



Lion Fish - From Bad to Good

Steve Broadbelt and his team at Ocean Frontiers have culled way over 12,000 lionfish from East End reefs; Chef Ron Hargrave from Tukka and Chef Wayne from Eagle Rays have purchased a majority of these predators to cook up in delectable local dishes. Lionfish are beautiful, resilient and strong - a cool fish, but they are deadly to our reefs and if we don't stop them from multiplying, we have a serious problem. Steve Broadbelt has watched the invasion and has deep concern for the marine environment. "Lionfish are still around,

but largely under control, but we still need to weed the garden to keep on top of any increases in their population" says Steve. Once the "bad" predators are bagged and brought to the surface, there's more to the story. Public enemy # 1 on the reef becomes the famous lionfish Taco. Rather than being discouraged by the lionfish presence, many communities have decided to turn this challenge into an opportunity to explore a unique and delicious culinary experience. When alive, lionfish are known for their venomous fin rays, which makes them hazardous to other ma-



rine animals, as well as humans. However, after a visit to the frying pan, this fish becomes a delight in your

belly. So when visiting the Far Side, be sure to place an order for these invaders at your favourite restaurants.

Nothing like a huge juicy sweet mango that drizzles through your fingers - what a




Bush Medicine

There was a time in Cavman, when the seriously sick could not call an ambulance, the nearest hospital was in Jamaica this was way before any sort of flying craft even came near the Cayman Islands. The journey, by sail, could take several days, or longer, subject to wind conditions. Often, depending on the illness, the patient would pass away before reaching Jamacia. Fortunately, most Caymanians at the time remained rather healthy due to lots of sunshine, healthy eating habits, hard work and few virus-carrying visitors.

With families to maintain and daily chores to be done, Caymanians of yesteryear living off the land and sea had to learn to make use of the resources on hand, which included the local herbs. The knowledge about the medicinal and therapeutic uses of these plants, once passed down from generation to generation, is sadly difficult to access these days. However, thanks to the efforts of a few individuals and organizations, among them North Side's Queen Elizabeth II Botanic Park, that knowledge is being preserved.

Medicinal plants have their own special section of the park's Heritage Garden. The garden also features a traditional Caymanian cottage built circa 1900 and once owned by Julius Rankine of East End, a front sand garden, grounds for the cultivation of root crops and vegetables, and a collection of traditional fruit trees.

The garden reflects the importance of the Earth's bounty to survival in Cayman's challenging conditions. Herbs provided medicine for health, flavor for the pot, fragrance for the skin and hair, and, for some, the added recreation of a good smoke. "There was no modern medicine back in Cayman's early days, and people had to rely on what is known as 'bush medicine,' which, what people may not be aware of, is the origin of many modern medicines as we know them today," said park manager John Lawrus. "Most societies in the Tropics valued the therapeutic uses of plants, and the same was true in the Cayman Islands," he said. "Some of these traditional remedies are now becoming well

known in alternative medicine to treat various ailments."

In Cayman, families grew or gathered these valued plants, dried and preserved them for future use, and kept seeds from year to year. Plant traditions were passed down to children, who accompanied their parents inland to the family grounds to help with seeding the soil after helping

to harvest the crops. Herb plants were cherished, and folks watched to see that only what was needed was picked, so that others could make use the benefits of the plants. Even today, with a modern Government hospital and facilities such as Health City, some of the old-timers still prefer their medication comes from the bush rather than a pharmacy.

There will be 15 minutes of free time to explore the viewing deck where there is also a snack and gift shop.





The Cayman Islands National Anthem

Composed by - Leila Elberta Ross-Shier (born McTaggart 16 November 1886 - she worked as an educator, librarian and was an official Registrar of Births and Deaths. Despite the norm of segregation at the time, she encour-

aged all high school students to read, no matter the colour of their skin. Ross-Shier wrote "Beloved Isle Cayman" in 1930. She also wrote hymns and ballads, organized concerts and was a church organist. Ross-Shier was one of the signers of a petition that led

to granting women's suffrage in the Cayman Islands in 1959. Ross-Shier died on September 26, 1968, in Grand Cayman.

Did you Know? Who was Owen Roberts?



Caymans Owen Roberts International Airport is the main airport for the Cayman Islands as well as the main base for Cayman Airways. The airport is named after British Royal Air Force (RAF) Wing Commander Owen Roberts, a pioneer of commercial aviation in the country.

Owen Roberts Airport is one of the two entrance ports to the Cayman Islands. At one time, it was the only international airport remaining in the Caribbean with an open-air observation "waving gallery" until January 2017, when it was closed due to reconstruction. The upgraded Owen Roberts International Airport passenger terminal no longer has an outdoor observation "waving gallery," and that's too bad: the gallery is very much missed by locals.


