ABOUT KUCHINATE

Kuchinate's goal is to achieve resilience and well-being through an art-based holistic approach which includes economic empowerment, psycho-social and community support, vocational training and public advocacy. Kuchinate takes pride in using this unique approach to strengthen, uplift and empower hundreds of the most vulnerable women within the African asylum-seeking community.

HIGHLIGHTS OF 2022

Kuchinate hired 10 community managers from the collective.

Our ten community managers each are in charge of an integral part of the organization and are provided with the education, practice, and experience that they need to fill these roles with increasing competence and confidence and develop transferable skills for their and their communities' future.

Tel Aviv was ranked the most expensive city in the world.

The rise in prices was felt deeply by and impacted Kuchinate's artisans and managers and their families who were just surfacing from the economic crisis they were thrown into during the pandemic.



We sold our products all across the country through our homesales.

We visited 52 homes, community centers and fairs to spread the word about Kuchinate and sell our products in home sales.



3 women of the Kuchinate collective were resettled to the United States, Canada, and Sweden.

There is no durable solution for many of our most vulnerable women in Israel. We work hard to try and help our artisans who most need it to be resettled to a first world country through the UNHCR. In 2022, with mixed emotions we bid farewell to only 3 of our women who were fortunate enough to be resettled to the United States, Canada and Sweden.

Our Computer and Digital Literacy teacher Tesfazgi Asgedom started a new life in Canada. With a growing Kuchinate community in both Canada and the United States we have started dreaming about expanding Kuchinate across borders.









In 2022, **over 80 women** received a fair and regular income through their work at Kuchinate. Together we made:







FLEXIBLE WORKING CONDITIONS FOR GREATER RESILIENCE

Working either in our studio or from their homes, or even on the bus, women are able to plan their work around their mothering and other responsibilities. This flexibility allows them to be more independent while earning an income.



COLLECTION LAUNCH

We would like to introduce you to our newest friends at Kuchinate, a range of sewn animals in colorful African fabrics. The animals were designed in collaboration with artist and long time volunteer Laura Burch. These elephants, giraffes, camels and snakes come in different sizes. The sewing department worked diligently with Laura to develop their basic sewing skills and craft the different animals.

KUCHINATE GOES DIGITAL

Kuchinate made tremendous strides in digitizing the entire inventory and sales system. This was no small feat, as until the beginning of this year, everything at Kuchinate was done manually.

Before digitization the was implemented, the managing community women had to first digital literacy undergo basic training, and then a more intense training program to work with system, Shopify. the new are extremely proud that Shewit Gebreamlak is our inventory expert and in charge of Shopify.





EDUCATION

Throughout 2022, Kuchinate has exponentially expanded our program of vocational activities for Kuchinate community managers and artisans to improve their personal, professional, general and vocational development. These activities included practical skills in language, business, and computer and digital literacy, along with vocational skills to improve the women's standing in their respective communities and within their own families.



In February 2022 we opened our Educational Studio, a dedicated space set aside for learning away from the busyness of our studio, where 8 volunteer teachers teach:

18 women English
14 women Hebrew
17 women storytelling and public speaking
19 women Shopify and digital system

women attended various courses such as sewing, crochet, and upcycling, English and Hebrew language, computer and digital literacy, Shopify and political storytelling and public speaking.





Kuchinate community managers have taught:

40 women Level 1 sewing

22 women Level 2 sewing

16 women crochet skills

8 women upcycled products

10 women dolls

Through our Storytelling and Public Speaking training course, Kuchinate supported community managers and a handful of artisans to feel more confident in telling their personal stories, share their lived experiences in Eritrea/Sudan, along the migratory route and in Israel and advocate for asylum-seeking women in general.

The artwork of one of the Kuchinate artisans, Lina Otom Jak Agolon, was displayed for the month in the High Court of Israel in Jerusalem, as part of a collection of artworks honoring International Refugee Day. Lina's work of art was among those of well established Israeli artists including Philip Rantzer and Elham Rokni.

The summer exhibition "The One World" was displayed in Tel Aviv at Parterre - Project Space for Philosophy and Art, and curated by our board president, Sandra Weil. The exhibition brings together cultures and religions traversing three continents. Alongside prominent Israeli artist Ohad Meromi and Palestinian artist Erada Jumaa, two Kuchinate artisans proudly displayed their works. Lina Otom Jak Agolon and Mebrhit Gebremariam created works reflecting their cultures and traditions.

In March, we took part in the exhibition of international artist Poly Applebaum at Magasin III Jaffa in her piece "Red Desert, Red Mountain, Red Sea". The piece featured baskets crocheted by Kuchinate artisans.



We were part of an International Women's Days celebration "Women Driving the Green Agenda" in Stockholm, Sweden at the Zimbabwe Ambassador Residence with thanks to Israel's ambassador to Sweden, Ziv Nevo Kulman. Bracelets made by our artisans were given as a gift to everyone at the event including Jenny Ohlsson: State Secretary and Sofia Calltorp: Ambassador for Gender Equality & Coordinator of Feminist Foreign Policy in Sweden.

ADVOCACY CONT.

MADAME MOREAU

Throughout 2022 Kuchinate collaborated with Haitian voodoo artist Madame Moreau, selling her beaded works in our studio and Shabazi shop.

ASSUTA HOSPITAL COLLABORATION

In March, Kuchinate artisans, in collaboration with local organizations Ruach Tova and Larger than Life (G'dolim Me'Hachaim), volunteered for children with cancer at Assuta hospital in Ramat HaChayal. More than 100 staff, doctors, nurses, maintenance, and administration workers crocheted with our Kuchinate artisans and then donated the 100 baskets to children fighting cancer in the hospital.

HAGADDAH SHOW WITH REFUGEEE ARTISTS

We launched the Hotline for Refugees and Migrants' Art Haggadah at our Shabazi store with music from Lily and Tonton Kalupa (asylum seekers from

Congo), poetry by Patrick Kafoya Chuma (an asylum seeker from Congo), and Kuchinate music by the Women's Choir. On display both the Haggadah in and in the store were the works of asylum-seeking artists, including those of the Kuchinate artisans.
