If 2020 was the Year of the Pivot, 2021 was the Year of Tenacity. The initial adrenaline of operating during a pandemic had long worn off. We'd weathered a first and second wave, and now we faced a third, fourth, and fifth.

Change is constant in a growing business, but I'm going to be honest: this year was a nail-biter. I stopped hoping for pressure to subside, and started wondering if we had the stamina and resources to keep building the road in front of us.

We missed goals, which felt awful, but we crushed others, which kept us going. Our Classic belt sales were lower than we'd hoped, which meant that we didn't cycle through their recycled plastic packaging before Earth Day 2022. On the other hand, we blew our community giving benchmarks out of the water, and supply chain disruptions accelerated the growth of our local supplier network. We even met some goals we didn't know we had.

This team and I believe in our products. We believe in our mission and our community. Also, we're really stubborn without a lot of "quit" in us. It's a good thing, because 2022 brings perhaps the biggest challenge yet: un-pivoting our COVID pivot, getting back to the core of our business, and finding our feet on a landscape that's shifted forever, personally and professionally.

Our promise to you is that we'll keep making progress no matter what. This sustainability report will show you some of the ways how. There's work to be done to help folx of all stripes feel great in their jeans and secure in their jobs, and we're grateful to you for keeping us accountable.

Social Sustainability

Our mission: to create people-first jobs that produce economically accessible products for a diverse customer base.

Our tactics: creating dignified work, ensuring economic accessibility, prioritizing visibility and representation, partnering with our community.

Creating Dignified Work

Our ongoing commitments

- » Prioritizing "Who, not where" in our manufacturing ethos. We work with the best component suppliers and sewing providers, wherever they are - and "best" to us means the highest-quality products and the highest-quality jobs
- » Nurturing long-term supplier relationships through consistent, transparent, two-way communication that helps our small, tight network of businesses grow together
- » Ensuring that everyone along our supply chain, including us, pays living wages and provides safe, comfortable work environments for their team and is third-party verified to be doing so

- » Prioritizing local suppliers when purchasing office, shipping, and other administrative supplies
- » Using third-party screening for potential in-house hires to reduce unconscious bias in hiring practices
- » Providing every Unbelts employee who works 20+ hours per week with comprehensive health benefits, above-living-wage compensation, and above-industry standard vacation time
- » Creating flexible schedules and remote work opportunities that allow for caregiving needs as well as mental and physical health maintenance



Last year's progress

- » Achieved: We documented our diversity and inclusion policies so they're easily referenced by every team member
- » Partially achieved: We didn't finalize "a preferred suppliers list that ensures Unbelts' dollars are flowing to values-aligned service and product suppliers," but we did grow that list by four suppliers - all of them local to our Edmonton HQ.
- **Plus**, we maintained consistent, transparent communication with our suppliers to minimize or eliminate the effect of Unbelts' COVID-related operational challenges on our supply partners' needs and goals
- » **Plus**, we incorporated paid time off for self-care days to encourage health maintenance and burnout prevention

In 2021, Edmonton's living wage increased from \$16.56 to \$18.10. We adjusted our starting wage accordingly.

Our 2022 to-do list

- » Identify partner organizations who can help us expand our Edmonton manufacturing while maximizing social impact to local workers
- » Screen our local suppliers for the same environmental and social sustainability values alignment that we do our longterm overseas suppliers
- » Engage internal team in evaluating current benefits and perks to ensure fit with actual needs
- » Carried over from 2021: Make our diversity and inclusion policies easily accessible to public by publishing on website
- » Carried over from 2021: Launch an engaging diversity and inclusion training program for our team



Building in Economic Accessibility

Our ongoing commitments

- » Making cloth mask donation requests easily accessible by individuals and organizations on our website; we have, to date, fulfilled 100% of our mask donation requests
- » Offering no-interest payment by installments on our website
- » Holding regular sample sales and Almost Perfect sales to offer fullquality, fully-warrantied Unbelts at reduced pricing
- » Creating under-\$15 products via our Unbelts Loop line

Last year's progress

» Surpassed: We originally planned to host at least two Almost Perfect sales of Unbelts to increase economic access to our products. Instead, we held one sale - and paired it with a donation of 148 Almost Perfect belts to Edmonton Youth Connect, which provided youth in need with no-cost belts.



