of God. The text references both the Old Testament and New Testament in order to help students clearly understand the stages of Divine Revelation, from creation to the fullness of Revelation in the Incarnation of Christ and his Paschal Mystery.

The text opens with an explanation of how God reveals himself and how he wants to be known. From this basic understanding of Divine Revelation, the text focuses on the origins of the Bible. A more detailed explanation of how the Bible should be read as a sacred text as well as an overall synopsis of the organization and books of the Bible follow in Chapters 3 and 4. God's Kingdom initiated in the life of Christ is the focus of Chapter 5 and detailed in the synoptic Gospels. Christology from the Gospel of John is the subject of Chapter 6. In Chapter 7, Christ's particular mission as priest, prophet, and king is explained and evidenced from Scripture. Chapter 8 explains how Sacred Scripture is essential to liturgy, prayer, and the overall life of the Church. The sequence of the course is viewed in the focus question and chapter outline of each chapter.
