


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Local Entrepreneur Makes Shark Tank Appearance



US-based Cavmanian singer, songwriter and producer Nicholas George (Nick) and his business partner have secured a \$75,000 deal for their TIK PIK company, during season 15 of ABC's 'Shark Tank', which aired live on Friday, 3 Nov. On the sixth episode of the popular American business pitch-and-investment reality show, Nick, TIK PIK co-founder, appeared on the show with his partner, Kevin MaC, head of corporate sales, who is a singer/ songwriter based in Nashville. They approached the Sharks, who are the socalled "tough, self-made multi-millionaire and billionaire tycoons" to pitch their guitar picks. TIK PIK is a patent-pending guitar pick company that "sticks to your guitar without using any chemicals, adhesives or leaving behind any residue", the company said on its website, adding the pick's "unique design also provides a comfortable non-slip grip, making it easier to hold onto while playing". It added that the 'secret" to its product is the

"nano-suction technology" in which "thousands of tiny suction cups allow TIK PIK to stick to your guitar like a magnet... and provides a comfortable and secure grip while you are playing."

TIME IN THE TANK "As a huge fan of the show myself, I was both nervous and excited to walk out those doors into the tank." Nick explained the time in the tank is much longer than what gets shown on TV, "so there were many emotions that Kevin and I both went [through] as we gave our presentation, answered questions, and eventually [went through] the negotiation." Nick said one of the main things was "making sure I remembered all my facts and figures. The Sharks intentionally know nothing about you [or] your business before you walk out, so it was important to be prepared for whatever direction the conversations could go." Shark Tank judge Mark Cuban makes a deal with the TIK PIK duo. The sharks bit. Judge Mark Cuban ended up making a

deal with the TIK PIK duo. who took a 16% piece of the company for \$75,000.

While the TIK PIK founders secured a deal, they almost missed their chance. "The show came up early in the life of the brand and product. It actually wasn't ideal timing because we were still 'getting off the ground', but we wanted to take advantage of something that was in front of us, and we are glad we did."

During the episode, Cuban gave a big shout-out to Cayman, noting how fond he is of the islands and his frequent visits. He also shared he's a fan of George's dad, singer/musician George Nowak, also known as Barefoot Man. "Going in, I knew that Mark had a home in Cayman, but I didn't realise how important our island(s) are to him and his family. Then hearing they were a fan of my dad's music made my jaw drop!"



Caymans Turtlers and Schooners a Must Read Book Beach

The Caymanian turtler chose a most dangerous occupation - going to sea to face unforeseen weather and ocean conditions, with the ever-present threat of never returning home - just to earn something to take care of his family.

The thrill of the Regattas behind them, the vessels and crewmembers made ready to set sail for the first turtling season of the year from late January to March. In the weeks following Christmas through mid-January, the captains, officers and crew worked ashore,



side-by-side making the necessary preparations for the 10-12 week trip to the Cays off the coast of Nicaragua. Such was the case from early 1900s through 1970, with the 1920s-1940s representing the peak turtling decades.

Working voluntarily, they mended or made new turtle nets, receiving a daily meal from ships' owners as they did so. Sails, riggings, buoys and the body of each schooner was checked and repaired making the vessel ready for the 700-mile round trip journey to the

Miskito Banks and back. Tradesmen and women such as sailmakers, riggers, carpenters, painters, etc. were exceedingly grateful to be able to use their skills and earn a bit of extra money to supplement their income during these seasons of preparation.

'Stores' or supplies for the weeks of rang-


ing were collected from the local shops/merchants who regularly 'outfitted' different vessels. (This consisted of basic items such as kerosene, flour, cornmeal, sugar, salt, lard, and soda; mostly items used to make bread, johnny cakes, dumplings or sea pie to go with the staple diet of fresh caught fish or salted turtle). Barrels or drums were filled with fresh water as water supplies were limited at the cays. Additionally, lines of credit were set up with the sponsoring shop to provide for the families of each crewman during their absence.

