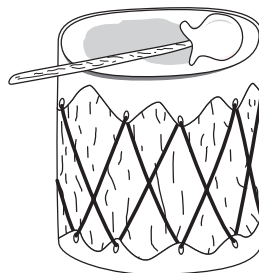
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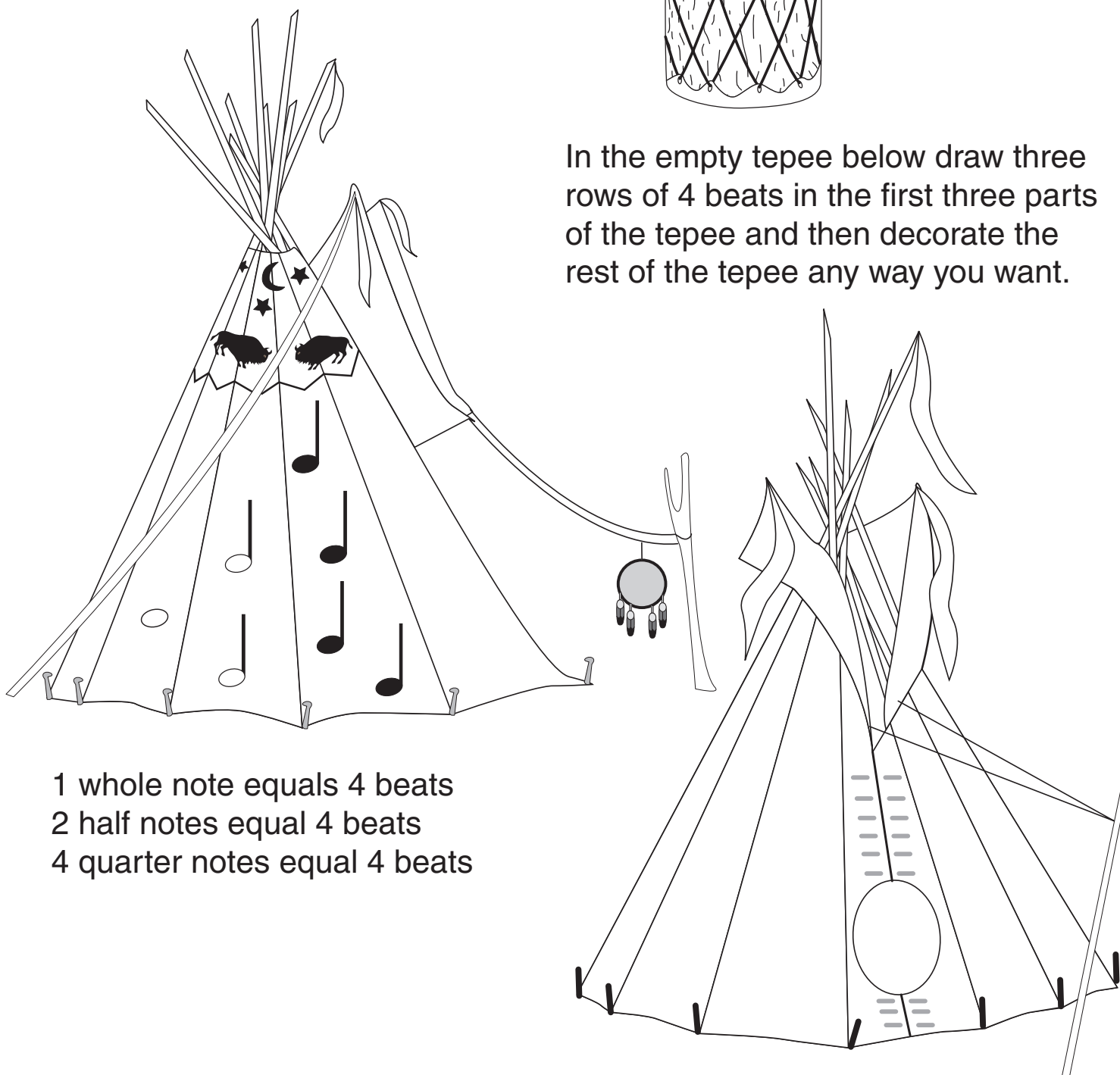


The 4 Beat Tepees

One beat is like the beat of a drum.



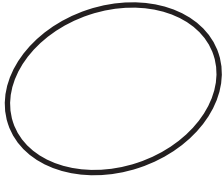
In the empty tepee below draw three rows of 4 beats in the first three parts of the tepee and then decorate the rest of the tepee any way you want.

Whole vs. Hole



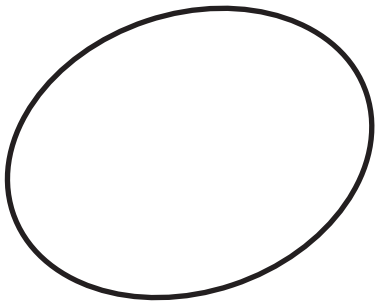
A whole note is white and won't have a stem.
