a bed-load of his new wine in the back of his pickup. The wine is a 1998 Napa Valley cabernet sauvignon called 2480 Hollywood & Vine. Almost no one has heard of it before, and the wine is made in such small quantity, 150 cases, that a large portion of the production fits back there in a rough, strapped-down pile. Careening up winding, steep Sage Canyon road, he loses a case. "Oh shit," Egelhoff says, screeching to a halt and throwing the truck into reverse. Fortunately the wine survives the tumble with only scratched capsules. A first-release cabernet, 2480 Hollywood & Vine is nevertheless priced \$75, and it's sold out. "Everyone thanked me for not overpricing the wine!" Egelhoff says. There's an improbable math here, \$75 adding up to a wine you've never heard of, never tasted, never even read about. So when Egelhoff's truck hits that bump, there's almost a

thousand dollars hitting the tarmac.

Go to the Cantinetta at Tra Vigne or Dean & Deluca in St. Helena, go to Enoteca Wine Shop in Calistoga and look at the bottles on their shelves, listen to the managers talking about their new favorite wines. Or grab a table at Bouchon in Yountville, or at Meadowood above St. Helena. These Napa Valley wine shops and restaurants are where much of the attention starts, where reputations can heat up and wines sell out as newborns.



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