What's An Almost Perfect Unbelt?

They're Unbelts with minor sewing or fabric imperfections that don't affect overall appearance or functionality. Instead of discarding these items, we sell them at a discount, backed with our full

» Surpassed: We had an unprecedented year for community giving, particularly with our cloth masks - read on for full details in "Community Partnerships."

- » Hold at least two Almost Perfect/sample sales
- » Add at least two more products to our Unbelts Loop line

Prioritizing Visibility and Representation

Our ongoing commitments

- » Ensuring diverse representation of ethnicity, body size, and gender identity in all Unbelts materials, and matching that representation with actual accessibility to products and partnerships
- » Sewing custom belts at no additional cost for individuals whose sizes or usability needs aren't represented by our pre-sewn products
- » In artist collaborations, prioritizing the work of individuals from marginalized communities; providing above-industry standard compensation; and working together to ensure their lived experiences are represented meaningfully
- » Seeking out opportunities to advocate for size and gender inclusion in the apparel industry through public speaking, media coverage, and collaborations with likeminded individuals and organizations

Last year's progress

» Achieved: We introduced additional belt lengths to address the need for more inclusive sizing via our Hybrid belt, which will shape our sizing options across all product lines in 2022

Our 2022 to-do's

- » Conduct a thorough community survey to identify how well we are truly solving our customers' problems, and who remains excluded from our community
- » Initiate usability testing with individuals living with disabilities to ensure universal accessibility to our products
- » Introduce a second size in our Intrepid belts and in any new belt releases
- » Create a public, easily-accessible custom belt request form to reduce barriers to sizes outside our pre-sewn range


Partnering With Our Community

Our ongoing commitments

- » Donating a minimum of 5% of our inventory to community initiatives annually
- » Seeking out collaborators for joint giving campaigns and fundraisers
- » Identifying opportunities for sustainable apparel advocacy in partnership with community individuals and organizations (further details in Environmental Sustainability: Designing and Advocating for Responsible Apparel Consumption)
- » Building paid time off for volunteering into every Unbelts team member's employment agreement
- » Offering mentorship to early-career community members, including hosting our third Human Ecology Practicum student from the University of Alberta

Last year's progress

» Achieved: Formalized our donation and partnership program criteria to minimize project approval time and ensure values alignment. Our written internal guidelines for who we can donate time, dollars, and/or product to (ie. must be a not-for-profit organization, must not carry religious affiliation) For every cloth mask sold...



...we donated three to community organizations and families.

» Goal surpassed: We donated 17.45% of our 2021 inventory to community individuals and organizations. Our usual goal? 5%.

Environmental Sustainability


Our mission: to create truly useful products that help repair, not exacerbate, our planet's environmental crisis.

Our tactics: minimizing resource extraction and waste at every step of our products' life cycles, using circular methodologies to extend those products' lifetimes, and designing products that extend the life cycle of other, more resource intensive garments.

Minimizing Resource Extraction and Waste

Our ongoing commitments

- » Avoiding unnecessary features and excess materials in product design, including packaging
- » Using recycled and diverted materials
 - » Belt elastic made from recycled PET (rPET) yarn
 - » Belt care labels made from organic cotton and rPET
 - » Belt hardware made from recycled scrap metal
 - » Masks made of overstock polyester and organic cotton
 - » Packaging and all print materials made of recycled materials
 - » E-commerce mailers are resealable and made of 100% recycled materials



Each Intrepid belt repurposes about 8.5 plastic water bottles.

