#### With Whom Do You Gather?

Vatican II met from 1962 to 1965 in Rome 748 and produced, among others, a stunning Constitution on the Church called, in Latin, Lumen Gentium. "Christ is the light of the nations," it says in its opening lines, "and consequently, this holy synod gathered together in the Holy Spirit ardently desires to bring to humanity that light of Christ which is resplendent on the face of the Church..." The Council here points to a favorite image of the early theologians of the Church: The Church is like the moon: all its light is reflected from the sun. In other words, when you see the Church, you see only the body of Christ, working under the power of the Spirit. And if you see anything else, then we humans in the Church are failing to live up to our high calling to bring Christ to the world.

### The Name of the Church

751 People have assembled for religious purposes for as long as anyone can remember.

There is also buried in our understanding of Church a sense of being called or summoned, perhaps of being "called together."

- 753 The Constitution on the Church,
  mentioned above,
  uses rich imagery to help us understand
  who we are as Church.
- 754 The Church is, for example, a sheepfold or even the flock, with Christ as our shepherd.
- 755 It is a field farmed well and tilled carefully, a choice vineyard tended by Christ, who is the true vine.
- 756 It is the building of God,
  the household of God,
  with Christ as the cornerstone.
  It is a temple built of living stones
  which are we—the People of God.
- It is our mother.

  It is the new Jerusalem.

  These many images each point
  to a different dimension
  of the Church, which is, in truth,
  a great mystery,
  a sacrament of Christ to the world.

## The Mystery of the Church

- 758–59 God had called together a people
  long before Jesus of Nazareth was born.
  This family of God gradually took shape,
  increased its own self-identity,
  and learned to follow its vocation.
- 760 We know that God is the Trinity,
  the Father or Mother of us all,
  Jesus, the teacher and friend of all,
  and the Spirit of love for us all.
  This is God: one and inseparable,
  always acting, and as one.

The Church is also inseparable from the Trinity because it is the community called the People of God or, we might say, the People of Love.

Remember, the Trinity isn't located up in the skies but is very near to us.

We dwell within the Trinity's love, and the Triune God dwells within us.

761–62 When Abraham heard the divine call in his own heart and responded with Sarah, the Church was unfolding.

763 When Christ, who is the Son of God, began announcing the reign of God, it was again a call to gather as Church.

The Church is a sign of the kingdom of God already present among us but not yet fully achieved.

# **The Body of Christ**

764 For us Christians,
being part of the Church
is being part of the body of Christ,
with Christ as head
and ourselves as members.

We see ourselves as a sign to the world, a sacrament to the world that shows forth Christ, that is, love revealed.

We are, in a word, the family of Christ, the household of love.

765 The Church has a specific structure to help it achieve its mission.

- But the Church is born entirely from Christ, so even its structure is one of service.
- 767 And this structure,

along with all the members of the Church and all aspects of Church life, is given the Spirit of love and flows from that Spirit as well.

That is the real meaning of what happened on Pentecost.

The Sacred Source of Wisdom and Love flowed out into the community and awakened within its members the gifts needed for ministry.

These gifts continue to flow today.

769–70 Because we experience
the mysterious presence of God,
we sense that the Church
is powerfully endowed
as both a human institution

It is oriented at once toward action in the world and contemplation of the divine mysteries.

It is at once the mystical Body of Christ and a society of humans.

and a spiritual community.

The Constitution on the Church from Vatican II explains this for us in article 8.

### **Our Union with God**

772 It is in the Church that we humans
experience communion with God
in genuine, concrete moments.
In the Church, we are all united in Christ,
and it is a communion that never ends.
The entire structure of the Church is organized



to help us all live in this love, that is, as holy men and women. The Constitution on the Church 774-75 enlightens our understanding of all this. "the Church, in Christ, is a sacrament," the document says in article 1, "a sign and instrument, that is, of communion with God and the unity of the entire human race." This is the first purpose of the Church: to be a sacrament of Christ which also unites us with each other in the Spirit of love. And this communion, of course, is made possible 776 by Christ, the firstborn Son of God.

In the Church, we experience once again

which is what can save us from non-love,

that Trinitarian love,

that is, from sin.