Wg Cdr. Owen Roberts was

a Wing Commander in the Royal Air Force, during World War II. Following the war, Roberts retired and later founded Caribbean International Airways (CIA). By 1950, Roberts had established regular service between Grand Cayman and Tampa, Florida; Kingston, Jamaica; and British Honduras (now Belize). During the early 1950s, Caribbean International Airlines was operating weekly seaplane service between Grand Cayman and both Tampa and Kingston with Consolidated PBY Catalina amphibian aircraft as the airstrip on Grand Cayman had yet to be completed. In 1953 Roberts died in a plane crash.



Stinky The Randy Dolphin Makes Headlines (Cayman-Sept 2012)

Were you hoping to get lucky on your vacation? You know, like Dudley Moore in the movie '10'. Well, that was fiction, this is fact. Back in 2012 a randy dolphin, by the name of 'Stinky' was looking for love in all the wrong places, in the waters off the Cayman Islands. He'd been getting frisky with divers in the area and was caught on video. The encounter with "Stinky" the dolphin was filmed by Michael Maes, an underwater videographer based on Grand Cayman Island. The video, posted to Maes' You-Tube page, shows the lonesome dolphin circling and trying to "ride" Maes before turning to Maes' friend. Stinky is then seen rubbing his body along the other diver's back before trying to roll him over. Maes said he posted the video, which went viral with more than 102,000 views, to show the dangers of lone dolphins like Stinky, who was looking for a mate. "It remains a wild animal and Stinky is in an awkward situation, which can turn him into a playful killer-machine," he wrote on his YouTube page. At the time Maes said - "Please be prudent people and get out of the water when you see him. Believe me, if he decides, you don't stand the



slightest chance!"

The sight of the dolphin delighted many boaters, swimmers and divers, but his antics dismayed scientists who traveled to study him. They said at the time, "Stinky could be a danger to humans. This was confirmed by Laura Engleby, a marine mammal branch chief with the U.S. National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

At the time, Cayman Islands TV station CITN posted a poll on its site asking viewers whether the government should try to stop

What is it?

IT'S AN AGOUTI

Agoutis have five toes on their front feet and three toes on their hind feet; the first toe is very small. The tail is very short or non-existent and hairless. The molar teeth have cylindrical crowns, with several islands and a single lateral with enamel fold. Agoutis may grow to be up to 60 cm (24 in) in length and 4 kg (8.8 lb) in weight. Most species are brown on their backs and whitish or buff on their bellies; the fur may have a glossy appearance and then glimmer in an orange colour.

In the wild, they are shy animals and flee from humans; in captivity, they can become trusting. In Trinidad, for example, they are renowned for being very fast runners, able to keep hunting dogs occupied by chasing them for hours. In Cayman they are known as a Cayman rabbit and can be seen

often dashing through the bush and wild of the North Side and East End part of the island. The Cayman Parrot Sanctuary in East End is the home of 'Lil-bit', considered the most famous rodent in the Caribbean. He loves taking pictures with visitors. Cayman rabbits (when cooked by a local) are also quite a delicacy - but don't tell 'Lil-bit' that.





Red sky at night is a sailor's delight, and it also makes for some pretty spectacular sunsets. But why are some sunsets so extra-special? Generally, what's considered a magnificent sunset is a particularly colourful one, with hues of red, orange and pink streaked across the

evening sky. And when it comes to color, the brighter the better. The colors we see - or don't see - in a sunset are the results of a scientific phenomenon called light scattering. The color we see is determined by the different wavelengths of light, plus the size of the particles in the atmosphere.

Ok, now that sounds like a bunch of scientific gibberish - Now let us get the unsystematic point of view from a tourist or local sitting on a bar stool at Kingston Bight on Little Cayman.

Sir Turtle - Little Cayman's Luxury Villa

Just 70 miles away and a short flight on Cayman Express, lies the jewel of the Caymans. Little Cayman's population stays at around 200 full-time residents, thousands of birds and many iguanas which still have the right of way. The school has three or four students and two teachers. Owen Island (our fourth Island) is located in Little Cayman's South Hole Lagoon. There are a few Dive Resorts and restaurants and then there's Sir Turtle. This Villa was the get-away home for the legendary diver Bob Soto who passed away in 2015.

The property is located high above sea level with unparalleled views of the beach on one side and the official RAMSAR Bird Sanctuary on the other.

Designed as a duplex split into two homes, each nautical style villa has four bedrooms (3 king sized beds and one twin room) and two bathrooms and an open loft so it can comfortably sleep 10-12 people. You can rent the red side or the blue side or both for a big gathering.

It truly is the most relaxing break away from it all, with both sides sharing a private beach and dock, private pool and you can feel free to use their kayaks, paddle boards or bikes to explore the island. The beach is blinding white and the lagoon that surrounds it shimmers in the sunlight, a lagoon so clear it would seem invisible if it were not for the dive boats anchored in the distance. On Owen Island there is a sign



under a coconut tree, that reads:

"PRIVATE PROPERTY -VISITORS WELCOME - PLEASE KEEP THIS ISLAND CLEAN"

How charming is that?