When all was ready, fleets of fifteen to twenty schooners and several small boats set sail over the horizon. Each vessel usually carried three officers (a captain and two mates) and ten to twelve seamen. With favorable winds, they arrived at the Miskito Cays within 3-4 days, and the hunt for the great sea turtles

began. Sea turtle meat has a flavor that can range from fishy to beefy. It is usually available as white or dark meat. The meat is lean and flavorful, and can be used in various dishes. It is often compared to veal in texture and taste. The meat is dark and stringy with a slightly sweet taste. It is a delicacy in many countries, and is very popular in Cajun food. In Cayman, especially during the holidays and weddings, turtle stew is still a traditional local favorite.






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Release a sea turtle with Release a sea turtle With **Cayman Turtle Centre**



Cayman Turtle Conservation and $Education\,Centre\,offers\,visitors\,to\,the$ Cayman Islands a once-in-a-lifetime experience, getting up close with a Green sea turtle and participating in its release into the wild. These juvenile Green sea turtles have been raised at the Centre for the first year or two of their life and they are big and strong now.

They are ready for release into the wild and independent research and studies prove that they have a great chance of survival.

Aside from being a national symbol of the Cayman Islands, Green sea turtles have an important environmental role as a 'keystone' species in the marine ecosystem

and as one of the ocean's few large marine herbivores, maintaining coral reefs and seagrass beds by grazing on algae that might overgrow our reefs and by mowing the coastal seagrass in our Sounds to keep them healthy. This helps not just sea turtles but also other breeding marine life such as conch, lobsters, and reef fish, thereby also benefiting our local culture and economy through fishing, diving, etc.

Cayman Turtle Conservation and Education Centre utilizes a conservation technique called headstarting to give yearling Green sea turtles their best shot at survival in the wild. This strategic process begins with their conservation team raising young, endangered turtles

so they can grow larger before being released. This gives them the best chance to make it out in the ocean as they are released at a size that helps eliminate most of their natural predators in the wild.

Comprehensive studies have shown that over 90% all of the nesting wild Green sea turtles in Cayman waters are genetically related to those from the Centre. This scientific evidence confirms that the released turtles are returning to nest in the Cayman Islands, demonstrates that "headstarted" turtles do assimilate into a natural environment, and proves that reintroductions are critical to helping turtle populations recover.

You can adopt one of these head-

started turtles and give them a unique name before gathering with your closest friends or family to release them into the wild. Each turtle released from the Centre is micro-chipped and if they return and lay eggs many years from now this may be detected.

Island is sort of the black-sheep (outcast) of the Cayman Islands. It rarely gets mentioned in the travel magazines or school geography lessons, however for the FUN NEWS staff this is the 'pearl' of the Cayman Islands. WHY? Population - ZERO.

In 1942, after numerous ships were sunk in the Caribbean by German U-boats the US Navy decided to place a Naval base in Grand Cayman. There were about six strikes by the German submarines. One ship the Comayagua was torpedoed about 14 miles of shore from George Town. This level of activity led to the setting up of a small United States Navy base. Forty to sixty men lived there on a regular basis. The arrival of the American military was joy-

fully welcomed by the Caymanian people. With the navy came forms of entertainment previously unavailable on the island, such as movies, cowboy movies were a favorite. Gene Autry, Roy Rogers, and John Wayne. A small generator was used to run the projector in the Town Hall, and the Caymanian residents were invited to the showings.

VISIT THE PENNY BLACK STAMP SHOP for COLLECTORS

The branches of interest extend to many subjects, avid and casual collectors may seek a reference to: history, geography, art/culture, music, sport, nature (animals, plants, birds), transport (vehicles, trains, ships, aeroplane/flight/space, architecture) and many other topics. In terms of local onisland and Caribbean cultural interest there are many illustra-

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Have You Seen These Criminals?

The Cayman Islands are considered one of the safest tourist destinations in the entire Caribbean. Fun News normally avoids any stories on crime, politics and wars. However, this Keystone cops story is just too humorous not to tell.

The year was 1984 - on front page of the Daily Caymanian Compass there is a story that shocks the island: the headline reads "\$1,000 Reward for Burger King robbers." At the time, such a brazen act of transgression was unheard of. There were the rare break-ins, bar fights and speeding violations, but a robbery, with the use of guns? No way; not in the peaceful Cayman Islands! Well, soon the seriousness of the situation turned into sort of a jest, like a joke that takes a while before the punchline kicks in.

