Where Do I Meet God?

Using our own powers of observation, 50 reason, and sound thinking, we can come to know God. We can be sure of God's presence because we can see the works that God has done: the creation of the world and of us humans. But we can also come to know God because God has chosen to freely, generously, and lovingly reveal the divine heart to us. God has, in a word, given us a glimpse of mystery, the divine plan of loving goodness, formed and carried out through history. This divine plan culminated in Christ, through whom all we need to know about God was fully revealed. The Constitution on Divine Revelation from Vatican II tells us about this. "It pleased God, in his goodness and wisdom," the Constitution says in article 2, "to reveal himself and to make known the mystery of his will, which was that people could draw near to the Father. through Christ, the Word made flesh, in the Holy Spirit, and thus become sharers in the divine nature."

The Covenant with Noah

God speaks to Noah and to us: "As for me, I am establishing my covenant with you and your descendants after you, and with every living creature that is with you, the birds. the domestic animals, and every animal of the earth. I establish my covenant with you ... this is the sign: I have set my bow in the clouds and it shall be a sign "