Bodden Town – Cayman's First Capital (Home of the Grape Tree Cafe')

Bodden Town was the first settlement of any size on Grand Cayman, situated in the island's most fertile area and next to what was then, a fine natural harbor, protected by the reef. Originally known as 'South Side', by the time it was visited by George Gauld, a Navy surveyor, in 1773, about half of the island's total population of 400 lived there. Gauld had been commissioned to survey the coast of the island, and it was at this time that the settlement was named Bodden Town. It is thought that this was because of the large number of inhabitants bearing the name Bodden. Gauld states that Isaac Bodden was the grandson of the original Bodden, a soldier from Cromwell's army. Well, that was then - and this is now. Now the village is famous for the awardwinning Grape Tree Cafe' located right on the beach. You can't miss it - right near the RUBIS gas Station. We at FUN- News suggest our hungry visitors to take our advice - leave your "fast-food" thoughts behind and prepare your palate for some real local

fare at the Grape Tree Cafe'. Conch soup, jerk and roast fish, an array of sides, and their very popular fried fish. Mahi bites is the latest addition, and try the red bean soup, cassava, curried goat, oxtail, and the ultra seafood delicacy 'grilled lobster'. Down that with coconut water... now you just can get more native than that. If you are lucky enough to meet Mr. Ossie, the owner, prepare for a wealth of information about the first capitol and more local edibles. While you're having your lunch or dinner, you can turn the kids loose to play on the beach - this place is a true Cayman delight.









Were there Pirates in Cayman?

Dirty Reid Walker - in the Cayman Triangle

By 1660, the English had established themselves in Jamaica and begun treating the Cayman Islands as natural appendages of the larger territory. However, apart from small settlements on Grand Cayman and Little Cayman, most of the three islands were left untouched. This was ideal for pirates, since Cayman also lay astride the route of treasure galleons returning to Spain, laden with gold and silver from the New World.


This promise of capturing Spanish treasure ships on their way home from the Caribbean soon attracted the attention of a motley crowd of buccaneers, pirates and freebooters. The 'Golden Age' of piracy spanned from the 1650s to the 1730s and Cayman's most notorious pirate was Edward Teach, otherwise known as Blackbeard, who frequented the area from 1713 to his death on the 22nd of November 1718.

The celebration of Pirates Fest (Cayman's National Festival), which runs in the later part of each year, is downplayed in favor of district heritage days. Some of the biggest names in buccaneering circles, including Lowther, Lowe, Morgan and Blackbeard, prowled the coasts of the Cayman Islands. During Pirates week, there are many costumed Blackbeard and Johnny Depp look-alikes running around the island, getting the tourists in the buccaneer spirit.


According to Neville Williams' 'A History of the Cayman Islands', the abundance of fresh water, turtle meat and wood made Cayman an ideal landing spot. Further-



more, the Islands offered pirate captains the possibility of finding crews to man captured vessels and a quiet location away from the authorities, where pirates could hide their loot and careen and repair their vessels. However, this pirate's haven only lasted for about 110 years; by the 1730s, the scourge of the buccaneers had been largely tamed, if not discouraged by the growing population. In the early 70's the movie titled 'The Cayman Triangle' was filmed in Grand Cayman. It was an exciting event on the island, way before we had radio, TV or cinemas. Produced and directed by Anderson Humphries, it told the story of Dirty Reid Walker, considered the most notorious pirate of them all - of course, the entire film was a spoof and fictional - it was however well-received by locals and even took some awards at various film festivals. It can be viewed on You-Tube.



The Incredible, Eatable Conch

Don't say conch - say it like the local - it's a "konk". The meat of conches are often eaten raw in salads or cooked in burgers, chowders, fritters, and gumbos. Conch is indigenous to the Caribbean and West Indies. Conch is particularly popular in the Bahamas, Turks and Caicos, The Caymans and Jamaica. Conch is often cooked into fritters, stews and curries. In the Dominican Republic, Grenada, and Haiti, conch is commonly eaten in curries or in a spicy soup. It is locally referred to as lambi. In Puerto Rico, conch is served as a ceviche, often called ensalada de carrucho (conch salad), consisting of raw conch marinated in lime juice, olive oil, vinegar, garlic, green peppers, and onions. And there's this thing called 'The Conch spaghetti', a thin, clear spaghetti-like string that makes up part of the conchs anatomy. It has a salty flavor and worth a souvenir video when gulping one down.

Some chefs get stingy when making conch fritters - often they use more dough

than conch... the best way to make conch fritters, no matter your ingredients or spices, is to put lots of conch in it.

belly. Pearls from
the queen conch
are rare and have
been collectors'

rian times. Conch pearls occur in a range of hues, including white, brown, and orange, with many intermediate shades, but pink is the colour most associated with the conch pearl, such that these pearls are sometimes referred to simply as "pink pearls".