A police forensic sketch artist was brought to the scene. A police sketch artist is an artist who assists law enforcement professionals. They produce a visual likeness of people or things related to police investigations. They talk to witnesses to develop a sketch of a suspect, including facial features like color of the eyes and skin, color of the hair, visible scars, etc. The more accurate the image, the better chance of catching the bad boys. And this forensic artist did an amazing job: the likeness he created was almost an exact resemblance of the robbers, a mirror image.

"So what did they look like" asks the

"They had bags over their head, with two holes cut out for the eyes" - both witnesses confirmed the same.

The officer did his work, and the following day his sketch appeared on the front page of the July 26th -1984 edition of the Cayman Compass. A \$ 1,000 reward was offered for



their capture (lots of money back then) and soon the entire island was looking for two suspicious individuals with bags over their heads. You can't make this stuff up.

One such beautiful example would be a set of stamps of the Trafalgar Bi-centennial which coincidentally too, has a special art feature of embedded wood in the design of one stamp.

The subject and art of stamp collecting can be many things to many different people. And as far as collectors and their age group, it is tempting to believe this is mainly an interest of the older generation, but in fact this does vary and the stamp shop attracts a variety of ages, some who just need the basic introduction to build on their initial interest, and others who may be children but who can quickly put most adults in the 'back of the class', due the fact that as young children they may have had the benefit of the influence and time of a knowledgeable elder.

Ultimately, for either a child or an adult: the truism stands "we only stand to learn" by our experiences. WHAT IS IT?



The Flying Gurnard Fish, also known as the helmet gurnard, is a bottom-dwelling fish of tropical to warm temperate waters on both sides of the Atlantic.On the American Side, it is found as far north as Massachusetts and Canada and as far south as Argentina, including the Caribbean and Gulf of Mexico. On the European and African side, it ranges from the English Channel to Angola, including the Mediterranean. This fish is variable in coloration, being brownish or greenish with reddish


or yellowish patches. When excited, the fish spreads its wings, which are semitransparent, with a phosphorescent, bright-blue coloration at their tips. The fish also has large eyes. It reaches up to 50 cm (20 in) and 1.8 kg (4.0 lb). The fish's main diet consists of small fish, bivalves, and crustaceans. They have been spotted often along the sandy bottoms of Caymans sounds and lagoons, and are a sight to See. They look much like an angel.







50 Years of Rum Laced Music

Half of a century ago H G Nowak landed on these shores with a paper bag of personal belonging and a guitar. There were few hotels here at the time, no fast food outlets, no roundabouts, no radio or TV - it was simply "The Island Time Forgot". For George Nowak it was a childhood dream that became reality. He always wanted to be a professional "beach-bum", a Robinson Crusoe, a life of empty beached, sunny days and spearing fish for dinner. He quickly landed a job at Rum Point performing in the Wreck Bar each evening. Owner at the time, Bruce Parker made it clear there was not enough business to hire a full time musician, so other chores were necessary, but the beer, burgers and hammock were free. George eventually was tagged as the "Barefoot Boy": he had tossed his sandals and helped rake the beach, watered the plants and taking out the garbage. His favorite job was to catch fish for the restaurant. At the time

Rum Point had around a dozen guest rooms. Soon, he was discovered by Dave Mitchell, manager of the Galleon Beach Hotel on the Seven Mile Beach side, so several night per week, he started performing there. A few years later, Cayman's first luxury style, 200 room hotel was built - The Grand Caymanian Holiday Inn. Now advancing to the "Barefoot Man", he was offered a long contract and, finally, some good money. He stayed on for 23 years till the

Ritz purchased the property. From there he moved back to Rum Point and then on to the Wyndham Resort where he performed for some 20 years - till Covid ended it all.

During that "walk of life", he has recorded some 20 albums, mostly his original rum laced originals. His first record was on a 45 rpm vinyl and then on to 33 1/3 long play, cassettes, 8-tracks, compact discs and now, he's part of the streaming word - Spotify, ITunes, Amazon Music and all the rest. He claims to be 75% retired, however you can still hear him and his band members at Pane & Pasta now and then - reservations suggested. Call 547-9208. 






