




VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL CURRICULUM TEACHER'S MANUAL: 4 AND 5 YEAR OLDS







Welcome to the Scottish Sleuths Vacation Bible School curriculum series. Each year, our Scottish Super Sleuths, Angus McTavish and Professor Dabney Thornwell, are called in to solve a Biblical "case" with the help of the VBS children. The detective characters symbolically portray the message that we want the students to learn to become thoughtful investigators of Biblical truth.

This year, the Case of the Titanic Transformation takes us through the beginning chapters of the Book of Acts. The focus is on investigating the beginnings of the early church and its application to our lives today. Christians are baptized in the Spirit and the Church is built by the Spirit. We also learn how the Church is given the boldness of the Spirit, does battle in the strength of the Spirit and adds believers by the work of the Spirit!

Curriculum Distinctives

- 1. Focuses on the verbal transmission of Bible stories (The art of storytelling).
- 2. Emphasizes class discussion in an open question and answer format.
- 3. Age-appropriate.
- 4. Maximizes the small amount of time with profound truths without trying to be too theologically elaborate.
- 5. Reduces the amount of "busy work."
- 6. Does not overload with too much content or too many activities.

Vacation Bible School is a ministry of the local church that is intended to be primarily evangelistic in nature. The curriculum presents

the gospel message from God's Word in the context of loving relationships between teachers and their students. Therefore, it is vital for each teacher to remember that VBS is all about:

- Showing the love of Christ to each one of your students;
- b) Faithfully and clearly presenting the gospel of Jesus Christ from God's Word; and,
- c) Praying for God's Spirit to do His sovereign work in the lives of the VBS children.

Please feel free to use your creative energy to mold this curriculum to your own personality and the learning styles of your particular students. Remember that the end goal of all our teaching is to bring students face-to-face with the gospel of Jesus Christ with full dependence on His Spirit to change hearts and minds.

On Classroom Setup

The most important thing to remember about your classroom setup is that it should be conducive to learning. Arrange the room in such a way that the students can effectively hear and see the teacher(s) and have classroom discussion. Also, post the Scripture Memory, Application Points and other visual aids that will focus the minds of the children on God's truths.

Don't worry about decorating according to the theme—but you are welcome to be as creative as possible. The priority is making the room a place that helps the children learn.

DAY ONE

BIBLE TEXT

Acts 1:1-2:13

MEMORY VERSE

I Corinthians 12:13a

SCRIPTURE TRUTH

The Christian is baptized with the Holy Spirit in order to have power to live the Christian life and spread the gospel.

LESSON AIM

For the students to know that the Holy Spirit is the promised gift of God given to His Church.



The opening program includes a skit to introduce the day's theme, a time of singing, and announcements. After the opening program, go with your students back to your classroom.



Introduce yourself, your co-teacher(s), and your classroom helpers. Greet the boys and girls warmly, working diligently to memorize their names. Make sure each student has a name tag.



[Note: Each day's icebreaker is intended to: 1) help build relationships between leaders and students, and between students themselves; and, 2) help "warm up" the students so that they will engage in conversation about the Bible Lesson.]

Have the students sit down. Get their attention.

Have all students share what they want to be when they grow up. Comment on how interesting the answers are! You may also share what your dreams were as a child.

Transition: It will be interesting to see how many of you end up doing the things you

think you will be doing in the future. A lot will CHANGE for you over the next fifteen to twenty years, that's for sure. In our studies this week, we will see how life TOTALLY changes for the early disciples of Jesus!



[Note: The "Bible Lesson" time is intended to: 1) Allow the students to read and hear God's Word and gain understanding of what it says; 2) Raise questions in their minds that will be discussed during the "Bible Application" time.]

<u>Materials</u>: Our younger children need this storytelling time to be dramatic as well as visual. Feel free to bring in pictures, drawings, flannelgraphs, puppets, etc., as visual aids.

Introduction: This week, we will be investigating the Book of Acts in the New Testament. The longer title of this Bible book is "The Acts of the Apostles." As we study this week, you will see that a better name for this exciting book is: "The Acts of the Holy Spirit in the lives of the Apostles." We'll begin our study in Acts 1.

Read Acts 1:1-5.

¹ In the first book, O Theophilus, I have dealt with all that Jesus began to do and teach, ² until the day when he was taken up, after he had given commands through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen. ³ He presented himself alive to them after his suffering by many proofs, appearing to them during fortydays and speaking about the kingdom of God. ⁴ And while staying with them he ordered them not to depart from Jerusalem, but to wait for the promise of the Father, which, he

said, "you heard from me; 5 for John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days from now."

Discussion: When do the opening stories of the Book of Acts take place? [After Jesus' resurrection, right before His ascension.] What did Jesus order the apostles to do? [To stay in Jerusalem.] What did Jesus PROMISE the apostles? [The baptism of the Holy Spirit.]

Let's continue. Read verses 6-8.

⁶ So when they had come together, they asked him, "Lord, will you at this time restore the kingdom to Israel?" ⁷ He said to them, "It is not for you to know times or seasons that the Father has fixed by his own authority. ⁸ But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth."

Discussion: What will the apostles receive when the Holy Spirit comes upon them? [Power.] And what will the Holy Spirit enable them to do? [To be Christ's witnesses.]

Listen! Read verses 9-11.

⁹ And when he had said these things, as they were looking on, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. ¹⁰ And while they were gazing into heaven as he went, behold, two men stood by them in white robes, ¹¹ and said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking into heaven? This Jesus, who was taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven."