Last year's progress

- » Achieved: Ceased production of our recycled plastic boxes for Classic packaging
- » Achieved: Replaced all virgin polyester yarn usage with rPET
- » Plus, we successfully test-launched the Hybrid belt, which uses fewer raw materials than the Intrepid and which is available in two sizes (in line with our size inclusivity goals)

Our 2022 to-dos

- » Introduce recycled materials for our Intrepid "secret pockets"
- » Redesign point-of-purchase displays with recycled materials
- » Introduce consistent, minimalist packaging across all product lines that serves e-commerce and brick-and-mortar customers equally well, and which integrates seamlessly into our new recycled point of purchase displays
- » Expand "split sizing" across product lines to ensure proper allocation of materials, while guaranteeing all features can be utilized and enjoyed by every customer, regardless of size
- » Investigate alternative materials and suppliers for hardware, prioritizing materials that are equal or superior to ours in sustainability, and prioritizing local suppliers to reduce carbon emissions
- » Create a roadmap for carbon-neutral inbound and outbound shipping, with our outbound shipping being totally carbon-neutral by Earth Day 2023

After that, we're prioritizing

- » Creating a reclamation and re-use plan for existing retailers' point of purchase displays so we can slowly introduce our recycled displays without waste
- » Selecting a supplier, or suppliers, for carbon-negative inbound and outbound shipping

2021 goal missed

What we wanted to do:

"Discover how we can support waste reduction at the second tier of our supply chain (ie. material suppliers), and collaboratively set targets to be met by Earth Month 2022."

What actually happened:

We underestimated the staying power of the COVID-19 pandemic and the compounding pressure that would put on us and our suppliers. Pivoting between masks and belts, and trying to maintain an inventory balance of each, tested our internal operational limits. Meanwhile, our component suppliers faced rolling lockdowns that made their business' survival the first priority.

Our 2022 goal:

To revisit waste mitigation with our component suppliers as they re-stabilize.



Using Circular Methodologies to Make the Most of What We Use

Our ongoing commitments

- » Extending our products' lifetimes by offering free repairs and replacements
- » Sewing all imperfect (but functional) elastic into Almost Perfect belts that are sold at a slight discount
- » Repurposing offcuts and imperfect elastic into Unbelts Loop upcycled products, such as cup sleeves, miniwallets, and hair ties

Last year's progress

- » Achieved: introduced "unpackaging" (using mini-loops made from upcycled waste elastic) across all product lines
- » Achieved: added hair ties to our Unbelts Loop line to upcycle surplus mask elastic
- » Achieved: increased awareness of. and access to, our repairs program by streamlining our Belt Hospital Request process and making it easier to find on our website



2021 elastic waste before upcycling: 419.875 m


2021 elastic waste after upcycling: 94.8 m



Our 2022 to-dos

- » Instead of "achieving 85% elastic waste reduction in our Guangzhou studio as we've been able to reach in Edmonton" (our 2021 goal), we aim to move 100% of our cut-and-sew manufacturing to Alberta, where we can increase our responsiveness to inventory demand and expand our elastic upcycling program
- » Carried over from 2021: re-launch our Belt Buyback program and pre-loved Unbelts marketplace, which we have continued to pause during COVID
- » Carried over from 2021: extend our Lifetime Warranty to all products (ie. replacing our 500-Day Warranty on our Classic Belts)
- » Review product design for ease of repair and re-use

Designing and Advocating For Responsible Apparel Consumption

Our ongoing commitments

- » Staying informed and up-to-date on current research into the environmental and social impacts of the textile industry
- » Proactively collaborating with other sustainable apparel stakeholders to ensure cross-industry innovation and cooperative growth
- » Supporting making loved clothes last through products that reduce textile degradation and waste (for example, our stretch belts revive loose, worn-out waistbands; our laundry bags reduce wear-and-tear)

Our 2022 to-dos

- » Provide more, and clearer, education on how our customers can best reduce their apparel consumption by better caring for their existing wardrobe
- » Identify at least three potential add-on products that help our customers extend the life of their clothing
- » Host at least two jeans swaps to encourage denim re-use before purchasing
- » Measure what matters: conduct a before-and-after survey of at least 5% of our customer base to assess to what extent we are helping them reduce apparel (and especially denim) consumption

After that, we're prioritizing

» Third-party testing of our Best-Ever Laundry Bags to independently verify our internal research and testing's conclusion that they effectively reduce textile wear-and-tear