Go To Hell! Sinner Or Saint, It's Worth The Drive



Hell is an area within the district of West Bay, Grand Cayman. Its name comes from a group of short, black, limestone formations, located in the area. Its eerie and rather sinister look is what gave it its infamous name. It is roughly the size of half a football field. Visitors are not permitted to walk on the limestone formations but viewing platforms are provided. A gift shop and service station is located in the area, and art depicting Satan can be seen when entering. There are numerous versions of how

Hell received its name, but there are generally variations on what a past Governor once said, "This is what hell must look like."

It is also claimed that the name "Hell" is derived from the fact that if a pebble is thrown out into the formation, it echoes among the limestone peaks and valleys and sounds as if the pebble is falling all the way down to "Hell." Regardless of how it first came to be called Hell, the name stuck, and the area has become a tourist attraction, featuring a fire-engine red hell-

themed post office from which you can send "postcards from hell", and a gift shop, where the staff says phrases like "How the hell are you?" and "Where the hell are you from?" Some of the stores in the area feature prominent quotations from the Bible on their sides. This is due to the pious and religious nature of Caymanian society. There is a church just a stones throw from the gates of Hell - And keep in mind - if you go to Hell with someone you're mad at, where do you tell them to go?

- The biggest shark is the whale shark which can grow up to 50 feet long. The dusky shark can exert a force of 132 pounds with a single bite. A shark may use 20,000 teeth during its lifetime.
- Most sharks never sleep because they have to constantly pump water through their mouth over their gills to breath or they will die.
- Most sharks can see well in poorly lit areas, have fantastic night vision, and can see colors. The back of sharks' eyeballs have a reflective layer of tissue called a tapetum. This helps sharks see extremely well with little light.
- The ocean is a dangerous place - for sharks. Experts estimate that humans kill over 100 million sharks every year across

the globe. When you look at this number compared to the recovery and reproduction rates of sharks, it's horribly distressing. The Cayman Island Brewery donates a portion of its White Tip Beer sales to Guy Harvey's shark research program.

- More people are killed by falling coconuts each year than shark attacks.
- The most dangerous place in Cayman - for humans, is attempting to go round a round-about.





The Cayman Parrot Sanctuary



The Cayman Parrot Sanctuary all started as a dream, then became an idea, and soon advanced to a project, which is now a reality. Tukka's Chef Ron Hargrave originally planned to build a simple playground and mini-zoo for his children and the youngsters of East End. A few swings, a slide, a sandbox and then toss in a

few parrots and agoutis to keep the kids busy while he watches over his popular restaurants.. Soon one notion turned to another and now, nearly three years after the idea was hatched it's become one of Grand Caymans major Tourist attractions and a home for snakes, turtles, guinea pigs, rabbits, hermit crabs and a family of Cayman Parrots that share the grounds with other feathered friends, and of course the star of the show Lil-Bit a friendly agouti that everyone comes to see.

Mrs Regina Nowak has become Chef Ron's official zoo-keeper, ing the sanctuary running smoothly. Mrs. Nowak is well known on the island for her compassion for animals. The sanctuary residents are lucky to have Mrs. Nowak and the Sanctuary team take care of their daily needs. They require fresh water, clean cages, love and food which is within their natural dietary habits, such as sea grapes, almonds, tamarinds, mangos and a mouse now and then for the snakes. Such staples are not always found in your local grocery store, so as the official zoo keeper, Mrs. Nowak spends

lots of time trekking through the back-bush of East End for supplies. On the rare occasion when an animal gets sick or injured, a trip to the veterinarian in George Town becomes necessary. The Sanctuary is open Wednes-



It charms visitors to our shores, as well as commands the respect of Islanders that, in some parts of the world, depend on it for their livelihood. Known regionally as the 'tree of life' every part is used, from its tallest frond down to its rooted trunk - from the sweet, delectable juice and fresh meat of its fruit, to the husks to fuel fires, fronds to make baskets, and the trunks for building homes and furniture. In Cayman, in the old days, before spray insect repellent, the coconut husks were burned in the yards to keep mosquitoes away.

It rules our beaches, with

ing into our blue skies and turquoise seas. In smaller south-sea islands where crop cultivation is not possible, coconut is the only staple food, ensuring food security for island inhabitants. You can drink its delicious water, eat the flavorful white meat, make perfumes and soaps from its oil. The hard shell is used for making buttons or drinking cups, the fronds are made into hats, baskets, roofs and fish traps etc. The trunk can be carved out and made into a canoe and the entire tree can become a huge umbrella to shade you from the tropical

sun as you sip a rum punch on the beach.