Discussion: What happened to Jesus after He said these words? [He ascended into heaven.] Those were two angels standing with the disciples!

Let's read more.

Read verses 12-14.

¹² Then they returned to Jerusalem from the mount called Olivet, which is near Jerusalem, a Sabbath day's journey away. ¹³ And when they had entered, they went up to the upper room, where they were staying, Peter and John and James and Andrew, Philip and Thomas, Bartholomew and Matthew, James the son of Alphaeus and Simon the Zealot and Judas the son of James. ¹⁴ All these with one accord were devoting themselves to prayer, together with the women and Mary the mother of Jesus, and his brothers.

Discussion: Where are the apostles now? [In an upper room in Jerusalem.] What were they doing in this upper room? [They were devoting themselves to prayer.]

Summary: Peter is now the main leader of the apostles. He stood up and reminded the 120 people in the upper room how Judas had betrayed Jesus, in fulfillment of the Scriptures. Since Judas was gone now, it was time to replace him with another apostle.

Listen. Read verses 23-26.

²³ And they put forward two, Joseph called Barsabbas, who was also called Justus, and Matthias. ²⁴ And they prayed and said, "You, Lord, who know the hearts of all, show which one of these two you have chosen ²⁵ to take the place in this ministry and apostleship from which Judas turned aside to go to his own place." ²⁶ And they cast lots for them, and the lot fell on Matthias, and he was numbered with the eleven apostles.

Discussion: Who were the two nominees for apostle? [Justus and Matthias.] Who was chosen by the Holy Spirit? [Matthias.] Now we have twelve apostles again!

Let's continue.

Read Acts 2:1-4.

¹ When the day of Pentecost arrived, they were all together in one place. ² And suddenly there came from heaven a sound like a mighty rushing wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. ³ And divided tongues as of fire appeared to them and rested on each one of them. ⁴ And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance.

Discussion: What annual feast day were the people celebrating? [Pentecost.] What sound filled the entire house? [A mighty rushing wind.] What came to rest on the heads of the apostles? [Divided tongues as of fire.] Then what started happening? [They spoke in other languages as the Holy Spirit gave them utterance.]

Let's read more. Read verses 5-11.

⁵ Now there were dwelling in Jerusalem Jews, devout men from every nation under heaven. 6 And at this sound the multitude came together, and they were bewildered, because each one was hearing them speak in his own language. 7 And they were amazed and astonished, saying, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? 8 And how is it that we hear, each of us in his own native language? 9 Parthians and Medes and Elamites and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, 10 Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, ¹¹ both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabians—we hear them telling in our own tongues the mighty works of God."

Discussion: Why were the residents of Jerusalem so astonished? [They heard the apostles speaking in their own languages.] What were the apostles talking about? [The mighty works of God!]

Let's finish our reading for today.

Read verses 12-13.

¹² And all were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" ¹³ But others mocking said, "They are filled with new wine."

Conclusion: Were ALL the people amazed by the power of the Holy Spirit? [No, some people mocked the apostles.] We'll talk more about this amazing baptism of the Holy Spirit during Bible Application time!

Close this time with prayer, thanking God for His Word.



Go with your children to the Recreation Area. The Recreation Team will be responsible for your students during this time. **Use this time** as your break.



Snacks will be delivered to your classroom. Have a volunteer lead the class in a prayer of thanks for the food and drink. Make sure the students respect each other while eating and clean up after themselves. This is also a good time for all of the children to take a bathroom break.



Escort your children to the Music Area. The Music Team will lead the class in a time of singing and learning the various VBS songs. **Use this time to prepare for Bible Application time.**



[Note: For pre-schoolers, the Bible Application time is intended to reinforce the truths that were presented during the Bible Lesson time. This is done by teaching one and two word simple concepts. The "Application Point" titles are for the teacher's use only.]

Application Point 1: God always keeps His promises

Materials: Gum for all the children.

Jesus told His disciples, the first apostles of the Church, not to leave Jerusalem. What were they supposed to wait for? [The baptism of the Holy Spirit.] They were promised the Holy Spirit. Did they receive this promise from God? [Yes.]

All through the Scriptures, from Genesis to Revelation, we see God making promises to His people. And, we always learn that He keeps ALL of His promises as well. It's one thing to make promises; it's another thing to perfectly keep them! Let me make a promise to you. I promise to give you all a piece of gum at the end of class today. Now let's say I forget that promise or decide not to give you the gum. How would you feel? Allow answers.

So what would life be like if God made promises but only kept SOME of them SOME of the time? Allow answers. In what ways would it change YOUR life if you couldn't count on God to keep His word? Give your students some examples.

Our God is THE promise-keeper. He never lies. He is totally powerful to follow through on what He says He will do. Sending the Holy Spirit was a vital promise that was perfectly kept.

Since God keeps His promises, He also expects His people to keep their promises. So why do we so often FAIL to keep our promises to God and to other people? Allow answers. [Help the students see their own sinfulness and need for Jesus!]

Serving a God who always keeps His promises brings great comfort and stability into our lives. It also shows us that God loves His people. On to the next point...

Application Point 2: God's people are baptized with the Holy Spirit

Materials: A flashlight with batteries.

As we have already said, Jesus promised that the apostles would be BAPTIZED with the Holy Spirit. This is a promise He made several times beforehand as well. Were they BAPTIZED with the Spirit? [Yes.]

We often think of baptism as something done by a minister, with water. This water baptism is
