- We humans were created good.

We can still glimpse this original holiness when we reach those moments of peace, when we pause to sense the divine presence around us.

We sometimes experience a sense of overall well-being, of absolute harmony:

profound inner unity, love with our spouse, and peace with God.

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We're able to live as God wants, then, to be in control of our senses, as it were, and not be subject to lust,

greed, or lording it over others.

The story in Genesis uses figurative language to describe how God desired for us to work with God in maintaining the balance of life.

What a pleasure it was for us to tend the garder

What a pleasure it was for us to tend the garden as coworkers with the Creator!

God, we might say,

put us in that garden

and directed us toward the goal

of sharing divine perfection.

We humans were created good. We, for our part, as is well known, did not achieve that goal. We missed the mark, as it were, and wandered into selfishness and sin.

The Reality of Evil

One need not look any further
than the daily news
to see that evil exists in our world.
Who can escape it?
And yet...
Cod is infinitely good and holy

God is infinitely good and holy.
All of creation is good.

So, where does evil come from?

To fully understand sin,

we must examine our relationship with God because we reject this relationship, based on love and harmony, in favor of our own futile plan.

And what is our plan?

It is not to be in a relationship but instead to be unilateral.

On its bottom line,

sin is an abuse of the freedom to love which God gives to us all.

Instead, we become selfish and unilateral:
we use sex to satisfy our lust,
we use money to satisfy our greed,
we use others to satisfy our dominance.

We see only one side of life: our side.

Sin is not merely some psychological flaw, or a mere mistake, or the result of our upbringing, whatever that might have been.

God is infinitely good and holy.

We do have such psychological scars, indeed, but most are not sinful and many can be healed.

We do make mistakes, no doubt about it.

And for some people, emotional injury from family life does seem to set destructive patterns into motion.

But sin is beyond all of this.

It is an outright rejection of love.

In sin, we miss the mark of love,
set for us by our Maker.

In Christ, we see sin's opposite:

we see a man who was unwilling
to be unilateral
and who called us all back to love.

Christ reveals to us what sin is really all about because he sacrificed everything— everything, including his own life, rather than ever give up his love.

In this, Christ provides us
with the grace to overcome sin ourselves
and live in the divine light once again.

All human beings require this grace because all human beings miss the mark.

We all disobey God.

We all fail to love.

Fortunately for us and for all women and men, we have a new law in Christ.