Now, the versatile coconut tree has one more propitious feature - something we could use in Cayman considering the high cost of fuel: Tony Deamer has converted his car to run on coconut oil.

PORT VILA, Vanuatu: Rounding a corner and heading up a steep hill outside the capital city of this lush South Pacific island nation, Tony Deamer stomped on the gas pedal of his Range Rover - but didn't downshift. With nary a sputter or a cough, the vehicle -- modified to run on coco-


nut oil instead of diesel fuel
-- took the incline in stride.
"Coconut oil is a bit more
torquey, because it burns
slower," said Mr. Deamer,
an Australian-born motor
mechanic. "Normally, I'd
have to shift down into first
here, but with coconut oil, I

can keep it in second gear."

In what could prove to be

a boon for both the environment and cash-strapped South Pacific islands, Mr. Deamer has succeeded in proving that automotive diesel engines, with very little modification, can run safely on coconut oil. The discovery has huge potential for island nations like Vanuatu where the cost of imported

oil is a heavy burden on the economy. Mr. Deamer operates about a dozen vehicles on pure coconut oil. Why hasn't someone thought of that here in Cayman? Imagine driving into a gas station:- "Sir, would you like high-test or regular?" - "Neither! Fill her up with coconut".

Coconut is a versatile and nutritious food. According to Livia Dickson Chen, a nutrition expert with over 11 years of experience, coconut water helps to hydrate the body and improve the skin, the pulp which is a source of fibers that help in good intestinal functioning and substances that help reduce inflammation. Coconut oil



helps modulate the intestinal microbiota due to its antimicrobial action and helps fight infections. Coconut is also rich in antioxidants, which can help protect the body from damage caused by harmful molecules called free radicals. It has antibacterial effects and may promote blood sugar control. Coconut is the fruit of the coconut palm, which is commonly used for its water, milk, oil, tasty meat and even petrol in some parts of the world. It is low in carbs and high in fiber and fat, making it a great choice if

you're on a low carb, paleo,

or gluten-free diet. In summary, coconut has many potential health benefits, including hydration, improved skin, good intestinal functioning, reduced inflammation, antimicrobial action, and protection against free radicals. It is a great addition to a healthy diet.

The nut has also been known to cause conflict. Now and then there will be a



Cayman Turtle Conservation & Education Centre



Cayman Turtle Conservation and Education Centre (CTCEC) has achieved a new milestone with the number of Green sea turtles released into the wild reaching over 36,000 since its release programmes began in 1980.

The Centre is dedicated to protecting and conserving sea turtles, as well as other native species, and their captive breeding programme has played an essential role in the recovery of the Cayman Islands' wild

Green sea turtle population. In recent years, a Darwin Plus study, in collaboration with the University of Barcelona, revealed by DNA analysis that a minimum of 90% of Grand Cayman's nesting Green sea turtle population shows genetic relationships to the Centre's breeder turtles: in other words, at least 90% of Cayman's current breeding population originates from turtles that the Centre has released in prior years.

"We are thrilled to have

released over 36,000 Green sea turtles into the wild," Mr. Christopher Jackson, Acting CEO at CTCEC, said. "Our conservation initiatives are vital to the survival of this endangered species, and we are proud of the impact we have made in protecting and conserving Green Sea Turtles here in the Cayman Islands."

The release of these turtles is a significant milestone for CTCEC and comes as the Centre celebrates its 55th year of op-

erations, having been established in 1968.

The Centre's mission is to provide a unique and lasting experience with endangered sea turtles and other wildlife, through conservation, education, research, and sustainability in the Cayman Islands and beyond. In addition to the captive breeding and release of the Green Sea Turtles, the Centre has also been involved in other conservation efforts, including the restoration of mangroves and breeding of our National Bird, the Cayman parrot.

Visitors to the Centre can enjoy up close wildlife encounters with turtles, Caribbean birds, and other native animals. Also on offer are unique experiences such as private turtle releases and the opportunity to become a 'Keeper for a Day'. Learn more at www.turtle.ky.
